Everybody to-day seems to be inclined to see the dumb animals get a square show for their lives, and whilst we rejoice in the fact that a step is being made to renew the life of the Cruelty to Animals Society, still we pause for a moment and ask ourselves if the movement is going to be ridiculed by hushing up a case of cruelty because the perpetrator happened to belong to the class known as the Upper Ten. As we said before, if the woman in question didn't kill the dog, then by all means make it public, but if she did kill the dog then all means should be used to bring her, though the pride of that woman and all her associates fall to forty feet below zero.

On Sunday last, a newspaper appeared for the first time. It is called the Sunday Express. Its Editor and Proprietor is Mr. W. M. Dooley, who lately edited the Western Star in the interest of the Morris Government. It is printed and published at 231 Theatre Hill at the "Plaindealer" office. According to its own avowal, "the Sunday Express has no politics." But strangely the chief advertising patron of the Sunday Express is the Government. On page 6 there are two Notices to Mariners, taking up three quarters of a column, signed by A. W. Piccott, Minister of Marine & Fisheries. But these two ads. are not the only ones Mr. Dooley received from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, for on page 7, there is a column ad. from the Game and Inland Fisheries Board, signed Jas. W. Mercer, Secretary. Turning back to page 6 we find a double column ad., a quarter of a column long, from the Department of Public Works, signed James Harris, Secretary. On page 8 there are also two Government ads., which take up four fifths of two columns. The larger ad. is signed S. D. Blandford, Minister of Agriculture and Mines; the smaller one is signed Alex. A. Parsons, Superintendent Newfoundland Penitentiary.

We have already pointed out that the editor declares the Sunday Express has no politics. But curiously this statement introduces a write-up lauding Mr. J. F. Downey, the Tory

Special Evening Telegram.

SYDNEY, To-Day. The Morweena arrived this morning from Montreal and sighted the Montreal floating dock 120 miles off Sydney.

PODGORITZA, To-Day. The Turkish town, Tushi, surrendered to the Montenegrins yesterday. This opens the way to Scutari, where the Turkish forces are said to be concentrating, and on which the Montenegrin troops are now advancing. The division commanded by Crown Prince Danilo, after a fierce battle, occupied the fortifications on the heights of Uschanitch, Tushi, Paltina. The final charge against Tushi and Paltina was at the bayonet point, and the Turk surrendered. Five hundred prisoners were taken.

Special Evening Telegram.

VALPARAISO, To-Day. Three new islands, without vegetation, supposed to be the result of a recent marine upheaval, were discovered sixty miles southwest of Juan Fernandez by the captain of the steamship Glenalvon, who reported them on the arrival of the steamer here.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day. As crowds pass the British Embassy in Constantinople the whispering shows a feeling very different to that in Germany, where there is a campaign of almost unprecedented ferocity and irresponsibility. The formal war parties declare Britain is engaged in a diabolical attempt to foment a European conflagration in which Germany would fall an easy prey to Anglo-French domination. The London Times to-day rebukes Lloyd George in its most dignified fashion for saying on Saturday, "If war ensued he hoped the result would be that the bounds of freedom in Government would be extended." "This," says the Times, "will certainly be quoted abroad as an ill-concealed example of taking sides. 

The General Committee in charge of the Marine Disasters' Fund held a meeting in the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday afternoon. Secretary Pearn reported 94 claimants, as follows:—  
21 Widows, at \$40.00 a year for 5 years ..... \$4,200.00  
14 Dependents ..... \$40.00 a year for 5 years ..... 2,800.00  
8 Dependents at \$30.00 a year for 5 years ..... 1,200.00  
51 Children at \$30.00 a year until age of 15 is attained, in all about 460 years ..... 13,300.00  
\$22,000.00

The amount subscribed is something over \$20,000.00. This, with interest, will meet all demands fairly well. It was decided that no payments be made without a certificate that the beneficiary was still living; that children of school age must attend school; and that the regular disbursements might be made when deemed advisable, under the supervision of a Stipendiary Magistrate, Justice of the Peace or clergyman. The distribution will be half yearly. The first payment will be made on November 1st for the present year and thereafter on January 1st and July 1st.

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NO WORK ON TRINITY SPUR.

TRINITY, To-day. The Daily News and Chronicle of Saturday last in an interview with President Reid state that work is being continued on the Trinity Spur. This statement is incorrect. No work has been done on Spur since November last. CORRESPONDENT.

Declines Foreign Intervention.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. In her reply to the Powers, declining any foreign intervention in matters of reform in Macedonia, the Turkish Government contends that one of the chief causes which has hindered the various attempts to ameliorate the internal situation in Macedonia is the State of insecurity, brought about by the criminal outrages of all kinds, committed by agitators. Turkey's reply thanks the European Powers for their interest, but declines intervention, which she has determined to carry out reforms without interference.

To-day's News.

