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

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Rules of the Association.

I. That the Association be called the DOMINION OF CANADA ARTILLERY Association, and have for its object the development of Gunnery skill, and the dissemination of Artillery knowledge throughout the Dominion of Canada.

2. That the annual subscription for individual members be *two dollars*, which will give the right of voting at any regular organized meeting, other than a meeting of Council. The donor of *twenty dollars*, in cash, at any one time, or a prize of not less value than *forty dollars*, to be competed for at a general prize meeting, may be elected a life member.

3. That any Canadian Artillery or Engineer Corps, the Royal Military College Cadets, and the Artillery detachment of the North-West Mounted Police Force, subscribing not less than *ten dollars* per Field and *six dollars* per Garrison Battery, per annum, may become affiliated to this Association, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships in the proportion of one for each two dollars thus subscribed, the officers of each subscribing Battery to select from amongst themselves the person to hold such memberships and return their names and addresses, when selected, to the Secretary, to be registered by him previous to the Annual General Meeting.

4. The affairs of the Association to be managed by a Council to consist of *ex-officio* members and such others as may be elected annually at a General Meeting. The Hon. the Minister of Militia and Defence; the Deputy Minister of Militia and Defence; The Major General Commanding; The Adjutant General; The Inspector and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery; The Deputy Adjutant Generals of Districts, and Brigade Majors; All Officers Commanding, and Regimental Field Officers of Artillery Brigades; Officers Commanding Affiliated Batteries and Engineer Corps; The Director of Stores; The Commandant and Professors (being officers), Royal Military College; Military Secretary to the Governor General, an President Dominion Rifle Association, shall, if members of the Dominion Artillery Association, be *ex-officio* a member of the Conncil.

5. The Governor of the Dominion and the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces shall be respectfully requested to become Patron and Vice-Patrons, respectively, of the Association; and at any General Meeting of the Association other names may be added to the list of Vice-Patrons.

6. A General Meeting of the Association shall be held annually, on the third Thursday after the meeting of Parliament, to receive the Annual Report of the Secretary and Treasurer, and to transact general business. No alteration of the Rules of the Association shall be made, excepting at such meeting. Twentyone days notice of any motion involving such alteration shall be given in writing, by the member intending to propose it at the General Meeting, to the Secretary, who shall forward it immediately to every member of the Association.

7. The office-bearers shall consist of a President and four Vice-Presidents of the Association, to be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, and a President and four Vice-Presidents of Council and a Secretary-Treasurer to be elected annually at the first meeting of Council next after the Annual General Meeting. The Council shall have power to fill up vacancies occurring subsequently. That there be also an Executive Committee to consist of the Inspector and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery, with two officers to be elected by the Council from among its members at the first Meeting of Council after the Annual General Meeting, of which the Inspector of Artillery shall be chairman, to the charge of which Committee shall be intrusted all technical artillery matters and carrying out of annual competitions, appointment of umpires and the arrangement of details in connection therewith, three to form a quorum. The members of the Executive Committee to be eligible to any office and to report to the Council. (See Rule 21.)

8. At all General Meetings of the Association the chair shall be taken by the President, in his absence by the senior Vice-President present, and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents by the President of Council, and so on.

9. At all Meetings of Council, five shall form a quorum, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority, and the chairman shall have a casting vote when the members are equal.

10. Ordinary Meetings of Council shall be held on the day previous to, and immediately after the Annual General Meeting.

The Minutes of all Meetings of Council shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary, and open to the inspection of any member of Council.

11. Extraordinary Meetings of Council shall be summoned by the Secretary when required by the President of Council, at such places as the President may direct, either at his own discretion, or upon the request, in writing, of six members of Council, of at least three different corps, duly entitled to vote at such meeting, one of whom shall be a Vice-President, notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fourteen days previous to such meeting, and the requisition for the meeting and the notices to the members must state the object, or objects, of such meetings. Members of Council shall be permitted to send a written vote to the Secretary upon subjects to be discussed at such meetings.

12. All subscriptions, other than through affiliation, to the Association shall become due on or before the 1st May for the current Association year, and the Treasurer shall be required to deposit all sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Association, in a Savings' Bank.

13. Two Auditors shall be appointed annually to examine the Treasurer's accounts previous to the Annual Meeting.

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14. The payment of money for current expenses must be authorized by the President of Council or in his absence by one of the Vice-Presidents, other payments to be made only on authority of Council.

15. The Council shall have the power of establishing such competitions as they may deem advisable. All technical details to be referred to the Executive Committee.

16. An annual report from the Secretary and Treasurer to be submitted to the Council before publication. The Council shall also make a report of the proceedings of the year to the General Association Meeting.

17. All competitions to be closed by the 31st December of each year, and all returns thereof, with list of men entitled to badges, must be sent to the Secretary by the 15th January ensuing the year for which the claim is made.

18. That members of Council, not being life members, must pay the annual subscription to remain as such.

19. That any Commanding Officer of a corps, being a member of Council, unable to attend any meeting of the same, may nominate, in writing, an officer of his own command to attend in his stead, and upon such officer delivering to the Secretary such nomination, he shall be entitled to speak and vote at such Meeting of Council, but any motion made or seconded by him shall be made by him in the name of the member of Council for whom he acts.

