ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR 1877.

There will be five Eclipses, three of the Sun, and two of the Moon, only one of which requires special notice.

I.—February 27th.—The Moon is eclipsed, invisible to us.

II.—March 14th.—The Sun is partially eclipsed, invisible to us.

III.—August 8th.—The Sun is partially eclipsed, invisible to us.

IV.—August 22nd.—The Moon is totally eclipsed, visible only in part. Begins at Montreal, 4.25 evening; total begins 5.16; middle, 6.16. Eclipse ends 8.6 evening. Begins at Toronto, 4.1 evening; total begins 5.2; middle, 5.52. Eclipse ends 7.42 evening.

V.—September 6th.—A partial eclipse of the Sun, invisible.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus shines as a Morning Star until the 6th May, after the Star shines as an Evening Star until the 10th June, after which date it is classed as a Morning Star. Jupiter is an Evening Star after the 15th April, previous to that date it is a Morning Star. Saturn is a Morning Star from March 1st to June 16th.

CITY POSTAL DELIVERY.

The following are arrangements in connection with Free Postal Delivery in the City of Montreal:

1. There are no fees chargeable on the delivery of Letters or Papers.

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POST OFFICE.

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2. There are six deliveries daily, Sundays excepted, in the Central portions of the city, commencing respectively at 8.30 a.m., 10.00 a.m., 11.30 a.m., 1.00 p.m., 2.00 p.m., and 3.30 p.m., and four deliveries in the other portions of the City, commencing at 8.30 a.m., 11.30 a.m., 1.30 p.m., and 3.30 p.m., excepting, however, in the more distant divisions in the Northern and Eastern portions of the City, in which there are only two deliveries, commencing at 8.30 a.m., and 1.30 p.m.

3. Letters and papers addressed to particular streets and numbers are delivered without delay by Letter Carrier.

4. Letters and papers addressed to Box and Drawer-holders are, until otherwise ordered, delivered through the Boxes and Drawers, as usual. Should, however, such letters and papers be addressed to Streets and Numbers, they will be delivered by Letter Carrier, unless the Sorting Clerk should distinctly and promptly remember that the parties for whom intended are Box and Drawer holders. No letters or papers are placed in the Boxes or Drawers unless addressed either to the number of the Box or Drawer, or to the holder, or to the care of the holder thereof.

5. Letters and papers addressed simply "Montreal," to parties who have neither Boxes nor Drawers, are delivered as expeditiously as circumstances will permit, either through the General Delivery or by Letter Carrier. If papers and periodicals published in the city are addressed to Box or Drawer-holders in the Montreal Post Office they will be delivered if pre-paid by postage stamp, one cent, each package of four ounces. Papers or periodicals published in the city are not delivered by Letter Carriers.

6. Persons desirous of receiving their letters and papers promptly by Letter Carrier, should request their correspondents to place on the addresses the Street and Number at which they are to be delivered, as otherwise they will be subject to delays, which it is impossible to avoid.

7. They should also provide themselves with small change for the payment of unpaid postage, as the Carriers (who are not allowed to give credit) cannot be detained for its collection. In the event of an unpaid letter or paper not being delivered in consequence of the party to whom addressed having no change, it will be taken back to the Office and sent out again for delivery as soon thereafter as practicable. If, on its being tendered a second time, the party to whom addressed is not provided with the postage, it will be sent to the General Delivery at the Head Office, where application for it will have to be made.

8. Persons having offices at which they desire their letters and papers to be delivered by Letter Carrier, should affix a letter box to the door, with an opening from the outside, as otherwise, in case the office is closed, the letters and papers will be delayed until the next delivery. It would also be very desirable that, where convenient, letter boxes should be affixed to the doors of private residences.

9. Persons receiving their letters by Letter Carrier should, in the event of their removal, advise their correspondents, and at once send their new address in writing to the Postmaster.

10. Three Postal Receiving Offices are established:—One in the East, at No. 588 St. Catherine Street; one in the North, at No. 311½ St. Lawrence Street; and one in the West, at No. 466 St. Joseph Street; to which, the letters and papers will be conveyed by vehicle from the Head Office four times daily, viz.: at 8.00 a.m., 11.00 a.m., 1.00 p.m. and 3.00 p.m., and distributed from thence by Letter Carrier at the hours already mentioned.

11. These Receiving Houses are also open for the sale of Postage Stamps, and the reception of Registered and other mailable matter, from 8.00 a.m. to 6.00 p.m.

12. Collections are made from the Receiving Houses and Street Letter Boxes by vehicle, leaving the Head Office as follows:—For Receiving Offices, daily, Sundays excepted, at 8.00 a.m., 10.00 a.m., 11.00 a.m., 1.00 p.m., 3.00 p.m., 6.00 p.m., 8.30 p.m., and on Sunday at 8.30 p.m. For Street Letter Boxes: Daily, Sundays excepted, at 10.00 a.m., 1.00 p.m., 6.00 p.m., 8.30 p.m., and on Sunday at 8.30 p.m.

13. Every effort is used to secure the satisfactory working of these arrangements. If, however, irregularities occur, they should be at once reported to the Postmaster.

These Registration Fees are, of course, in addition to the Postage, and must be pre-paid.

DISPOSAL OF UNPAID OR INSUFFICIENTLY PAID LETTERS MAILED IN CANADA.

If for Places within the Dominion.—A letter wholly unpaid is not forwarded, but is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa. If pre-paid at least one rate, that is, 3 cents, the letter is forwarded to destination, but is rated with double the deficient postage. This rule applies also to city or "drop" letters, the postage on which is 1 cent. per half ounce.

If for the United States.—A letter, whether wholly unpaid, or insufficiently paid, is not forwarded from Canada, but is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa, in order to be there opened and returned to its writer.

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If for the United Kingdom.—A letter wholly unpaid is forwarded, but is rated with double postage, that is, 5 pence sterling per ½ ounce. If it is insufficiently pre-paid, it is charged at the same rate, deducting what may have been pre-paid.

If for other British Colonies or Foreign Countries (except France).—A letter, whether wholly unpaid, or only insufficiently paid, is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

LOCAL OR "DROP" LETTERS.

One cent. per half ounce, to be pre-paid by Postage Stamp.

POSTAL CARDS.

Canadian Postal Cards of one cent each circulate within the Dominion,—and are transmissible, without further charge, to the United States and Newfoundland.

