OTTAWA, Oct. 30-Premier King definitely denied this afternoon rumors that he had decided to place his resignation in the hands of the Governor-General.

"When all the returns are in, I intend to discuss the situation with the Governor-General and I shall then make a statement of my intentions," he said.

Beyond that the premier declined to go further.

Should he retain the premiership, a series of by-elections would be necessary to repair the damage of his cabinet. Three of the ministers defeated yesterday-Hons. But the remainder, not counting the Premier who is also head of the Department of External Affairs, held between them the portfolio of Immigration, Secretary of State, Labor and Railways. Appointees to these portfolios, including the Premier himself, would all need to be either elected or re-elected.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30—A Hondurian debt floated 50 years ago in Great Britain which was originally 25,000,000, but with compound interest amounts to nearly £30,000,000, was settled yesterdal through an engagement signed at the British Consul. Honduras agreed to pay a total of £1,250,000 in semi-annual installments without interest over a period of 30 years. The money is to be provided by a three per cent. tax on all Honduran consular invoices.



LONDON, Oct. 30.—What is apparently an official bid from the Liberals for co-operation between the Liberal and Labor parties was launched last evening at a Liberal meeting under the chairmanship of the Earl of Oxford and Asquith, the party leader.

The speaker was Prof. Gilbert

The speaker was Prof. Gilbert Murray, who claimed close affinity between the Liberals and Laborites and said the Socialistic tenets of the Laborites troubled him very little, because state action was bound to increase with the development of society.

If the expulsion of the Communists from the Labor party, so forcibly pronounced by Ramsay MacDonald at the recent Liverpool congress, was successful, the natural consequence, Prof. Murray believed, would be a gradual rapprochement between Labor and Liberalism.

He suggested, as the best plan, a Liberal Government with a Labor wing, and, as second best, a Labor Lord Asquith cordially endorsed the nt with a Liberal wing.

It is recalled that the Laborites up to the present have emphatically udiated any idea of co-operating with the Liberals.

One or two large consumers of iron in the east have covered for considerable tononages, and, it is reported, were able to obtain concessions on current quotations. The Toronto quotation as yet shows no variation from the \$25.35 price.

METAL MARKETS FIRM.

METAL MARKETS FIRM.

A stronger demand for scrap iron resale account has stimulated trading among dealers. During the last greater volume of scrap changed hands than in any corresponding period in the last six months. The ingot nonferrous metal markets continue firm, with unchanged prices, but new high levels in tin und zinc before the end of the year rould not be surprising. Galvanized sheets are down 50 cents a hundred pounds at toronto.

September production of pig-Iron was 34,609 long tons, or 31 per cent. over the production in August. Sharp declines were noted in the foundry and malleable trades, but this loss was more than offset by the increased tonnage of basic iron made for the further use of the producing firms.

Exports of pulp and paper for the month of September were higher in value than those of the preceding month and of the corresponding month of last year. The combined total amounted to \$13,636,003, being an increase of \$1,055,396 over the preceding month, and an increase of \$2,029,510 over September, 1924.

BIG NEWSPRINT EXPORTS.

BIG NEWSPRINT EXPORTS. The total for the last month was the second highest for any month this year, having been exceeded only in March, and the increase over the corresponding month of list year was a new record for 1925. Newsprint exports alone amounted to 116,277 tons, valued at \$8,190,000, compared with 101,813 tons in the corresponding nonth of last year.

While bank clearings for the week ended Oct. 22, were lower in Torinto and Winnipeg, those in Montreal and several other important centres were higher. The Montreal clearings showed an increase of \$11,000,000 over the corresponding period of last year.

Toronto clearings showed a decrease of \$4,000,000 while Winnipeg reported a decline of \$6,000,000. Ottawa, Hamilton, Halifax, Saint John and London, all showed increases.





work done by the state and various fish and game clubs this summer in stocking the brooks and streams flowing into Stillwater Reservoir with brook trout, according to the statement of E. S. Cullings, secretary of the Black River regulating board, says The Watertown, N. Y., Times.

"The great blue heron is destroying countless numbers of the small trout which have been placed in the streams this summer," said Mr. Cullings. "I don't know where all of the birds have come from, but there are hundreds of them flocking to the vicinity. We did not stock the trout streams to feed the herons. These birds are also destroying great numbers of big frogs which abound along the shores of the reservoir and along the shores of the reservoir and along the shores of the reservoir and along the frogs are very large and plentiful this year, or were until they attracted the herons.

"In the spring 18,000 trout fry were placed in the streams. In July the Lowville Fish and Game Club placed \$,000 fingerlings in the streams and one month ago the State Conservation Commission gave us 20,000 more fingerlings from the state hatchery at Old Forge. The herons are gobbling these up as fast as they can find them.

"Since their killing is prohibited by federal laws, I wrote to George A. Lawyer, who at the time was federal game protector connected with the States Biological Survey of the Department of Agriculture. I secured a written order from R. W. Dunlap, Acting Secretary of Agriculture, permitting the killing of great blue herons at Stillwater Reservoir at any and all times.