20. Whenever an Artillery Association is formed for any of the Provinces of the Dominion, such Association shall be entitled to affiliate with this Association on payment annually of \$2.50 for each battery comprising such Provincial Association.

21. The Provincial Association shall, in addition to its Council membership, be entitled to be represented on the Executive Committee of this Association, in matters connected with the Province, by one of the existing members of Council.

22. All Provincial competitions, other than those which already are, or may be established by this Association, shall be subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of this Association, but shall be arranged for, adjudged and prizes awarded by the Council of the Provincial Association.

23. The Secretary of this Association shall be required to furnish such information from the records of the Dominion Association as may be required for the distribution of additional Provincial prizes.

24. That the *Canadian Militia Gazette*, published at Ottawa, shall be the official organ of the Association ; and publication of a notice in that paper, by the Secretary or other person authorized to act on his behalf, shall be a sufficient intimation to all concerned of the holding of any regular or special mex and of the Association, or of any proposed changes in the Constitution and Rules thereof—provided that such notice shall be first inserted at least ten days before the holding of the meeting specified, and shall appear in every subsequent issue until such date.

Minutes of Annual General Meeting.

Proceedings of an Annual General Meeting held at Ottawa on the 21st February, 1889.

The meeting was called to order at 12 o'clock, noon, Lt.-Colonel Macdonald, President of the Association, in the chair.

1. It was moved by Major Frank King, seconded by Captain Donaldson, "That the report for 1888, as printed and distributed, be received and taken as read."—Carried.

2. It was moved by Lt.-Colonel McKenzie, seconded by Major Stewart, and carried unanimously by a standing vote :—" That the thanks of the Association be tendered His Excellency the Governor General for his attendance here to-day, for his acceptance of the office of Patron, and for his continuance of the prizes for General Efficiency given by his predecessors, the Marquis of Lorne and the Marquis of Lansdowne."

His Excellency, who was warmly received, replied as follows :---" I assure you it is a sincere pleasure to me to carry out, as far as may be, the good work which has been encouraged by my predecessors. I can assure you that no one brings to the task a greater appreciation of the work than do I. Of course I am not a gunner, but I have seen a great deal of gunners, and therefore, perhaps, I am better able, even than my predecessors, to appreciate the work in which you are engaged. I understand that the Association does add very materially to the strength of the Dominion. We all know that our force is kept up for defensive purposes. We hope that it will never be required even for this purpose; certainly

But in these days, to be forearmed is to be forewarned, and, as far as may be, it is the duty of those who undertake the defence of the country to see they can do so efficiently. Now, sir, I know very well we labor under a special difficulty. In the first place, whatever the personal wishes of the Minister of Militia and Defence may be, he has colleagues in the Cabinet who control him as to ways and means; and further than that, they have behind them the country and a body of constituents who justly demand, in the first place the expenditure shall not be excessive, and in the next place that they shall get their money's worth. Therefore you never have the means here of indulging in those costly armaments with which we are too familinr at home, and of which, as a former War Minister myself, I have some personal knowledge. That has its advantages and its disadvantages. There is no doubt that the perfect gun of to day will be the past gun of to-morrow, and the obsolete gun of a few years hence; and that is the difficulty which, by preserving an attitude of entire quiet, you undoubtedly avoid. On the other hand, where circumstances unfortunately call you out for the purposes of defence it implies much more to be done in the case of Artillery than with Infantry arms. Artillery would be brought face to face with the question of dealing with the most improved ordnance, differing entirely from that which they have been in the habit of using, and furnished with the most improved appliances of modern science, supplied, I presume, by the Government of the country. At the present moment you have the 64 pr., which represents the garrison gun, and the 9 pr. muzzle loader, which is used by the field artillery. Speaking of the latter, I venture, in the presence of many military men, to say that it appears to me for all the purposes for which it is ordinarily required, a very fairly efficient gun, and those who have read Major Prevost's report-the able superintendent of the cartridge factory at Quebecwill see that he thinks further improvement is possible in shell, by which it may be made an even more powerful gun than at present. But for ordinary work it is, perhaps, as good as we can have. On the other hand we cannot say quite as much about the garrison gun. I only venture to throw out, in the most careful way, the suggestion that there is a possibility of means by which the Dominion may meet the present difficulty without incurring more expense for the purchase of guns. They may approach the Imperial Government with the view of using some of those guns which are mounted for Imperial defence at Halifax. I have some reason to believe that both the General Officer and the authorities there are perfectly willing to put all facilities in the way, and to give the utmost attention in their power. In that way, and in that way only, does it seem to me at the present time, that without great expense gun detachments could become acquainted with the working of improved modern guns. I understand that at Halifax there are some guns of the most improved modern type, and if the Minister of Militia could see his way clear to the difficulty of travelling expenses, etc., it does seem to me possible that gun detachments may be sent down there in succession, and that they might at all events have some idea how to use the more modern appliances that are attached to the modern guns. Of course a great deal can be

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learned in the ordinary drill, and practically that will be carried on as before. That is the only way, I think, of carrying on the work in the most improved way, and without casting a great burden on the finances of the country. I have no

After lengthened discussion it was suggested that if the following motion was agreed to it would meet the requirements of the case :----

The amendment of Major Van Wagner, seconded by Mr. Myles was then withdrawn with consent of the meeting.

