

PATTERSON, N.J., June 20.
Thirty-one striking silk mill workers, members of the Industrial Workers of the world, convicted of unlawful assemblage, were sentenced today to three months each, with hard labor, in the county jail. The sentences are, however, suspended.

LONDON, June 20.
The battleship presented by the Malay States was the subject of a question in the Commons. Sir John Slessor asked the First Lord what he intended to do with it. Mr. Churchill replied that the original plan was for the employment of the battleship in conjunction with any ships that might be present; developments which have taken place as regards the latter, however, make it undesirable at present to elaborate this suggestion.

LETHBRIDGE, June 20.
A combined hurricane and cloud-burst struck Lethbridge, and considerable damage is reported. The city spent the night in darkness, owing to the disability of the Power Plant. Telephone connection with the city and rural lines was partially destroyed. The gale ripped the roofs of several houses. Several barns, out-houses and fences were blown down, and trees uprooted. In some sections of the city the stacks were rolled about like boxes and piled upon one another.

BREMEN, June 20.
A school teacher and two children were shot dead, another teacher and three children badly wounded, and three children slightly injured today by a former teacher named Schmidt, who, armed with six loaded revolvers and carrying a quantity of extra cartridges, entered the Catholic school and started a fusillade among the classes.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 20.
In the neighborhood of \$45,000,000 will be represented in the Harvard University boat today. The Yale men are not so wealthy, but are being coached by one of the Harriman heirs.

BIRMINGHAM, June 20.
The arsonettes set on fire a large unoccupied house near here. Usual accompaniments.

MELBOURNE, June 20.
Premier Fisher and Cabinet resigned today, as the result of their defeat by the Liberals, who now have a majority of one in the House of Representatives.

The Pantry.

The pantry is a small, airtight enclosure which is filled with cast-off side dishes and the blasted hopes of last week's menu. It is also used to conceal burned leaves of bread from the watchful eyes of prying step-mothers, who are satisfied that the family wastes enough food every week to gorge an orphan home.

Pantries are always located as close to the dining room as possible, so that no time need be lost in bringing some forgotten delicacy of bygone days to the table. This is a handy arrangement, for every once in a while some member of the family will enquire what became of that apple pie that was served last Friday, upon which the remnants can be placed in front of him before he has time to change his mind. Thrifty housewives never throw anything away that will keep for three weeks without souring, but place it high up in the pantry, where nobody can get at it but the feverish house fly.

The pantry was originally intended as an elastic mausoleum for damaged goods, and is used with much success as a warehouse for base-hardened cookies, discouraged jelly, soggy doughnuts, petrified pie, decrepit cheese, discarded sponge cake and blue-faced milk. In addition to these dainties it will also hold with perfect ease the family stock of matches, salted soda, leaky tinware, sour biscuit, canned corn, pink pills, beet sugar and water-logged wafers, giving it a very neat and orderly appearance.

Most pantries are provided with a rebounding floor bin, which has to be held open with the right knee while it is being searched. If a woman runs her head into one of these bins and releases her hold, she is liable to be penned within its dark confines in a stooping attitude and have to call for help in smothered accents.

Pantries would be more highly thought of if they could be ventilated with something besides the pervasive odor of the nutmeg grater and fetid breath of the Potato salad.

Choked Him.

The Evening Herald is utterly unable to meet our clinching proof that the Evening Telegram, instead of being on the fence about the Reid Deal of 1898, declared war on it immediately. The Evening Herald insinuates that the Evening Telegram, after the Reid Contract had been tabled and the nature of it known, kept silence, prepared either to support it or to oppose it, just as the Liberal Party might decide by caucus. His claims that in reality we know nothing about because we were not editor at the time, and tells us contemptuously that he does not know where we were in the country, but he tells us if we were we had not been long enough here to know our way about town. What self importance and conceit, as if his recollection of us and our doings were of importance to any body. As a matter of fact we had been in the country almost eight years at the time of the Reid Contract and were well known in educational and Church of England circles. But what has that got to do with the charge that the Evening Telegram was on the fence a notable time after the Government had disclosed the terms of the Reid 1898 Deal. Our answer choked him, and well it might. It did not depend on the recollection of ourselves or of anybody else, it was based on the sure record of time and place and contemporaneous printed records. We quoted the journals of the House and showed that the Reid Contract was tabled on the evening of February 22nd, 1898, and that the issue of that same evening, the Evening Telegram declared war on the Deal in no uncertain tone.

We publish the call to arms sounded by the Evening Telegram during the time the Premier of the day, Sir James Winter, was introducing the Resolutions relating to the Deal in the House of Assembly.

