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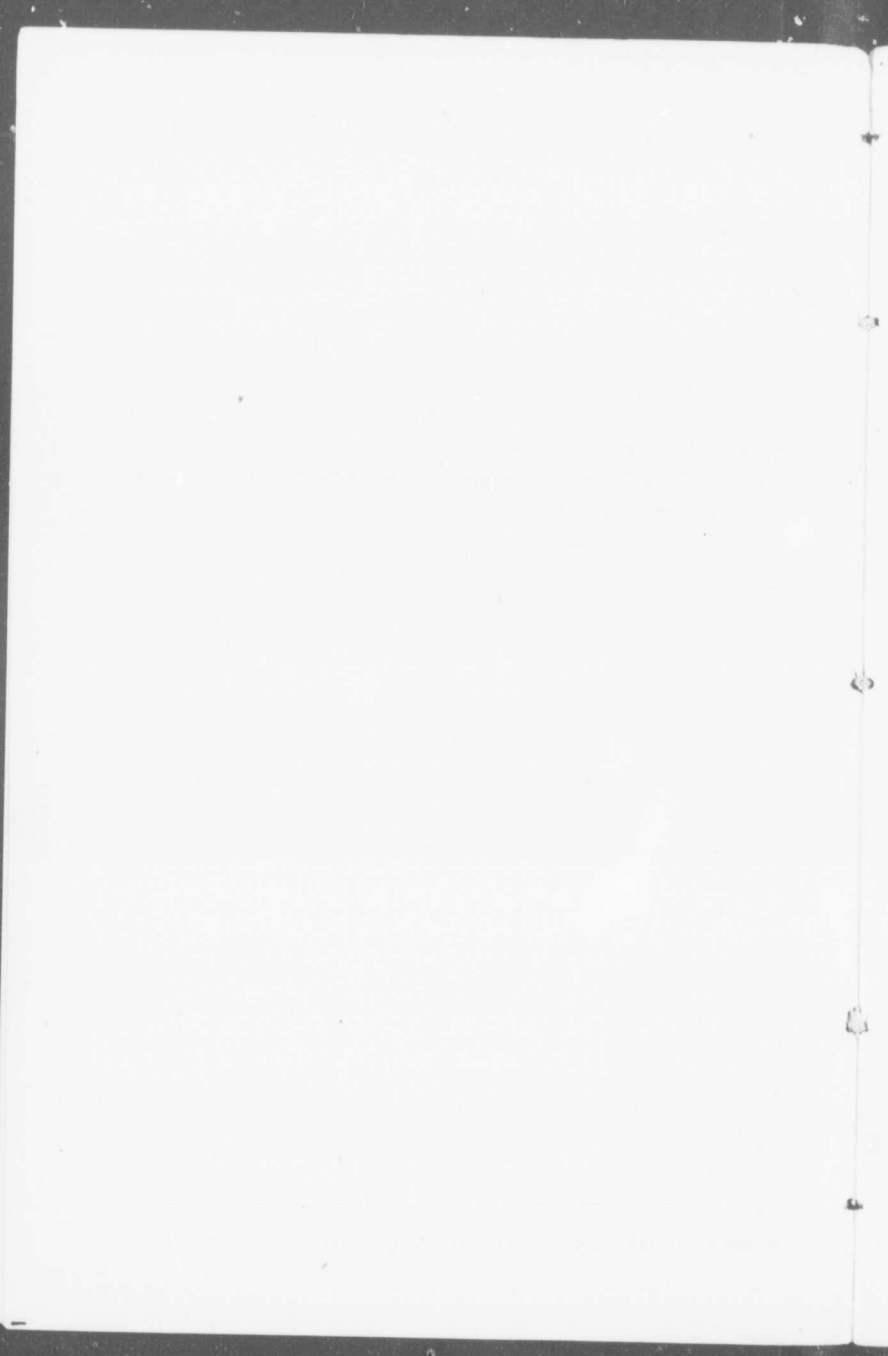
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INTRODUCTION.

