CANADIAN LIFE INSURANCE UNDER THE SEARCHLIGHT.

In order to a proper understanding of the principles and methods under which the enormous sums in the hands of life insurance companies have been acquired, it is essential to get a good grasp of the chief plans upon which policies in the United States and Canada are issued.

In the case of a \$10,000 policy the difference in premiums, as may be seen at a glance, would be nearly \$80 a year, amounting in 5 years to \$400; in 10 years to \$800; in 15 years to \$1200; in 20 years to \$2000; and so forth proportionately for larger amounts of insurance.

But the astonished reader, and policy holder asks indignantly, How can these things be? First let him remember that the policy, the written contract between the company and the insured, never without the signature of the insured, is not a mere piece of paper, but a legal document, and the company does not carelessly receive money for profits from the policy-holders, but it does not promise, except under some form of the gambling totientia system, to give any return for them. 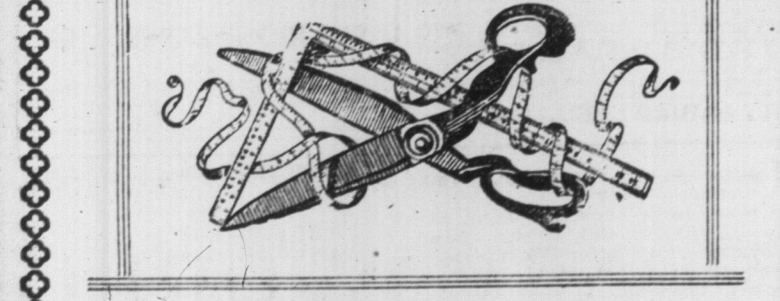

TRAIN FALLS FORTY FEET TWELVE PERSONS INJURED. Tender, Mail, Baggage Coaches and Smoking Car Thrown into Creek.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 27.—Twelve persons were injured to-night on the Southern Railroad, when a train was hurled from a bridge seven miles from Lexington into a creek 40 feet below.

Realizing that if the locomotive left the rails on the bridge the whole train would be dragged after it, Engineer Phillips threw the throttle wide open and barely succeeded in getting the locomotive across the bridge when the sides of the bridge were battered down by the plowing cars. The mill was saved, but all the baggage was destroyed or damaged by water.

The bridge is 150 feet long and built of wood. A relief train went to the wreck with physicians and the injured were brought to Lexington for attention. All the wounded persons will recover, it is thought.

John Lewis, Editor Dundas Advertiser, Visits Toronto.

An advocate of the reduction of the rate of postage on printed matter arriving in Canada from the old country is Sir John Lewis, who arrived at the King Edward yesterday.

This, he added, would enable British publishers all the better to compete with American papers for Canadian business.

"I believe the Canadian government is ready to do its part," added the veteran Scotch journalist. "The only difficulty is with the home government, which has a surplus in the postal department of 4,000,000 a year and could well afford to grant the reduction."

Sir John, who was present at the Empire Club luncheon yesterday, came to Toronto from Montreal with Lady Lewis, and they return on Monday to Montreal and then to Quebec, where they embark for the Virginian for the homeward. Sir John had hoped to visit the west, but this project he has had to abandon.

Three years short of being an octogenarian, Sir John is one of the best est-working editors in Scotland and is a man of varied parts. He has edited the Dundas Advertiser, established The People's Journal and several other papers.

"We are out entirely on a pleasure visit," he said. "I have long desired to re-visit the scenes that I had no time to make a more thorough acquaintance with during my last visit as far back as 1876. Since I have been in the country I have been struck with the wonderful signs of progress in all directions."

The late Sir William Lewis, the editor and proprietor of The Sheffield Telegraph, one of the leading provincial papers of England, was brother of Sir John.

"My brother was knighted by Lord Salisbury," Sir John told The World last night. "I was knighted by Mr. Gladstone. We were strongly opposed to each other in politics, but we were the most affectionate of brothers."

TENDENCY OF OUR SYSTEM TO DEplete SOME CALLINGS

Dr. Goldwin Smith Agrees With "Old Boy" That School System is Not Perfect.