TREACHERY! "A huge plot to sell Newfoundland's Railways, Dock, Telegraph System, Mines, Minerals, Agricultural Land and Everything else of any Value offered by the Government for \$1,000,000. Look out for to-morrow's Telegram."

Is there any uncertain tone about the opposition of the Evening Telegram to the Deal on the very afternoon the matter was introduced into the House of Assembly? Does not that show up the falsehood of the suggestion that the Telegram was uncertain as to its attitude, dilly-

dallying and waiting to see how the cat jumped. The opposition of the Telegram to the Deal disclosed was immediate and definite and left no doubt as such and Mr. McGrath in his next issue treated the Evening Telegram as hostile to the Deal.

Mr. McGrath tells of negotiations at the time of the Whiteway Administration to extend the time of the lease then held by the then Mr. R. G. Reid, and of the Evening Telegram's approval of an extension of time. Well, what of that? Was there anything inconsistent in that? The Evening Telegram however never did approve of the outrageous terms of the 1898 Deal and promptly took a lead in opposing the sell-out.

But there was more than mere inconsistency on the part of the Evening Herald, McGrath and others who had gone to the country pledged to no further concessions to Reid and who immediately after the Elections set to work to negotiate that notorious sell-out to the late R. G. Reid. That was treachery pure and simple. That was fooling the electorate. That was an outrage of a magnitude that has seldom been known in parliamentary circles. The Evening Herald was against concessions to Reid before the elections of 1897, and in February, 1898, it was an ardent supporter of this phenomenal take-in of the people. Mr. McGrath charges the Evening Telegram falsely with wobbling, but he himself was to the fore in fooling the people in 1897 and in selling them in 1898. This is a fact which is incontrovertible as his own charge of base in 1909, while supporting the Deal locally, he was exposing its iniquities in the Chicago Record. Later again, he made a change of front and ratted from the Tory party to support the Liberals in the fall of 1900 and then supported the 1901 Deal until 1907 when he ratted again and commenced a systematic denunciation of it. No wonder Mr. McGrath talks about being choked. If our words fall to the ground, he will be no more stubborn and the electorate this fall will treat him as a choked politician for whom they have no further use and his leader will go with him for even Tories complain McGrath has done more to kill Morris than anybody else. That is Tory opinion. They are expecting the political demise of Sir Edward Morris from a surfeit of McGrathisms.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Lipton met his yachting advisers and discussed with them the question of accepting the final terms sent by the N. Y. Yacht Club in reply to his challenge for a series of races for the American Cup. It was decided that the acceptance of terms must be deferred until the receipt of the 1913 rules of the New York Yacht Club, which he is constantly referring to throughout the Club's letters, but which were not enclosed. Without these rules, Sir Thomas declared it was impossible to understand the conditions prescribed for the race. He has forwarded a cablegram to New York requesting a copy of the regulations be sent him and expects they will arrive within a week.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., To-day. For the sixth consecutive year Harvard's Varsity eight oared crew triumphed over the Yale oarsmen. The long four-mile race closed the annual inter-university regatta yesterday, preceded by two crimson victories in the afternoon and two wins on Thursday. It completed the Harvard sweep that has been equalled but once or twice in rowing.

PHILADELPHIA, To-day. The Australian cricketers overwhelmed the gentlemen of Philadelphia yesterday the opening day's play in their first match in this city. The visitors scored 308 runs for the loss of only three wickets, when stumps were drawn for the day, while the Philadelphia side retired with a total of 124 runs.

SEATTLE, To-day. Archdeacon Stuck, Episcopal Missionary who set out from Fairbanks, Alaska, several months ago, to climb Mt. McKinley reached the summit of the highest peak of the great mountain on June 7, according to a private cable received here.

ANNAPOLIS, To-day. Ensign Billingslea was instantly killed and Lieut. Towers seriously injured by a collapse of a binnacle in which they were manœuvring.

The S. S. Duchess of Marlborough is to-day at Griquet. She reports arriving at Griquet at 10.40 a.m. to-day. "Straita blocked; waiting at Griquet for ice to move off." At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Municipal Council took place yesterday afternoon.

Mr. K. R. Prowse wrote that the General Protestant Cemetery Committee intended to make repairs to fences, and asked the Council if they needed any land for street improvement. Council will visit the place and view surroundings.

Council repudiated a claim from R. Hopkins, a second time. Complaint was made of piles of old packages being strewn around Lime and Cabot Streets. Owners will have to remove them.