Newspapers.—Between places in the Dominion, to the United States, to Newfoundland, publishers pre-pay their edition in bulk, at the rate of one cent for each pound weight; no further charge on delivery. Transient newspapers within the Dominion, to the United States and Newfoundland, one cent per four ounces, to be pre-paid by stamp. Transient papers for the United Kingdom, two cents per four ounces.

Periodicals.—Published in Canada not less frequently than once a month, sent from office of publication, or from news agencies, for places in the Dominion, to the United States or to Newfoundland, the postage rate is the same as for Newspapers, i.e., one cent per pound, when paid by the bulk weight; Transient Periodicals, one cent per four ounces. Newspapers and periodicals for the Dominion, the United States and Newfoundland, weighing less than one ounce each, may be posted singly, if pre-paid by stamp, one half cent each.

Periodicals and Books for United Kingdom, by CANADIAN LINE, are subject to the British Book Post Rates, namely:

Newspapers to France and Samples are sent at the above "French Book Post" rates.

A "book packet" may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature and art, maps or prints, photographs, daguerotypes, when not in glass or in frames containing glass; any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters), and the books, maps, papers, &c., may be either written, printed or plain, or any mixtures of the three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign. Book packages must be open at both ends or both sides.

Patterns.—Rates between Canada and United Kingdom and France, same as for Book Post.

Patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

Patterns, &c., must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck, or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts. Patterns and samples of merchandize, not exceeding the weight of eight ounces, addressed to the United States, may be sent at the rate of ten cents for each package.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France or Portugal, must not exceed 18 inches in length, and 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

Transmission of Patterns and Samples within the Province of Canada.

Patterns or samples of merchandise, and goods for sale, not exceeding twenty-four ounces in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per four ounces, under the following regulations:—

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II.—The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender, in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended—also a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the articles enclosed; *inside* there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

III.—Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter, or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules, is to be rated and treated as a letter.

IV.—The rate of one cent per four ounces is to be pre-paid by postage stamp,—and if such rate be not fully pre-paid by the stamps affixed, the package is to be rated with the deficient postage, and a fine of five cents in addition.

V.—Packets of samples or patterns may be registered on pre-payment by postage stamp of a registration fee of five cents in addition to the postage rate—and provided such packets be duly handed into the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be obtained for such packages when presented for registration.

VI.—No packet of samples or patterns must exceed twenty-four ounces in weight; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause: To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or to enclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), is an offence punishable by a penalty of not less than ten and not exceeding forty dollars.

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Miscellaneous Postal Matter.—On books, pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices current, hand-bills, book and newspaper manuscripts; printers' proof sheets, whether corrected or not; maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs; photographs, when not on glass or in cases containing glass; sheet music, whether printed or written; documents, wholly or partly printed or written, such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of like nature; packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions or grafts; patterns or samples of goods or merchandise, when posted in Canada for any place in Canada, the rate of postage is *one cent per four ounces in weight*, to be pre-paid by postage stamp, or by the use of stamped post bands when suitable for the purpose. No letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, must be sent or enclosed in any article of miscellaneous mail matter; and all transmissions authorized by this regulation must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides, or in such manner as to admit of inspection to ensure compliance with this condition. If enclosed in sealed envelopes, notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged.

Miscellaneous mail matter as above specified, when addressed to the United States or to Newfoundland, may be forwarded, when pre-paid the one cent per 4 oz. rate, as if addressed to a place in Canada, with the exception of packets of samples and patterns of merchandise addressed to the United States, on which the special rate of ten cents must be pre-paid.

Money Orders in Canada.—All the Money Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia, are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz:—

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.—The Money Order Offices in the Dominion also draw upon all the Money Order Offices in England, Ireland and Scotland, the Channel Islands, and British India, save those in British India for which there are special rates, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:—

All the Money Order Offices in the Dominion are also authorized to grant Money Orders on the United States, the maximum amount of which, however, upon a single order, is limited to \$40 Canadian currency. The rates are:—

For Orders under and up to \$20..... 25 cts.

In all classes of Orders, as many of the maximum amount may be obtained as will be needed to make up the sum the applicant desires to remit.

By the amended Post Office Act, which came in force on the 1st October, any Postmaster issuing Money Orders on credit, and any person aiding and abetting, or procuring the issue of such orders, will be guilty of misdemeanor.

The Money Order Post Offices in the Dominion are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, British Columbia, and Newfoundland; and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to the issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

1. The Post Office Savings Bank commenced operations in Ontario and Quebec on the 1st April, 1868.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Savings Bank Post Office the Savings Bank regulations may be read by the public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed upon the cover of the Pass Book supplied to each depositor.

4. Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits are received daily during the ordinary hours of Post Office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General.

5. The Postmasters of the Savings Bank Offices will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

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6. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, and the sums paid in, or withdrawn, are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in is sent to the depositor from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

7. Every depositor's account is thus kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices, which at the time may best suit his convenience, and exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the Pass Book, in proof of identity, whenever paying in or drawing out deposits.

8. Interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits.

9. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, nor for postage or communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will always be ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

