



Imports for the Year Show

a Larger Increase Than Exports.

Washington, Jan. 21.—The United States foreign trade in 1920 was the largest in the country's history, total-ing \$13,507,000,000. Exports were valued at \$8.228.000,000 against \$7,920 -000,000 in 1919 and imports were val-ued at \$5,279,000,000, or \$1,375,000,000 greater than the imports in 1919. This left a trade balance for 1920 of approximately three billions of dollars in favor of the United States as against a balance the year before of approxi-mately four billions of dollars.



Orders for materials have been under careful conderation, have been under careful conderation, he states, and some action in that di-rection has already been taken. The minister of labor contends that

the Dominion census must necessarily be taken in June as required by statute, and the government has no au-thority to deviate therefrom, conse-
