# REPORT.

---

The Particular Council of the Society of St. Vincent of Paul, in presenting the Annual Report of the year's operations of the three Halifax Conferences, to their friends and benefactors, and asking for a renewal of their Christian sympathy and support to carry on during the ensuing months of 1892, the works of mercy the Society is engaged in ; have much gratification in announcing that during the year now closed, the expenditure has been less than during the one preceding it. Last year it was our unpleasant duty to report the largely increased expenditure of \$524.70 over that of 1889-90 ; now we are happy to be enabled to state that the outlay of 1890-91 has been \$283.64 less than that of 1889-90, as will be seen by the following comparative statement.

This decrease is in the coal expenditure. In the year 1889-90 the General Treasurer paid out for this article \$1018.75; while in 1890-91 the disbursement was \$746.83—a saving of \$271.92.

The receipts from all sources during the year were \$2808.45, as against \$2681.90 the previous year, an increase of \$126.46.

The balance in the General Treasurer's hands at the end of 1889-90 was \$107.19. This year the balance is \$261.22.

Among the items of expenditure in the General Treasurer's account will be found one for "books, printing and stationery," \$45.70. It is necessary to explain here that the larger portion of this sum was expended for the purchase of a number of the various publications of the "Catholic Truth Society" of London, suitable for distribution by the Active Members of the Conferences, so that good Catholic literature may be circulated among the families visited, the seeds of heavenly doctrine scattered, and the teachings of the Catholic faith early instilled into the minds of youth, where it is to be hoped they will take deep root.

In our last Report we expressed the hope that the ranks of Active Members might be recruited by zealous and energetic young men. We are pleased to have it to say that St. Mary's Conference has admitted four such, and that the roll of St. Patrick's has been increased by a similar number,

St. Mary's Conference has to regret the death of one, Mr. Geo. Metzler, who was a life-long member, he having joined the Society shortly after its foundation here. St. Patrick's Conference records the death of three during the past year, viz: Messrs. Joseph Mulcahy, Geo. Fultz and Archibald McDonald. More help is needed, and though as a rule it is desirable that Conferences should not be overcrowded, still there is work for more Active Members.

There being no permanent President of St. Patrick's Conference since the death of Mr. John Sullivan, the President of the Particular Council has, since the last Annual Meeting, appointed Capt. P. Doyle to that office, and also Mr. Thos. Flinn to the office of Vice-President of St. Joseph's Conference. A change has also been made in the Secretaryship of St. Mary's Conference. Mr. P. M. Duggan having resigned, Mr. Wm. J. Phelan has been appointed to succeed him, with Mr. Richard O'N. Duggan as his assistant. Although in the appointment of officers the President of the Particular Council is perfectly independent in his choice, he takes into consideration the desires of the Conferences, while having regard for the fitness of those he appoints to particular offices. By thus acting in concert with all, good results follow. The various Conferences, we have much pleasure in reporting, are in good working order, and the members, while performing their work with zeal, exercise all necessary care and discretion. We can also report with satisfaction, and for the information of our friends and benefactors, that in order that the work carried on by the Conferences be not lost sight of, the Particular Council meets regularly once a month. At the meetings monthly reports from the various Conferences detailing their operations from month to month, are laid before the Council by the Presidents. Thus the Council is kept continually acquainted with the work being performed; is enabled to carefully examine the expenditure, enquire the reasons for such, give useful advice, encourage zeal, spread good example, and strengthen the union of heart and mind.

The Conferences meet regularly once a week throughout the year, and in addition the members come together at quarterly meetings, at which quarterly reports are submitted and read. Discussion then follows, and members are given an opportunity to express in a fraternal manner, their views as to what is most necessary to be done to give life and activity to the Society, and make its work effective.

During the year there were distributed among the families relieved the following quantities of the articles enumerated :

In addition to these, other articles suited to the needs of the sick were given, as will be found on reference to the reports of the several Conferences.

The total number of families relieved during the year was 188, being 51 less than the year previous.

The number of visits paid by Active Members to the homes of families relieved was 4 058.

The cost of interment of nine bodies was borne by the Conferences.

It will thus be seen that not only are the wants of those in bodily health provided for, but that the sick and infirm are specially cared for, and families relieved of the expense of burial when death occurs.

Were it not that its rehearsal would prove tedious, we might enter into detail of the condition and circumstances of some of the cases on the books; moreover, the society

keeps in view the advice of our Holy Father Leo X., that "the more the Society conceals the good effect of its work the more it is fitted to the practice of charity and the alleviation of mankind's miseries."

