GOVERNMENT WILLING TO RATIFY MULLOCK DEAL

But Legal Obstructions Must First Be Cleared Away—Opponents Wanted Delay.

The Ontario Government will be quite willing to ratify the city's sale of the Cherry-street property to the National Iron Company, provided the courts reject the application of J. Ross Robertson to have the bylaw quashed whereby the transaction was ratified by the city council.

Mr. Chisholm contended that as the amount realized from the sale had to be spent in improving Queen's Park, the city was really a trustee for the Queen's Park, and that the government and city both being agreeable, no ratepayer could object to the transaction.

SIR JAMES DRAWS OUT REPORT FROM O'BRIEN

Editor of Law Journal Says Premier's Conclusions Must Be "Equally Silly."

Henry O'Brien, editor of The Canada Law Journal, writes The World as follows in reply to Sir James Whitney, an interview with whom on the hydro-power question was published a few days ago:

On my return from the country my attention was drawn to the report of an interview given to the daily press by Sir James Whitney, in which he refers in strong language to an article in The Canada Law Journal, of which I have the honor to be the editor-in-chief, and saying that the legal position taken by the writer of that article is "simply silly."

If the conclusion arrived at in the well-considered article referred to were "simply silly," surely it were equally silly for one occupying so high a position as the Premier of Ontario to leave his important duties to try, by a newspaper interview, to destroy the effect of an article which he declares to be of no moment.

I would in the strictest confidence inform Sir James that nothing appears in the columns of The Law Journal which has not been fully considered in all its bearings by one or more competent critics; and as to the article in question, the views therein expressed are legal matters which are submitted to and approved of by one of the leading counsel of this city.

LAWYERS EDGE THEM ON. Write Farmers Inviting Them to Go After Higher Figures. IS DANGEROUS CROSSING

Father of Boy Hurt by Train Calls for Investigation.

John Swithbank, whose son Fred was seriously injured in the crossing accident at Streetsville in which Thomas Gant was killed, said yesterday while visiting his son at St. Michael's Hospital, that he intended to see that an investigation was held. Coroner Lawson decided not to hold an inquest because a man who was working in a field near the scene of the fatality asserted that all necessary warning had been given by the engineer of the train. Swithbank said he wanted to know exactly how the accident happened and he wanted to see a guard rail erected on the crossing. The crossing is an exceedingly dangerous one, being situated on a curve.

It is said that a train cannot be seen until it is within 20 yards of the crossing.

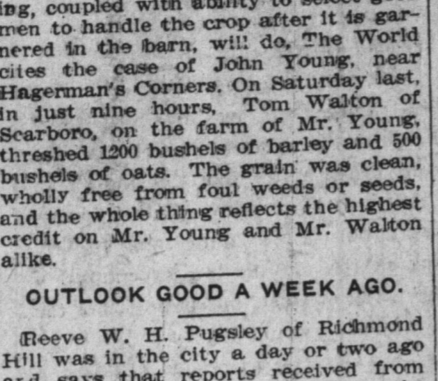

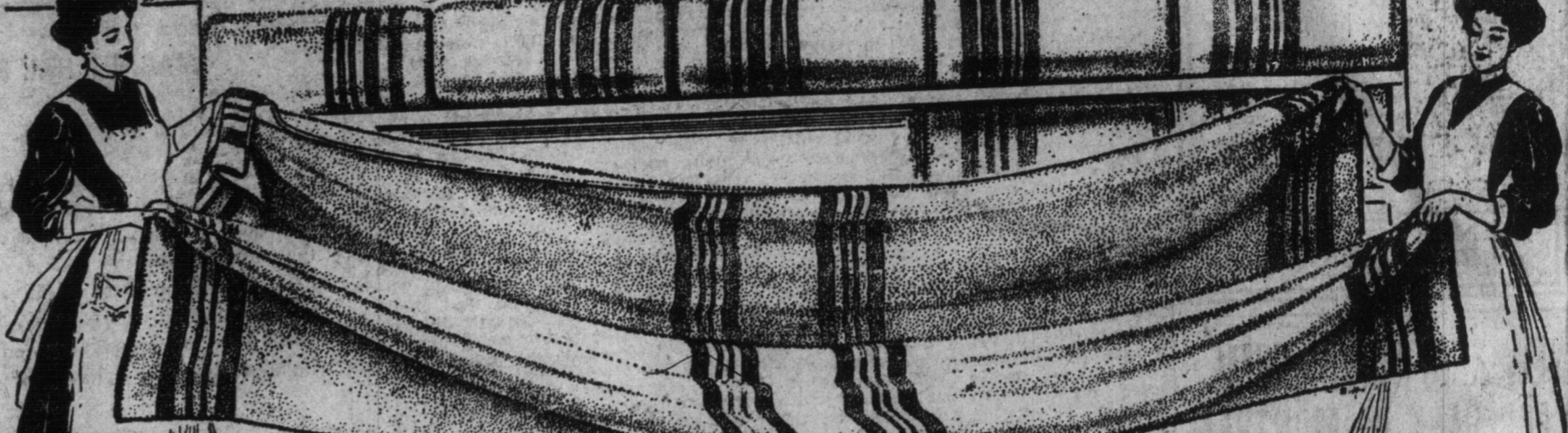

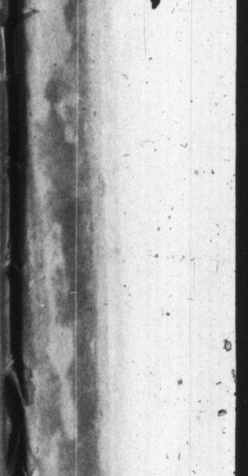
