THE MARCH VIN MARIANI TONIC IN COURT. SIR WILFRID IN ROME

Despite the Injunction Issued by The Renowned French Preparation Assailed by Had an Audience With the Pope Yesterday at Noon.

PROPOSE TO HAVE ITS LEGALITY TESTED. CLAIM THAT DRUGGISTS SHOULD NOT SELL IT. AN HOUR'S CHAT WITH HIS HOLINESS

The Strike May Be Extended to the Central District of Pennsylvania. Prominent Members of the Medical Profession in Toronto Swear That It Is a Medicated Wine.

Reynoldsville Miners Talk of Raiding Other Mines Belonging to the Company—The Bill of Injunction Filed, and President Dolan of the Mine Workers' Union Was Surprised—Buffalo Is Getting Short of Coal—The Firemen Authorized to Take Possession of All the Coal in Sight if They Run Short—Hamilton Dealers Afraid of a Shortage—Springfield, Ill., Men on the March.

Pittsburg, Aug. 12.—The striking miners at Canonsburg have determined to force the injunction issued by continuing the daily marches and meetings in the neighborhood of the McKeever and Canonsburg mines, in spite of the order of Judge McIlwaine of Washington, forbidding marches on the public roads leading to the mines. The purpose is to have the men arrested in order to test the legality of the injunction.

Information has been received by the Pittsburgh operators that the mines of the Bell, Lewis and Yates Company have struck in the Reynoldsville district, and that all the mines of the company are idle. The company is one of the heaviest tonnage producers in the northern field, and shipped extensively to the Buffalo and New York State markets, as well as to the eastern seaboard coaling docks. About 8000 men were employed.

Serious trouble was threatened at Unity at 4 o'clock this morning. Deputy Sheriff Richards was in charge of some men going to work, and the strikers ran ahead of the men, shouting and cursing. Sheriff Richards ordered the strikers to move, but they refused. He then called on his other deputies to assist him, and the strikers, seeing that he meant what he said, moved off, still shouting the men going to work.

Central Miners Disfranchised. Ex-State President George Harris of the Old Miners' Union was in conference here today with the officials relative to the extension of the strike into the central coal fields of Pennsylvania. He was well received, and is dissatisfied, and he believes can be induced to quit work, which would materially bring an end to the movement. The Jefferson-Clearfield Coal and Iron Company employs about 10,000 men, and they are now striking out daily from 30,000 to 35,000 tons of coal, most of which is being shipped to Detroit.

The Reynoldsville miners, numbering 1000, have already quit work, and are now considering the advisability of making a raid on the other mines of the company located in Jefferson County, and inducing them to quit work. It was decided to start the movement at once. A convention will be held during the early part of next week at Grove City, which will be attended by delegates from the mines in Mercer, Lawrence and Butler Counties. Meetings also will be arranged for all the other points in Jefferson, Clearfield and Cambria Counties.

APPROACHING A CRISIS. Miners Propose to Try to Stop the March of the Heavily Armed Miners. Pittsburgh, Aug. 12.—The court officials intend to try to forestall the customary march in the morning by going to the camps to-night and reading the injunction to the campers. If this is done, the crisis will be certainly reached at about 4 o'clock in the morning, as the strikers appear determined to test their right to carry on their program. The court officials said that when the deputations do start to enforce the injunction they will be met by the strikers, and that as fast as the men are placed in jail others will be brought into camp to take their place, and thus the deputies will be kept busy making arrests until the jails are overcrowded. The strikers aver that this movement of the company is another plan for getting the militia on the ground. When they find the miners will not obey the injunction, and the jails become crowded, it is expected that the sheriff will adjudge that his deputies are not sufficient to cope with the situation, and he will be constrained to call out the militia. This is the view of the situation taken by the leaders of the strikers now in the camp.

THE BILL WAS FILED. Sailed Mine Workers' Association Named as Defendants in the Case. Pittsburgh, Aug. 12.—The much-talked-of bill for an injunction against the United Mine Workers, which was to have been filed in the United States Courts, was filed in the county courts about 10 o'clock this morning. The defendants named are the United Mine Workers; Edward McKay, vice-president; William Warner, secretary and treasurer; and others.

