

SORDID SQUABBLE ENDED IN DEATH

Story of Events Preceding Fatal Injuries to Harry Zagawolski.

HE ATTACKED BROTHERS Postmortem Shows Death Due to Blood Poisoning From Blows.

According to the evidence of Harry Pata, at Coroner Winnet's inquest at the morgue last night into the death of Harry Zagawolski, an Austrian, the fight that is alleged to have been the cause of Zagawolski's death occurred in Pata's boarding house at 308 Weston road, on Sunday, Nov. 22. It began, it is said, between the dead man and Harry Smith of Niagara street.

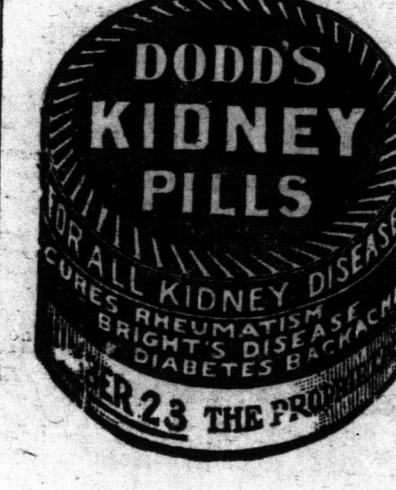

PRISONERS WILL DO BUSH WHACKING

Interned Men to Clear Thousand Acre Farm in New Ontario.

TO BE PAID FOR TIME

New Site Will Be Used for Experimental Farm by Ontario Government.

Another step in the opening up of new agricultural possibilities in New Ontario was taken yesterday by Premier Hearst last evening, in giving the site of the new experimental farm on the Transcontinental, where war prisoners will be set to work. The premier expressed gratification at the result of the negotiations between federal and provincial governments in exploring the clay belt of the province, and at the same time providing work for a large number of idle men. The farm will be situated on the Kapuskasing River, in O'Brien Township, and midway between Hearst and Cochrane. The first batch of prisoners left Kingston last evening to begin clearing operations. The site comprises 1000 acres immediately adjoining the railway, and is under forest to a great extent. The first work will be to cut the wood and underbrush, and by means of portable sawmills to provide timber for huts to keep the men thru the winter. In the spring the land will be put under crop, with the intention of making the farm self-supporting and growing products if possible for overseas needs. For the first two months the prisoners will be accommodated in colonist cars placed on a siding. There will be separate lodging for huts and guards. Strict vigilance to prevent escapes will not be very imperative because of the out-of-the-way nature of the site, and escaping prisoners would run the risk of death thru frost or starvation. In the majority of instances, will be men used to labor of this character, and will likely be paid for their work. They will be expected to make some return for their board and lodging.

INSTANCED HIGHWAY AS WAR RELIEF MEASURE

Ontario Road Engineer Made Opening Address at Chicago. Convention.

Before the annual convention of the American Roadbuilders' Association, in Chicago yesterday, President W. A. McLean, Ontario highway engineer, referred to the Toronto-Hamilton highway as an example of where private capital had stepped in to assist in construction of a road as a measure of war relief. He stated that the proposal of a cross-province road from Montreal to Windsor was being favorably viewed by the public, and that the commencement of construction was quite probable.

The building of highways for war relief was a logical measure, but provinces found it difficult to aid large undertakings. The first office of road construction would depend entirely on the duration of the war. Should it close within a year the effect would easily be overcome.

ALARM IS FELT AT SMALLPOX SPREAD

Thirty-Three Cases Reported Since Beginning of December.

LOCAL DOCTORS' NEGLECT

London Township Was Threatened by Dangerous Outbreak.

Considerable alarm is being felt in several parts of the province over the outbreak of smallpox, and the provincial board of health is being advised seriously. Warnings are being issued with regularity to the centres where cases have been reported, and unless local doctors show a great conception of their duty, by notifying the department of new cases, some penalties will follow in strict regard. It is realized that the spread of smallpox is so insidious that the expertise of old days, when the whole province was swept by the scourge, might come again. During the last eight months 417 cases have been reported and in December 33 have been sent in. Provincial Inspector R. W. Bell has been on the road for the past several weeks seeing that proper precautions are being taken. London and London Township are receiving much unfavorable criticism for the neglect of the department, and threatened for a time to prove a large epidemic. In many cases the doctors crop, with the recognition of the nature of the disease and characterized it as "fruit rash" and "apple rash." But for lack of evidence some of these would have been penalized. Cases in Bradford, Cayuga and Seneca Townships are now engaging the attention of the department and unusual precautions will be taken. It is pointed out that the winter season does not recognize the disease, because of poor ventilation in the houses and the proximity of the germs to be carried on furs, woollens and heavy clothing.

