The Prior Aymer had taken the opportunity afforded him, of changing his riding robe for one of yet more costly materials, over which he wore a cope curiously embroidered. Besides the massive golden signet ring, which marked his ecclesiastical dignity, his fingers, though contrary to the canon, were loaded with precious gems: his sandals were of the finest leather which was imported from Spain; his beard trimmed to as small dimensions as his order would possibly permit, and his shaven crown concealed by a scarlet cap richly embroidered.

Swamp her, sink her, if you can and then the world will enjoy peace and happiness. There is but no sentiment on its ramparts to tell it of the enemy's approach. Nothing to disturb our daily indulgence and midnight revelry. The traditions of the past which so annoy us will be obliterated, and there will be naught to put us out.

We should like to have the photograph of these rev. gentlemen. They must very much resemble their Divine Master, particularly in humility, meekness, and, above all, charity. Woodstock and its surroundings must be a blessed country, although some are leaving it, the papers say. They must belong to the tribe of Gad, and have never experienced the influence and beneficence of that most unselfish man—the Hon. Mr. Lindsay, M. L. C. "O Lord, are these the fencibles!" as Sir John Harvey once said when he saw the coast guards of Newfoundland.

There must always, though, we suppose, be something to "raise the wind." We have seen no "surprise parties" in the papers of late, but they have been fruitful sources. Thanks are due the Rev. Mr. Colpitts and his Reverend brother Turner; and it would be a pity to give Hon. friend Lindsay, M. L. C., the go-by. They are nice men, one and all of them—holy men, walking in the footsteps of their "Divine Master," and teaching the people the way to Heaven by word and example. "O, ye hypocrites!" Ye say one thing and do the other.

We must apologize to our readers for spending annihilation on brothers Colpitts and Turner. We should not do so, certainly, but that there are deluded people by the hundred, who not alone listen to the nonsense they talk, but groan "Amen." It would be absurd, though, to argue with men, who, by their speeches, show they know as little about history as they do about charity. We have read historians of different creeds, aye, and what is re-

lated by the cynic Hume and the unbeliever Gibbon; but they all admit that what we know of the past, all we have in literature that is worth knowing, came down to us through the Ark of the Catholic faith. When the barbaric Goths and Vandals trampled down the splendor of ages, and tried to stamp out literature and moral religion there was one flame they could not quench. It had been kindled by the Author of Truth, and it contained the essence of all that was good. That lamp burned and never grew dim, even when all the world beside was dark. Around this lamp gathered the knowledge of the past and all the jewels it produced. Had that lamp gone out where would be that knowledge, that literature of which Messrs. Turner and Colpitts speak? We must confess that it is with some misgivings we bring the question of religion into print; for it has proven but too often that the more the discussion on it, the more confusion has arisen. But we cannot stand by and listen to ignorant men, who know nothing of the history of their own religion, much less of that which they vilify and bay at, talk nonsensical lies to gullible people. Men of education and mind are seldom guilty of bigotry; though they may have strong views on this side or on that. Ignorance is the mother of bigotry and fanaticism; it is the foundation upon which rest the theories of such men as Messrs. Colpitts and Turner. It is not surprising, therefore, that they should yelp at the Catholic Church.

**IMPORTANT RUMORS.**

There is a rumor floating in certain quarters that our respected Lieutenant Governor is very soon to resign his office. The reason assigned is, that while he likes Fredericton not a little, he loves his home at Dorchester more; that he has no ambition for the honors of the gubernatorial chair, and wishes therefore to go back again where his heart will be more at ease. This may be true or it may not,—we give it to our readers just as we got it ourselves. When appointed, it is said, he had no ambition for the office, and was only prevailed upon to accept it; and then intimated that he would not likely retain the office more than a year or so. But if our worthy Lieutenant Governor does resign, those who have come in contact with him, as well as those who know him only by repute, will have cause for regret.

Those who have met him at his residence appreciate his affable and amiable traits of character; those who have not learn to admire him from the many sterling and humane qualities they are told he possesses.

It is said should His Honor resign, a certain Judge of the Supreme Court would take his place. In connexion with the vacant place, the name of the Attorney General would come up, which would in turn bring up the question of another "reconstruction." It is likely the Provincial Secretary would be stepping into Hon. Mr. Fraser's boots; and that Mr. Blair, for the consideration of the vacated office, would leave "disreputable company," and become powerful as a Provincial Secretary as he was in leading the forlorn hope of his motly Opposition. Did Mr. Blair consider the shadow which assumes the character of substance but too often before his eyes, as a sufficient Will-o'-the-wisp to blind him to his present place, then it is likely an election would take place immediately in York, in which some such prominent figures as Mr. E. L. Wetmore or Mr. W. Wilson would figure; or perhaps Mr. J. B. Gunter or Mr. G. Fred. Fisher would try their luck. It is hard to tell how things might turn out.

**THE HEALING WATERS OF JOHNVILLE.**

There is a mineral spring at Johnville said to possess wondrous powers of healing diseases of the blood. People have come several hundred miles to bathe in the water, and to drink it with success. Some have been afflicted with Scrofula that might almost pass for leprosy. The water contains large quantities of sulphur and iron, which give it the qualities for which now it is becoming so justly famous. But this healing fountain is degenerating into a dirty puddle. Not alone do human beings visit the spot, but the animals that graze tramp it up; so that those who have come from afar are disgusted at the treatment the elixir of life gets at the hands of Provincials. Levity aside, it is a shame that so valuable a spring as this undoubtedly is should not be taken care of. Some people are of the opinion it should be left open to the public. We grant it should, but yet it should be given to the care of some one who might provide accommodation for the people resorting there for the winter. There is some land about the spring and this should be granted or leased, by the Province, to some one, who would, beyond doubt, build a hotel just there, and make the wilderness at Johnville blossom as the rose.

The New York Independent, a Protestant newspaper of high repute, says the infamous ronegale Father Mac-Namara is a ruffian, and that those to whom he preaches are a low and godless rabble. Yet the Religious Intelligencer quotes the sayings of this miserable wretch in nearly every issue.

THE TELEGRAMS about the disturbance in Europe are most unreliable. No one but the chief actors knows what is going on; and they keep their own counsels. All the telegrams are mere surmises. There is nothing new to-day.

A COURAGEOUS woman yesterday in Buffalo city, chopped her husband to pieces with an axe.

Mrs. George Case plays that wonderful imitation of the "bag pipes" at the City Hall on Tuesday evening next.

HON. MR. CHAPLEAU has begun his canvass in Terrebonne. His election is sure.

**Educational Department.**

**AN EXPLANATION.**

We have been at some pains to ascertain why pupils from Grade 7 of Park Barrack School should be sent to the same Grade in the Model School, while children from Grade 6 of the latter were sent to Grade 7 of the former; and we learn there was nothing wrong about it. In May last, or thereabouts, Park Barrack Schools were overcrowded, and an arrangement was made to take eighteen or twenty of the pupils into Mr. Stochon's Grades in the Normal School; but on the understanding that they should be sent back as soon as arrangements were made for their accommodation. These are the children, therefore, which were sent back; and there was nothing wrong in that transaction. But the parents complain: loudly, saying, why move such and such children graded to the Model School, when they might have sent me to that grade, instead of sending him back to Park Barracks? The answer is this. No pupil can enter a grade in the Model School unless on application made by the parent or the pupil. It sometimes happens there are too many applicants for the vacancies; in that case the first in turn are selected till the vacancies are filled. The children graded the other day from Mr. Raymond's school had their names down a year or so previous. There is no cause for discontent.