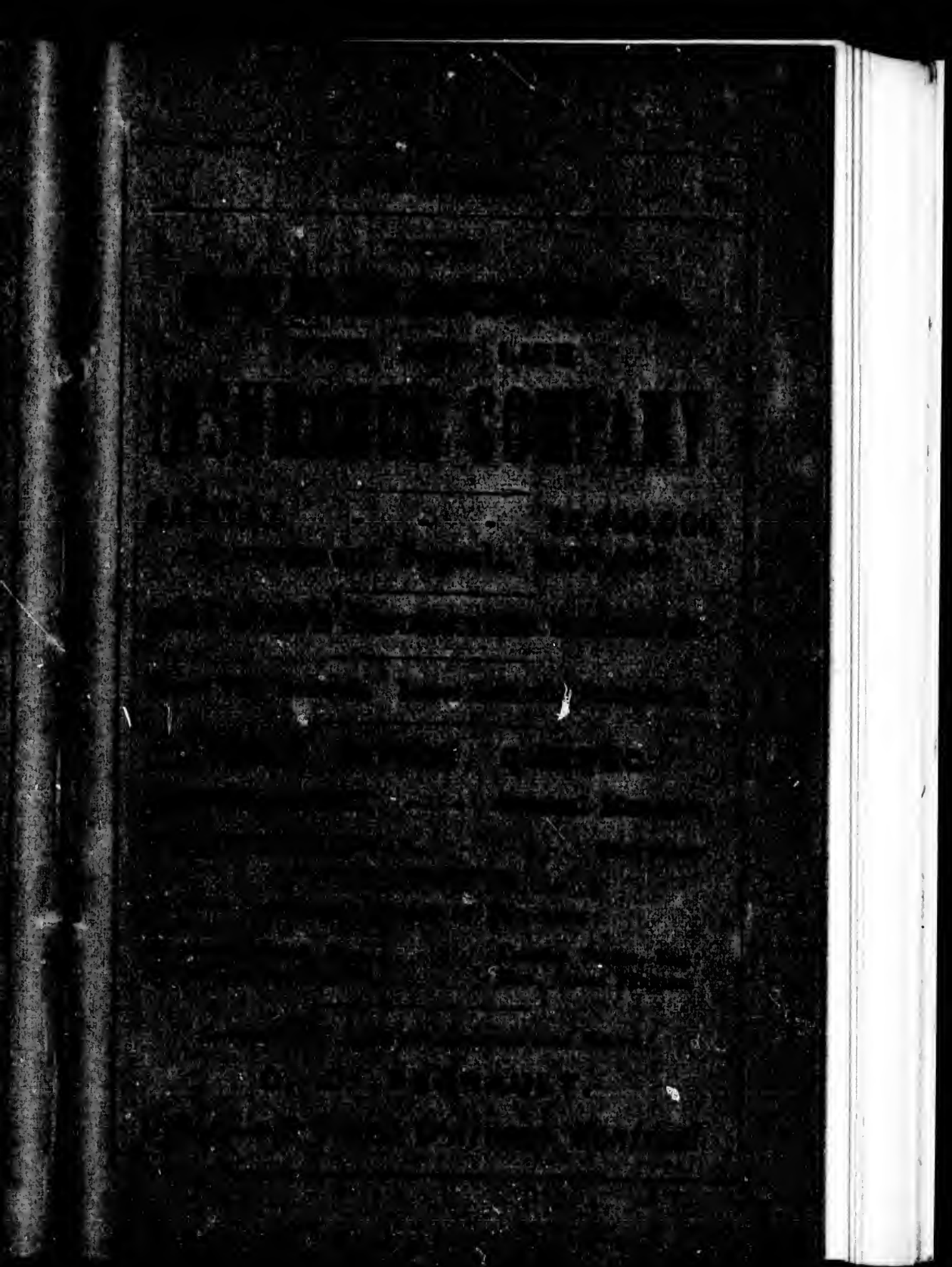

Schedule D.—The following goods, when the growth and produce of any of the British North American Provinces, may be imported free of duty, subject to alteration or regulation by proclamation of the Governor-General in Council, viz. :—

Animals of all kinds; Fresh, Smoked and Salted Meats; Green and Dried Fruits; Fish of all kinds, products of fish, and of all other creatures living in water; Poultry, Butter, Cheese, Lard, Tallow; Timber and Lumber of all kinds, round, hewed, but not otherwise manufactured, in whole or in part; Fish Oil, Gypsum, ground or unground; Hay, Hops, Straw, Bran, Seeds of all kinds, Vegetables, including Potatoes and other roots; Plants, Trees and Shrubs; Coal and Coke; Salt; Wheat, Peas and Beans; Barley, Rye, Oats, Indian Corn, Buckwheat, and all other grain; Flour of Wheat, Rye, Indian Meal and Oatmeal, and Flour or Meal of any other grain.

All goods not enumerated as charged with any other duty, or declared to be free of duty, and non-enumerated packages, 17½ p. c.

"The following packages, viz.: bottles, jars, demijohns, and carboys, whatever be their contents, and brandy casks, barrels, or other packages in which spirituous liquors, wines, and malt liquors are contained, and barrels or other packages in which petroleum oils or the products thereof are contained, and all goods not enumerated in this or any other Act as charged with any duty of Customs, and not declared free of duty by this Act or some other Act or provision unrepealed by this Act, shall be charged with a duty of Customs of *seventeen and one half per centum ad valorem*, when imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein."

"But all packages not hereinbefore specified, (and not specially charged with duty under Section 4 of the Act 31 Victoria, Chapter 44, or any other unrepealed enactment,) and being the ordinary or usual packages in which goods are packed for exportation according to the general custom and usage of trade, shall be free of duty."

"The fair market value for duty of all goods upon which an *ad valorem* duty of Customs is chargeable under this Act or any other Act, shall be ascertained and determined, except as hereinafter provided, in accordance with the provisions of the sections twenty-nine to forty-six, both inclusive, of the Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "*An Act respecting the Customs*," so much of any Act is inconsistent with this section being hereby repealed."

"Whereas difficulties have frequently arisen in determining the fair market value of goods imported into Canada, being the manufacture or production of foreign countries or of Great Britain, such as musical instruments, sewing machines, agricultural machines or implements, medical preparations, (commonly called patent medicines), or other similar goods, the prices of which are published by the manufacturers or producers, or persons acting on their behalf, it is hereby enacted, that the Governor in Council may, from time to time, fix and determine a certain rate of discount which may be deducted from such published prices of any such manufactures or productions, and the remainder of such published price, after deducting such rate of discount, shall be deemed and taken to be the fair market values for duty of any such manufactures or productions as may or shall be specified in such Order in Council, anything in this or any other Act to the contrary thereof notwithstanding."

"If the importer swears that no invoice has been, or can be received, then the Collector or officer shall fix the amount of duty to be paid. In all other cases, invoices are to be produced, verified upon oath of importer, and filed at Custom House."

"No person making or authorizing a false invoice of any goods shall recover any part of the price thereof."

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"Any importer dissatisfied with appraisement, may appeal against it. Two merchants then to appraise the goods, and their judgment on the matter to be final. Appraised value to be never less than invoice value."