MILWAUKEE, To-day. Roosevelt's wound was slight, and he went to the Auditorium and began his speech after he had seen his assailant arrested. The latter is mentally upset on Roosevelt running a third time and said any man running a third time should be shot. In notes found in the man's pocket was one stating that he had been visited in a dream by the spirit of Wm. McKinley who had said, indicating Roosevelt, "This is my murderer, avenge my death." Roosevelt felt no pain at the time the shot was fired and was not aware he was shot until he was on his way to the auditorium. The bullet struck the manuscript of his speech and this retarded its force. His assailant was stopped from firing a second shot by Martin, one of Roosevelt's Secretaries, leaping on the man's shoulders. Capt. McArthur also jumped on the man and overpowered him. A witness said that he saw him go up and Roosevelt spoke to the people and told them to spare the man, who was then arrested. Roosevelt insisted on delivering his address. He will make this speech or die, one of the other," he said. After speaking for an hour, he rushed to the hospital. An examination of the wound showed it had been made by a large bullet entering the fleshy part of the right breast. X rays will be used to locate the bullet.

PARIS, To-day. There is official confirmation that the Ottoman troops which the Servian frontier, has reached the Foreign Office from the French Minister at Belgrade. The invading forces numbered about 2,000. They advanced to the neighbourhood of Rostovatz, and had a brief engagement with the Servians. Twenty-four Servians were killed. Turkey has then accepted the summons to demobilize as a declaration of war. It is taken for granted that a few hours will bring the news of Bulgaria's incursion into the field of war without formalities.

ATHENS, To-day. Everything is ready on the frontier for a forward movement. There is no longer any doubt in the minds of the Greeks that war with Turkey is inevitable. The stir and bustle caused by the mobilization of the army has been followed by a complete calm. All business is stopped and the places of amusement are closed. Athens is practically empty. The only noticeable activity is that of the ambulance organization.

BROUGHT OUT PATIENT.—Mr. E. Whitway proceeded to the Goults today and brought to hospital in the ambulance Mrs. Stebbanman. She is suffering from cancer and is seriously ill.

HAD HAND POISONED.—Yesterday Capt. William Winsor was stricken suddenly with a severe pain in his right hand which after a while extended to the arm and after a few hours hand and arm became very much swollen. Going to Dr. Fatt he found that blood poisoning had set in and gave the proper treatment. Capt. Winsor has not the slightest idea how this occurred.



Fox Farming.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Would you be good enough to allow me space in your paper to request the Game Board to issue public instructions, as to the starting and running of fox farms. Fox farming is very profitable. A pair of good hounds are worth from \$7,000 to \$8,000 dollars. We would like to know what the first cost would be, but above all we are anxious to know how we are to stock the farm, as the law says: "No person shall at any time take any foxes from burrows by smoking, digging or any other means whatsoever." How, then, can I stock the farm? Is it with dead or injured ones, that I might get a trap? or must I import a pair, or is there a fox farm in the community to buy from? It looks as if someone has the "grip" on foxes, as we have heard that you must be a rich man to start a farm. Where does the poor outport man come in? If he gets a pair of black skins or silver hairs he must be satisfied with that the skin will bring, perhaps six or seven hundred dollars. Another fox farmer sees in eight say four or five thousand dollars. Another farmer we around here would like you to publish and the details of the inquiry of the wrecked steamer Wilhelmina. We would very much like to read the testimony of the Hon. Mr. P. Cashin and the Larder Bros. Are not the two principal witnesses, the Larders, out of the country? We poor people are often obliged to saddle a good deal, and we would like to see published the finding of this inquiry and the question answered in public as to who stripped the Wilhelmina? Why was she stripped of her fittings when it was common talk that she would come off? We poor wreckers would be glad to have all wrecks strictly investigated not only ourselves examined but also those who become wreckers for the good of others health and the fun of the thing. [We direct the attention of our readers to an article we republish in this issue from the "Charlottetown Guardian" on Fox Farming in Prince Edward Island.—Ed.]

THE FOX INDUSTRY OF P. E. I. Gem of the Gulf by Far the Largest Produce of the World.

Like a chapter from the Arabian Nights is the story of the silver fox industry in Prince Edward Island, with the difference that the latter is tangible, open to inspection and capable of verification. That the smallest province in the Dominion, heretofore regarded as without natural resources except the fertility of its soil and prolific life in its waters, should suddenly find itself in possession of a single source of wealth rivaling the gold mines of the Yukon, is matter of no small moment. And this is what Prince Edward Island has found within the past few years in its fox industry. As is the case with the gold mines the available wealth from the fox industry is as yet, an unknown quantity, unlike, however, those who have "dugged" in the latter, with ordinary forethought and precaution have, we believe, without exception, found gold, many of them most liberally.

