LAWRENCETOWN NOTES AND NEWS

Evaporator Running Full Blast--Dramatic Club to Stage Play--Personal And Other Notes

One evening last week two automobile parties had the misfortune to collide near Stevenson's Garage which spot proved very lucky for the disabled one. The other car being able to travel towards home on its own power. It seems that the cars were not properly lighted, the one having a lantern while the other had no lights whatever. One was travelling West, the other East, and quite apparently both must have been clinging to the one and same side of the road, and as neither had sufficient light to reveal the other, a collision was inevitable. The car carrying the lantern was very badly damaged, but in spite of the severe wrecking the lantern kept burning throughout. The car with no lights was not as badly damaged and was able to proceed home under its own power. Considerable discussion ensued as to whose fault it really was, and the odd part of the whole situation is embodied in the fact that the car at the time of the collision carrying no lights immediately after the mishap turned on the lights and started for home. Of course it is unlawful to run without at least some kind of light, and where a car has lights that are in working order it seems odd that they should choose to run the chances of disabling other people's property and endangering human lives.

Owing to the excessive rainfall during the former part of last week, the town was without the electric lights for two nights and had very little light the third night. The water is gradually becoming lower and the lights by this time are well up to normal. In addition to depriving us of lights it also held the trains here at the depot on Wednesday last all due to a severe washout near Paradise. The people on the trains were supplied with hot drink and cakes during their stay in the town and with the exception of the great inconvenience and delay, fared very well.

The evaporator at the present time is running full blast, and gives employment to many of the town people in addition to many from the outlying sections. These additional people together with the local people present quite a busy looking thoroughfare on Main Street on a Saturday night. It is not definitely known just how long the present run of apples will last but as long as apples are procurable for evaporator purposes it is very probable that the local industry will be running.

The Lawrencetown Drug Store which has in the past been conducted by Dr. L. R. Morse, has recently changed hands and is now ready to supply the wants of the public under the direction of Mr. Porter. Miss Banks remains as clerk, and in addition to being open during the week days is now open on Sundays from two until three in the afternoon and from 8.30 until 9.30 in the evening which in itself is going to be a splendid convenience for the town in general.

Roads in town and towards Middleton are at present in sort of a muzzed up state, making traffic somewhat sluggish. It is hoped, however, that with the spring frost and mud mixing the gravel firmly together that for next year we will be repaid by good roads for the poor roads that it has been our lot to travel this year.

C. Haynes, the local photographer, has recently purchased some up-to-date apparatus and lately has been getting considerable business. Numbered among his latest work have been views of the recent washout, views of the river flowing with a tremendous capacity of water and many others.

Several motor parties from the town are vicinity taking advantage of the few Sundays that are now left in the present season for motoring, left for various trips on Sunday last, some going to Bridgewater, some Kentville, Annapolis and Aylesford.

The autoing season is rapidly approaching the finale, and the period for pleasuring is practically a thing of the past. Any autos that are now travelling, manage to have side curtains around protecting the occupants from the ravaging winds.

The Dramatic Club of the town are contemplating the production of a comedy drama in the near future. Parts are now being assigned and it is hoped that the play will be staged by the middle of November.

HEAVY RAINS DO MUCH DAMAGE

Roads in Mountain Districts Difficult of Travel in Some Locations

Last week's downpour of rain was the heaviest experienced in this part of the country for many years during the Fall season as regards amount of rain falling during a short given period. All streams were overflowing. Two washouts occurred on the Dominion Atlantic Railway, one near Paradise and the other near Moschelle. It was late Wednesday night before the damage done was repaired and the held up express trains could proceed on their way. The intervals and meadows along the Annapolis river were covered with water and for about twenty four hours some orchards near the river were surrounded with water some four or five feet deep.

Roads which were well built, well crowned and with good drainage, did not suffer very much, but roads in Mountain districts were damaged to a considerable extent. Smooth surfaces on hills were worn off, exposing masses of rocks and boulders difficult for vehicles to negotiate. Repairs will, in the aggregate, cost a very considerable sum of money.