The above matter having been settled it was again moved in amendment to the main motion by Lieut. Irving, seconded by Mr. Dodd, "That the following be added to the report of the Executive Committee, 'that this meeting regrets that the Executive Committee of this Association has thought fit to decide upon the merits of the protest made by the Hamilton Field Battery without consulting the representative of the Ontario Artillery Association, which representation the Association is entitled to.'" Lost by vote of President.

The motion (No. 3) was then put to the meeting and carried.

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Report of Council, 1889.

1. The Council herewith presents the Reports of the Executive Committee and of the Secretary-Treasurer, with accounts duly audited for 1889.

2. The Council has much pleasure in drawing attention to the Secretary-Treasurer's report, which shows that the past year has been the most prosperous one during the existence of the Association—All the Field Batteries with two exceptions, and thirty-one out of thirty-nine Garrison Batteries have affiliated, while the list of individual members shews a gratifying increase.

3. The Annual Meetings for practice have been well attended by both Field and Garrison Batteries.

4. The success already achieved by the Ontario Artillery Association leaves no room for doubt as to the advantages which would accrue to the Service at large, were other similar Provincial Associations organized, as they afford a stimulus to increased efficiency and enlist local sympathy and support, pecuniary and otherwise, which cannot be shared by the Dominion Association. The local distribution of prizes has been found to have a beneficial effect upon the Subscription List.

5. Motions to alter certain existing rules of the Association will be submitted for the consideration of the General Meeting. It is proposed to amend Rule 4, so as to limit the Elective members of Council to officers on the active or retired list, and also that Rules 20, 21, 22, shall be so amended as to render impossible any misconstruction as to the terms under which Provincial Associations may become affiliated with this Association.

6. The Council would recommend that the Department of Militia and Defence be requested to increase the time allowed non-commissioned officers and gunners of all Batteries that go into camp, by say four days for preliminary drill before going into camp—thus allowing the entire time in camp to be employed in performance of camp duties and other necessary work, much of which is now left undone for the want of time.

7. The Council desires to express its obligations to the Inspector and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery, and their Executive staff for their assistance and cooperation during the Annual Meetings for Field and Garrison Artillery practice and in carrying out the general aims of the Association, which latter have as their chief object the improvement in every detail that effects the Military organization and efficiency of both the Field and Garrison Artillery of the Dominion.

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Report of the Executive Committee, 1889.

FIELD BATTERY PRACTICE.

1. The main features of the practice for this year consisted in the substitution of a range-finding practice, carried out during annual drill, for the preliminary practice hitherto in use, and the reduction of the actual number of competitors at the ordinary practice from sixteen to eight.

These changes are in accordance with those proposed by the Executive Committee in its last report.

Of the sixteen affiliated batteries, ten were enabled to carry out the rangefinding practice, and with very satisfactory results. The range was found by two marksmen of each sub-division, the latter acting independently, and on the range being found by common shell, two rounds of Shrapnel were fired from each gup.

2. The instructional value of this practice to the whole Battery is very great. More attention will have to be paid in future to coming into action and opening fire with rapidity under service conditions, and the practice itself will be carried a stage further by finding the ranges by sections instead of by sub-divisions, and by using a second target when the distance of the first has been correctly found.

3. The actual competitive practice was carried out at a land range near Kingston, and was participated in at that locality by detachments from thirteen batteries—the Newcastle, Winnipeg and Welland Canal batteries fired at local headquarters during their annual camps. The scores made in most instances were very good, and afford a fair test of the relative efficiency as marksmen of each detachment. The following remarks, however, are deemed necessary for general information and future guidance :—

(a) All competitors should be previously well trained in laying a gun, and no man with defective eyesight should be selected as a possible marksman.

(b) Care should be taken in preliminary instruction in fuze boring, many bits having been broken owing to undue haste and want of experience.

(c) Very much more care should be taken in judging the effect of fire, in most instances this can be better done by a signaller with a field glass than by the competitor, and apart from its necessity for required alterations in elevation and deflection, should be invariably practiced as being an absolute necessity on service.

As a first attempt at a general meeting of Field Battery detachments, the competition may be considered as entirely satisfactory, and reflects much credit upon the Execut Major Lindsay doubtless be turn

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upon the Executive Staff, which was furnished by "A" Battery, R. S. A., with Major Lindsay as Camp Qr.-Master, and the experience gained by all will doubtless be turned to practical advantage in future meetings.

4. In this connection the Committee strongly recommend that steps should be taken to improve the present Service Sights, which are manifestly too rough and coarse to do full justice to the shooting powers of the gun.

DRILL AND DRIVING COMPETITIONS.

5. This competition for Gzowski cup and cash prizes shows a decided improvement, the winning Battery this year performing their drill in the average time of 2 min. $34\frac{1}{8}$ sec. as compared with 2 min. 46 sec. the time made by last year's winners. As the competition is a fair test of drill, driving and horses, its continuance in its present form is considered very advisable.

GARRISON ARTILLERY PRACTICE.

