The Late ex-Emperor.

The death of the ex-Emperor of the French has caused unusual com-motion in the old world, and no little excitement in the new. Queen Victoria has sent an autograph let ter to Chiselhurst, and a telegram of condolence has been received from the Pope. The Italian Government learned of the death of the ex-Emperor with the deepest regret, as it was impossible to forget that Napoleon had contributed greatly to secure the unity of Italy.

The Prince and Princess of Wales remain in strict retirement at their country seat at Sandringham for one week, as a mark of respect to the memory of the ex-Emperor. The British Court will go into mourning from the 14th to the 24th of Janu ary. The Municipal Council of Rome has adopted resolutions of condoand letters of condolence from the Emperor of Russia and the King of Italy have also been re-

Mr. Benedetti arrived at Chiselhurst, and was received by the Empress, M. Ollivier and Marshall Mc-Mahon are expected to-day. Prin-cess Murat and suite arrived on Saturday afternoon.

The remains of Napoleon III. will probably be buried on Tuesday, un der the seal of the family, in the Chancel of the Roman Catholic Chapel at Chiselhurst. It is said that the French Government will permit the final interment of Napoleon's re mains in France if the funeral is made strictly private, and deceased is bured as ex-Emperor not as Em peror. The ceremonies must be simply of a religious character. The President is understood to have conferred with the Minister of the Interior and the Prefect of Police with the object of preventing the funeral, if it takes place in France, being made the opportunity of a political manifestation.

Great numbers of people from France are expected at the funeral. The south-eastern and Northern railways of France have reduced the rates of fare for the benefit of the poorer classes desirous of attending the ceremony. The ceremonies must be

An impression is gaining ground that the Emperor died from the effects of chloroform, administered to assuage pain.

The first subscription list for a monument to the Emperor Napoleon, which opened by the Persecutar of Milan, already exceeds \$5,000 and that paper reports that subscriptions are pouring in from all quarters. National subscriptions for the same object have been opened at Venice.

A despatch to the agent of the Associated Press from a friend of the Imperial Family of Chisselhurst, gives the following description of the scene:—The remains of the late Emperor have been placed in a coftim. The corpse is dressed in the imiform of a marshal. The upper lip is bare, the moustache having been cut off to facilitate the taking of a plaster cast. The beard, which remains, is brown and bushy. The features look stern and care-worn, and have an expression of pain. The grand cordon of the Legion of Honor lies across his breast. The hands which are ungloved, are disposed in an easy and natural manner, the right clasping the left. On the fourth linger of the left hand is a ring with several diamonds, which was placed there by the Empress. A small silver cross of exquisite workmanship lies on the breast, find on the corpse are placed three sprigs of holly. Over the head a crown of violets is suspended. BUFFALO POLICE REPORT.—The Post-furnishes the following particulars:—Supt. Bryne has submitted this annual report to the Board of Police Commissioness, from it we bearn that the total nather of persons arrested during the past year was 10,534, an excess of 2,059 over 1871, the number reported being 8,475. The nativity of those taken into custody during 1872 was 4,744 white Americans and 148 coloured Americans and 727 Canadians. The others were foreigners from different nations. Of the total number of arrests, 3 were charged with murder, 4 with arson, 48 with burglary 50 with burglary and larceny, 3 with rape, 5 with bigamy, 32 with assault with intent to kill, 62 with assault with a deadly weapon, 131 with grand larceny, 658 with petit larceny, 1767 with assault and battery, 11 with gambling and the balance with offences of a minor character. Of these 3,870 were married, and 6,664 single; 940 could read and write and 1,200 could not; 74 could read only. The total number of lost children found and restored to their parents was 151. The total of the persons furnished with lodgings at the different station houses was 3,675.
