New York, Jan. 28.-The jury which is to try Harry K. Thaw for the killing of Stanford White is rapidly nearing completion. When court adjourned this evening there were nine men in the jury box, one having been added during the morning session and a second just before the hour of adjournment, 5 o'clock. It is thought that the taking of testimony may be

begun Wednesday afternoon. Fifty talesmen were examined today. So rapidly were the remaining members of the special panel disposed of at the morning session, that at the noon recess orders were hurried from the court that an additional 100 men be summoned to report before Justice Fitzgereld to mornow morning. This Fitzgerald to-morrow morning. This will make a total of 300 men thus far summoned. Of the original panel there remains to-night but thirty-five. It was not considered this number would be sufficient for the selection of the three jurymen necessary to make up the trial complement of the twelve. Of the fifty men examined to-day. forty-three were excused upon doctors' certificates; upon the ground that they had formed opinions too strong to be shaken by the forthcoming testimony; because they knew Stanford White, or some important witness in the case, and for year other reasons. and for various other reasons. Five talesmen were challenged peremptorily, the state leading in the exercise of this privilege with three challenges.

Thaw's counsel issued the following authoritative statement last night: "Harry K. Thaw will be freed on the strict application of the laws on the statute books of the State of New York. 





That the original belief in the universality and impeccability of free trade departing, even from the British Liberal party, is again evidenced in a recent address delivered by Mr. R. B. Haldane, war secretary, as president convened by the Royal Economic Society. The movement for the formation of a public ownership league will perhaps have the effect of causing the government and the opposition to take a more active interest in the questions which are the subject of discussion thruout the country, more particularly those relating to the need for exercising greater control over the transpor

The very fact that there is not in the City of Toronto a sing newspaper prepared to enter upon a defence of the actions of the corporations is sufficient evidence that they appreciate the strength public sentiment in the matter of public control over pu utilities, and that they realize the necessity for supporting any measure which has in view the better supervision over the corporations working under a public franchise. A section of the press would be only too glad to oppose any movement looking toward public control over public utilities or public ownership in any form, but they cannot see their way clear to do so owing to the strength displayed by the

The vote polled in the City of Toronto in favor of controlling the Niagara power companies was a surprise even to the friends of public ownership, and as the whole country appears to have become thoroly aroused on the subject of public control over the corporations, there is no doubt that the movement for the organization of a public ownership league thruout the country will meet with the cordial support of the people.

Perhaps the most iniquitous combination on the continent of America is the Hard Coal Trust, which places in the hands of a few men control over a necessity of life, something which is absolutely necessary for the protection of the people in the winter season.

We have in this country a consolidation of railway forces which

almost as prejudicial to the welfare of the public as the Hard Coal Trust. The Canadian railways are so closely bound together in traffic agreements that they have the people absolutely at their mercy, and as a result the business of the country is restricted and hampered by lack of proper facilities for the conduct of business and by exorbitant transportation tolls.

It is evident that the government will not take any steps to protect the interests of the people as against the railway companies, and it is therefore necessary that some means should be found that will compel them to take an interest in the questions which are occupying the attention of the public. This can only be accomplished by a consolidation of the forces which are working for an improve ent in the laws governing large corporations, and the formation of a public ownership league is a step in the right direction

If there is one question that merits the attention of parliament it is the necessity for providing cheap transportation for the produce of the country, and the protection of the All-Canadian route to the seaboard, but altho the matter has been brought before the government day after day thru the pblic press,u there is not the silgtest indication that they intend to deal with it in any way. In fact there appears to be a disposition to ignore the subject completely.



lirds Must Be Imitated if Flight is to Be Successfully Mastered.

A navigable air-ship is described nd illustrated in The Evening Post newspaper of December 20, 1709. The ngraving of this much-vaunted inention shows a body of a ship formed collopwise, while its equipment comrises the following curious apparatus: Bellows to be blown when there is no wind; wings to keep the vessel upight; sails wherewith the air is to be livided; globes of heaven and earth, serving as a cover to two loadstones placed in them upon pedestals, to draw the ship after them, the body of which of iron plates covered with straw form of a net, on which are fastened a number of amber beads, which by a secret operation will help to keep the ship affoat, while by the sun's heat the

In this respect they entirely differ from the balloon and all forms of fixed aeroplanes. In nature small wings driven at high speed produce the same result as large wings driven at slow speed. To sum up, the conquest of the air appears to lie in the direction of the bird-like flying machine rather than the aeroplane, in which case the first problem to be solved is the construc tion of a perfect pair of wings en dowed with every property pertaining to the natural mechanism of flight.

Sleighs may be secured to porting supplies at the rate of \$7 per day. There are two places on the road to sleep at on the journey and meals are served at 50c each.

WHAT ALGOMA WANTS.

equests Deputations Will Prefer to Both the Governments,

Sault Ste. Marie, Jan. 28 .- The wor erful silver discoveries of the Cobalt egion have created a world-wide attraction to Canada in general and New Ontario in particular, with the result that millions upon millions of dollars are being poured into the country by capitalists, prospectors and others eager to get a share of the good things going. Gratifying as this is to all Canadians, there is a danger of Cobalt being looked the country of the whole of ed upon as comprising the whole of New Ontario, whereas it is only a very small the enormously wealthy section. In the Algoma district the inhabitants have awakened to the fact that it is necessary to get a hustle on in order that the government and the people of Old Ontario should be made aware of the colossal resources that exist in that vast district in the way of minerals, oil, timber, water powers, natural harbors, waterways and fertile lands. To carry out this educational work, all the municipalities have formed themselves into a union, and are sending a monster delegation to Toronto to wait upon the provincial government to seek their aid in the development of these valuable

resources.

It should be remembered that New Ontario is over 700 miles in length and nearly 400 miles in width, and extends from the western boundary of Quebec to the eastern boundary of Manitoba, and from Lakes Huron and Superior on the south to James Bay and the Albany River on the north, is one of, if not the richest countries in the whole Dominion, and is inhabited by over 120,000 people.

Yet despite all its wealth, New Ontario claims that but poor assistance is given the district in return. The people of Algoma have been the first to form an organization to make known their most pressing needs, and they will make an appeal to the government and the legislature at an early date for hberal grants to aid them in building good roads and to build a house of refuge, where the poor and needy transient visitors can be accommodated, re-

sient visitors can be accommodated, restored to health and started out to earn an honest living once again.

Also will they seek the assistance of the government in removing many disadvantages, which they say they now suffer at the hands of great monopolists, who do just as they please regardless of the rights of the people. As an instance, at Massey, a great lumber company, who were given exceptional privileges, have monopolized the whole mouth of the Spanish River, so that navigation is impossible. Repeated attempts have been made by the townspeople to come to an amicable arrangement with this company for the use of ment with this company for the use of the river, so that boats may bring in Companies Will Hereafter Dispose of Products Individually.
