In France popular feeling is growing stronger, and it is confidently expected at Paris that the present Gollet Cabinet will be overturned in order to make room for one more energetic and less disposed to bow down before Germany. The Ministers, with the exception of Boulanger, are designated as cowards by a majority of Frenchmen, who are indignant at their thoroughly apparent dread of offending Prince Bismarck. Meanwhile, although Schnaebeles is back in P France, his trial is proceeding at Leipzig, with the object of proving the complicity of the French Government in the recent roubles in Alsace-Lorraine and in anti-German in-trigues among the annexed populations. It