In making this our annual appeal to friends and benefactors for the means to enable us to carry on our works of mercy, we hope we may be pardoned in reminding those who are blessed with this world's goods that the doctrine of Christian Charity teaches that in extending the hand of brotherly assistance to the poor, the sick, the aged and infirm, they recognise in them the suffering Man-God, who has asserted "that what you do unto the least of these, my brethren, you do unto me." There may be many who, through force of circumstances, are seldom or ever brought into contact with poverty and suffering, and consequently it may seem to them that they have not the means of fulfilling the sacred obligation of relieving the poor and lowly members of the human family among whom their lot has been cast. But we can assure these that in the Society of St. Vincent of Paul they have the channel through which this obligation may not only be complied with, but that they have also the opportunity of performing an action meritorious in the sight of God, sanctifying the soul, and ennobling the heart by stimulating and expanding its noblest affections. Although originally founded by three Catholic young laymen, the work the Society is engaged in has rapidly spread, and its benign influence is felt to-day in every quarter of the civilized world; the result of its labors so far, stand an immortal monument to its pious founders, and it has given a practical and forcible illustration to the philanthropists of the world of what can be done by human energies properly and religiously directed.

In conclusion we appeal to you, dear friends and benefactors, to cheerfully renew your subscriptions and donations. Let those who are possessed with the good things of this earth contribute generously, and enable the Active Members to relieve the calls of suffering humanity. They are contin-

ually appealing to us for relief, and without your assistance we are unable to bestow it. You have been generous in the past, and earned the gratitude of the destitute, whose miseries you have alleviated. Let the donations of the rich be supplemented by the offering of the widow's mite. The same reward is offered to all who give in the spirit of true charity, the reward of an eternity of bliss promised by Our Lord, who has said, that a heavenly kingdom is prepared for those who do works of mercy in His name. With a record of so many years of usefulness in the past, it is with confidence that we appeal to the generosity of our fellow Christians to enable us to prosecute the good work in the future.

## REPORT OF ST. MARY'S CONFERENCE.

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 31st, 1891.

*To the President of the Particular Council:—*

SIR,—I have the honor to submit for the information of the Council the following report of the operations of St. Mary's Conference during the past year.

44 families representing 220 persons have been cared for, and 40 families representing 120 persons, have received coal.

1842 visits have been made by the Active Members to the families receiving relief.

The average attendance of members at weekly meetings during the year was 12.

The weekly contributions of members amounted to \$121.15, being \$17.50 more than in the previous year. The largest weekly expenditure of any one week was \$27.00 in the month of March, and the smallest was \$10.75.

The following articles were distributed:—

The Conference was careful not to relieve families where there was a father or young men, except in cases of sickness, feeling that their mission was more particularly to assist

widows and orphans. No relief was given without the case being first visited. In many instances children have been clothed and employment obtained, while a number were encouraged to attend school and their religious duties. The expense of three burials was borne by the Conference.

During the year four young members were added to the active roll, thereby making the work of some of the older members lighter. We regret to have to record a loss to the Conference by the death of a very zealous member, Mr. Geo. Metzler.

## REPORT OF ST. PATRICK'S CONFERENCE.

HALIFAX, N. S., DEC. 1st, 1891.

*To the President of The Particular Council :*

SIR,— In presenting the twenty-fourth Annual Report of the Conference, and in giving a general survey of the work, we are able to report a larger average attendance at the Meetings of the Active members this year than in the past. In addition to the usual work of the Society, we have been aided in the work of relieving those under our care by the co-operation of the Society of the Children of Mary under the direction of the Sisters of Charity in our parish.

It is not necessary to enter into a lengthened detail of the work done during the year, further than giving the results of our expenditure, &c.

Our total disbursements (exclusive of that for coal) amounted to \$633.00, and our receipts \$645.02.

The total number of members now on the roll, 44; Active Members, 22; Members admitted during year, 4; Members died, 3. The number of families on the books was 80; of that number 67 were widows. Adults relieved, 101; children, 193; total individuals, 294. There were 2,000 visits made by the Members in aiding the above families cared for, and the following articles were distributed, viz :—

Together with sundry articles such as eggs, broma, milk, &c., suitable for the sick, costing \$27.21,

In addition to the above the customary Christmas grant was given to the families on our books at that happy season.

We issued during the year 264 orders for coal—a total of 2421 bushels.

We provided for the burial of 2 adults and 2 children. The Conference has to record with sincere sorrow the deaths during the year of Mr. Joseph Mulcahy, one of the original members of our Conference when founded in 1867; Mr. George Fultz, an active member since 1869; and Mr. Archibald McDonald, a younger member who was carried off by that dread disease, consumption.

In concluding we repeat the words of one of our members: "that if more helpers would join our ranks they would soon be convinced that there is beneficial and important work to be done among the poor of our parish."