Goldwin Smith was asked if he had read "Old Boy's" letter in yesterday's World, and, if he had, what he thought of it. What he said was: "We must all wish that 'Old Boy' were wrong so far as the primary subject of his letter is concerned. But he is certainly not alone in his misgivings as to the effect of the system of public instruction, pushed as the zeal of its administrators appears to be pushing it, on the general happiness of the people. There are those who fear that the tendency may be unduly to narrow the training of the next generation, and to crowd out of the system the more ambitious callings. The great and growing expense of the system, the burdensome to the taxpayer, might be cheerfully borne if we could only be assured that the system was the best for the industrial organization and the happiness of the people. But if room in the more ambitious callings is limited, the excitement of the general opinion of the humber callings can hardly be productive of general happiness. GOODYEAR PROCESS

The following description of the Grand Trunk Railway's new roundhouse at Mimico appears in The London, Eng., Railway News of Oct. 14: The Grand Trunk Railway has recently erected a new roundhouse and machine shop at Mimico, Ont., near Toronto, built according to the Kahn system of reinforced concrete. It contains 30 stalls, each 13 ft. wide at the inner circle, and 26 ft. at the outer circle. Each stall is 22 feet long, divided into three sections, and carried on four columns. The entire structure is built of concrete reinforced with Kahn trussed bars. ITALIAN LABORERS SCARGE.

Employment Agency Can Find Places for Many.

For the first time in many years there is a scarcity of Italian laborers in Ontario. In spite of the countless numbers which the citizens note around the streets of the city, few of them are without work. So few, indeed, that not two score of unemployed Italian workmen can be found in the vicinity of the city.

"I have orders here for three hundred men and cannot fill them," said Peter Dini yesterday. He is one of the Dini Bros., member of the Italian Knights of Labor Society. It is practically a government institution, and one which is all powerful in the countries to which the sons of Italy immigrate, and the charges made by these employment bureaus, for that is the style of work done by the Knights of Labor, are purely nominal. The Italian government sees that the members of the society do not go behind on the year. Further than that it is not a government institution.

Mr. Dini explains the scarcity in the following manner. During the past few years large numbers of Italian have gone home and reported that this is not the land of promise, but merely a good field for laborers. This notice has had its due effect on the immigrants. The season, too, is very far advanced for any great number to start from Italy to come to this country, which is reported to be the land of ice and snow.

"I have not a batch of men in sight," said Mr. Dini yesterday. "There is so much railway building going on at the present time that it has taken all the men at my disposal. The C.P.R. want fifty men for Mimico and another fifty to shovel coal at York. These orders I cannot fill, and there is practically nothing for it but to wait for the men to come in. The railway construction gangs I understand will work all winter, especially on the lines near Toronto."

PATRICK'S HOPES BLASTED.

State Court of Appeals Denies Motion for Re-Argument.

Albany, N.Y., Oct. 27.—The court of appeals this afternoon denied the motion for a re-argument of the appeal of Albert T. Patrick from conviction of murder in the first degree, and sentence of death for the killing in 1900 of William M. Rice, an aged millionaire of New York City.

The motion now denied was made Oct. 2 by former United States Senator David B. Hill, when he raised the point of the propriety of Judge Gray of the court of appeals sitting in the case, in view of the fact that Patrick's appeal had participated as assistant counsel in the execution of the original sentence.

This decision apparently deprives Patrick of his last hope of interference, as far as the courts of this state are concerned, with the execution of the death sentence first passed at upon him in March, 1902. The court of appeals, within a few days, will assign a new date for the execution of the original sentence.

Whether Senator Hill will attempt to carry the case to the United States courts on appeal remains to be seen. Patrick's only hope now would lie with executive clemency at the hands of Governor Higgins.

ROOSEVELT IN COLLISION.

Steamer Conveying President to Warship Was Beached.

United States flag ship West Virginia, via New Orleans, Oct. 27.—(By wireless.)—At 11 o'clock last evening, through confusion of signals, the fruit at same place collided with the lighthouse tender Magnolia, which was conveying the president, Secretary Loeb and Dr. Hensley to the cruise. The Magnolia was damaged and two or three holes made in the hull below the water line. The ship was beached, and the president was taken to the West Virginia. The Magnolia, immediately on being struck, was beached, her bow being high and dry. After a careful examination of the damage to the vessel it was evident that there was no danger and the president and his party went to bed.

Major Graybill of the United States Engineers was aboard the Magnolia. His ship, the Ivy, a sister ship of the Magnolia, had preceded the Magnolia, and was some distance ahead. A boat was immediately put off for the nearest telephone, about a mile and a half away, and the order given to head the Ivy off at Pilot station and have her return for the president and his party. The transfer was made at 3 o'clock this morning. The vessel got underway immediately and the West Virginia was boarded on schedule time.

