

Russians Still Capturing En Enemy

Miian, June 22—Information from Vienna and Budapest re-ports panic reigning in Lem-berg and the exodus of popula-tion from Bukowina and Galic-ia is extending the feeling of panic to the Austrian-Hungar-ian capital. In order to prevent ian capital. In order to prevent further alarming news from reaching Vienna from the frontierprovinces all telegraphic and telephonic communication is stopped. Railway traffic is also reduced and refugees are prevented from pouring into Vienna and Budapest. I learn in one week more than 100,000 refugees reached Lemberg. The feeling there is that Lemberg will again fall into Russian hands.

Petrograd, June 22—The last two days have brought no essential change in the situation on General Brussiloff's front. Crossing the River Sereth, in Bukowina, General Letchitzky's forces have progressed slightly further south in pursuit of the Austrian General Pflanzer's army, but in the centre and along the northern flank the Russian drive has been halted by the flerce counter-offensive of the Teutonic allies.

The defence of the Kovel-Lutsk region has been taken over entirely by German reinforcements, newly arrived from the French front, who are making a determined attempt to regain the ground lost during the first ten days of the Russian advance. One group of German forces is concentrated at Kovel. 