6. The practice at local head-quarters was confined to two Batteries each of the Halifax and New Brunswick Brigades, the Cobourg Battery with S. B. guns and the Batteries of the British Columbia Brigade. It was hoped that the latter could have practised under similar conditions to the former, but as they were obliged to fire at a range of about 1350 yds. the other Batteries firing at a range of from 1750 to 1800 yds., the Committee decided that they could not comply with the rules of the competition and their prizes have consequently been awarded at the rate of ten dollars per Battery.

7. The competition at the Island of Orleans was conducted on the same principles as during the former year. It was attended by 31 officers and representatives from 21 Batteries. Owing to an insufficiency of 40-pr. ammunition only 8 rounds from this gun were fired by four competitors in each detachment, the same number firing 4 common shell and t Shrapnel each from the 64-pr. The size of the targets was reduced from 8 feet square to that of an ordinary puncheon, and in consequence they were much more easily replaced when damaged, and the practice was not delayed to any appreciable extent. In a few cases it was noticed that competitors with defective eyesight had been selected as marksmen, and more care in this respect in future is strongly recommended.

The arrangements for camping, subsistence and transport were very satis. factorily carried out by Major Lindsay, Camp Quarter-master, and much of the success of the meeting is undoubtedly due to the able manner in which the necessary details of the management were performed by the working staff detailed from "B" Battery, R.S.A.

SHIFTING ORDNANCE COMPETITION.

8. This competition was well and closely contested by detachments from the Halifax, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Brigades. The members of all these showed evidence of careful training, and the simple operations elsewhere described, were very correctly performed in the manner prescribed by the Hand-book of Artillery Drills. It was subsequently decided by the Committee that the second prizes in A and B competitions should be awarded.

9. The Committee desire to suggest that special Range Reports for batteries practising at sea ranges be prepared, and that the present rules for practice may be revised with the alterations rendered necessary by recent regulations inserted.

to Instructional Target. These were recommended for supply to each battery by the Executive Committee in its last report, but a motion was subsequently carried at the general meeting that the Government should be asked to supply them—and this Committee are not aware of any subsequent action having been taken. In view of the very trifling cost of these targets if made locally, and the expense which would necessarily be incurred by their transport from any one locality to all batteries, the Committee suggest that the actual cost of manufacture be allowed to each Brigade or Battery making use of such targets.

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Secretary's Report.

To the Council D. A. A.

I have the honor to present herewith my Annual Report as Secretary-Treasurer for the year 1889—being the fourteenth of the Association—in which the details of the several competitions will be found under their respective heads.

I have much pleasure in reporting an increase of five in the list of affiliations during the year as compared with 1888 and of six over the total for 1887. The affiliations for 1889 have only been exceeded once since the formation of the Association, *i.e.* in 1886 when the total was 51. The average total for 10 years, 1880 to 1889 inclusive, is 42'4, so that this year's total is 7'6 above the average. On the whole I believe 1889 to be the most successful year in the annals of the Association. The number of Annual Subscribers is 53, against 19 for 1888.

The affiliations represent a force of about 3000 officers and men—every one of whom took part, more or less, in the several competitions, which were of a purely technical nature, and carried out under the supervision of the Inspector and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery.

Special donations were received from His a cellency the Governor General, two silver cups for general efficiency; from the Hamilton Powder Co., through the President, T. C. Brainerd, Esq., one hundred dollars; twenty dollars from Major Seeley, N. B. Bde., G.A., as life member's subscription; sixteen copies of the Manual of Field Artillery from the Secretary.—It was found impossible to procure the Garrison Artillery Manuals as promised, the work being out of print. The President of Council, Lt.-Colonel Turnbull, has signified his intention of presenting a Silver Challenge Shield for competition, and the Hon. H. Mercier, Premier of the Quebec Government, has offered a valuable prize for Garrison Artillery competition.

The cups presented by the citizens of Quebec and Montreal for competition with the 64 and 40-pr. guns, respectively, have both become the property of the No. 3 Battery, Halifax Brigade, Garrison Artillery, that Battery having won them twice in three successive competitions as required by the conditions under which they were presented.

The scores of the several Batteries have this year been given in full, with a view of making the Report serve as a Battery record—it is hoped that it will meet with the approval of all concerned.

The Treasurer's statement of receipts and expenditure will be found at the end of the Report. The total receipts to date have been 3,436 of which the sum of 300 was for affiliations, 136 for members' fees and 100 special donation. There is a sum of 76 still outstanding, being the affiliation fees of five Field and one Garrison Battery, the Royal Military College and "A" Battery, R.S.A., together with the fee of the Ontario Artillery Association. There were in all 7 Field Batteries to be paid for, but two commanding officers remitted the fees under protest when the matter was explained to them. As I shall have to lay this whole matter before you at the next meeting of Council it will be unnecessary to enter into details here.

In addition to the expenditure given in the detailed statement the sum of \$1,397.61, charged to allowance for annual drill, was expended under the authority of the Inspector of Artillery in carrying out the details of the Field Artillery practice.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting and meetings of Council are published at pages 12 and 16 of this Report.

I regret to have to record the death, (accidentally), during the year, of an officer who took an active interest in the affairs of the Association. I allude to the death of Major C. J. Short, R.C.A., an officer well known to every member of the Association, and deservedly regretted by all.

