DARING HAMILTON BURGLAR DOES HUGEN IN 10 MINUTES

Forces Door in Hunter St. Station and Gets Away With \$120 While Clerk is Upstairs.

Hamilton, Jan. 11.—(Special).—One of the most daring robberies ever committed in Hamilton was pulled off this evening, when the T.H. & E. ticket office, at the Hunter-street station, was rifled and \$120 booty secured.

The ticket office agent, left the office in charge of Edwin Yorkick, at 6.40 this evening. Yorkick locked both doors of the office at 6.45 and ran to the office upstairs in the station building. He was gone only ten minutes, but during that time the door leading from the ticket office had been opened by means of a jimmy. The thief had grabbed \$120 from the till and had disappeared.

The door is a stout one and was secured by two locks. The thief, judging by the marks he left on the door, worked like a Trojan, and broke one lock and forced the other. Yorkick declares that when he went upstairs there was not a soul in either the ladies' or general waiting rooms, and he was alone in the ticket office.

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BREWERY WORKERS PROTEST AGAINST CUT OF LICENSES

As Citizens and Ratepayers Object to Having 25 Per Cent. of Their Number Thrown Out of Work.

The possibility that the city council may endeavor to reduce the number of hotel licenses is causing uneasiness among the brewery workers who see in such a measure a menace to themselves. At a meeting of local United Brotherhood of Brewers, the following resolution, which is self-explanatory, was passed:

"Whereas there is a movement on foot for the purpose of reducing the number of hotel licenses in the city, and whereas the adoption of such a measure will be means of 25 per cent. of our number losing their positions in the breweries;

Therefore be it resolved that we, as citizens and ratepayers who are employed in the various breweries of this city, do most strenuously protest against any such legislation being enacted, as in our opinion it is vicious and unfair and will be the means of doing our members a great injustice. Copies of the above are being sent to the mayor and city clerk.

PLAN TEMPORARY PEACE TO RE-ARM EUROPEAN WAR

Vice-Admiral Doubaissou Supposed to Voice Zeal's Sentiment About Calling a Truce.

Paris, Jan. 11.—Vice-Admiral Doubaissou, the Russian member of the North Sea commission, is quoted by The Echo de Paris as having stated in an interview that he had submitted to Emperor Nicholas a program for a reorganization of the Russian fleet, which is indispensable for success in the war against Japan. Twenty months will be necessary to complete the program.

The declaration made by Vice-Admiral Doubaissou is a highly significant one. Heretofore the members of the Russian embassy and all the other Russian officials here have resented suggestions of peace as humiliating.

It is reasonable to believe that these were expressive of personal views before hearing from St. Petersburg, where the Russian government is now. The official view is that Admiral Doubaissou's statement is expressive of the opinion of the Russian government, and that it is a national sentiment.

Therefore, the added, "I do not hesitate to say that we tend toward not off peace. We will leave the Japanese Fort Arthur and the territory they now possess in default of securing satisfactory terms of peace."

THE BANK OF TORONTO

We draw the attention of our readers to the report of the annual meeting of the Bank of Toronto, which will be published in our columns to-day.

A striking feature of the report is the amount of assets held in gold, which is now available assets amounting to \$3,904,806.03, being nearly 50 per cent. of the total liabilities to the public, and the interests of the depositors are also being protected by the addition of \$1,170,000 to the reserve fund, which is now \$3,300,000, being \$500,000 more than the capital of the bank.

The net profits for the year aggregated \$490,985.91, of which \$45,870 came from premium received on new stock. The staff received consideration in the addition of \$7500 to the officers' pension fund.

The deposits amount to \$17,044,605.42, an increase of \$1,670,534.19 for the year, and loans, discounts and investments \$21,468,522.81, showing an increase during the same period of \$3,171,100.00.

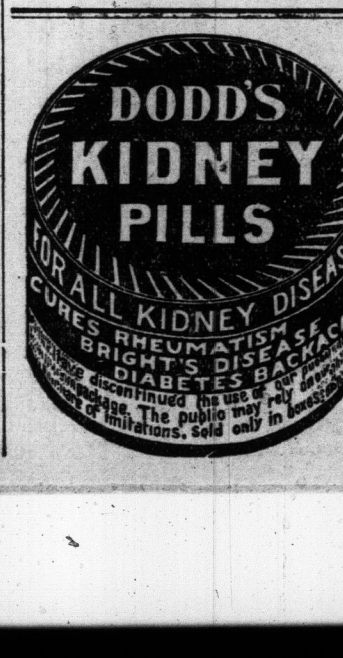

REPORT OF 11th JANUARY, 1905. The Forty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Stockholders of the Bank of Toronto was held at their Banking House, corner of Church and Wellington streets, on the 11th instant.