Light was asked for by Captain English at the corner of Prescott and Queen's Road. Referred to Lighting Committee.

G. Ormond asked permission to install motor in store on Temperance Street. Referred to Engineer.

The defective gully in front of Mr. Ryan's house on William Street, will be attended to.

Permission was granted Jno. Byrne, Parade Street, to make repairs to fence, and to James Maher, Fergus Place, to excavate for proposed dwelling.

Plans submitted by Elder Young, of proposed dwelling on Freshwater Road, were approved.

J. Simms was granted leave to repair house.

Solicitor Morris reported that Council was not liable for damages to Gas Co's underground pipes by stray electric currents.

The Horwood Lumber Co. will be asked how much they will contribute to remove part of sidewalk at corner of Water and Bambrick Sts.

Harvey & Co. will also be asked how much they will contribute to lay extra water service on Forest Road.

Twenty persons were allowed to install water and sewerage in their homes.

A discussion then took place on the arrears question which was introduced by the Mayor, who referred to the letter that appeared in the press, relative to taxes arrears. The Mayor stated that whilst a good deal of outstanding debts were collected since the beginning of the year, yet there was a large sum to be collected. He pointed out that a new system is being adopted for the collection of the arrears. In the course of a few days every debtor will be supplied with a bill of the amount they owe, and if the account is not settled in ten days, payment will be enforced by law.

Councillor Mullaly referred to the letter that appeared in the press and took exception to the paragraph that said the names of some of the people who owed were unknown. Some one, the Councillor continued, is violating the rules of his office, and should be dealt with.

The Mayor then asked if any Council employees were in arrears.

The Secretary replied that there were several.

The Mayor.—It is a disgrace. He then made mention of the defect in the new concrete conduit at Windsor Lake. Until repairs are effected everything possible will be done to conserve the water supply to the city. The Mayor intimated that the conduit was built under the late Mr. Galt, C.E., of Toronto, and that the City Engineer and Government Engineer had held a conference and that the work of repairs would soon commence.

Foreign Stokers For Ventures.

Owing to the inability to get crews, unless \$40 per month as demanded by local firemen is paid, the steamers Bellaventure and Bonaventure are still hung up in port. The stokers will not sign on under any concessions unless they get a guarantee of \$40 a month. The amount is \$5 in excess of what the Canadian Government pays. Captain Webb, who is here in the interests of the Canadian Government, has wired his principals the attitude of the local men, with the result that a contingent of men is being forwarded from Halifax to man the ships. The foreign stokers will likely arrive on to-morrow's express, and the Ventures will sail from here on Monday morning.

Strange Doings Cause Loss of Life in Lisbon.

Lisbon, June 13.—Many persons were injured here yesterday in a panic which attended a subscription performance given at a theatre in aid of the numerous political prisoners recently arrested in a series of anti-Government uprisings.

Most of the foreign diplomats were at the theatre, which was crowded with spectators, when a number of men entered and began firing revolvers. A stampede followed in which many were knocked down and trampled under foot.

A troop of cavalry surrounded the building and arrested many Royalist sympathizers.

Many were also killed or wounded here yesterday by the explosion of a dynamite bomb thrown from a window at a procession passing along the streets.



Regatta Meeting.

GOVERNOR PRESENTS CUP FOR BRIGADE RACE.

An important meeting of the Regatta Committee was held at Wood's Restaurant last night, the attendance being large and the feeling enthusiastic. President Hiscock presided in his usual graceful manner. V. P. Higgins, absent from the city on professional business, and Treasurer Ellis, who is unwell, could not be present at the convention. When the minutes of the last meeting had been read by Secretary Noonan and passed, the President stated that the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency Governor Davidson did so on Wednesday, and were cordially received. In the course of their conversation His Excellency said that he took a keen interest in aquatic sports, that he had himself often competed in regattas abroad, and showed the committee several excellent trophies, the result of his capabilities as an oarsman. His Excellency not alone promised his patronage but said he would be pleased to be at the lakeside the better part of the day. Not alone this, but he has offered a handsome cup for the winners of the Brigade Race. The report of the committee was received most enthusiastically and a hearty vote of thanks was recorded. His Excellency. The committee unanimously decided also to ask Mrs. Davidson to present to the winners of the different events the trophies they will have earned for the day.

The Secretary read letters from Hon. W. C. Job, John Harvey and Dr. Rendell, thanking the committee for appointing them as honorary members. He also read letters from Hon. J. Anderson and Messrs. H. W. LeMesurier, J. H. Monroe, Capt. E. English, E. Dave, Jas. Jardine and R. C. Smith, saying they would be glad to act as judges.