Dr. W. Bell Dawson, F.R.S.C., found amongst the papers of his late father, a manuscript letter, dated 1872, from Rev. Dr. Silas T. Rand, who spent over forty years, from 1849 till his death in 1890 as a Baptist missionary amongst the Micmacs of the Maritime Provinces.

His letter to Dr. (later Sir J.W.) Dawson, principal of McGill University, enclosed two lists, including together about 500 Micmac place names, with their meanings, which Dr. Rand had recorded in the course of his work.

This find was handed to the undersigned as a member of the Geographic Board of Canada, who, in submitting the manuscript to the Board, volunteered to arrange the lists alphabetically and index them for readier reference, especially as they bore marks of hurried work, including some repetitions.

After beginning the work it was found that many of the names had already appeared in the English-Micmac and Micmac-English dictionaries of Dr. Rand, but these, scattered through the two books, were absolutely buried so as to be practically unavailable for geographic purposes. It was ultimately considered best to consolidate all of Dr. Rand's place names in one list for comparison and ready reference, and to provide an index to the Indian meanings as well as to the English names. After the first compilation had been made, a very good list was found in Rand's "First Reading Book in the Micmac language" published in 1875, and the substance of this list, specially rich in meanings, has also been embodied in the completed work. It agrees closely with the English portion of the dictionary, which, however, gives no meanings.

This compilation is now submitted to the Geographic Board: the names show endless variations of form, which the compiler has not attempted to reconcile; indeed Dr. Rand and Mr. Clark, the editor of his Micmac-English dictionary, have both referred to the impossibility of securing uniformity in a language of many dialectic variations, with

no written records to maintain its purity. Absolutely no liberties have been taken with the manuscript; the discrepancies show two things; that the language itself is unstable, and that Dr. Rand had no fixed usage in spelling the words; he used different forms for the same sound in different places, and at different times.

Mr. Clark, in his preface to the portion of the dictionary which he edited, refers to some of these inconsistencies and difficulties, as follows;-

"In the south, at Yarmouth, the a was flatted in many words, and often when occurring as initial to a word was preceded by a submerged y Take the word alasoodumai (as spoken by the central bands) which was sounded almost Yalasoodumi at Yarmouth and alasoodumai at Restigouche in the north, while in Cape Breton it received its briefer alasoodmai, and in Prince Edward Island, conformed to the standard.

The gutural g is always hard, and often displaced by k. The sharper k is often found in simple nouns while the flatter g is heard distinctly in related verbs and compounds.

The dentals d and t, and the labials b and p easily displaced each other, and it is often almost impossible to know which has been used even when a compound of the word is introduced.

Two or three vowel sounds in succession are common, and are connected with a gliding slur which sounds very musical but requires deliberation; euphonic particles frequently occur. Every letter is sounded, and sounded as written, in Micmac".

