**PROCEEDINGS IN THE  
HOUSE YESTERDAY**

**A Lively Little Discussion Over Ginger  
Ale and Sandwiches.**

Ottawa, April 18.—(Special).—The House began this afternoon where it left off in the morning, with the discussion of the bill for the amendment of the law relating to the regulation of the liquor trade. The House was divided into two camps, the one for the amendment and the other for the bill as it stands. The amendment was supported by the Liberal members, while the Conservative members were in favor of the bill as it stands. The discussion was lively and continued until late in the afternoon. The House adjourned at 10 o'clock.

**Private Bills.**

The House spent the next hour and a half considering private bills, several of which were cleared from the order paper and sent to the committee. There was some discussion on the bill to incorporate the Nickel and Silver Companies. Mr. Laurier pointed out that the bill proposed to give extraordinary powers respecting railway construction, and he would like the Railway Committee to consider the bill on this point, but eventually Mr. Laurier's view prevailed.

**Three and a Half Readings.**

The following bills, among others, were read a third time: The bill to amend the Railway Act, the bill to amend the law relating to the regulation of the liquor trade, and the bill to amend the law relating to the regulation of the liquor trade. The House adjourned at 10 o'clock.