The bill recites the conditions prevailing at the mines since the strike began, and alleges that the strikers have paid no attention to the injunction, and that the lives of miners and the property of the company are in danger. Judge Collier granted a preliminary injunction and restraining order enjoining the defendants from assembling, marching or encamping in proximity to the mines and houses of the miners for the purpose of intimidation, menaces, threats and opprobrious words or preventing the miners of the plaintiff from working. It further restrains the defendants from inducing or compelling any employee or miner to quit work.

A hearing was fixed for Aug. 16. The injunction is regarded as the most sweeping yet issued.

Dolan Was Surprised. President Dolan expressed surprise when informed that it had been granted, and added: "It will make no difference to us. We will not break camp, and will go right on as usual until the matter is tested in the courts. We will stay there regardless of every judge in Allegheny County, and if they try to enforce the injunction they will have to build more jails to accommodate the men." When the news of the injunction granted by the county courts, practically breaking up the camp, reached Turtle Creek, the wildest excitement ensued. The strikers were emphatic in their protests against the action.

A conference of the camp leaders was at once called for and many were discussed for some means of holding the ground gained against the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal Company's men.

Lawrence A. Wilson, agent in Canada for Vin Mariani, was seen after the trial. 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The Strike May Be Extended to the Central District of Pennsylvania. Prominent Members of the Medical Profession in Toronto Swear That It Is a Medicated Wine.

A Case of Exceptional Interest to Druggists Heard in the Police Court Yesterday—On the Decision Rests the Right of Druggists to Sell Any Tincture or Preparation Containing Alcohol—The Paris Firm of Mariani & Co. Make a Powerful Line of Defence—Magistrate Kingsford Allows the Case to be Presented to the Attorney-General.

The Ontario Liquor License Act has been the cause of an immense amount of litigation in this Province, but it is doubtful if a more interesting case, or one more calculated to test the spirit of this law, ever came before a court than that which was heard by Magistrate Kingsford yesterday in the Police Court, when Hooper tried to prove as an intoxicating liquor without a license. The article which the Crown tried to prove was the celebrated Vin Mariani, the tonic wine used all over the civilized world and sold by nearly every druggist in Canada. The action, therefore, is one of great interest to druggists, and the drug trade generally, and in fact to the thousands who have purchased this well-known tonic at their druggists. The most important feature of the action, however, is the test of the License Act, and the demonstration of the ridiculous situations which can be created by a strict adherence to the letter of the law as opposed to the spirit of the law.

An Important Case. The importance of the case, from a druggist's standpoint, cannot be over-estimated, for, as J. J. MacLaren, Q.C., the well-known temperance lawyer, who appeared for the defence, remarked, if the act covered such a medicine as Vin Mariani, then no druggist could keep any tincture, and this would constitute a startling innovation in the jurisprudence of the country. As there are about 74 tinctures in the province, the case will be seen at once. The Crown case was conducted by Crown Attorney Curry, R. C. Levescote, J. J. MacLaren, Q.C., appeared for the defence. Lawrence A. Wilson, agent for Canada for Vin Mariani, was also present. The court room was crowded and great interest was shown in the case. The first witness was License Inspector Hastings, who testified that he had purchased a bottle of Vin Mariani at Hooper & Co.'s drug store on July 22.

An Analysis. Prof. Ellis, of Toronto University, swore that he had analyzed the Vin Mariani purchased by Inspector Hastings and found it to contain wine and coca erythroxine. It contained about 12 1/2 per cent. of alcohol. It might produce a certain kind of intoxication, but he would class it as a stimulant and tonic.

Dr. J. E. Elliott called. The defence then called Dr. J. E. Elliott, who testified that he had prescribed Vin Mariani regularly in his practice for brain exhaustion, and in the opinion of the non-alcoholic from a medicinal point of view, as the component parts of Vin Mariani included in the French Pharmacopoeia clearly proved that the coca was more powerful than any other stimulant and tonic, and consequently the drug would have the prescribed by a physician.

