

Epidemic Influenza

(Issued by the Department of the Public Health, Nova Scotia)

The public is warned against pinning faith to the use of camphor bags, garles, throat sprays, etc., as preventives of influenza. It should be realized that the germs of influenza and of the pneumonia which so often complicates it; will resist immersion in strong germicidal solutions for several minutes, and could not possibly be destroyed by the odour from a champhor bag or similar device. Gargles and throat sprays may do harm rather than good, by irritating the mucous membrane and rendering it less resistant to bacterial invasion, so they should not be used except upon the advice of a physician.

It cannot be too stongly urged that safety lies particularly in avoiding close association with those who are strongly resemble ordinary colds, those who have colds should be kept at a distance. The infective agent is given off in the discharges from throat and nose, and in the fine spray which is ejected in the acts of coughing. sneezing and loud talking. Such spray is ejected to a distance of from four to five feet. Keep out of its range.

The number of the organisms of influenza or pneumonia which float about in the open air or in the air of well ventilated and uncrowded rooms can usually be taken care of by the healthy individual. "Invasion in mass" however, may overcome the resisting power of even the strongest man. Such invasion is only likely when one comes within range of the cough or sneeze of an infected person.

Resistance to attack by the small number of germs which may be present in the air of well ventilated places depends mainly upon the general health. This should be maintained at the highest possible standard by avoiding excesses of any kind, getting a sufficient amount of food. plenty of sleep, a moderate amount of outdoor exercise, an unlimited supply of fresh air. Clothing should be warm, chilling should be avoided and wet clothing, including foot wear, should be changed for dry at the earliest possible moment.

There is grave danger in neglect of what may appear to be an ordinary cold. Many mild cases of influenza are scarcely to be distinguished from this minor ailment. Those who lightly regard what they think to be a mere cold may not only subject themselves to great risk, but endanger all with

The most important item in the treatment of influenza is to go to bed at once and to remain there until the doctor advises oherwise. This is the surest way to escape dangerous com-



Preparing the Flock for Winter.

(Experimental Farms Note) The success to be obtained from the farm flock will depend very largely on the way it has been handled during the autumn month. The plan at the Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S. is, before the breeding season opens in the fall go through the flock, pick out all the nonproducers, poor milkers, or any that may have bad mouths or spoiled udders; also any that may be too old for breeding profitably, and discard them. In selecting out the breeding flock looks alone is not the only guide, as many times a ewe may be a profitable breeder yet be very thin, due to the fact that she has been brought down by a heavy milk flow. Good ewes should be retained in the flock as long as they breed and feed their

lambs properly. All lambs not intended for breeding purposes are sold. If the market happens to be flooded it is found to be more profitable to feed them well until January or February, by putting them on good aftermath until barning time, then finish on roots and meal.

Ram lambs intended for breeding are placed in a separate field with good clover aftermath and given a light grain mixture of ½ pound oats; ½ pound bran and 1-5 pound oilcake meal. The ewe lambs are also placed in a field by themselves, but not given much grain unless the afterfeed is poor. All breeding ewes are flushed during the latter part of October or the first of November. This consists in putting them in a good field of clover and giving them a light grain ration of oats, bran and a little oilcake meal. Hence the ewes make a rapid gain in flesh. New Flour Regulations Are Drastic,

Perhaps few, if any, of our readers fully realize just how drastic are the new flour regulations, and that it is absolutely necessary to buy the substitue when purchasing war flour and a positive violation of the law to induce the grocer to sell flour without the specified substitutes. According to the latest ruling of the Food Board only four substitutes are now obtainable with every purchase of war flour. Of these substitutes the Board demands that 25 per cent. of the purchase of flour must be obtained. That is when a 24pound bag of flour is bought 6 pounds of either rye flour, corn flour, barley flour or oat flour must be obtained at the same time and so according to quantity purchased.

The order has been made most drastic and no doubt ignorance of it is creating considerable animosity between the grocer and, in some instances many of their oldest customers. 