A BIG INDUSTRY FOR THE VALLEY

Big news for Berwick and the Annapolis Valley in general is the statement that under new management the chain of evaporators in the Annapolis Valley, known as the Nova Scotia Evaporators, Ltd., are to be taken over and controlled by the Valley Products, Limited, a Syndicate to be incorporated under the provisions of the laws of Nova Scotia. This Syndicate, which will have a capitalization of \$400,000, has as its object the manufacture of the various finished products which will be featured as jellies, and dehydrated vegetables, utilizing all the apples and vegetables now going to waste in the Valley, and inducing the growers to make a much greater expansion in production.

The Company has established headquarters at Kentville, with Mr. P. Addison Demick, an aggressive and progressive young man, as general manager. Mr. Demick has been making a special study of the economical, financial and industrial conditions in Canada, and finds there is unlimited opportunity for industrial expansion in the entire Dominion. After a complete survey of the Maritime Provinces along industrial lines, he is firmly convinced that as soon as the apple and vegetable growers of this Province realize that they have a domestic market for products now going to waste, at a good price at their very door, then and not until then, will the growers of the Maritime Provinces enlarge upon their present production in a very material manner.

In the Syndicate associated with Mr. Demick are several influential Valley citizens, whose whole-heartedness in a complete Nova Scotia enterprise of this kind, has manifested itself in a very wonderful manner.

Mr. G. F. Humphrey, of London, England, who will have complete charge of all the plants and manufacturing of its products, is an expert in all foods. He has been commended by the British Government under Lord Rhondia, Minister of Foods, during the late European war, which absolutely assures to the company and to the public the same standard quality in the finished Canadian product, as is known of British manufactured goods.

Hitherto the evaporating plants of the Valley have been in operation for a period of only three or four months in the year. Under the new Company it is anticipated that the plants will be run for a period of ten or eleven months in the year, and employ in the vicinity of 2,000 hands. This will provide a ready market for the fruit and vegetable growers of the Valley.

In addition to the Canadian markets the Company has established markets in England, continental Europe and Brazil, which will absorb all the products that the Company can manufacture.

The modernizing of the dehydrating plants will enable the Company with its new process of manufacturing dehydrated products to use all available vegetables and fruit grown in the Valley. This will be of great advantage to the growers, as the Company will be able to absorb twice the quantity now produced.

The plants and equipment will be of the most modern type and very advantageously situated in the following towns:—Windsor, Kentville, Berwick, Cambridge, Waterville, Lakeville, Kingston, Middleton, Lawrencetown and Annapolis.

The new Company will, it is understood, acquire control of the various plants on the 1st of January next, and will commence at once the work of modernizing and reconstruction, at the same time giving attention to the provision of proper and up-to-date housing facilities for employees.

Mr. Demick and his chief associate, Mr. Humphrey, were in Berwick on Saturday and will be here frequently from now on.

A Register representative, in an interview with Mr. Demick, was informed that Berwick would be one of the Company's most important centres, the idea being to employ five to seven hundred hands here ten or eleven months of the year.

Further developments will be watched with great interest.—Berwick Register.

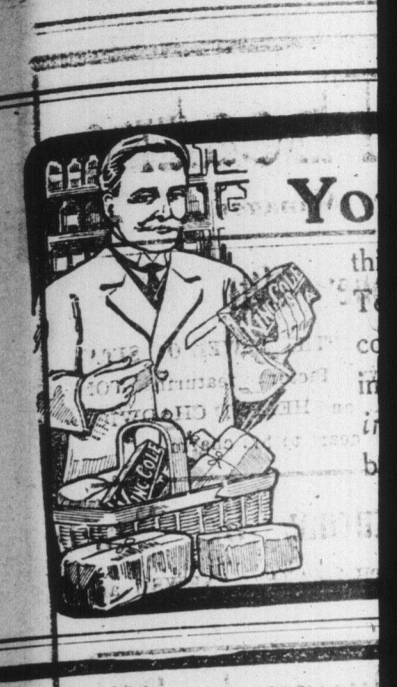
