SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

NEWFOUNDLAND CONFERENCE

OF THE

Rethodist Church of Canada,

PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE NEWFOUNDLAND CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

Dearly Beloved Brethren :--Of the many duties connected with our ministerial work, we deem this of addressing you in our capacity as the United Pastorate of the Methodist Church in this Island, to be one of special importance and peculiar pleasure.

Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

Great is our gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the many tokens of His favour which He has been pleased to show us during the past ecclesiastical year. Some of our circuits have been favoured with gracious outpourings of the Holy Spirit; others have not been so abundantly blessed, nevertheless all have enjoyed evident manifestations of the Divine presence and power. As a Conference, we have ample proof that God is in the midst of His people. He is verily in the assembly of His saints. We are sorry to state that for the want of sufficient funds we cannot occupy some of the places that are open to us for immediate operation.

The calls from several parts for ministerial help and pastoral oversight are very pressing. We sincerely hope that means will soon be placed within our reach to enable us to fill those places now vacant. Amid our solicitude for the interest of the Church, in the expansion and consolidation of the cause of God among us, we rejoice to mark evidences of progressive piety in the lives of many of our members of society who are not ashamed to acknowledge Christ before men, and by exemplary conduct to advocate His religion in the world. The sittings and deliberations of Conference have been seasons of grace. The brethren have not failed to exhibit in their intercourse with each other the Spirit of their Master. Great unanimity and brotherly love have characterized our actions. It has been truly seen, "How good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." Every member of our Conference has manifested an earnest desire for the prosperity of Zion, and each has resolved anew through grace to labour with quickened zeal and increased vigour for God. As those who are specially called to watch over souls, and who are conscious that at the last day, we shall have to give an account of our stewardship, we affectionately exhort you to be faithful to your vows and to walk worthy of your high calling, as true disciples of the Saviour. Do not forget the responsibilities you assumed when you became members of the Church of Christ. As Methodists, you are called upon, in an open and decisive manner, to acknowledge Christ. You are, therefore, to take up your cross daily and confess His name, to follow him through evil and good report. This cannot be accomplished independently of Divine help. Strive therefore to obtain that assistance which God will give unto all who believe in Him. Be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus the Lord. Obtain that faith which will give you the victory over the world. Aim at holiness of heart. Pray for inward purity. Zealously conform to the doctrines and precepts of Holy Scripture, "Present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Thus shall your lives exhibit to the world a scene of entire devotion to the service of the Saviour, and men will glorify God in you. Continue with the heat to believe unto righteousness, and with the mouth make confession unto God. And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith'virtue, and to virtue, knowledge, and to knowledge, temperance, and to temperance, patience, and to patience, godliness, and to godliness, brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness, charity. For these things &c.-1 Peter, 1, 5-10.

We wish you to manifest in your Christian life, your sympathy with our Rules and Discipline, your practical approval of our doctrine and Church Polity; and to identify yourselves with us in all our endeavours to spread Scriptural holiness over the land. We therefore urge upon you the necessity of the faithful and constant discharge of your various duties in connection with your Church membership and profession of godliness. Be attentive, dear Brethren, to the means of grace. Cultivate a love for closet prayer and devotion. In private communion with the Holy Trinity pour out your petitions to the Almighty, and dwell in the secret place of the Most High. The spiritual strength, moral courage, Christian prudence, and sanctified thought and affections derived from this source will qualify you for every duty, secular or sacred, which you are daily called to perform. Remember also the family altar. We fear lest this duty of paramount importance to the religious training of our families, should be by any either entirely neglected, or conducted in an irregular and indifferent manner, rendering its designs and lessons in a great degree abortive.

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Too much care and discretion cannot be exercised in the proper discharge of this pleasing service, incumbent on all parents and heads of families. You are to be examples of holiness to your children and all under your care. Notwithstanding all the facilities of the present ages for the mental and moral culture of the rising generation, you have still your duty in this respect to perform. You cannot delegate your position with its weighty and solemn responsibilities to another. You are to nurse your children for the Lord, to train them in the way they should go. It is said that Go I knew Abraham; that he would command his children and his household after him, to keep the way of the Lord to do justice and judgment. Did. God know the Patriarch? So he knows all; and will, at least, reward or punish according to the merit or demerit of our case. With all due admiration for parents who do their utmost to prepare their children for honorable positions in this life; we lament to see in any instance the absence of a religious training, and a neglect to educate their children in those principles which shall qualify them for a higher, holier, and everlasting life.