Team Roster.

FIELD ARTILLERY.

The following instructions are published for the guidance of Officers comdg. Batteries of Field Artillery.

I. -- AMMUNITION.

Batteries which perform their Annual Drill in Camps, in the vicinity of which an Artillery Range can be obtained, will bring into camp properly packed in the limbers, the following detail of ammunition, to be taken from their reserve, viz :—

A strap 3/4 in. wide with buckle may be used, if preferred, instead of the curb-chain.

The side rein will not be required for the off leader when ridden by No. 7, and the latter will use the bearing rein to assist in guiding the horse.

4.—CAMPING.

When the circumstances of the case will permit, all batteries will encamp as detailed in Manual for 'Full interval,' with the exception that the guns will be parked at half interval, and unless it is absolutely necessary that the horse lines should be within the camp, the tents will be aligned on the flank guns, 24 yards apart, and an interval of 15 yards maintained between adjacent corps.

When it is necessary that the horses should be attached to a picket rope, the latter should be securely made fast not less than 2' 6'' from the ground.

Batteries should in all cases bring their picket ropes to camp.

5.— Officers commanding Batteries, are to bring to camp their Artillery Store Ledgers, Service Rolls and Clothing distribution lists. Credits for Discipline, Camping, &c., will be affected by the manner in which these are kept, and the preceding instructions observed.

ANNUAL GUN PRACTICE, 1889.

FIELD BATTERIES.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. In accordance with G. O. (9) 17-5-'89, the following instructions are issued for the annual Gun Practice of the Field Batteries in the Dominion :---

2. Batteries which perform their drill in camp, in the vicinity of which a land or water range can be obtained, will, this year, carry out the following instructional practice.

Range finding by sub-divisions.—The entire battery will parade in drill order, march to the practice ground, and come into action under service conditions.

The target will consist of a barrel or cask, moored or placed at any distance between 1500 and 2500 yards—no banrols will be used. The range party will not signal any of the shells, but will keep a record of the estimated distance from the target at which each shell strikes the plane, or bursts.

Two marksmen will be selected from each sub-division, and the guns will each be laid under the supervision of one of the battery officers.

The following process will then be adopted by each sub-division acting independently so far as regards the elevation, deflection, and subsequent corrections; no communication being allowed between sub-divisions: —

(a). The gun will be laid (common shell, percussion fuze,) by the first No. 1, at the elevation proper for the range as estimated by him, according as the shell is short or over, the second round will be laid with an elevation corresponding to 100 to 300 yards, over or under, with the object of making certain that the shell shall fall on the opposite side of the target to that on which the first shell fell—when the target has been included between two shells the long "bracket" is found.

(b). To find the short "bracket."—The third round will be laid with the elevation corresponding to the mean between the two ranges which make up the long bracket. If this be short, or over, the fourth round will be laid with the elevation corresponding to the mean between the third round and the second, or first, and if the shell fall on the opposite side of the target to that on which the third shell fell—the short "bracket," viz., that between the third and fourth shell, will have been found, and the correct range will be within these distances.

The fifth and sixth rounds will be fired at the mean of the short bracket, with the object of verifying the range.

(c). The first three rounds will be laid by the first selected No. 1, the next three by the second No. 1. The former will prepare his own fuze and lay the seventh round (Shrapnel shell), and the latter the eighth round (Shrapnel shell). Points for direction will be given by the officer superintending the practice, who will also direct the order of fire; at the conclusion of the practice the points for elevation obtained by each sub-division will be obtained from the distances recorded by the range party, according to the usual scale, and the total number of points obtained by each sub-division duly recorded.

(d). The only competition sanctioned in the above practice, will be between sub-divisions. Each battery will have a separate target, and no two batteries will practice together.

(e). The officer commanding artillery in camp will make the necessary arrangements for providing targets and for range duties.

4. The number of rounds to be expended are as detailed in G.O.(9),17-5-'89.

The range will be not less than 1800 yards. Rules for practice as published by Inspector of Artillery. The result of the trial shots and of the Shrapnel shell only will be signalled by the range party.

The officers instructional practice will be carried out before the competition firing.

5. Tents and blankets will be provided on the practice ground, and arrangements made for subsisting the detachments in camp. Further information as to dates of meeting and assembly of detachments, etc., will be published subsequently.

6. Officers commanding batteries which practice elsewhere than at Kingston, will make the necessary requisitions for ammunition, according to the scale authorized in G. O. (9), without delay. Practice in all cases will be conducted according to the above regulations.

CIRCULAR.

I. ANNUAL GUN PRACTICE.—The following addition will be made to the Rules for practice :—

On Land Ranges, when the circumstances of the case will permit, or when two or more Batteries are practising together, telephones may be used for signallin, purposes.

When the signalling is by flags, as already described, and if considered necessary by the umpire, a white flag may be hoisted at the Battery when Shrapnel shell are to be fired; if any doubt should arise as to the signalled value of a blind Shrapnel, a white flag is to be hoisted at the Battery, and a repetition of the previous signal called for.

Batteries unable to send detachments to the General Competitive Meetings at Kingston and Quebec, and which perform their annual gun practice elsewhere, will be unable to count their scores for aggregate or individual prizes, or for the efficiency competition, unless such scores are certified to by an umpire and range officer unconnected with the Battery, and appointed by the Inspector or Assistant Inspector of Artillery.