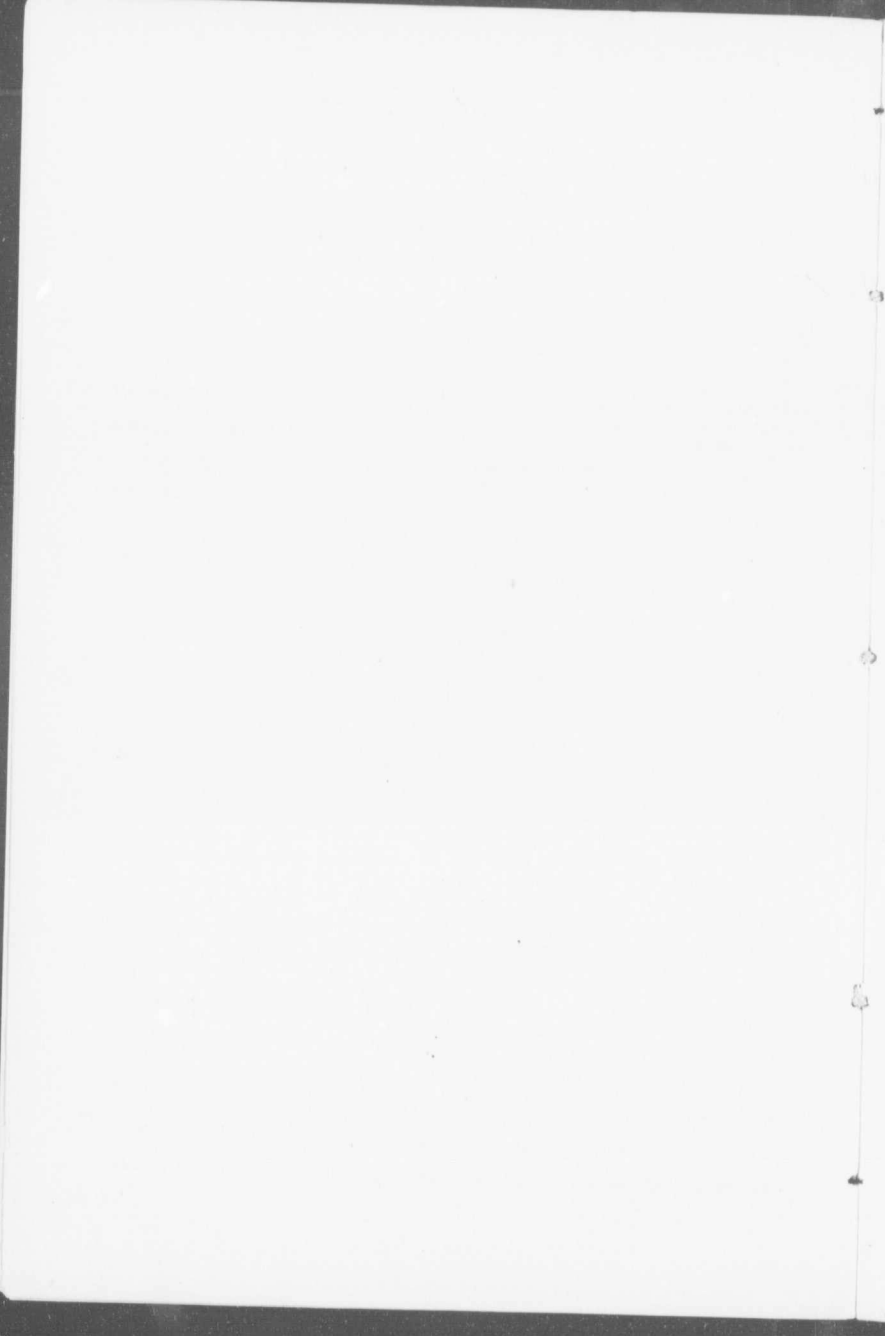
The long a and short e are by many sounded so nearly alike as to cause confusion, as are also â and ow. Dr. Rand instances the word alasawa which he claims might be written elasâwa or elasowwa. Letters are often transposed, even in the one dialect, apparently without intention or change of meaning, as shown in the terminations, ookse and koose.

The compiler would say in conclusion that in his judgment the list of 1852 (names marked S) is the most valuable, as it records Dr. Rand's earliest and freshest contact with the Micmac names, though the translations may not be so accurate as those in his main list, written when he had greater familiarity with the language; next the compiler would rank the manuscript names written in 1872 (marked R); then those in the English portion of the dictionary; or preferably what is the same list with meanings in the Reading Book of 1875 (marked X); and he would rank as least accurate those in the Micmac dictionary. It is doubtful if Mr. Clark fully appreciated the weight of the long vowel sounds, longer than any English vowel sounds; he certainly did not accentuate them as does Dr. Rand.

The extent of work involved in preparing these lists bears eloquent tribute to the immense difficulty and vast amount of work done by Dr. Rand in recording the large vocabulary preserved in his two principal Micmac works.

DR. RAND'S LETTER OF TRANSMISSION TO DR. DAWSON.

Hantsport, Dec. 10, 1872.

