



Advice of Government Expert To Brampton Women - Canning

(Toronto Globe.)

Brampton's women, who, incidentally, send 800 and sometimes more, pairs of socks to the trenches every month, gathered over a hundred strong in the Armories there yesterday, and listened for three hours to Mrs. Woelard of the Department of Agriculture, speaking on the best way to can fruits and vegetables. Mrs. Woelard is a home-made cook, who credits her mother with instilling the credits her mother with instilling the ideas of food economy which she now gives out so clearly in every centre to which the Women's Institutes call her. Perfect cleanliness and sterilization are her watchwords. "Never use a dishcloth for anything, not even to wipe the table, when you are canning fruit," she says; and goes on to explain all about the germs which gather under the rubber rings which are thrown into their bottles when the latter are put away

"You may not see those spores," says Mrs. Woelard, "but they'll be there, and if you don't get them they'll get you, or, rather, your fruit or vegetables, and both will spoil, and you'll wonder why." So she insists that jars must be put into cold water, which is to be brought to the boil and boiled three minutes; and she boil, and boiled three minutes; and she further says that the "intermittent me-thod" is the only truly safe one for the sterilizing of vegetables and fruits after they are put in the jars.

The Intermittent Method.

Beans, spinach, carrots and peas, for example, are blanched, that is, boiling water is to be poured over them, and they are to be left to stand for five minutes. This will remove the slightly acrid taste that may belong to them. They are then plunged into cold water, and from that drained, and packed into sterfrom that drained, and packed into ster-ilized jars. Beans may be cut up, but Mrs. Woelard favors placing them in the jars lengthwise, as "they look better," she says. The gems are then to be placed on a rack in a boiler of water, with the covers only partly screwed on (or ex-pansion may break the glass), and boiled for twenty minutes. Take out, screw tops lightly, and set to cool for a day. Half unscrew the next day, boil twenty minutes more take out screw tightly. By this means the spores which have not been killed by the first or second boiling will be finished off, and the vegetable or fruit will be completely sterilized and will be sure to keep.

THE HARDWARE MARKET

(Hardware and Metal, July 21.) Numerous important changes have again been effected in hardware prices during the last week. From western Canada the number of changes has been unusually large. While the west has been somewhat slower than the east in following the trend of the primary markets, the number of changes during the last week or two gives evidence that that section is reaching the high levels warranted by the costs of raw materiols. There is an interesting situation developing in the iron and steel industry in the United States which may have a far-reaching effect. At one time it was thought probable the United States government would take over the steel and iron plants of the country. At a meeting in Washington recently it was decided that they should be continued under private ownership, but that the government would take their product at a price to be established after an investigation had been made as to costs. vestigation had been made as to costs. It is understood the price is to provide for a fair margin of profit. The point of interest which vitally affects the hardware trade is the fact that it may be stipulated that the mills shall charge the same price for their products to the domestic consumers as that charged to

the government.

Light and heavy tee and strap hinges, together with hinge hasps and staples have been moved to higher levels. Wrought butts, machinists' hammers, coil chain, black sheets, vises, grinders, steel and wood tackle blocks, hack saw blades, glass boards are among the lines that have been advanced in price. Linseed oil is in firm market. Thrpen-tine is inclined to lower prices, but with the prospect of export developing from the producing centres of the south there is a possibility that prices may be firmer. Window glass has been ad-vanced by the changing of discounts. Business in hardware lines is keeping

GROCERY PRICES.

The following comment on the mar-The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appeared in Canadian Grocer last week:

Two important lines in which advances have been recorded during the week are salt and baking powder. Certain lines of soaps have also been increased in price to the retail trade. Cornflakes have been advanced from the leaves quotetions, and there are indicalower quotations, and there are indica-tions that higher prices may come quite generally. Corn is now a scarce article, as millers who have been endeavoring to buy in the United States for the ma facture of cornmeal and other products find there is none for sale at present. They say if there are still supplies in the United States they are being held out of the market. One milling concern is out of the market entirely on yellow comment for the reason that corn has cornmeal for the reason that corn has not been available. Prices on corn products, such as corn flour and hominy have been moved to higher levels in conformity with the situation in corn. Rolled oats are in firm market, due to the scarcity of the grain for milling pur-

Cooked meats are quoted higher now that the summer demand has set in heavier. There has been a good demand for barrel port by the lumber companies of the maritime provinces, as they are getting ready for operations in the woods next winter. One large Ontario umber company has also been in the narket for this class of meat. Lard and market for this class of meat. Lard and compound are in easier tone, due to the light demand during the summer months. There is a desire to stir up business and prices are shaded when any business looms up as a possibility. Butter is in easier tone, although prices have not receded. Eggs are higher in price, due

to lighter receipts.

Flour held in steady market with a better demand developing. Sugar refiners were still in a divided market, some holding at the advance recorded last week, while one refiner continued to quote at previous prices. Consumption of sugar has not yet started to be heavy. Cloves have been advanced quite generally. Cheaper stocks of coriander seed are on the way and if the ships are not intercepted by submarines lower prices can be expected in this commodity. Some of the first raspberries of the season reached the market during the week. Strawberries are dearer, as the week. the zenith of production is thought to have passed. Business in grocery lines continued quiet.

Davies Company and the Mathews Blackwell Company and will endeavor to ascertain net profits with a view to establishing whether or not prices for food commodities charged to the Canadian consumer have been unreasonable. The commission is clothed with all necessary powers of exemptation of the companies books. of examination of the companies books, and may examine under oath any neces-

and may examine under oath any necessary witnesses.

The chairman of the commission is G.

F. Henderson, K. C., of Ottawa. He is one of the best known lawyers of the capital, has had considerable judicial experience as a drainage referee for the province. Associated with him are A. B.

Brodie of the firm of Price, Waterhouse & Company, chartered accountants of Montreal, and Geoffrey Clarkson, of Toronto, one of the leading chartered accountants of Canada. All three members of the commission have offered to serve without compensation, but they will be allowed to engage a staff of accountants in order to carry on a full and accurate investigation. It is expected that a full month or so will be required before the commission will be in a position to make report to the government.




