WEATHER AND WORK.

A remarkable series of experiments has recently been conducted in a London county council school with the object of ascertaining the conditions under which scholars can work best. In the school in question a system of ventilation was adopted so that the temperature could be regulated and kept at anything between 50 degrees and 80 degrees. Twenty-two observations, were made, and during that time there were only two wet days. When the conditions were "Mild; fine drizzle," good work was done by the scholars, the subjects being algebra and arithmetic. When it was "drizzling; no cold," the work was well done at first, but subsequently was marked by deterioration. Good work was done on fine days, but with curious exceptions. Thus, when "sunshiny and fresh," the work was well done but "lazy at end." On a "windy and bracing" day, the work was "slack," and the scholars were "loiling about." On "foggy days" the results have been "good work," but when snow was on the ground the work exhibited "slackness and want of concentration." The results of the experiments are thus summarized:—Temperatures above 65 degrees give rise to definite subjective symptoms—slackness and inattention in some, headaches in others.