Dear Sir:-

I herewith send you a few scores of Indian names. I am not at all satisfied with the arrangement I have adopted. To string together a lot of names in alphabetical order seems to be about as preposterous a thing as could well be done. Even were the English names thus arranged there would be more sense to it. But I had long ago taken them down thus, and the absurdity of the thing did not strike me so forcibly until I had got nearly through with the copying. I think a good large map drawn for the purpose, and then all the Indian names inserted in their proper place, with a list, in the margin, of the meanings, would be about the best plan. But so far and such as I have I give thee. I have been more successful in finding out the signification of the names than I had hoped. This cannot always be done, and when it is done, the meaning of the word is not sure to suggest the reason of the appropriation. Names are given in the most arbitrary manner everywhere, and the Indians are no exception.

An amusing instance of this came to light in the name "Pelekuloolk", name of a point near Debert river, Onslpw. One old Indian and I had deciphered it very satisfactorily. "Pelekuloolkek" is the same as "Welle-kuloolkek", which means "very beautiful". But alas for our poetry and romance. The instructor happened to know how the place got the name - which was of modern date. A certain old fat funny man, kind to the Indians, had learned two Indian words - one was "Wele-kuloolk", meaning "the day is fine", and the other was "Kawesin", "I am hungry", but which he supposed meant "are you hungry". Whenever he met the Indians he used to "let off" these words, to the great amusement of the Indians who were not slow in nicknaming the worthy old man, "Wele-kuloolk", and they used this name as much oftener than

"Capt. Jones" was used, as "Sam Slick" is used oftener than Judge Haliburton. The termination "ek" added to a man's name denotes his residence, like the apostrophe is to your name or mine. Thus "Wolekuloolkek" changed sometimes into "Pelekuloolkek", simply meant Capt.

Jones's, and has nothing to do with the form or fashion of the place. So may it often be.

You see, then, that two separate and distinct ideas are to be kept in view in fishing out Indian names; first - the meaning of the word; second - the reason why this name was appropriated.

An Indian who understands his own language is capital authority in the first case, his guess work in the second may be as valuable as your own, or more or less so. Of course, there are cases where there is no difficulty. But take the name "Mestogook", "The gunwad", there can be no end to the guessing why a place should be called "gunwad", a very pretty name by the way in English.

But I will not write a dissertation on names. There may be some not here given that you would like to see, and you can, if you please, mention them. And I intend to follow the thing up, now that I am in it, a little further, for my own satisfaction. Everything bearing on the Indians, their history and their welfare, ought to be, and I hope it is, interesting to me - and should be to every Christian, patriot or philanthropist.

KEY TO THE PRONUNCIATION.

The consonants are sounded as in English. C is replaced by k, except where combined with h, when the digraph ch has the sound of ch as in church. (Mr. Clark uses the sign c^h for this sound, but to bring all the authorities on to the same basis it was necessary to change his records back to the more familiar ch, which Dr. Rand uses. Hard c's in Dr. Rand's manuscript have been changed to k, so that the letter c appears only in combination with h.A).

G is always hard as in go, egg.

H following a vowel in the same syllable (as in shk) is a soft guttural.

A consonant at the beginning of a word, preceded by an accent (thus 'K.H.N.T) is sounded without a vowel. Kw terminal is an explosive sound not heard in European languages.D.

The vowels are sounded thus;-

A as in father.

\bar{A} as in fate.

\check{A} as in fat.

\hat{A} as the second a in abaft (The dictionary gives this as having the sound of a in law, and from internal evidence as well as common usage in the pronunciation of Indian names the compiler considers the broader sound is meant. Dr. Rand makes \hat{A} too much like a.A).

\bar{E} as in me.

E as in met.

Ei as i in pine or ei in height.

I as in pin.

\bar{O} as in no.

O as in not.

\bar{U} as in tube, use.

U as in tub.

Oo as in fool, move.

\check{Oo} as in good, wood.

Ow as in now.

When any other vowel is doubled, as *āā*, *aa*, *ee*, the usual sound of those letters is prolonged.

(All the vowels are sounded, and given full value; the doubled vowels introduced by Dr. Rand to denote single sounds indicate a common Indian usage of prolonging the vowel sounds into something approaching a drawl, certainly much longer than in English. A).

Accent.

The usual place for the accent in Micmac is on the penult. When it falls on any other syllable it is marked ('). But a prolonged vowel (*aa*, *āā*, *ee*, *ō* or *oo'*) always takes the accent.E.
