ALARM IN FRANCE, FLOODS ARE FEARED, CROPS GOING BAD

Paris, July 8.—Continuous cold and wet weather is beginning to cause serious alarm. There has been daily rain for six weeks and the precipitation since January 1 has already exceeded the average annual rainfall. A recurrence of floods is threatened. The grape crop is suffering heavily and mildew has made its appearance in the champagne district. The hay crop is almost destroyed. Meteorologists attribute the rainfall to continuous hot westerly winds from America, which also bring moisture in crossing the gulf stream that is precipitated as soon as it comes in contact with the cold land of the continent.

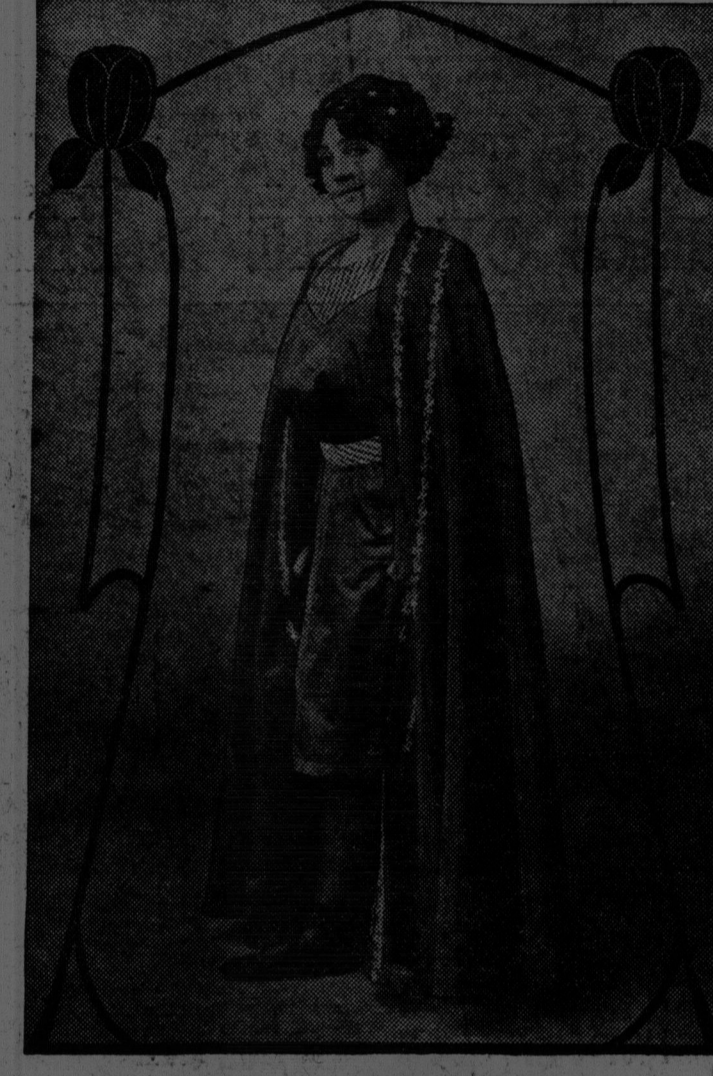