London, Aug. 12.—The Westminster Gazette this afternoon published a long leading article, during the course of which the opinion is expressed that if Secretary Sherman is forced to retire from Ohio he will "make Ohio too hot for Senator Hanna," adding: "Some innocents may object that if Sherman is too sensible to hold office he must too sense for the Senate. But, as a matter of fact, no one has yet estimated how incompetent a man must be before the Senate is closed to him. In this respect the advantage of the House of Lords."

Cycle Manufacturers Combine. Alarmed at the Demand of Workmen for Forty-Eight Hours a Week. London, Aug. 12.—At a meeting of the Cycle Manufacturers' Protective Association in Coventry today, a resolution was adopted expressing alarm at the proposals of a large number of workmen to strike or lock out, demanding that the employers should constitute a union, and while the men employed in the same branches in the United States worked 60 hours a week, the employers should limit their hours to 48 hours per week.

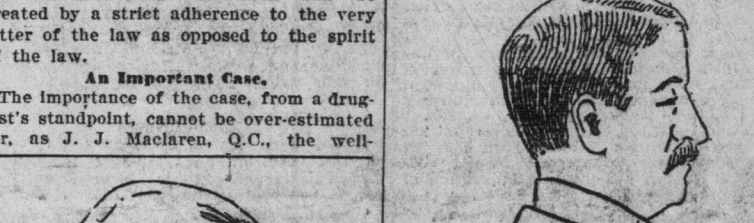
AUSTRIA IS HURLED. Her Representative Has Left Bulgaria's Capital Because of an Abreast. Sofia, Bulgaria, Aug. 12.—The Austrian Charge d'Affaires, Baron Call von Kumbach-Rosenburg, has left Bulgaria on an indefinite leave of absence, owing to the refusal of the Bulgarian Premier, M. Stolioloff, to comply with the demand of the Austrian Government formally to disavow an interview with the Premier, published in the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin last month, in which, referring to the assistance of Austria upon the punishment of Capt. Boitcheff, the former aide de camp of Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, recently convicted of the murder of his paramour, Anna Szimov, an Austrian subject, he drew an insulting parallel between the penalty in official circles in Austria and Bulgaria.

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THE DUMPING OF THE RAILS

Of Toronto Railway Company Into the Ravine.

EVIDENCE TAKEN YESTERDAY

At the Court House, Toronto, Before Magistrate Carl Zeidler.

Charge is Unlawfully Causing Damage to the Rails—Witnesses Swore to Being Engaged by Defendants to Do the Removal—Said to be Furnish to Resistor—Evidence as to the Damage to the Rails—Many of Them are Bent—The Part Defendants Took—More Evidence Will be Given To-day.

Information having been held before Peter Ellis, J.P. for York County, that Andrew McMillan, Thomas Dudley and John L. McCulloch did on the 20th July, 1897, unlawfully cause damage to a quantity of rails in the ravine between the ravine and the ravine.

It is claimed by the Crown that the defendants in depositing the Toronto Railway Company's rails in the ravine damaged the property for a week ago, but Mr. Grant, for the defendants, had asked and been granted an adjournment to enable him to procure evidence.

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THERE WILL BE MUCH SUFFERING

That is the Prediction of Captain Amex, a Pilot Who Has Just Returned From the North.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 12.—The blockade of Klondikers at Dyea and Skagway will lead to much suffering this winter. Capt. Amex, who was the pilot of the steamer Isander, which has just returned from the north, says that things are in very bad shape. Affairs could not be much worse. Two thousand people are camped about the rocky shore, with but few horses or pack animals at hand, and they have practically no chance of getting over the pass. One of the United States commissioners, by using his official influence, and paying \$400 in costs, managed to get the Klondikers to pack his outfit over the Chilkoot Pass to the lakes. Of the others who went from Puget Sound without horses not one in fifty will go across the mountains this winter. Seven Seattle men who went up on the Isander returned on the Victoria, utterly disgusted with the prospect, and will remain at home until spring, when they expect to make another start. Those who have horses and boats stand a fairly good chance of getting through, but they must be before winter comes on.
