OPPOSED DUNCAN ACT

DID LAWYER HOSSACK West Northumberland Paper Says So, and Wm. Wilson Repeats It in North Toronto.

The McNaught-Shaw meeting in Douglas Hall Saturday night attracted an audience which filled the hall to overflowing and, despite the oppressiveness of the atmosphere, the speakers were enabled to hold the attention of the gathering for three solid hours.

Mr. Wilson lent spice to the proceedings by reading an extract from a West Northumberland paper, making caustic comment on D. C. Hossack's slogan, "Abolishing the bar."

Mr. Hossack, if elected, would be unable to accomplish anything as an independent in the cause of temperance. Mr. McNaught assailed the position taken by A. G. ## NORTH AND SOUTH POLES TO BE EXPLORERS' QUESTS

Peary's Plans Outlined Before International Congress - Unknown is Going South.

BRUSSELS, May 31.—At yesterday's session of the International Polar Congress, Herbert L. Bridgeman, representing the United States, submitted the scheme for reaching the North Pole prepared by the Peary Arctic Club of New York.

The plan involves the use of Peary's old ship, the Roosevelt, which will leave in the fall, winter on the north shore of Grant Land, and thence make a dash for the pole in 1908. The coast of Grant Land will be followed westward to Cape Columbia, over a route which will shorten the distance 100 miles and counteract the effects of the eastern currents.

One of the features of the new scheme is the more rigid training of sledge division in order to keep the men together. On the return voyage, Lieut. Peary proposes to explore Crocker Land, a section of the unknown Arctic, the exploration of which he thinks may revolutionize the existing ideas regarding the heretofore traversed polar regions.

Mr. Bridgeman moved that the committee place Lieut. Peary's scheme on record, with a vote of congratulations to the lieutenant.

At the afternoon session of the congress, the fact was disclosed that an American is preparing to undertake an expedition to the south pole in 1910, upon plans worked out by Lieut. Peary. The latter, however, is not to take part in the expedition.

President Roosevelt, to whom Lieut. Peary disclosed the facts, is said to have endorsed it enthusiastically. The identity of the American has not been revealed.

## CLEVER COUNTERFEITERS.

Winnipeg Police Say Two Green-goods Men Have Bad Record.

WINNIPEG, May 31.—Wolf Cohen and Solomon Samuels, two green goods men from Philadelphia, caught by Winnipeg police Thursday morning, are in reality two counterfeiters with national reputation, according to statement of one of the police officials, and a charge of counterfeiting will be laid against them when they come up for trial next Friday morning.

When the two men first appeared in Winnipeg, they showed partially completed American bills to N. Segal, their intended victim. These bills were printed on only one side, and, according to Segal, had every appearance of being genuine.

Detectives are still searching for the house in which the two men stayed whilst in Winnipeg, but so far without success. It is believed when these lodgings are located dies and other paraphernalia for manufacturing spurious money will be discovered, incidentally, money frequently appears in circulation here, and the police have been unable to trace its source.

Before the arrest Cohen boasted that if the police attempted to arrest him he would kill both himself and them, exhibiting a small vial which he claimed contained nitro-glycerine.

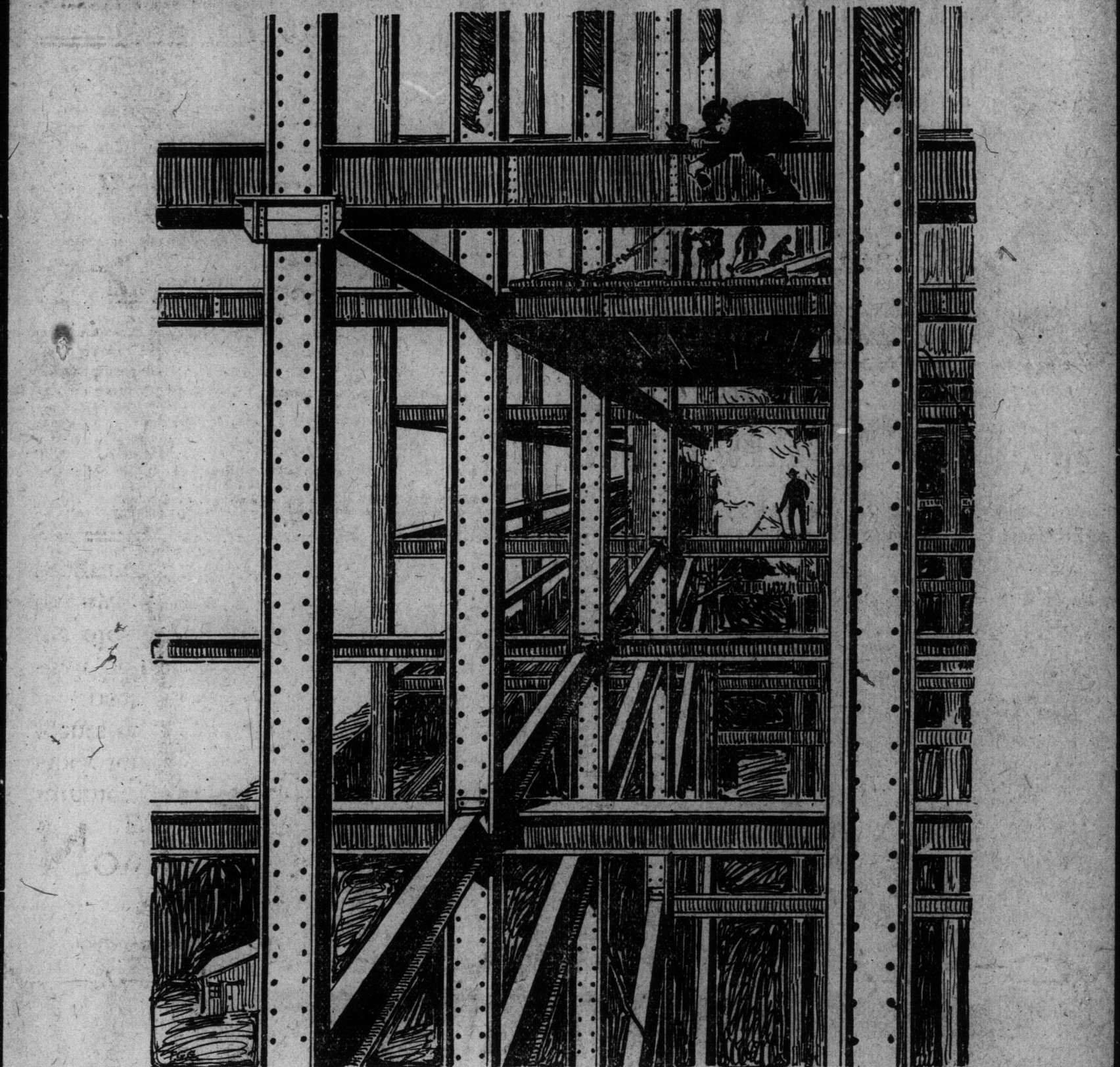
