Chris. Kelser was charged with assaulting his wife by hitting her on the head with a plate. He was eating fish and fish-bones with great avidity, he became black in the face, and was choking when she remonstrated with him. He replied with a plate, and was fined \$1 and costs or ten days.

John Ellemonge pleaded not guilty to assaulting J. W. Edwards. The man Edwards had been assaulted very brutally, and two witnesses swore that Ellemonge kicked him when dewn. He was fined \$50 and costs or 60 days.

George Watson was charged with assaulting F. A. Campbell on Yonge street yesterday. The dispute arose over the payment of some moneys, and in the fight Watson, it is said, used his teeth. The magistrate said he was determined to have this ruffianism stopped. He imposed a fine of \$20 and costs or 60 days.

The case against Thos. Jones, charged with assaulting Wm. Rowe (Paddy Rats) some weeks ago, was remanded until 78th. The adjourned case of assault preferred by John McCabe of the City hotel, against Charles Chalkley, Henry Eades and James Lynch was next heard. The conflict arose over the payment of some money due to Chalkley by McCabe. Defendants are said to have been under the influence of liquor and were ordered out. A row ensued, in which McCabe says he was violently assaulted. A fine of \$2 and costs or 10 days was imposed on Chalkley. Lynch was bound over to keep the peace in \$100 for a year, and Eades was discharged. The counter charge against McCabe was adjourned unit the 9th.

YONGE STREET PAVEMENT. The board of works held a star chamber meeting yesterday forenoon.