BRIDGE GUARD FREE SHOOTING JUSTIFIED

Magistrate Denison Acquitted Frank E. Keilty—Trespasser in Hospital.

Magistrate Denison yesterday acquitted Frank E. Keilty on a charge of wounding Thomas Carnochan on the morning of Nov. 3 on the C.P.R. property. Keilty was a bridge guard and because Carnochan, who was trespassing on the railway tracks, refused to give up his position, he fired on him. Carnochan received a serious bullet wound and had been in the hospital since.

"Attempts have been made to blow up bridges," said Crown Attorney Corley. "That is so," said the magistrate, "and they will be guarded. I will dismiss the case."

THIEF COSTS HEAVILY CROWN TIRED OF HIM

Had Appeared Three Times Recently—Goes to Jail Farm.

In the sessions court yesterday Joseph Cronsey pleaded guilty to stealing two saws, valued at \$2.50, from the Alkenhead Hardware Co. "You have cost the crown \$100 this year," said Justice Coatsworth, "as you have been before me three times already."

"Know I don't deserve it, but consider my family," pleaded Cronsey. He was sentenced to two months at the farm, and as he has been in jail one month he will be released at the expiration of a four-week term.

TIPOGRAPHICAL UNION LOSSES BIG LIBEL CASE
Court Case is Echo of McNamara Dynamite Plot.
Canadian Press Despatch. NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—The \$100,000 libel suit instituted by James Lynch, former president of the International Typographical Union of North America against John Kirby and other directors of the National Association of Manufacturers for passing resolutions charging the union with responsibility for the dynamite explosion which killed a score of employees in the Los Angeles Times building in 1910 was dismissed by Justice Guy in the supreme court today.

CAR HIT FIRE ENGINE HORSES' LEGS WERE CUT

A fire engine from Lombard street station was struck by an eastbound street car at Queen and Jarvis streets when proceeding north on Jarvis at 4:30 yesterday afternoon. The glass of the car was broken and the horses attached to the engine had their legs cut thru falling on the pavement. The police said that a number of civilians warned the motorman of the car of the approach of the engine, but no attention was paid.

LOST CLAIM FOR WHEAT NO CONTRACT EXISTED

Judge Winchester yesterday dismissed the claim of the Campbell Milling Company, who were suing Priebeier Bros. of Mount Elgin for \$200.

It was claimed by the plaintiffs that defendants failed to deliver a carload of wheat. The defendants denied that a contract existed. Plaintiffs purchased wheat from another shipper and claimed the difference between the price they paid and that which they would have paid had the supposed contract been carried out.

AN ENVOY AFTER FOUR CENTURIES

Sending of Sir Henry Howard to Vatican Notable Event.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Dec. 15.—The correspondent of the Daily Chronicle at Milan telegraphs: "Sir Henry Howard's appointment as Great Britain's envoy to the Holy See, with the consequent re-establishment of formal diplomatic relations between England and the Vatican after a lapse of nearly 400 years, is commented on in the Italian press as an event of first rate political importance. "One conviction, generally expressed in the organs as Italian public opinion, is that Great Britain's action, besides welding firmer than ever to herself the vast Catholic populations of the British Empire, will strengthen immensely the moral as well as material influence of the allies and the friends of the triple entente."

CONDEMNED EVIDENCE JUDGE WAS DISGUSTED

Claims Certain Classes of People Almost 'Deserve Public Disapproval.

"This sort of thing is a disgrace to any class of people and it is no wonder that Jews are reduced upon when such transactions as these come to life," said Judge Coatsworth in the sessions court yesterday when disposing of a case in which Reuben Dubinsky was charged with stealing \$10 from the Parkview Theatre. "I say this without any prejudice whatever," he continued, "but the evidence has been so unsatisfactory in this case and in another yesterday that I feel justified in making this statement."

Mr. Justice Kelly awarded \$5 damages to John Kerr Pliska against J. W. Moyes, for trespassing on property on Glen avenue. Under the judgment Mr. Moyes is restrained from trespassing.

Benny Vanstokle of Beverley was awarded \$5 and costs against Charles James, who tore down a part of a fence and drove over Vanstokle's property, alleging that it had been dedicated a road. In passing judgment Mr. Justice Kelly held that it had not been sufficiently shown that the plan was ever registered.