A letter was received from Mayor Ellis saying that he would again this year put up a \$2 gold piece for the winners of the Tradesmen's Race. The Premier will do the same for the laborers and fishermen.

A letter was also received from Mr. J. W. Morris, of the Reid Nfd. Co., saying that he had communicated to the various crews of their boat the committee's determination as to the transferring of crews.

When the President and committee were at Government House the question as to the possibility of H. M. S. Sirius being present Regatta Day was mooted. It was learned that the ship would not be due here until August 9th, and His Excellency promised to get in touch with the Commander and if possible have the warship here for the event. The President read a letter received from His Excellency saying that he enclosed a letter from the Commander of the Sirius, dated Robinson's Brook, June 18th, saying that the ship would be in St. John's for Regatta Day, and would arrive a few days before it to give the crew of the ship time to practice, so that they may

enter in one or more of the contests. This information was gladly received. The President announced that the cups for the amateur and swimming races had been ordered, as also the Governor's cup. The medals will be ordered later. Designs have been received for medals from several parties and these will be submitted to the committee in charge of the matter later. The President asserted that a rumor went abroad last year that a spirit of favoritism existed in the committee with regard to the matter of selecting the maker of the medals. They had designs last year from three parties, who enclosed them in envelopes but did not give their names, nor did anyone know them except the President, but he could not say who they were. The designs are taken on their merits and some shown to be superior to others in the opinion of the committee were selected and were later declared to be the work of Mr. Alfred Macnamara Jeweller. Favoritism of any kind under the circumstances could not possibly enter into such a competition, and this year the award will be made in the same manner. 





Brigus Art Exhibition.

On Monday last the town of Brigus was quite enlivened by the holding of an Art Exhibition here for the first time in its history. The day being fine, hundreds of school children came trooping into town during the afternoon from all the schools at Cupids, Clarke's Beach, Turk's Gut, the Gullies, etc., to see the sight. At night the splendid hall of the Methodist Academy presented a most animated scene as the residents prom-naded around inspecting the fine array of over a thousand pictures by American and Newfoundland schools, or sat listening to the music furnished at intervals by the Misses Bartlett, Thompson and Rabbits.

At 8 p.m., Capt. Wm. Bartlett took the chair, being supported by Rev. Dr. Murphy, Parish Priest, Rev. Mr. Feild, rector of the Parish, also Prof. Nichols and Mr. Winter. (Rev. R. H. Maddock, Methodist Minister, was unavoidably absent.)

The chairman warmly endorsed the effort that was being made to encourage the study of drawing in our schools, and regretted that it had not been taught him. It would have been so useful in so many ways.

Prof. Nichols followed in an impromptu speech intended specially to answer many enquiries made to him during the day about the pictures, and wound up by a strong appeal to parents and teachers on the value of drawing.

Rev. Dr. Murphy spoke of the pleasure it gave him to be present at such an excellent exhibition, and to do all in his power to aid such a praiseworthy effort. Brigus ought to be deeply grateful, as the exhibition would arouse interest in education generally.

Rev. Mr. Feild heartily supported the exhibition too. He spoke of the good done by exhibitions in other lands and incidentally gave some humorous experiences of his own at home and on the continent. Brigus was making a good beginning; they should go on. He hoped the children would persevere with the drawing.

After the presentation of a prize to Miss Clarke of the Methodist Academy, the audience resumed its inspection of the pictures. The exhibition closed at 10 p.m. by singing the National Anthem.—Com.

Municipal Matters.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Referring to my letter of a previous date, which appeared in your esteemed paper, and in which I dealt with municipal matters, I have learned that some officials of the Council are blamed for furnishing me with information as to the inside workings of that body, and that as these officials may be injured by my remarks, I must emphatically state that this contention is absolutely untrue. What I hold no brief for any of the Council officials, I consider it my duty to inform those interested that I have not received my information from them, then, now or at any time. I wrote solely in the interest of justice and not with the intention of injuring any person. But why this secrecy of the Municipal Council, and why should any information be withheld from the public, as it is the public business, some of which demanded attention, notably the Casey Street arbitration, which in the absence of the Mayor, and by the intervention of Councillor Mullaly, had it held over until the return of the Mayor, when it was brought forward again. After receiving due consideration it was decided that the taking over of such property was absolutely unnecessary, and not calculated to be for the best interests of the city. Referring again to this secrecy of municipal matters, I would like to ask what if the officials did give information to any citizen on public matters, would they not deserve praise, instead of censure?