Packages delivered before Examination.—All the packages mentioned in any one entry, although most of such packages may have been delivered to the importer, shall be subject to the control of the Customs authorities of the port at which they are entered, until such of the packages as have been sent for examination to the Examining Warehouse shall have been duly examined and approved, provided such examination take place within three days after the delivery of the package or packages into the Examining Warehouse, and after twenty-four hours' notice by the importer to the collector; and a bond shall be given by the importer, conditioned that the packages so delivered shall not be opened or unpacked before the package or packages sent to the Examining Warehouse shall have been examined and passed as aforesaid, provided they are examined within the delay aforesaid; and the packages so delivered, or the goods if lawfully unpacked, shall, if required by the Collector of Customs, be returned to the Custom House, within such delay as may be mentioned in the bond, under a forfeiture of the penalty of such bond; provided that the Collector shall use due diligence in causing such examination to be made, and may, if he sees no objection, permit the remaining packages to be opened and unpacked, as soon as those sent to the Warehouse have been examined and approved."

Collectors to file Invoices.—"The Collector of Customs, at all the ports of Canada, shall retain and put on file, after duly stamping same, all invoices of goods imported at such ports respectively, of which invoices they shall give certified copies or extracts whenever called upon so to do by the importer, and such copies or extracts, so duly certified by the Collector or other proper officer, and bearing stamp of the Custom House at which they are filed, shall be considered and received as authentic, and the collector shall be entitled to demand for each certificate a fee of fifty cents, before delivering the same."

Materials used in Canadian Manufactures.—34 Vic., cap. 10, Sec. 3.—"Governor in Council may, from time to time, transfer to the *free list*, any or all articles (whether natural products or products of manufactures) used as materials in Canadian manufactures."

Machinery.—Sec. 4.—"Governor in Council may authorize the admission, free of duty, of all machinery to be used in any Canadian manufactory, on satisfactory evidence that like machinery is not then manufactured in Canada. Under the authority of this section, certain rules for the free admission of machinery have been adopted by Order in Council of 7th June, 1871."

North-West Territory.—Sec. 5.—Customs duties in North-West Territory to be same as in Manitoba.—32 and 33 Vic., cap. 2.

Regulations for the Inspection and Branding of Petroleum, sanctioned by Order in Council of 30th May, 1868.

1st. Refined Petroleum shall be tested by Taglibue's Pyrometer or by such other similar instruments Inland Revenue Act, as may be approved by the Minister of 1868, Sec. 17. Inland Revenue, and all such instruments shall be distributed under the supervision of the Department of Inland Revenue, and shall be used in accordance with instructions sanctioned by the said Department.

Fire test..... 105 degrees.

2nd. All barrels, casks or packages containing Petroleum which have been inspected, shall be branded with:—

The date of the inspection.

The name of the Inspecting Officer.

The degrees of heat at which the vapor produced by it ignited.

The name of the refiner, or, if imported, the name of the importer.

3rd. Refined Petroleum may be warehoused and removed in bond, under the regulations made by an Order in Council on the 27th day of April, 1868.

All Petroleum and Coal Oil manufactured in or imported into Canada, offered for sale without having been inspected, shall be liable to forfeiture, and for every barrel, cask or package (containing not less than 20 gals.) inspected, there shall be imposed an inspection fee of..... 10 cents.

Do. do. less than 20 gals..... ½ cent per gal.

Regulations respecting Petroleum and its products which will not stand the fire test of 105 degrees, sanctioned by Order in Council of 15th January, 1875:—

No imported refined petroleum which will not stand the said test, whether designated as "Coal Oil," "Naptha," "Benzine," "Benzole," "Parafine," or other oil or fluid, distilled, manufactured or produced by any process or treatment whatever, shall be admitted to entry for consumption or warehouse in Canada, unless the importer shall have produced a license from a collector or other proper officer of Inland Revenue, authorizing him to import and keep the same on hand.

ADULTERATION OF FOOD.

Extracts from 31st Vic., chap. 8.

“ An Act to impose License duties on compounders of spirits; to amend the ‘Act respecting the Inland Revenue’ and to prevent the Adulteration of Food, Drink and Drugs. 26th May, 1874.”

3. “ A license to carry on business and to act as a compounder, and to sell by wholesale the articles compounded under such license, may be granted to any party who had complied with the provisions of this Act; provided that the granting of the license has been approved by the District Inspector of Inland Revenue, and that the party has, jointly and severally, with two good and sufficient sureties, entered into a bond with Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in the sum one thousand dollars, and such bond shall be taken before the Collector of Inland Revenue, who shall cause such sureties to justify as to their sufficiency, before him, by affidavit endorsed upon such bond, and shall be conditioned for the rendering of all accounts and the payment of all duties and penalties, which the party to whom the license is granted will become liable to render or pay under the provisions of this Act, and that such party will faithfully comply with the requirements thereof, according to their true intent and meaning, as well with regard to such accounts and penalties, as to all other matters and things whatsoever.”

4. “ The party in whose name a license is granted to act as a compounder, shall, upon receiving such license, pay to the Collector of Inland Revenue, the sum of fifty dollars.”

14. Gives authority to appoint analysts of food, drink and drugs.

15. Empowers Revenue officers to seize and destroy adulterated articles, when so reported by the analyst.

22. "Every person who shall wilfully admix, and every person who shall order any other person to admix with any article of food or drink, any deleterious or poisonous ingredient or material to adulterate the same for sale, and every person who shall wilfully admix, and every person who shall order any other person to admix any ingredient or material with any drug to adulterate the same for sale, shall, for the first offence, forfeit and pay a penalty of one hundred dollars, together with the costs attending the conviction, and for the same offence shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be imprisoned for a period not exceeding six calendar months, with hard labor."

23. The penalty under this clause, for selling or offering for sale any adulterated article of food or drink is one hundred dollars for a first offence; for a subsequent offence, two hundred dollars; and, in either case, the adulterated goods are to be seized and forfeited to the Crown.—See Clause 15.

24. "Any person who shall sell any article of food or drink, or any drug, knowing the same to have been mixed with any other substance, with intent fraudulently to increase its weight or bulk, and who shall not declare such admixture to any purchaser thereof, before delivering the same, and no other, shall be deemed to have sold an adulterated article of food or drink, or drugs, as the case may be, under this Act."

"Every person who mixes, or causes to be mixed with any intoxicating liquors sold or exposed for sale by him; any deleterious ingredient, that is to say, any of the ingredient specified in the second schedule to this Act, or added to such schedule by any Order in Council made under this Act, or any ingredient deteterious to health."