There is an idea prevalent that the money exchanging hands for foxes here is all Prince Edward Island money, passed from one neighbor to another in exchange for foxes, and that after all the industry brings no additional wealth to the province. This is not so. Within the past few days a gentleman from Port Elgin, N. B. bought five pairs of foxes from Tignish and Alberton parties, paying for them fifty thousand dollars; a gentleman from Moncton bought four pairs, also from parties in Tignish and Alberton at the same price, ten thousand dollars a pair; a gentleman from St. John bought two pairs in the same locality at the same price and wanted two more pairs but could not get them. John Agnew, of Alberton informs us that he has had almost daily telegrams from parties in the neighboring provinces making all kinds of offers for foxes but that there are none for sale. The island stock for the present year and much of next year's stock is already sold.

One of the banks in Prince County took in \$80,000 in three days recently; all fox money and the greater part of it from outside the province. Another bank took in \$60,000 in a week, most of it from New Brunswick. One county branch bank in Prince County, among the fox ranches, has more cash on deposit than the local head office, and all this from the fox business. We have it on good authority that in Prince County alone half a million dollars changed hands during the past summer for foxes and that at least two thirds of it came from outside the province. We understand that his year the addition to the provincial income tax, as a result of the fox business will be about \$10,000.

A business that in so short a time has arisen to such proportions is surely worth talking about, worth promoting and worth letting the world know about. Now as to the value placed upon silver foxes. Five thousand dollars for a little black fox seems an exorbitant price, extravagant, risky and all that. But in foxes, as in other investments, the cost is exorbitant or the reverse in proportion to the returns. We have an authentic record for a single female black fox which in seven years produced forty-five descendants which lived and were sold. These at the prices ruling today would be worth \$25,000, a pretty liberal return in seven years for an investment of \$10,000 for a pair. At a meeting of fox ranches a few days ago, Hon. Charles Dalton made the statement, and submitted his books to prove it that in 1910 he shipped to the London fur market between forty and fifty skins. For these he received an average of \$270 each, or \$13,500. Moreover, of all the skins that brought over \$100 Mr. Dalton had sixty per cent. This fact, along with the other equally significant fact, that of all the black foxes in captivity in the world, 85 per cent. are in Prince Edward Island, goes to show that Prince Edward Island may safely be regarded as the natural

headquarters for one of the greatest industries in the world to-day. The possession of such an industry is of incalculable benefit to the province and, if guarded as it deserves to be, will before long make the province one of the richest in the world. This is not an advertisement for the fox business, nor an attempt to induce inexperienced, unbusinesslike investment in it. It is as easy to lose one's all in the fox-business as in any other, if entered into without necessary business precautions. That there are possibilities of infinite wealth in it is amply proved by men who have already made fortunes. (Charlottetown Guardian, Oct. 12 '12.)

## The Berry Industry.

At Old Perlican there are extensive barrens where partridge berries grow in profusion, and this fall women and children of the place collected 1,000 barrels in the aggregate, all of which were sent here and transhipped to the States. The people were paid 18 cents per gallon for picking them and daily they would pick from 15 to 18 gallons, so that they made good wages. By the barrel they were paid \$3.00 plus 80 cts. if the packages were furnished by the gatherers. It is estimated that \$4,000 or more was earned in the aggregate at the industry and many a family managed to buy a winter's provisions as a result of this work.

Will, however, set to work with a vim which did him credit, put out his three traps and was home at Westleyville on the 23rd September with 800 qtls. having used all his salt. Capt. Sam Bob secured 1,050 barrels of cod for the summer.

## FINE NATIVE TIMBER.

The Prospero this trip there arrived 40 pieces of splendid timber from Henderson's mill at Jackson's Arm, White Bay. They were each 30 ft. long and 10 by 10 inches square. The timber is composed of white birch is equal to any that might be imported from Canada. This mill which is run by Turbinia gives employment to a large number of men and the owner hopes to cut 200,000 feet of this valuable wood the coming winter.

## FISH STILL PLENTIFUL.

At Bay de Verde when the weather is civil and the men can get over the ground they fish a very plentiful haul of squid or herring bait is used. Boats with two men on board take as high as 5 qts. each.

The whaler Cabot, operating at Snook's Arm, captured three large whales last week. When the Prospero was passing Cape Charles on her last trip the whaler Hawk reported that she had only six fish ashore. So far she has not done as well as she did at Cape Broyle the early part of the season. No news of the Cachelot's movements at Hawke's Harbor, Labrador, has been learned since the Solway was here last.

## Timely Sermon.

At the first Mass in the R. C. Cathedral, Sunday, Rev. D. O'Callaghan, who was the Celebrant, preached a sermon in which he dwelt on the Intemperance classes. He referred to the recent attack made on the police in the West End and the attitude of on-lookers towards them which was not favourable to the officers. ## Bankers Report.

Reports from the bankers fishing on the Labrador Coast received within the past couple of days show that they are doing poorly. About a week ago there were nearly 50 sail fishing off Domino and they have not near as much fish as 12 or 14 sail had last year. Several bankers also fishing at American-Tickle are even doing worse than those at Domino.