2. GENERAL EFFICIENCY COMPETITION.—In order to more nearly equalise the credits awarded for theoretical and practical subjects in Garrison Batteries, the values of answers to questions will be reduced from 30 and 48, to 24 and 36 respectively.

A reduction of one point from the general total gained by any Battery, will be made for each N. C. officer or gunner below the establishment authorized for drill, whose absence at inspection is not satisfactorily accounted for under exceptional conditions.

The percentage of the highest possible score made by each Field Battery, will in future be counted for general efficiency, instead of one-fifth the score made.

STANDING ORDERS FOR ARTILLERY CAMPS.

1889.

I. On arrival at camp the officer in command of detachments will report to the Camp Adjutant, who will detail the tents, stores, &c., to be taken over by the detachments. The general distribution will be two officers to a tent; non-com. officers and gunners, seven or eight to a tent; field officers, a tent each. An officers' mess will be established in camp, and rations and cooking arrangements provided for the N. C. officers and gunners. Each man is required to bring with him one tin plate, one cup or canteen, and knife, fork and spoon.

2. All officers and men forming the camp will be liable for any duty that may be required. When detachments are paraded all officers not detailed for special duty will parade and march with their detachments to practice or drill, as the case may be. One officer at least must be present with his detachment during practice.

3. The senior non-com. officer or gunner of each tent will be held responsible for the quietness and order of the men under his charge, and for their being present in the tent at roll call. He will also be responsible for the general cleanliness of his tent, and will see that the palliasses are properly rolled and appointments securely placed.

4. Officers in charge of detachments will be responsible to the Camp Quarter-Master for the tents and stores issued to them. Should any of these stores be damaged or missing the regulation price for such damage or loss will be charged to the officer in command.

5. No non-com. officers or gunners are allowed to leave the camp lines unless properly dressed to go out. Officers and men desiring to sleep out of camp must obtain leave of absence.

The competitions were carried out under Rules for Practice and Rules for Marking issued by the Inspector of Artillery. Large barrels were substituted for the ordinary $8' \times 6'$ targets, in accordance with a recommendation made by the last Executive Committee.

Rules for Practice.

I. Competitions limited to number of N. C. officers and men as directed in General Orders.

2. At the discretion of the Officer superintending the practice, two trial shots, common shell with percussion fuze, or solid shot, may be allowed at the commencement of each Battery competition, or when two or more Batteries are firing together, or when target has been moved to a different locality during a competition.—Trial shots to be laid by the Umpire, on the target, without any deflection and the results signalled.

3. Before commencing, guns to be in action, time fuzes not bored, percussion fuzes may be screwed in, detachment in post at the guns or under cover.

4. Each competitor to prepare and fix his own time fuzes, and to lay his gun without verbal assistance except from the officer in command, who may advise the competitor as to length of fuze, elevation, deflection, &c., but who must not look over or correct the laying of the gun.

5. Lots to be drawn for the order of competitive firing, and not divulged until the competitor is called out by the Umpire.

6. The Range Officer is alone responsible for points given for elevation. No appeal.

7. The danger flag will be *hoisted* and "cease firing" sounded by the Range Officer when it is necessary to visit the target. When these signals are *repeated* from the Battery and the firing flag lowered, he can visit the target, lowering the danger flag and sounding "commence firing" when he has returned to a place of safety.

8. The Officer in charge of the marking at the Battery is alone responsible for points given for direction. No appeal.

9. On all other matters the decision of the Officer superintending the practice is final. No appeal.

10. Each competitor may be told the points given for direction and may also select one of his Battery to judge the effects of his that and inform him of it, but such assistant must not take up any position in front of that occupied by the guns.

FOR GZOWSKI CUP.

Circular, 25th April, 1889.

To be competed for on parade during annual drill by the four sub-divisions of the Battery. The prizes to be awarded to the Batteries performing the conditions in the shortest average time.

CONDITIONS :

Nine-pounder gun and limber, four horses. Four detachments each, to consist of 1 N.-C. Officer (mounted) 6 Gunners, 2 Drivers. Field day order.

Detachment to be in order of march. No. 1 and Drivers—stand to their horses. 1. Gunners and Drivers prepare to mount. Mount.

2. Forward at a trot. March. Left incline. Left-shoulders. Forward. Left-shoulders. Forward. Left incline. Halt.

The gun to be taken round two pickets, each 30 yards from the leaders, and 30 yards apart, and back again to original ground,

3. Action-Front,

4. Load with drill cartridge and fire one round with friction tube.

5. Cease firing. Rear limber up.

6. Gunners prepare to mount. Mount.

7. Forward at a trot. March. Gun to be taken straight through two pickets, 3 feet high, 40 yards distant, and 6 feet 8 inches apart—as soon as 15 yards clear then :—

8. Halt. Action rear.

9. Load with a second drill cartridge and fire one round.

10. Front limber up. Form the order of march. Halt.

Cartridges to be taken separately from the limber box by No. 7. Ammunition not to be carried.

For striking any of the pickets, 5 seconds to be added to the total time.

For any faults or mistakes in drill as judged by Umpire-5 seconds to be added for each.