Be punctual in your attendance on the Class Meeting. We regard this inscitution as one of the tests of our membership and of our fidelity to religion.

The advantages derived from this blessed means of grace are invaluable. Beware of the objections some endeavor to raise against attendance on this means. Do not forget that God's people in all ages have manifested a desire for sanctified fellowship with Him and communion one with another. This is evident from the Apostle's words as given in the First Epistle General of John, 1., 6, 7. Under trials peculiar to the times in which they lived, and circumstances in which they were found, they were strengthened to endure all things by the means of holy conversation and prayer. In the days of Malachi, "Those that feared the Lord spake often one to another, and the Lord hearkened and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord and thought upon His name." The author of the Epistle to the Hebrews says: "And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works, not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more as ye see the day approaching." We thus claim Scriptural sanction for this observance, and are confident that the holy in heart among us who walk in the light of God's countenance will deem it a great privilege to enjoy sanctified intercourse with God's people during life's pilgrimage. They will regard it as truly " The communion of Saints ; " and an exemplifica. tion of that holy interchange, the life of the redeemed in heaven. To

neglect it is a sign of religious declension, and an evidence of the waning influence and power of godliness in the heart. It verily showeth that piety has lost its lustre and is fading away:

Show also your attachment to the prayer-meeting: This has often proved a blessing to the unwary, as well as to the thoughtful and devout worshipper. At gatherings for public prayer many backsliders have been reclaimed, and strangers to religion brought to God. Here also young disciples have first essayed their gifts who have afterwards become prominent members of the Church. This religious service has brought a large revenue of grace and gifts to those who have exercised themselves in the performance of its privileges.

Need we remind you also of your duty as professing Christians to delight yourselves in the public service of the Sanctuary. We beseech you, dear Brethren, to be regular in your attendance on the ministry of God's Word. May you and your house in this respect serve God. Do not tarry away from the congregation of the Lord because others may vainly imagine that God may be worshipped as well at home in isolation and retirement from His people. This cannot be. Reason and religion stand opposed to this vain conceit.

The institution by God of the Sabbath and of Divine Worshir under the different dispensations revealed to us in the Bible is a sufficient authority for our observance of Public Worship. Invalids and sick persons may be justly excused, but for those who are able to attend to raise a plea for their absence is a sad proof of religious indifference and of a want of reverence and delight for the house of prayer. Such conduct merits just censure and pious reprehension. It is at once averse and repugnant to feelings of godliness and religious sentiment. The devout worshipper of God, like David of old, will love the place where the Divine honour dwelleth. He will rejoice to dwell in the house of the Lord, and to behold the beauty of his temple. May you say, "How amiable are thy tabernacles O Lord of Hosts," or in the words of the Poet :—

> "How lovely are thy tents, O Lord! Where'er thou choosest to record Thy name, or place thy house of prayer."

Do not neglect, when opportunities present themselves, to surround the table of the Lord. Meditate on the Saviour's words spoken to His disciples when He solemnly instituted this Divine Ordinance as recorded by the Evangelist: Matthew, Chap. xxvi., 26-28. May you then in obedience to the command of Christ, and also apostolical injunction, "Do this in remembrance" of Him, by which you will show forth His death till he come. The Church has always acknowledged the reality of this Holy

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Sacrament by which we emblematically partake of the broken Body and shed Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ; and feed by faith on Him the true manna and the Bread of Life which came down from heaven.

" O let us on thy goodness feed, And eat thy flesh and drink thy blood."

We wish you also in offering your children to God in the Sacrament of Baptism to present them to Him in His temple in the presence, and with the prayers, of the congregation. In doing this, you will follow the example of the parents of Samuel, and to those to whose care was committed the keeping of the holy child Jesus. Hereby you will publicly confess your faith in the Triune God and receive the blessing promised in His Word to those who keep His commandments.

