HURON'S DISGRACE.

The Respectable Press Denounce the Treasurer's Shame-ful Dismissal.

The Scaforth "Expositor" on the Situation An Article that all our Friends Should

As will be seen by the proceedings of the County Council of Huron, which we publish in this issue, that body, by the casting vote of the Warden, dismissed the County Treasurer and appointed another in his stead. This, it will be admitted by all, is a very grave proceeding, and one which should not be taken except under very extraordinary circumstances. Now, do the circumstances of the case justify this action? As no reason for it is given in the resolution passed by the Council, in order to a proper understanding of the proceeding, will be necessary for us to recite the cir-cumstances which led to the very extraordinary and exceptional conduct of the Council. As is generally known Mr. Ross, the gentleman so summarily dealt with, accepted the position of Pro-wincial Treasurer, and occupied the dual positions of Provincial Treasurer and Treasurer for the county of Huron. This was his sole and only offence so far as we was his sole and only offence so far as we are aware. It was not even charged, it dare not be charged, that he had in the alightest particular neglected any or the tuttles, for the performance of which he is employed and paid by the county. On the contrary, sone can deny that for the past twenty founded to the first time that Mr. Meredith made a feel of himself by 'raising aloft his arm.' past twenty-four years he has served the county faithfully, efficiently, and to the entire satisfaction of all. At least, during that long period, not one single complaint has ever been made against him in Council, or in any other public manner. More than this, it is susceptible of easy proof, that by his superior care and skill as a financier he has on different superiors of his ungentlemanly beoreksions as yell to the county thousands. skill as a financier he has on different occasions saved to the county thousands of dollars, which many a less skilled official could not have done. This is a fact which has been admitted in open Council over and over again, and is so well known to every person that it is scarcely necessary to mention it. Surely, therefore, this is a record which is not only creditable to him as an official, but should entitle him to at least common courtesy and decent treatment at the hands of those whom he had so faithfully served. Has he received this from the county council of Huron? We let their own minutes speak for them. This record shows that the council, in its dying hours, and without a moment's notice, at one stroke and by one motion, dis-missed an old, faithful and well tried public servant against whom no accusation rested, by appointing an untried and inexperienced man in his stead, and, as if to add insult to injury, they appoint a committee from their number to receive the books from the auditors and hand them over to the new official when he is

O'DONNELL'S DOOM.

The Slayer of Carey Hanged.

At Eight O'clock on Monday Morning - He Dies Bravely-Mis Brother in the

London, Dec. 15—O'Donnell maintain great firmness of demeanour, and is apparently prepared to meet his fate. He regards himself as a martyr. His brother visited him this afternoon and remained twenty minutes. At parting O'Donnell shook his brother by the hand and exclaimed, "Good bye, old fellow, keep up your spiritz and don't be downcast because of me."

London, Dec. 16—The police leaving duty at the prison this evening report that O'Donnell continues as firm as a rock. Everybody is much impressed with his nerve. O'Donnell is fully prepared to meet his fate, but has remarked that his death will be avenged on England.

He said he had felt the greatest animosity for the witnesses who appeared against him, but that had now disappeared. After the communion was administered to the condemned man,





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