Umpire's decision to be final, No appeal.

Shifting Ordnance Competition.

ISLAND OF ORLEANS, QUEBEC.

There will be Two Competitions (A) and (B).

COMPETITION A.—Conditions. Open to one officer or N.C. officer as No. 1, and 18 N.C. officers or gunners, selected from competing detachments of brigades. Independent batteries wishing to enter for this competition, will be required to include their firing detachment in that for shifting ordnance—but no camp allowance can be paid for other than the firing detachments.

Rules :—A 32-pr. S.B. gun to be dismounted down the rear on watered skids clear of the platform, taken round a post 30 feet in rear of the platform, and mounted on the carriage by parbuckling up the side ; the gun carriage is not to be moved after the gun is dismounted until the latter is mounted again, and then gun and carriage to be left in line of fire, stores clear of platform.

Mounting and dismounting to be in accordance with Drill Manual and stores as therein detailed for both operations.

From two to five seconds may be added to the time at the discretion of the umpire, for each mistake at drill or other irregularity.

Umpire's decision to be final.

Prizes will be awarded to the detachments performing the operations in the shortest total time.

COMPETITION R.—Go as you please. The details of this shift will be made known on the ground.

The President presented the Annual Report for the year 1889.

1. It was moved by Major STEWART, comdg. Ottawa Fd. By., seconded by Major Drennan, comdg. Kingston Field Battery, "That the Report for 1889 as printed and distributed be received and taken as read."—Carried.

2. Moved by Lt.-Col. TURNBULL, comdg. Montreal Bde., G.A., seconded by Lt.-Col. A. A. Stevenson, comdg. Montreal Field Battery, "That the thanks of the Association be tendered His Excellency the Governor General for his attendance at this meeting, for the continued interest he has shown in the Association, and for the valuable prizes he has donated for general efficiency."— Carried unanimously.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

The GOVERNOR-GENERAL, in reply, said that he was himself an eye-witness last year of some part of the work of the association. So far as he could give an opinion, the work done was extremely satisfactory, and the gun detachments he saw were smart, active, and intelligent. He hoped that the Minister of Defence, who was not present, would forgive him when he said that the only deficiency he observed was that the men had not better guns to work with. After alluding to the importance of better ordnance, he said he did not think it was expected that in a comparatively poor country they should be always endeavouring to get the latest improvements in guns, but he ventured to indicate last year the means by which the Dominion might meet the present difficulty without incurring more expense for the purchase of guns. He was sure that if the Imperial authorities were approached the guns which were mounted for Imperial defence at Halifax could be utilized. He thought the general officer would cooperate to enable gun detachments to obtain the best means of instruction with the most improved ordnance on the northern continent. He had been told that to a certain extent this mode of instruction had already been adopted. He had only to hope that this association would not relax any of its efforts in aid of artillery science. He was sure that an association such as this, representing the feeling of artillery officers in all parts of the Dominion, was able to do very much good in the permanent defence of the country. He hoped the authorities would give due consideration to representations proceeding from this organization, and that in time to come as in the past they would receive from the Government that assistance which they had a right to look for. 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It was then moved by Lt.-Col. A. H. MACDONALD, Q.C., comdg. 1st Bde. Field Artillery, seconded by Lt.-Col. D. T. IRWIN, Inspector of Artillery, "That the Report be adopted and the accounts as audited be passed."

The mover and seconder spoke at length in explanation of the report as to the carrying out of competitions, etc.

Lieut. L. H. IRVING moved in amendment, seconded by Major KING, comdg. Welland Canal Field Battery, "That as no Drill and Driving Competition had been settled upon by the Executive Committee, 1889, that prizes be awarded to the batteries performing this shift during 1889 upon the conditions laid down for this competition by the Executive Committee 1887." It was explained by Lt.-Colonel IRWIN that a circular stating conditions for this competition was printed and forwarded for the information of all concerned on the 30th April, 1889; this circular was based on the decision of Council subsequent to last annual meeting that no change from the conditions of 1888 was desired. The amendment on being put to the vote was lost.

It was again put in amendment by the same mover and seconder, "That as no shifting ordnance had been settled upon by the Executive Committee 1889, that prizes be awarded to the batteries performing this shift in 1889 upon the conditions laid down for this competition by the Executive Committee 1888." Explanations having been given by the Inspector of Artillery, this amendment was also negatived without division.

The original motion (No. 3) was then put and carried on division.

4. Moved by Lt.-Colonel A. A. STEVENSON, comdg. Montreal Fd. Battery, seconded by Major DRENNAN, and carried, "That the thanks of the Association are due and hereby tendered to the Hon. Sir ADOLPHE P. CARON, K.C.M.G., Minister of Militia, and to Parliament for the continued assistance given to the Association during the year 1889.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

5. Lt.-Col. MACDONALD moved, seconded by Lt.-Col. STEVENSON, "That General Sir FRED. MIDDLETON, C.B., K.C.M.G., Commanding the Militia, be elected President of the Association."-Carried unanimously.

Lt.-Colonel MACDONALD then vacated the chair, which was taken by the President elect, who thanked the members for the honor conferred.

