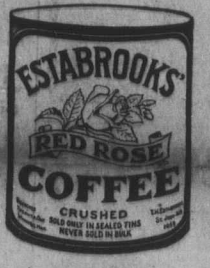

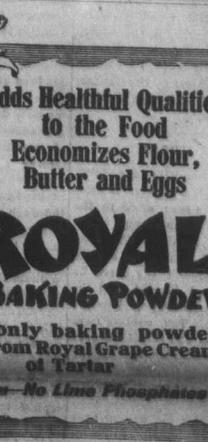

What can be more important in the child's education than love for our Empire? This year in particular, our duty to our country takes on an added meaning. One king has died, but the Empire still lives, and the stability and continuity of British institutions are shown when a new king succeeds, with no other manifestation than that of grief for the dead, and pledges of loyalty to the living.

In the United States they have occasionally what are called 'flag incidents.' Some noble minded patriot takes umbrage at the display of a foreign flag and proceeds to demolish it. This is a harmless form of insanity, and only tends to show the patriotism of the innocent individual.

Halifax Letter.

DEAR ACADIAN:—Quite a ripple of excitement is noticeable among the business people of our city over the reported purchase by the C. P. R. of the D. A. Railway. While the benefits accruing to Halifax may be something problematical there is little doubt but that the western counties will profit by the change.

Increased production means an increase of traffic. The C. P. R. has a reputation for fostering the sources of supply contiguous to its lines. The 'Valley' country is a splendid farming and fruit growing territory. Minimum rates for manures and fertilizers is a wise policy for a railway to adopt. Ample rolling stock during the busy seasons is another good move. Co-operation with the producer in growing and marketing his crop will bring satisfactory results to both grower and carrier. No doubt the C. P. R. in its wide experience recognizes these factors and many others as essential to successful results. Tourist business will always bring a good revenue, but for permanent assets the farmer and fruit grower is the mainstay.

This leads up to another proposition. We are reaching out after strangers to come and till our soil, which is all very good; but while they come in at our front door many of our most desirable young men pass out the back door into Uncle Sam's domain.

Has it ever occurred to our Provincial legislators to devise a remedy, or at least inquire if there is a possible remedy? A quiet talk with some of those who go, would throw light on the matter.

Some go because they don't want to farm, but many who would like to stay in the country and acquire a farm, find they must accumulate a considerable amount of cash before they can do so, and rightly or wrongly they believe they can accomplish their ideal better or more quickly in the U. S. than here. Loan companies, so far as the writer's experience goes, expect you to have about one half paid on your property before they will pay out money which is very little help to a beginner. They are out for a gilt edge security, not particularly to help the borrower.

We have had and still have in this province a large number of idle farms which could be acquired for cash at a very low rate. Some are extra good, some are fair to middling. Our province can borrow money cheaply. Could she do better than acquire those properties or such of them as could be purchased cheaply, hold them in fee simple and say to the young man qualifying in our agricultural college: Here, son, occupy one of our farms, stock it at your own expense, improve it to your satisfaction year by year, pay interest only the first two years, and annual instalments thereafter until the purchase price is paid.

An Agricultural Bureau or Board for the purchase of farms at rock bottom rates for cash, and also for their disposal as above, would do much to stop the exodus of our ambitious young men from the farming districts and would repopulate our deserted farms; and our province, besides helping her own young men, would stand to gain a good margin on her outlay. These would our province be able to feed herself and more. Industrial and commercial enterprises are all right, but pigs are a surer profit than pig iron, beef a more marketable commodity than battle ships; these more appreciated than cannon balls. The bulls of finance often deplete our resources, but those of the agriculturist build up a standard and thoroughbred wealth.

'Daddy of the 500 acres' wants to hold on to it until the millennium is in sight, so as to be sure of a good inheritance somewhere. He thinks it would be a pity to destroy the old landmarks by slicing out a 30 acre plot for the boy, and he cannot understand why the boy won't wait until he is 30 or 40 years old for his share, with perhaps the prospect of mother holding the reins of government another decade.

What Are Women?

Some little time ago a lady correspondent found fault with us for giving voice to the commonplace that women treat each other harshly, and that they are capable of exceeding bitterness and almost incredible meanness toward each other. One of the female characters in a play holding the boards of a local theatre this week exclaimed: "If women were only as loyal to women as men are to men!"

Our correspondent seemed to think that by adducing the names of a number of the most eminent women in history she had overthrown the general argument. And she also appeared to think that we ranked men on an altogether superior level to women.

One of the poets has declared that men at worst and best differ as heaven and hell. Tennyson speaks of men and women in comparison as endowed with passions which are "as moonlight unto sunlight, and as water unto wine." While few will agree that women are the "lesser man" most will accept Tennyson's generally in "Locksley Hall." But Tennyson lived to write "Locksley Hall Sixty Years After," and to describe the woman "with all the breadth of man, strong in will and rich in wisdom."

Ideals like this may be exceptional. It is not with exceptions we are dealing, but with the mass of women. Philosophically minded women sometimes explain the difference between men and women as due to economic or social or domestic conditions which have involved the subjection and subservience of woman's nature. The argument at least involves recognition of the difference that exists. That there is a difference is the important thing.

Unless a weakness or defect is recognized it will never be remedied, and one of the difficulties about reform is the exceeding sensitiveness, not to say touchiness, of certain individuals under criticism. Your critic, whether friendly or hostile is doing you a service, for he sees with a microscope where your friendly "critic" is looking with half-closed eyes.

Drinking Impairs Industrial Efficiency.
The United States Steel Trust has discovered that the present custom of drinking heavily is seriously impairing the efficiency of its men at Pittsburg. Statistics gathered by the company show that for seventy-two hours after each pay day, when a majority of the employees have been drinking heavily, the coke ovens do not run up to their full capacity. Some plans for the regulation of the drinking of its steel employees are now being considered. In the same connection the report says that the Carnegie Steel Company of Sharon, Pa., has announced that it will give preference to total abstainers in promotions. Notices to this effect have been posted, and a stringent rule has been adopted by which its employees are forbidden to drink in saloons or on or off duty.