"Every person who sells, or keeps, or exposes for sale, any intoxicating liquors mixed with any deleterious ingredient; and

"Every compounder, or dealer in, and every manufacturer of intoxicating liquors, who has in his possession, or in any part of the premises occupied by him as such, any adulterated liquor, knowing it to be adulterated, or any deleterious ingredient specified in the second schedule hereto, or added to such schedule by Order of the Governor in Council, for the possession of which he is unable to account to the satisfaction of the Court before which the case is tried, shall be deemed knowingly to have exposed for sale adulterated liquor, and shall be liable for the first offence, to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month, with or without hard labour; and for the second or any succeeding offence, to a penalty not exceeding four hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a time not exceeding three months, with or without hard labor."—See 28 Vic., chap. 36.

Regulations governing Food Analysts.

a. On receipt of sample from the Revenue Officer authorized, as provided in the Act above cited, to take such samples, the Analyst shall open sample, and, in the presence of that Officer, shall carefully mix equally and divide sample into two parcels, one of which he shall keep for analysis, the other he shall seal up with his own seal and deposit with Inland Revenue Officer.

b. The Analyst shall preserve a portion of his own sample for future examination. But, if the substance be of such a nature as to undergo alteration by keeping a short time, such as milk, the first analysis shall be final, and, in such case, no analysis shall be held valid, unless report be sent in within 12 hours of the taking of the sample, and in such case duplicate samples shall be unnecessary.

c. The Analyst shall impartially perform the duties of his office, and shall not give the result of his analysis, or the names or addresses of parties whose sample may be submitted to him to any one, except when called upon to do so in his report to the Department, or before a Court of Law, in conformity with his duties under this act.

Two Horse Vehicles.—From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed twenty minutes: for one or two persons, 50 cents; three or four persons, 65 cents.

From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed half an hour: one or two persons, 65 cents; three or four persons, 75 cents.

When the drive exceeds the time limited as aforesaid, hour rates to be charged.

By the Hour.—One or two persons, \$1.00; three or four persons, \$1.25.

CORPORATION.

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Fractions of hours to be charged at *pro rata* hour rates—but not less than one quarter of an hour shall be charged when the time exceeds the hour.

Fifty per cent. to be added to the tariff rates for rides from twelve midnight to four a.m.

The tariff by the hour shall apply to all rides extending beyond the city limits where the engagement is made in the city.

Baggage.—For every trunk or box carried in any vehicle, 10 cents; but no charge shall be made for travelling bags, valises, boxes or parcels which passengers can carry by the hand.

RATES OF CARTAGE.

From any place to any other in the 1st Division, or from any place (exclusive of the Harbor Wharves) to any other place in the City, and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed three-quarters of a mile.

Articles not herein enumerated (of a convenient bulk), not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cts. Ashes, Pot or Pearl, two barrels, 15 cts. Beef, Pork or Fish, five barrels or three tierces, 15 cts. Coals or Coke, half a chaldron or half a ton, 15 cts. Crockery, one crate or one hogshead, 15 cts. Flour or Fruit, seven barrels, 15 cts. Grain, not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cts. Lumber, sawn, from yard or boat, 500 feet board measure, 15 cts. Salt or Rice, six bags or six barrels, 15 cts. Firewood, dry, from yard or boat, half a cord, three feet long, 15 cts. Firewood, green, or from rafts, half a cord, three feet long, 20 cts. Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cts. Lumber, green or hard, from rafts, 500 feet board measure, 20 cts. Molasses, Sugar, or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead or load, 20 cts. Pig Iron, Lead, Copper, or Tin, one ton, 25 cts. Bar Iron or Steel, one load, 30 cts.

For each additional $\frac{1}{2}$ mile for above description of goods, 10c.

And from any of the Harbor Wharves to any place in the 2nd or 3rd Divisions, within half a mile distance from the boundary line of the 1st Division, and *vice versa*; or from any place (exclusive of the Wharves) to any other in the city, and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles,—instead of 15, 20, 25, and 30 cts., the rates shall be 25, 30, 35, and 40 cts.

From any place in the Western Section of the First Division:

To the stores and wharves below Wellington Bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 20 cts. The stores and wharves below Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 22 cts. The Basins above Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts. The Basins above Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, and the stores, stations, &c., at Point St. Charles, 25 cts. The factories, &c., at and above St. Gabriel

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Superior to all others.

Locks, north of Lachine Canal, 30 cts. The St. Bonaventure Street Railway Station, 20 cts. The St. Bonaventure Street Station, from the lower wharves of the harbor, 25 cts. And *vice versa* for one load.

And from any place in the Eastern Section of the 1st Division, instead of 20, 25, &c., the rates shall be 5 cts. additional. For any excess over the weight fixed for a load, additional *pro rata* rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter, by the employer; beyond the usual time, the carter shall be paid *extra*, at the rate of 5 cts. for every quarter of an hour. If a carter is called, and there is no load ready for him, or if unable to load without assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance unnecessarily travelled.

DIVISIONS REFERRED TO ABOVE.

First Division—East, Centre and West Wards (including McGill Street and N.W. side of Craig St.,) subdivided into two sections, Eastern and Western, the line of demarcation being the centre of St. Lambert and St. Jean Baptiste Streets.

Second Division—Comprises St. Ann's, St. Antoine and St. Lawrence Wards (exclusive of McGill and Craig Streets).
Third Division—Comprises St. Louis Ward, (exclusive of Craig Street,) St. James and St. Mary's Wards.

MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

Extracts from By-Laws Nos. 65, 66, 82, enacted April 20th, 1873.

Sec. 5. It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building, or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said Water Works, to furnish water to others, or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply of water agreed for, or to waste it, or to practice any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

Sec. 6. All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipes within their premises in good repair, and protected from frost at their own expense; and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

Sec. 7. No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the water pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern or

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apparatus connected therewith, or to or into which the water from the said Water Works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or misappropriated.

Sec. 8. If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do, or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this By-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this By-law, the Superintendent, or his deputy, may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause of complaint remains, or is not remedied.

Sec. 9. No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil pan, water closet, or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or contrived as that the water supplied to him is, or is likely to be, wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

Sec. 10. No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agents or officers.

Sec. 11. No person supplied with water from the said Water Works by meter, shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

Sec. 12. No person, unless duly authorized by the Water Committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover of, or draw water from the same.

Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city, without the license of the Water Committee, or of the said Superintendent.

Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the Reservoirs of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or offensive matter in the said Reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city, or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said Reservoirs, or upon the said bank or ground, or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after 10 o'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate, the waters of the said Reservoirs.

Sec. 15. No person shall draw or use water from the River St. Lawrence, or elsewhere, for the purpose of selling the same in any part of the city.

Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the Water Works in the said city for private fountains or for hand-hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the Superintendent of the said Works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff for the supply of water in such cases; and in no case shall the said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the

streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 17. No person shall use any hand-hose of a larger size or nozzle than one-fourth of an inch orifice, or use any hand-hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses or other vehicles.

Sec. 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of water supplied by the said Works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said Superintendent.

Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be, and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the Water Works of the said city.

Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due and payable to the City Treasurer, in advance, on the 15th day of August, every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees, of all buildings, part of buildings or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said Works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water, or to use the same.

Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies, or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance, and before the water is let on.

Sec. 22. In buildings occupied as offices, where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office or *suite* of offices, will be charged, in addition to the tariff rate, a Water-closet Tax.

Sec. 23. A discount of five per cent. shall be allowed to all water tenants who shall pay the said rates on or before the fifteenth August in each year.

Sec. 24. In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present By-Law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council, or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of the said Works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one in default to pay the said rates, which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on, for the use of any such defaulter, except upon payment of all arrears due.

Sec. 25. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this By-law, or of the said Tariff, shall for each and every such infraction be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars and costs of prosecution, and, in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

interest, at four per cent., of the actual value of the property in such case, the said value as set forth and established in and by the assessment roll last made and revised. Provided that all such institutions, with the exception of Churches, may, if they see fit, use water by meter, and pay therefor at the same rate as distilleries, breweries, and other establishments hereinafter mentioned.

Charitable Institutions, wholly supported by means of public subscriptions, shall be charged at the rate of one and a half cents per hundred gallons,

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The rent to be paid semi-annually, that is to say : One half on the first day of May, and the other half on the first day of November in each year.

If the meter gets out of order, and fails to register, the consumer will be charged at the average daily consumption previously registered by such meter : and for the purpose of average, the year shall be deemed to be 300 days.

The provisions hereinbefore made in regard to the supply by meter, shall not come into force until Public Notice is given that the Water Committee are prepared to supply meters to consumers.

When the Committee are thus prepared, they shall give two months' notice to that effect, in the newspapers in which the Corporation advertisements usually appear. Pending this notice, the Water Committee may fix special rates for unenumerated property or properties, manufactories or other establishments requiring an unusual supply; and no person shall be allowed to use water for any other purpose but for domestic purposes, without having previously obtained a permit from the Water Department to do so.

Persons desirous of supplying their own meter may do so with the previous sanction and written permit of the Superintendent of the Water Works.

When water is required for purposes not specified in the foregoing Tariff, the rate shall be fixed by the Water Committee.

The Water Committee shall have power to ascertain, by meter, the quantity of water used in any of the above cases, and charge accordingly.

MILITIA DEPARTMENT.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

The Three Military Districts into which the Province of Quebec is divided are sub-divided into seventy Regimental Divisions, comprised within Eight Brigade Divisions.

The boundaries of such Regimental Divisions are identical with the Electoral Divisions into which the Province of Quebec is divided, with the following exceptions, viz.: Montreal Centre forms two Regimental Divisions, known as First and Second Montreal Centre; the First Division comprising the East Ward, and the Second Division comprising the Centre and West Wards.

Chateauguay forms two Regimental Divisions, known as 1st and 2nd Chateauguay.

The First Division comprises the Parishes of St. Philomène, Chateauguay, St. Martine, and St. Urbain, and

INSPECTORS OF PRODUCE, &c.

Ashes.—Dyde & Major, Inspectors, College Street.

By Chap. 45, 37 Vic. 1874.—The Inspector shall charge the sum of 10 cents for every hundred pounds of Pot or Pearl Ashes inspected by him. 25 cents for each new head furnished, 18 cents for cooperage and repairs on each barrel,—said cooperage to include nails and end hoops of barrel. 25 cents for putting in a barrel partly filled the additional quantity thereof necessary to fill the same whenever duly required to do so. 25 cents per barrel in all cases where lime, raw ashes, damaged ashes, or other trash, have been packed or mixed with Pot or Pearl Ashes, for extracting or separating the same.

Flour.—Hon. John Young, 88 Common Street. Fees 2 cents per barrel for inspecting and branding (exclusive of cooperage.)

“When any less quantity than 100 barrels of flour are offered for inspection, the Inspector shall be entitled to receive the full fees that would accrue to him on one hundred barrels. When the Inspector, in his judgment, deems it necessary to strip or empty out the flour, to find out if there is the proper weight of flour in any cask, he shall be entitled to 2 cents for each barrel so stripped or emptied (if it prove to be of short weight), in addition to the 2 cents per barrel for inspection and branding.”

Butter.—Inspector, ——. The Inspector is bound to provide a safe and suitable place for storage.

“For all the services to be performed as aforesaid, including unheading, weighing, salting, heading, tightening hoops, marking and branding, and 10 days storage, each inspector shall be entitled to receive 10 cents for every package of butter by him inspected, as aforesaid, and if re-inspected 7 cents, together with the actual cost or charge of any package by him furnished, or for extra cooerage or repairs done to packages containing butter by him inspected, and no more; the charge for which extra cooerage and repairs shall not, in any case, exceed 5 cents per package; in consideration of which all packages shall be delivered in good shipping order; and such charges shall be paid by the person offering such butter for inspection, or his agent.

Beef and Pork.—James Doheney, 44 Wellington Street, Inspector. “For such inspection and branding, the Inspector shall be entitled to receive of and from the person submitting the same for inspection, for each and every barrel and half barrel, tierce or half tierce of Beef or Pork so inspected, salted, packed, pickled and branded, 25 cents for each barrel, 15 cents for each half barrel, 35 cents for each tierce, and 25 cents for each half tierce, exclusive of cooerage and repairs, the charge for which cooerage and repairs shall not exceed 15 cents per barrel, tierce or half tierce; in consideration of which charges, all barrels or half barrels, tierces or half tierces, shall be delivered in good shipping order.”