NO PRINCE OF ROYAL HOUSE FOR THE THRONE OF NORWAY

King Oscar Declines Offer to Prince of the House of Bernadotte.

Stockholm, Oct. 27.—King Oscar has definitely and formally declined the offer of the crown of Norway which, notwithstanding all my good intentions, has given me in the course of years many bitter cares. Moreover, I could no longer wear it to the benefit of the country, nor to the benefit of the people. But I must not let this decision be taken as a sign of my unhappiness of which it has always been my heart's desire to contribute so long as the means to that end and the welfare of the country, and the nation towards which I have entertained a sincere affection (especially my youth and the people) were to be considered. The duties entailed by my position as king of both countries of the Scandinavian peninsula, in view of the mutual relations between the two countries have taken I cannot think it would be conducive to the happiness of the crown of Norway or Norway that a prince of my house should accept an election to be King of Norway. Assurance would not call to arise in both countries a feeling of distrust which would operate as much against him as against me. This distrust might only too easily become an obstacle to the improvement of the mutual relations between the two nations, unfortunately separated henceforth, whereby I hope to see pacific relations between them, in a not too distant future. I cannot, therefore, accept the Storting's offer. I think with all my heart that the crown of my reign of 23 years, have faithfully served me and Norway, and who may even now entertain the hope of a former king. In now bidding them farewell I cherish sincere good wishes for them.

PRINCE CHARLES WILL ACCEPT.

Paris, Oct. 27.—Information reaching the highest quarters here shows that Prince Charles will accept the throne of Norway, following the departure of King Oscar. Prince Charles will leave Denmark to assume the royal functions immediately after the official notification of his election is conveyed to him.

MAYOR'S BRIDGE PROPOSAL.

To Advance One-Third of Cost and Then Go to Court.

Mayor Urquhart corrects the statement published in all the papers that he offered, on behalf of the city, to pay one-third of the cost of the Yonge-street bridge. The suggestion was made by Christopher Robinson, K.C., that the city advance one-third of the cost of the bridge, and if subsequent negotiations terminate in favor of the city the money will be returned. This, he explains, was proposed in order to facilitate the work. The York-street bridge was constructed by the city and the C.P.R., and these parties subsequently inaugurated court proceedings against the Grand Trunk for its share of the cost. The matter has been in the courts for some years.

PRaises Our Troops.

Viscount Maitland Pleased With Thursday's Military Display.

Viscount Maitland, an official of the war office in London, and assistant director of auxiliary forces, and also colonel of the City of London Imperial Yeomanry, expressed his appreciation of Thursday's review, when seen at the King Edward yesterday.

He declared that the Highlanders were a fine lot of men. But they are a little older than the regiments at home. He expressed his approval of the cavalry. If one had not known he was in Canada he would have taken the soldiers for British troops.

He suggested that an arrangement be made for the present troops, and that the number of horses could be supplied for British troops.

LIFE INSURANCE AND THE STATE.

Catholic Register: The trustees of the big insurance companies in the United States are completely on the defensive. Indeed, unless they keep the side of the state in strict reserve, the indications are that they will be convicted of looting the estates of their policyholders. Investigation into the condition of life insurance must now become a widespread and as far as possible, the further it is carried the more certain will be the result of governmental protection for the citizen. It is to be hoped that nothing will prevent this consummation.

Governments are slow to act in any radical direction without extraordinary cause that has aroused public feeling to high pitch. Civil and criminal proceedings against the trustees and managers of the big New York companies are under consideration, and one step of that kind have been taken government interference will be assured. Our Canadian companies are not placed under the same light of criticism possible in the United States today; but whether their management has or has not been infected by American methods the government of Canada cannot stand idly by and see the insurance business of this country conducted in the old ways whilst reforms are effected in the United States. Unless Canadian companies are kept abreast of modern public demands for full state guarantee the American companies after the present court subsidies, will have a new era both of activity and confidence opened up before them, and will appeal to the Canadian people with the advantage that up-to-date legislation will bestow upon them.

Retired Lawyer Sued.

Syracuse, N.Y., Oct. 27.—Frank Ryder, a retired lawyer and a wealthy real estate man, committed suicide in a basement store-room of the Carnegie Hotel, Toronto, when the clerk refused to sell him cigarettes furnished a revolver and demanded that he pay for them.

Russia's New Loan.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 27.—The negotiations for the new Russian loan advanced today. The amount is practically fixed at \$20,000,000. The principal bankers are apparently relieved by the knowledge that Count Witte will be the head of the government.