FIGHT TO GET THEIR MONEY OUT. PRAY TO HAVE IT RE-ACCEPTED.

Three Policemen Hurt in Handling Mob of 8000 Excited Hebrews. Who Thought Bank Was "Breaking" - Claims Paid in Specie Made Heavy Loads.

New York, Jan. 11.—Three policemen and two Hebrew women were injured in a sensational run on the State Bank in Grand-street to-day. The crowd of 8000 persons broke down an iron railing around the light in front of the bank, and it was only by desperate clubbing on the part of the police that the mob was prevented from forcing many of its number into it. The policemen and women were hurt at that point. An emergency police detail finally was called out and policemen were stationed at intervals of five feet for two blocks either side of the bank.

COMMISSIONERS DISAGREE ON COMPENSATION POWERS.

Bernier Says it Must Be Determined by Arbitration; Mills Takes Contrary View. Ottawa, Jan. 11.—(Globe Special.)—Since the meeting of the railway commission in Toronto on the 22nd and 23rd of December, and the hearing (on the 5th inst.) of the formal application for the expropriation of the Williams property, the board has gone fully into the whole case. It has decided to grant the application for the expropriation of the Williams property, and has fixed upon the 10th of February as the date at which the applicant company must accept or reject the order. In other respects, the final form of the order is the same as that which was handed out in Toronto at noon on the 23rd of December last, and then approved upon by all parties, except the representatives of the railway companies, who objected to section 7; and the two members of the board have agreed upon all the sections and provisions of the order, including the two additions above mentioned, except the said section 7. This section deals with the nature and extent of the compensation to be allowed to the owners, lessees and possessors of portions of the land covered by the application for expropriation and the date or dates from which the said compensation is to be computed.

Mr. Bernier, deputy chairman, has handed out his judgment declaring that in his belief the commission has not power to determine compensation for the property expropriated, which must be settled by arbitration. Then, if the commission and the owner, it is to do so without evidence as to the damage suffered, and none has been offered. Clause 138 of the Railway Act provides that the commission may prescribe terms and conditions, but Mr. Bernier's opinion that means terms and conditions relating to the use of the property expropriated.

Dr. Mills Disfers. The judgment of Commissioner Mills is dissent as follows: "Extracts from revised draft order for the expropriation of certain lands by the Grand Trunk Railway Company in the City of Toronto, dated December 23, 1904, at noon, as follows: (7) That the owners, lessees and possessors of the said lands hereinbefore described, and of each of them, other than the City of Toronto, shall, in addition to other damages recoverable by them, and each of them, be entitled to compensation for business losses, injuries, damages and expenses sustained and incurred, and to be incurred by reason of the application for this order for expropriation and the proceedings had thereunder; that the said compensation shall be computed from the date of the service of the application or the first of the applications upon the owner, lessee or possessor as entitled. The City of Toronto shall be entitled to only such compensation as may be allowed by law, and the compensation herein provided for shall be determined by the same procedure as is provided for in determining compensation for lands taken or injuriously affected under the Railway Act of 1903."

NOT BARRED FROM CANADA. Supreme Officers of the Knights of Columbus deny that their society is barred from Canada and say that the Bishop of Toronto is the only Canadian prelate opposed to the order. Rev. Father Cruise stated last night that so far as he was aware the society was in no way barred out of Canada; indeed, he thought there were branches in this country, and he knew of a number of Torontonians who were members of the order.

Toronto Horticultural Society. At the annual meeting of the Toronto Horticultural Society last evening the following were elected as officers for the current year: President, H. R. Frankland; first vice-president, W. G. Rook; second vice-president, George Mussen; secretary, C. A. Chambers; board of directors, Thos. Stanton, G. H. Mills, Edward Tyrrell, H. Simmers, William Joy, J. McP. Ross, S. Adlard, W. H. Fowl and George Douglas. Representatives to the International Association, H. R. Frankland and W. G. Rook; and to the Canadian Horticultural Society, Thos. McQueen.

Thomas Hellivell's Will. Thomas Hellivell left an estate of \$64,981 without bequeathing it to any one. His sister, Miss Abigail, will administer the estate. The balance is divided amongst numerous relatives. Be Careful. Belleville, Jan. 11.—Counterfeit \$5 bills on the Bank of Montreal have been passed in this city. They are clumsy imitations and should be avoided by one who uses proper care.