Fish and Fish Oil.—L. E. Morin, Quebec Gate Barracks, St. Paul, entrance by Water Street.—“Every Inspector or Deputy Inspector, who shall inspect, and brand, or mark any cask or package of pickled fish or in bulk, or any fish oil in accordance with the provisions of this Act, shall be entitled to fees at the following rates, which shall be paid by the original owner or the person who employed him in the first instance:—For each tierce of salmon, salmon-trout or sea-trout, 15 cents. For each half tierce of salmon, salmon-trout or sea-trout, 10 cents. For each barrel of salmon, salmon-trout or sea-trout, 15 cents. For each half barrel of salmon, salmon-trout or sea-trout, 10 cts. 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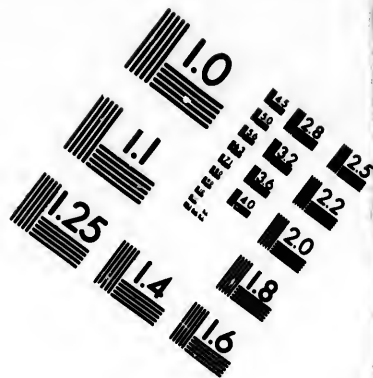
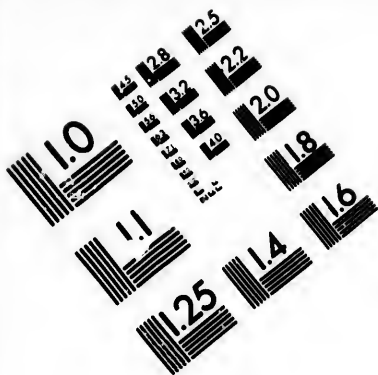
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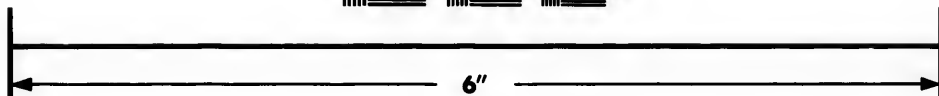
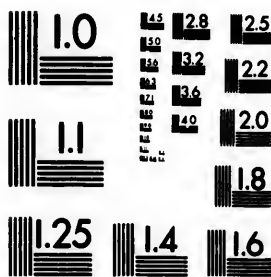
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GAME LAWS.

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**FISH AND GAME LAWS
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DOMINION OF CANADA.**

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Fishing for speckled or brook trout can only be legally done by angling by hand, with hook and line, from 1st May to 15th September. White fish or salmon trout are not to be taken by any means between the 1st and 10th November, nor by means of any kind of seine between the 30th May and 1st August. Gill nets for salmon trout, or white fish, must have meshes of at least five inches extension measure, and seines for white fish of not less than four inches. Pickerel or doré, and maskinongé, may be taken at any time, except from 15th April to 15th May; and bass from 15th May to 15th June. Fishing by means of net and other apparatus is prohibited, except under lease or license from the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The main channel, or course of any stream, must at all times be kept open, and no nets shall be so used as to obstruct the passage of fish in any river, bay, or creek, to and from their breeding places. The Local Fishery Overseers are instructed to enforce these enactments.

The following is the new Game Act in the Province of Ontario, giving the season when game must be killed:—

Deer, moose, elk, reindeer, or cariboo, from the 1st day of September to the 30th day of November inclusive.

Wild turkeys, grouse, pheasants or partridges, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of January.

Quail, between the first day of October and the first day of January.

Woodcock, between the 1st day of July and the 1st of January.

Snipe, between the 15th day of August and the 1st of May.

Mallard, grey duck, black duck, wood or summer duck, and all kinds of teal, between the 15th day of August and the 1st day of January.

Hares or rabbits, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March.

No person shall have in his possession any of the above animals or birds, or any portion of them, during the close seasons. They may be exposed for sale, nevertheless, for one month, and no longer, after such periods, or had in possession at any time for family use; but in all cases the proof of the time of killing or taking shall be upon the party so in possession.

None of the animals or birds above-mentioned shall at any time be taken by means of traps, snares, gins, baited lines, or other similar contrivances. Any person may destroy any such traps, snares, &c., which he may discover, without incurring any liability for so doing.

No one shall have in possession the eggs of any of the birds mentioned at any time. No batteries, sunken punts or night lights allowed in the killing of swans, geese or ducks.

Beaver, muskrat, mink, martin, raccoon, otter and fisher may be hunted and killed only between the 1st November and the 1st May.

The fine for killing deer, &c., out of season shall be not less than ten dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, for each animal.

For having in possession the birds or eggs of any of the birds protected, at any time, not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars, for each bird or egg.

For killing any of the fur-bearing animals out of the season, not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five, and a similar fine for any other breach of the Act. In all cases the whole of the fine is to be paid to the prosecutor.

QUEBEC.

*An Act to amend and consolidate the Game Laws of this
Province.*

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:—

1. No elk, moose, cariboo, deer, fawn or hare shall be hunted or killed between the first day of February and the first day of September in any year.

2. No grouse, ptarmigan, partridge, woodcock or snipe shall be shot at, hunted, taken or killed between the first day of March and the first day of September in any year.

3. No person shall fire at, hunt, take, kill or destroy any wild swan, wild goose, or any kind of wild duck, sea duck, widgeon or teal, between the first day of May and the first day of September of any year, in that part of the Province west of Three Rivers, nor between the fifteenth day of the month of May and the first day of the month of September, to the east of that town. But in that part of the Province to the east of the place known as the "Brandy Pots," in the river St. Lawrence, the inhabitants may, between the fifteenth day of the month of May and the first day of the month of September, in any year, hunt, take or kill the birds named in this section for food only.

4. No woodcock, snipe, wild swan, wild goose or wild duck of any kind, or widgeon or teal, shall be shot at, hunted, taken or killed at any time between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.

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5. No animal or bird, except hares, named in any of the foregoing sections, shall be taken or killed at any time by means of any rope, snare, spring, cage, net or trap of any kind; nor shall any such engine be for that purpose at any time placed, constructed, erected or set, either wholly or in part, and any person may take possession of and destroy any such engine so placed, constructed, erected or set.

6. No eggs of any species of wild fowl shall at any time be wilfully disturbed, injured, gathered or taken; and all vessels and boats employed in disturbing, gathering or taking the eggs of any species of wild fowl, and the eggs, shall be confiscated and sold.

