Mr. Lauder inquired of the Government whether or not it is their intention to continue the present system of Crown Land Agencies in the counties of Huron Grey and Bruce.

Hon. Mr. Richards replied that the agencies would probably be continued until after the present session closed. Then the Government would probably reorganize the whole system of the Crown Lands Department and decide upon the officers to be continued and those to be dispensed with.

Dublin, Jan. 10.—Facts which have come to the knowledge of the authorities here lead to the belief that the leader of the rising at Tallaght, last spring, was not killed as was reported. A man named Lennon, a prominent Fenian, was arrested here to day on a charge of high treason, and it is confidently asserted that he is the person who organized and directed the insurrection on that occasion. His examination will soon take place, when the evidence in possession of the Government will be brought to light.

Florence, Jan. 10th—The budget, which will be laid by the ministry before the Italian Parliament, calls for the adoption of the following measures to meet the liabilities and expenditures of the Government for the ensuing year:—First, the imposition of fresh taxes sufficient to produce the sum of one hundred and ninety million livres, in addition to the present revenue. Second, the authorization of a new loan for four hundred million livres.

Merewether, of the British expedition in Abyssinia, have been r. ved here, conveying the rather important intelligence that bands of natives supposed to be soldiers were prowling around the English camp at Senafe. In consequence of this manifestation, orders were issued for all the European troops, temporarily stationed at Annesley Bay and the different points along the line of march from there to the interior, to advance to the front and join the head-quarters division at Senafe.

Gas by a new Process

Gas by a new Process.

Gas for the lighting of a public building was used in Guelph, for the first time, on Friday night last in Mr. O'Connor's Billilard Hall. The chemical material used in its production are naphtha with two other ingredients, but the mechanism by which the gas is generated is hard to understand and much more difficult to describe. A machine has been patented for the purpose by Dr. Hall, of St. Mary's, and the one we saw in use was made by Mr. E. W. Colley, under the supervision of the patentee. It consists of two cylinders. The first of these is partly filled with water, and just above the line to which the water rises there is an opening for the admission of air. In the inside is what is called a "drum," which we are told is upon the principle of the turbine wheel, and which is made to revolve by means of a heavy weight attached to the axle by a small rope made of wires that passes over a pulley fixed to an upright beam, thus pressing the air, which fills the buckets as they pass the apt ture, into the water. The air is then forced up an upright tube, and along a horizontal to this that the liquid is put. An instrument called an "agitator" is working inside on the same axle that causes the revolution of the "drum." Its buckets take up the fluid, and the mixing of the air, that has passed through the first cylinder, with the liquid forms the necessary elements of the illuminating gas. The machine is also arranged so that it regulates the quantity of gas that passes from the cylinder into the pipe that conveys it round the building. Of course in

But one thing is certain that Dr. Hall has produced a very fine light. These were four lights burning from one chandelier, near the front of the Hall, and a very besuitful revolving light at the further end. If the gas is all that it is said to be, Mr. O'Connor can have sixteen lights (much better than coal oil makes) burning for six hours any night, and the cost will be only about seven cents. The Billiard Hall is worth a visit.
