





Germany's only hope is to starve and bankrupt the Allies; the news that the starving and bankrupting of the Allies have now become impossible would wreck that last hope. Germany did not dare let its people know what the president said about Russia; he put too clearly the fact that the Russian revolution and the American declaration of war had completed the issue as one of democracy against autocracy. As for the President's own definition of that issue, Germany could not and did not let her people read that. She could not and did not let her people know of the President's account of the German plots within and against the United States, for that would have destroyed the pretense that the Zimmerman Mexican intrigue stood alone and was merely a natural and innocent precaution against eventualities. She could not and did not let the people, who are being told that ours will be only a half-hearted and limited war, read this announcement:

"We are now about to accept the gage of battle with this natural foe to liberty, and shall, if necessary, spend the whole force of the nation to check and nulify its pretensions



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

Ireland Divided **Against Himself**

Gasgow Herald: Irish Nationalists and their friends took advantage of the passing of a resolution of sympathy with the new Russian Democracy to allege once more a want of consistency in congratulating foreigners-even though they happen to be valued Allies-on the attainment of their aspirations after freedom, while still refusing to recognize the legitimate aspirations of the majority in Ireland. There is, however, no parallel between a country which has required to emancipate itself by violent methods from an age-long despotism with a country which can enjoy the largest possible measures of lib erty to-morrow if it will tell a bewildered Government and democracy how ts aims are to be achieved. Ireland is house divided against itself, and if that division persists neither the British nor any other conceivable Government, nor any external authority to which it may experimentally delegate powers of pacification can succeed in allaying unrest by concilatory pledges and promises and producing concord and harmony. Nevertheless the Government, in spite of the risks of failire and a consequent aggravation of he situation, have decided on their own responsibility to make another ttempt. Ulstermen, it pointed out, are not adamant, and arrangements with Ulster would be facilitated if the Nationalists would publicly avow that they were prepared to act. No package other than new oak barrel made especially for refined cod liver oil, a tinned lined barrel, or a butter oil cask, shall be used to contain refined cod liver oil.