7. No wild cat, marten, fisher, shall be hunted, trapped or killed between the fifteenth day of April and the first day of November; and no mink between the fifteenth day of April and the fifteenth day of October in any year.

8. No person shall hunt, trap or kill any otter between the first of May and the first of October in any year; any beaver between the thirtieth of April and the first of September in any year; any muskrat between the first of June in any year and the first of April following, for the districts of Quebec, Saguenay, Chicoutimi, Montmagny, Kamouraska, Rimouski and Gaspé, and between the first of May in each year and the first of April following for the remainder of the Province.

9. No person shall, at any time, use or employ strychnine or other deleterious poison, either mineral or vegetable, nor any spring gun, to hunt, take, kill or destroy any animal whatsoever.

10. Every game-keeper appointed by the commissioners of Crown Lands shall seize on view any animal or bird named in the foregoing sections, or any part of such animal or bird found in the possession or charge of any person during the time prohibited, and which may appear to have been taken or killed during such time, or by any of the unlawful means named in sections 5 and 9 of this act; and he shall bring the same before a justice of the peace, who shall declare them confiscated in whole or in part.

Any animal or bird, or any part thereof, shall belong to the game-keeper.

10 a. No person shall have in his possession, or in his care or charge, any one of the said animals or birds already named, or any part or parts thereof, except the skin, during the times prohibited by this act, when it is forbidden to kill any, or have in possession any which appear to have been taken or killed by any of the means forbidden by this act; but any of the said animals or birds, or part or parts thereof, may be bought and sold (when lawfully taken), during fourteen days from the termination of the several periods respectively fixed, by this act, for the killing thereof.

11. Every such game-keeper shall cause to be opened, or shall open himself, in case of refusal, any sack, bag, valise or

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other receptacle, in which he shall have reason to believe there is contained any game taken or killed during the times prohibited, or any unseasonable skin of any of the said animals.

12. Every offence against any of the provisions of this Act shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars, and to be recovered summarily on information or on summons only by a Justice of the Peace.

That Justice of the Peace on the proof thereof shall impose a fine with costs, which said fine shall go to the informer.

In default of immediate payment, the offender shall be incarcerated in the common gaol of the district wherein the offence has been committed, for a period not more than three months. Any magistrate shall have power to convict on view.

13. No evidence or information shall first be required on oath from the plaintiff or defendant, in the proceedings instituted under this Act, provided the subject of the complaint or requisition be plainly stated in the writ or in a declaration annexed thereto. The evidence of the informer alone, or of any witness, shall be sufficient to convict.

14. No proceeding of any kind under this Act shall be vacated, annulled or set aside by *certiorari*; but an appeal shall lie to the Circuit Court of the district wherein the offence was committed, to be instituted in the same manner as appeals in virtue of the Municipal Act.

15. All prosecutions shall be brought within twelve calendar months from the day of the committing of the offence charged.

16. The Commissioner of Crown Lands may appoint certain officers to superintend the due execution of this act, and of any other act, which may be hereafter passed, respecting game in this Province.

17. The Commissioner of Crown Lands, and any other person authorized by him to that effect, may grant leave, in writing, to any one desiring to obtain *bona-fide* birds or eggs, or for animals for scientific objects, during the times prohibited, and the persons obtaining such leave shall not be liable to any penalty imposed by this act, provided he shall furnish, within the two months following the time he shall have hunted, in virtue of said leave, sworn statement, showing the kind and quantity of game, or for animals taken by him for scientific purposes.

18. All acts and parts of acts relating to game in this Province are hereby repealed.

19. This act shall come into force immediately after its sanction.

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

In New Brunswick, the only game laws in force are those relating to moose and partridge. There was an act making it unlawful to kill deer on the Island of Grand Manan for a period of three years, but it expired June 8, 1868. The close season

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for moose only extends from 1st February to 1st May. Fine \$40, and anyone is empowered to kill any dog found hunting within the prohibited time. Not more than two moose can be killed by any one person within a period of twelve months; \$12 for each offence. The killing, except for food, is prohibited, and the leaving the carcass in the woods subjects the offender to a fine of \$20. Partridges are not to be killed between 1st March and 1st September. The fishery laws are the same as those of Ontario and Quebec, except that the close season for salmon is, for net fishing, from 15th August to 1st March, and fly surface-fishing, from 15th September to 1st February.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

In Nova Scotia, chap. 13 of the Revised Statutes provides "that no moose or beaver are to be killed between September 1st, 1874, and September 1st, 1877, under a penalty of not less than \$30, nor more than \$50, for each offence." Provides for the preservation of useful birds and animals during the close season; authorizes the Lieutenant-Governor in Council to appoint a Commissioner or Warden for each district, to enforce the provisions of this Act, and assist the officers of the Government of Canada in carrying out the laws for the preservation of inland fisheries. Close season for partridge, 1st January to 1st October; for woodcock, snipe, blue-winged duck or teal. Hares or rabbits, 1st March to 1st September. Woodcock not to be killed between sunset and sunrise. Penalty for breach of Act, \$1 for each bird. Penalty for setting snares for moose, \$100. The export of moose and cariboo hides is prohibited. Fine from \$20 to \$50, and forfeiture of game or hides. Otter, mink and muskrat not to be killed between 1st May and November, under a penalty of \$8. It is absolutely forbidden to kill robins, swallows, sparrows, &c., and birds of song. Penalty for each offence, \$1.

The following is a summary of the Game Laws in operation in the undermentioned Provinces. No amendment has been made to these laws since 1868 :

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

It is unlawful to buy or sell, or exhibit for sale, any deer or elk between 1st March and 1st August, or any grouse, prairie fowl or partridge, or to destroy or to collect their eggs, between 1st March and 10th August. Fine \$50 or three months' imprisonment.

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GAME LAWS.

PROVINCE OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

There is only one game law in this island—entitled, "An Act for the Protection and Breeding of Wild Fowl and Game." It prohibits the killing, taking, purchasing, selling or possessing of partridges from the 20th February to the 25th August, and applies a similar prohibition in the case of snipe, or any other wild or migratory birds frequenting for the purpose of incubation (except wild geese), from the 1st April to the 20th August.

PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The game laws of Prince Edward Island prohibit the killing of partridges between 1st March and 1st October, and salmon in the Fall.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

No game law has been enacted in Manitoba.

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