6. Moved by Lt.-Colonel TURNBULL, seconded by Lt.-Col. IRWIN, "That the thanks of the Association are due to Lt.-Colonel MACDONALD, the retiring President, for the very able and efficient manner in which he had carried out his duties as President of the Association."—Carried unanimously.

Lt.-Col. MACDONALD made a suitable reply.

7. It was moved by Lt.-Col. MACDONALD, and seconded, "That the thanks of the Association are due and hereby tendered to Lt.-Col. MACPHERSON, Director of Stores, and to F. E. KNIGHT, Esquire, the Auditors for the past year, and that they be re-elected.—Carried.

8. Captain DONALDSON moved, seconded by Lt.-Col. IRWIN, "That the thanks of the Association are due and hereby tendered to the General Passenger Agents of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways for their kindness in granting to members attending this meeting the privilege of travelling over their respective lines at a single fare for the double journey.—Carried.

9. It was moved by Lt. Col. STEVENSON, seconded and carried, "That the thanks of the Association are due to Capt. DONALDSON for the manner in which he has performed the duties of Secretary, and that he be voted the sum of three hundred dollars as salary for the year 1890."

10. Lt.-Col. TURNBULL moved, and Lt.-Col. MACDONALD seconded, "That the report of the Council dated 5th February inst., be received and adopted."—Carried.

II. It was moved by Capt. DONALDSON in accordance with notice of motion, seconded by Major DRENNAN, "That the following be substituted for Rules 20, 21, 22 and 23 :---

" 20.—Whenever an Artillery Association is formed for any of the Provinces of the Dominion, the Secretary shall be required to furnish such information from the records in his charge as may be required for the issue of Provincial prizes."

Lieut. IRVING raised a point of order as to the validity of the notice of motion, it not having been published in the *Militia Gazette* in accordance with Rule 24.

The Secretary stated that every member had received individual notice on the 30th December, 1889, by circular, and that he did not consider Rule 24 other than permissive and providing a means of covering the difficulty in the event of the 21 days' notice not having been given.

The Chairman ruled that the notice of motion given was sufficient.

Lieut. IRVING then moved in amendment that the motion of which he had given notice be adopted, as it provided for this amongst other matters.

The amendment was ruled out of order, it not being an amendment to the motion under consideration.

The original motion (11) was then put and carried.

Capt. DONALDSON requested that the necessary alteration be made in Rule 6 (last sentence) and Rule 24 to prevent them conflicting as to time.

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"That Rule 24 be cancelled and the following added to Rule 6 :-- "And "that the notice be also published in two issues of the *Canadian Militia Gazette* prior to the Annual Meeting of this Association by the Secretary or other person authorised to act on his behalf—so long as such paper is published."—Carried.

13. It was moved by Lt.-Colonel MACDONALD in accordance with notice of motion, seconded by Lt.-Col. TURNEULL, "That Rule 4 be amended by striking out the word "others" in line 2 and substituting the following therefor : "Officers on the active or retired list." Lieut. IRVING moved an amendment which was subsequently withdrawn and the motion carried.

14. It was moved by Lt.-Col. STEVENSON, seconded by Lt.-Col. TURNBULL, "That the Government be requested to supply each battery—field and garrison —in the Dominion with a Morris tube."—Carried.

There being no further business before the meeting, His Excellency suggested that the thanks of the meeting be tendered the President, Sir FRED. MIDDLETON, for the very able manner in which he had conducted the business of the meeting whilst in the chair. The motion carried by acclamation, the members rising.

The meeting then adjourned.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF COUNCIL HELD IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE AD-JOURNMENT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

Lt.-Colonel TURNBULL, President of Council, occupied the chair.

1. Election of officers resulted as follows :--President-Lt.-Colonel T. TURNBULL, re-elected. Vice Presidents-Lt.-Colonel PETERS. Lt.-Colonel MOORE.

Major MEAD. Major LINDSAY. Ex.-Committee—Lt.-Colonel Armstrong. Major Stewart. Secretary-Treasurer—Captain Donaldson. 2. It was moved by Lt.-Colonel MACDONALD, seconded by Lt.-Colonel IRWIN, "That the Association procure and distribute copies of the Royal Artillery Manuals, Field and Garrison, at the rate of 4 copies of the former for each field, and 3 of the latter for each garrison battery.—Carried.

3. It was moved, seconded and agreed to, "That the establishment of competitions and preparation of prize list be left to the Executive Committee."

4. It was moved by Major VAN WAGNER, seconded by Major KING, "That this Council is not in favor of presenting prizes for voluntary drills."— Motion was lost.

5. Major KING moved, seconded by Major VAN WAGNER, "That competitors chosen from batteries for annual gun practice must have attended the last annual drill of their batteries."

Moved by Lt.-Col. MACDONALD, seconded by Captain DONALDSON, "That the following be added to the motion—' but any N. C. officer or man absent from annual drill by reason of his having been selected as a member of a team sent to Shoeburyness or Wimbledon may be selected as a competitor though absent from such annual drill with leave.'"—Lost, main motion carried.

It was generally expressed as an opinion that for instructional purposes the result of fire of shrapnel shell should be signalled for the information of competitors. The Inspector of Artillery pointed out that this rule had been laid down for last year, and he would remember it when drawing out the rules for this year's practice.
