





Rosebery's Resolutions

Our cable despatch conveys the intelligence that the House of Lords yesterday passed Lord Rosebery's and the shafts of Power's milk wagthird resolution by a large majority. It will interest our readers to peruse the terms of this resolution and we embody it. It runs as follows:-

"That the necessary preliminary of reform and reconstitution of the House of Lords is the acceptance of the principle that the possession of a Peerage shall no longer in itself give a right to sit and vote in the House of Lords."

It is not surprising that the House of Lords adopted this resolution as it clusion arrived at in 1908 by the House of Lords Select Committee, which was that.

"Except in the case of peers of Blood Royal, it was undesirable that the possession of a peerage should of itself give the right to sit and vote

in the House of Lords." Lord Rosebery was the Chairman of this Commiteee, and has been long prominently associated with propaganda of reforming the membership of the House of Lords. In a speech he made in Edinburgh on September 20th, 1907, he set forth his ideas.

"I have never been able to defend the present House of Lords. I have stoutly attacked it; I have constantly endeavoured to reform it; but, on the other hand. I am from the bottom of my heart and soul convinced by every iota of political and historical experience of which I am possessed that a second chamber, and effective second Second Chamber man."

Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir,-How effective the 1910 amendment to the License Act will be in curtailing the consumption of liquor in the city, in reforming the toper and in preventing the moderate drinker from developing into a drunkard can be decided only after the new regulations have had a fair trial.