We desire also to call your serious attention to the sanctity of the Sabbath, and the duties imposed on us by Divine authority in connection with the keeping of this Holy Day. God's ancient people were exhorted by the Prophet Isaiah to abstain from doing their own work and speaking their own words on the Sabbath. Our obligation to keep it holy is clearly taught us by the Apostle, who duly observed it as a day specially hallowed of God. To violate the sanctity of this day is a sure precursor of sorrow; while to keep it holy will bring to us the peace and blessing of God. Let us not forget the Divine precept, "Keep holy the Sabbath Day":—

" This day let our devotions rise To heaven, a grateful sacrifice."

In conformity to the rules of our Church we call your attention to the efforts which are put forth by Christian Philanthropists of the present day to abolish the use and sale of intoxicating liquors. The prevalence of intemperance and its consequent evils are truly appalling. We wish you therefore as those whose acknowledged principles are in sympathy with every good institution to co-operate zealously with those societies which have been organized for the suppression of this monster vice; endeavour by every means in your power to prevent the introduction of those deathproducing articles, to put a bar on this unrighteous traffic, which, though the sanction of the civil law is nevertheless condemned by a higher authority, even Divine Law. Those poisonous drinks which become so effective in the demoralization and ruin of millions who partake of them are pronounced by the first medical authorities of the day to be injurious in a high degree to the human system. Truly, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived thereby is not

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We wish to caution our youth against the use of corrupt and frivolous books unhappily too prevalent in this day. Great care should be exercised in the selection of what they read. Much of the present literature is exciting a baneful influence on society, and is, we fear, leading many away from the paths of virtue and piety. Nor is it safe to follow a great deal of the so-called theological and religious publications of the age. Some of these we regret to think have a tendency to divert the mind from the fundamental principles of truth as established in the Bible. Beware of the insidious influences which may imperceptibly draw you into the mists and mazes of scepticism and infidelity. To counteract these pernicious and deadly effects we advise you to make yourselves acquainted with our standard theology, and that class of literature which may be had at our Bookroom.

Again we ask you, dear young people, to be careful in yoar choice of companions. Do not forget that "evil communications corrupt good manners." "My son," says Solomon, "if sinners entice thee, consent thou not." "Abstain from all appearance of evil." To those of you who are striving to serve the Lord we would specially call attention to our Rules, and in particular to that part which forbids "the taking such diversions as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus." Zealously cultivate every virtue, and aim always to have a conscience void of offence to God and man. Guard against latitudinarianism in religion in every form and phase in which it may present itself to your minds. Let its infallible truths and precepts lead you in the way of righteousness and peace. It is designed to be a lamp unto your feet, and a light unto your path. While you thus walk, your path will be one of pleasantness and peace, like that of the just which shineth more and more unto the perfect day.

We sometimes fear that many amongst us do not consider the value of education as they should. Ignorance in many cases becomes the fruitful source of crime and corruption of morals. Education will greatly assist in preventing many evils into which the uneducated are liable to fall⁻ It has an elevating influence, and when based upon the principles of morality and religion will not fail to become a mighty power for good. We affectionately call your attention to the great facilities now placed within your reach for the secular and religious training of our youth. Throughout the bounds of our Conference our schools have greatly improved during the last three years. The teachers now employed are of a superior class and higher grade than formerly and as the result of this the tuition given is of an advanced character. This, as we presume you know, is principally owing to the able and indefatigable labors of the Rev. G. S. Milligan, M.A.,

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whose devotion to the cause of education calls forth our confidence and praise. We are glad to state that in some of these schools a classical and mathematical training is imparted to the pupils. Our Training School in St. John's, conducted on the model plan, is efficiently managed. Our Academy, long known to our influential people as our principal Institution in this country, continues to keep up its prestige and power. The various branches of learning there taught are sufficient to qualify our youth for any office they may be called to occupy in this life, whether in connection with science, commerce, politics, or any other important position. We hope the day is not far distant, when in Newfoundland we shall have in addition to the Institution herein mentioned, a department for the special training of our ministerial candidates in the character of a Theological Hall.