A writ against the city for damages for injury to his apartment house at 354-357 India street, caused by the plan of the sewer in his apartment house, was granted by Mr. Justice Kelly.

Anthony Stokle is claiming \$5000 damages for alleged malicious prosecution and arrest on July 14, against Thomas H. Printed, Gordon Stokley claims a like amount.

Little Current Lumber Co. are defendants in an action brought by Katherine Jeffrey and two infant children of Charles Jeffrey, to recover damages for Jeffrey's death in an accident.

FOREIGNERS CROWD FREE MEAL PLACES

World Reporter Visits Elm Street Institution and Sees Evidence.

CANADIANS STAY AWAY

Unless Desperately Hungry—Demands on Charity Increase Greatly.

"Hunger, you talk about the Englishmen for eating, but look at those forlorn, the bleeders. Why they chaw as much as two white men." The above tirade was delivered by an applicant for charity last night as he departed from the House of Industry after dining at the kitchen of the City of Toronto. His trousers were badly in need of repair, his boots were mere thin skins of leather and the his unkempt hair and various other articles of attire, attested poverty, he had the smile of a hunger-stricken man.

They have very little moral principle," said one official as he pointed out about a dozen of these men clothed in comfortable and very presentable apparel. The absence of signs of physical suffering was noticeable in contrast to the other applicants who never see a Canadian a Britisher applying unless dire necessity makes him," he concluded.

Large Dinner Table. In the last two days there have been over a thousand men on hand to partake of the meals and officials at the House of Industry have been forced to work overtime to keep up with the demand. Yesterday a slight falling off was noticeable, possibly because of the action of the police, and various other causes.

To Challenge Men. Following the action of the police, the board of governors met yesterday and decided that they would leave the matter of foreign idlers in the hands of the superintendent of the institution. It is the intention to make periodical visits to the lines and challenge any individuals that do not conform to the regularity of these visits may put some of these men off their guard and so cause them to reap the fruits of their idleness in the month of November.

Figures That Tell. The following figures give some idea of the enormous work which the officials have on hand. In the month of November 468 tons of coal, 33 bushels of coke, 27 cords of wood and 13,225 three-pound loaves of bread were delivered to poor families in the city. The following groceries were also distributed: 2814 lbs. rice, 752 lbs. sugar, 1420 lb. tea, 234 lbs. beans, 324 bars of soap, 2814 pints of milk and 324 two-lb. tins of syrup. And yet the demand is ever increasing, and about sixty families a day are being added to the list to be assisted, notwithstanding the great increase at the casualty door.

CHOLERA IS SPREADING AMONG THE PRISONERS. Six Cases Found Among Germans, Two of Which Were Fatal.

Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to BERLIN, Dec. 15.—Twelve thousand school-boys between the ages of 15 and 17 have been enrolled as volunteer recruits in Berlin.

They have been divided into twenty companies, and their military training is proceeding with all possible speed. It is intended that they shall take the field early in the spring.

PULP MILL BURNED. ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Dec. 15.—Fire from an unknown cause broke out in the Thorold pulp mill tonight, and, fanned by stiff wind, destroyed the entire plant. The firemen were hampered by the fact that the water supply was shut off for making of repairs.

Party Spirit in Municipal Politics

Abolition of lodge influence can only come from those who are in a position to exercise lodge influence. It is an unfortunate fact that lodge influence and party influence also have not been used for the best ends in public life...

Mr. Joseph E. Thompson, who made a promising run in last year's campaign, returns once more to the assault on the board of control, and the likelihood is that he will secure a seat. He has had the temerity, and should get the credit, of making the statement that he is not going to be bound by the ties of party politics or lodge friendship in making his fight.

The Three Bears

The story goes that a little girl named Silverhair once came uninvited to the house of "The Three Bears" and found three bowls of soup, three chairs and three beds, and promptly proceeded to spill the soup, break up the chairs and rumple the beds. Had there been three dreadsoughts on the premises, she would probably have messed them up too.

What will you do with you, you'll very soon find. You can sit there and cry till you've made up your mind.

The old tale is not without its application to the present political conditions in Canada. The Conservatives are in possession of the government, and they are quite willing, if the Liberals so desire, to test their hold upon the people by a general election. As a matter of fact, we believe, however, that no election is likely in the near future, and that parliament will convene as usual in January, and that there may be still another session.