With much pleasure we are able to remark favorably on the state of our Sabbath Schools. Our superintendents and teachers are generally selected from the ranks of our most intelligent and pious people. The children under their care and tuition enjoy many privileges unknown to former times. We would remark here, that while our Day Schools are for the special secular training of the young, and are indirectly assisting in the work of the Sabbath Schools: so the great benefit of the Sabbath School is seen in improving the minds both of the educated and of those of little mental culture with the principles of Biblical truth and an earnest and practical faith. It exerts an influence for good in many ways,— by acting as a barrier against evil, a safeguard against error, and a guarantee for future usefulness in the church and the world.

At our Conference five young men, who, having travelled the usual time of probation in our ministry, have by the imposition of hands, and prayers been set apart for the full and important duties of their high and holy vocation. In doing this we have not forgotten the words of the Apostle : "Lay hands suddenly on no man." According to the discipline of our Church they have been duly proposed and recommended by a Quarterly Meeting and passed through the searching examinations to which all our candidates are submitted before ordination. We rejoice to bear witness to their piety and zeal, and believe that they are called of God to the great work to which the voice of the Church has appointed them.

We are glad to state that our ministerial ranks have not been broken by death during the past year. Some of the Brethren have been laid aside from the work at intervals by afflictions and extreme physical weakness, owing in a great measure to their abundant labors. One of our Beloved Brethren becomes a supernumerary this year, whose precarious state of

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health almost forbids our hope of his recovery. We sincerely pray that the Great Head of the Church may vouchsafe to him in his long and trying affliction the richest consolations of Divine grace and meeten him for the inheritance of the saints in light.

In conclusion, dear Brethren, we beg to say there are other points of vital importance affecting your religious progress and which we have not named. We, as your ministers, sometimes feel a great degree of diffidence in being compelled to solicit from any of our people those dues and fees which are by right of labour and Divine Precept lawfully our own. If you study the laws and ceremonies affecting the constitution and authority both of the Jewish and Christian Church as taught in the Old and New Testament Scriptures, you will at once see that it was a duty imposed on the people by Divine legislation to bring their accustomed offerings into God's House, and there present them before the Lord in the presence of His ministers who were authorized and commanded to receive the same. Furthermore we observe when they neglected to perform these duties, as directed, they were charged by the Prophet Malachi with the sin of robbing God. They were expressly commanded by him to bring their tithes into the storehouse by which they would prove the Lord of Hosts who would pour upon them his blessings in abundance. This duty is also taught in the New Testament by Christ and his Apostles and forms a very important part in the policy of the Christian Church. The Apostles as recorded in the Acts devised means whereby the ministers might be relieved of the burden of attending to the secular or financial business of the Church by the appointment of persons whose special business was to attend to the temporal matters caused by the various contingencies incidental to the growth and expansion of the Church. Christ himself evidently manifested an interest in the revenue of the church by his action in sitting over against the treasury, and his remarks on those persons who cast in their gifts. And the Apostle St. Paul commands the Christians of his day to lay by them in store on the first day of the week as God had prospered them. He also commends the zeal of some for supplying the wants of those of other churches or communities of the church. He expressly taught that those who preach the Gospel must live by the Gospel; I. Cor., IX., 14. We are sorry to state that many of the Brethren have suffered a great deal of loss, and endured painful feelings owing to the small sums they have received on their circuits and stations. It is to be hoped, that as a general rule, our people will give these things their prayerful attention and timely consideration, and that the principle now practised in our independent circuits when the

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Stewards and others in office collect the minister's stipend will be adopted and zealously worked in every circuit. Finally, Dear Brethren, be watchful, be prayerful, that at last you may be found without spot and blameless, and be accounted worthy to walk with Christ in white. "Now, the God ofpeace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work, to do His will, working in you that which is well pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. AMEN."

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6.—That the thanks of this Conference are hereby tendered to the friends of St. John's for their great kindness in entertaining the Ministers during the time of their attendance at Conference, and that this resolution be read from the pulpits next Sabbath.

7.—The Conference desires to express its high appreciation of the invaluable services of the Rev. G. S. Milligan, M. A., Superintendent of the Methodist Day Schools, and to assure him of its hearty sympathy with him in the great work of Education in which he is engaged.

8.—This Conference desires to convey its cordial thanks to the Rev. A. W. Nichelson for the faithful discharge of his onerous duties as Editor and Book-Steward, and wishes him much future success in the work of the regular Ministry, or any other sphere of labour to which he may be called in connection with the Church.

9.—That a hearty renewal of thanks be tendered to the Rev. J. S. Peach for his very kind and efficient service in the Financial Department of our Conference during another year.

10.—That in the judgment of this Conference, the action of the last General Conference, in making it possible for a Minister to return to a Circuit after three years' absence is injurious to our Itinerancy, and begs the reconsideration of the subject and its alteration to an absence of six years.

11.—This Conference has pleasure in tendering its thanks to the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., for his valuable services as Treasurer of the Supernumerary Ministers and Ministers' Widows' Fund.

12.—The Conference expresses its hearty thanks to Joseph Lawrence, Esq., of East Keswick, Yorkshire, England, for the deep interest he has taken and continues to manifest in the welfare of the work of God in this Colony.

13.—This Conference desires to express its regret at the action of the General Conference in employing a Book Stew-

ard and Editor at Halifax, and hopes that steps will be taken as soon as practicable to return to the former practice of uniting the two offices in one person.

THANKSGIVING FUND.

The Conference resolved,—That a public meeting be held on all our Circuits and Missions to present the claims of the Thanksgiving Fund to our people, and that a collection be made at that time for this Fund: that all moneys be sent to the Rev. J. S. Peach, Treasurer, to be remitted by him to the General Treasurers of the Thanksgiving Fund.

(2) That three-fourths of the money obtained for the Thanksgiving Fund be remitted to the General Treasurers for the extinction of the debt, and the other one-fourth be retained for our Parsonage Aid Fund.

COLPORTAGE REPORT.

During last summer and autumn our Conference Colporteur visited Notre Dame, Bonavista and Trinity Bays, and disposed of a large number of religious and Standard works, besides preaching and holding other religious services in various places visited. SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

Another year has rolled its round and we gladly greet you at this Anniversary Meeting. Sabbath School work has taken such a position, and has been followed by such results, as warrant it in claiming the earnest and careful attention, of the Ministry and the Church. We rejoice in the possession of a faith, that while it furnished a depth which the sounding line of an archangel cannot fathom, it has a shore round which the children may gather knowledge which saves for ever.

At the head of all religious teachers we find the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, who, while he taught a Nicodemus, also said, "Suffer little children to come unto me:" and did take them in his arms and lay His hands upon them. Imitating his example, and following his command, "Feed my Lambs," Christian workers have been found toiling in this part of the Lords' vineyard through the year. We are more than ever persuaded that the brightest intellects and best energies of the Church of God should be given to this work.

The returns for this year in connection with our Sabbath School work in this Conference, bring to us a showing which proves unabated zeal in this work. The schedules shew an increase of 15 schools with 84 additional teachers and 441 scholars.

We observe with sorrow that the number of conversions this year is only 192 as against 445 last year; that the number meeting in class is 716 against 824 last year. This falling off may be partly accounted for by the fact that many of the children have to leave the schools during the summer, and are in their circumstances exposed to temptations and difficulties many and severe. Six hundred and seven volumes have been added to the libraries, while there is an increase of 150 Sabbath School papers.

For Missions there is the gratifying sum of \$748 66, being an increase of \$164 86, and for school purposes \$552 89, being and increase of \$27 68; and for general Sabbath School purposes \$66 81, an increase of \$5 14 upon the year.

Your Committee, remembering the many influences at work, first to decoy, and then to destroy, the young; and fully persuaded that the young are the hope of the church and the world, would earnestly commend to all Christian workers

most remunerative field of toil.

Your Committee would also suggest that as we have now 822 teachers, having the oversight and tuition of 6,783 scholars, that at no distant day a Sabbath School Convention be held to bring these workers together, that the best means for carrying on of this work be divided, and as far as our circumstances will permit, secure uniform successful action, in rendering our Sabbath Schools a greater power for good.