STILL CHASING EACH OTHER

unless the government promises to postpone the election almost indefinitely, the Liberals will don their war paint at the coming session, and while our soldiers are standing shoulder to shoulder at the front, our "elder statesmen" at Ottawa will be calling names, washing dirty linen and in short "fighting like blazes."

What both papers seem to overlook is that the session, and the life of parliament for that matter, can be terminated by the government as it may decide in five weeks, five days, or five minutes. By obstruction, the Liberals can hasten the election, but they cannot postpone it.

A good many Conservatives, recalling that while "The Three Bears" were making up their minds what to do with Silverhair, the young lady jumped out of the window and made a clean get away, urged the government to postpone the election for a month or two ago to bring on an election. They were evidently over-ruled by the government, which is probably preparing for an election, but will take its own time about bringing it on.

Let us therefore say to our good friends, the Liberals, that nothing is to be gained by threatening the country with a long and acrimonious session of parliament. We have never advocated a snap dissolution or called to commend the patriotic course pursued by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers at the war session.

A Progressive P.M.G.

Postmaster-General Burleson of the United States strongly favors the government taking over and operating all telegraph and telephone services. He recommends that this be done immediately in Alaska, Porto Rico and the Hawaiian Islands. The systems in these territories, he says, are so detached that no complications with private companies can ensue, and the field of experimentation furnished thereby will be large enough to enable the postoffice department to demonstrate the advantages of public ownership and operation.

Twins

It is, I think, a compliment to the flexibility of our financial system that the new federal reserve banking system recently inaugurated in the United States is essentially the same as ours, the regional reserve bank corresponding with the head office of our banks, gathering up surplus funds where they are not required, and mobilizing them for use where they are required. The result is that the branch bank system is in substance and reality established in the United States.

Anything more dissimilar than the Canadian banking and currency system and the new banking and currency system established in the United States by the Federal Reserve Act, it would be hard to imagine. Surely Mr. White must have spoken jocosely or the report of his speech does him great injustice. Let us see a few of the differences between a regional bank in the United States and a head office of a chartered bank in Canada. In the case of a regional bank: All profits over six per cent. go to the government.



The Civic Campaign

The air is still filled with mysterious whisperings of a "big man" who is about to offer himself to the electorate as a candidate for the majority in opposition to Mr. McCarthy. So far, aside from Hon. Mr. Crawford, no names are forthcoming, except that of Edmund Bristol, M.P., who has been approached on the subject, but does not seem to have encouraged any hope in the minds of those who urged him to enter the field.

WORLD WILL ENSURE DEFEAT OF GERMANY

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—In a leading editorial today The New York Times says in part: "Germany is doomed to sure defeat. Bankruptcy is in arms, under the moral condemnation of the civilized world, the Turk, the backward-looking and degenerate nations, desperately battling against the hosts of three great powers to which she is a feeble and a feeble ally."

Pulmotor Saved Life of Man on Operating Table Under Anaesthetic. Special to The Toronto World. Whether it is that the prevailing period of depression has left the average citizen, who is usually troubled at this season of the year with averse aspirations, in a position where he is unable or unwilling to finance the undertaking, or whether some of the perennial candidates have been scared out of the field by the immense difficulties and handicaps that are going to be faced by the council of 1915, the fact remains that there is a somewhat striking scarcity of men this year offering their services to the city in the various wards.

Last year there were four candidates for the mayoralty. This year, there are only two serious contenders so far. For the board of control a year ago eight went to the polls. This year seven is put at the outside number that will be in the field.

The two east end wards, One and Two, are the only ones of the seven where there is an increase of aldermanic candidates over the year ago. In Ward One, for example, the three sitting members went in by acclamation a year ago. This year there are five, and possibly six, residents of the district who would like to spend the year at the city hall. In Ward Two a year ago four candidates went to the polls. This year there are five probable candidates mentioned.

Up in Ward Five, with one alderman retiring, only two candidates have come forward for the vacant position, making with the two members of the year ago four candidates so far in the running. Last year there were seven contestants.

PEOPLE OF WARSAW ARE NOT WORRYING

Holiday Spirit Prevails Despite Proximity to Battle Front. Canadian Press Despatch. FIRST PRIZE COURT DETAINS STEAMER German Ship Bellas Seized at Quebec, Ordered Held by Ottawa Tribunal. CLAIM OF SALE MADE Lisbon Man Said That He Purchased Vessel Month Before War Began.
