Fourteen Bodies Are Taken From Ruins of Building in Germany

Pirmasens, Feb. 14—Fourteen badly mutilated bodies have been recovered from the ruins of the Bezirksamt, or Government building and two of the wounded died last night, bringing to 16 the total number of Separatists known to be dead in consequence of Tuesday's massacre.

Forty Separatists are known to have been inside the building at the time it was attacked. Seven of the remaining 24 are receiving hospital treatment, some being seriously wounded, but the others are unaccounted for.

SUCCUMBS Dies Few Hours After Suf-

fering a Stroke of Paralysis.

Found Unconscious on Jail Floor—His Condition is Critical.

Tragedy followed close upon the heels of tragedy at the St. John County Jail last night and this morning and within a few hours after one of the turnkeys had passed away following a paralytic stroke late last night, another was found stricken by a similar ailment on the floor of the jail office soon after eight o'clock this morning. Today Samuel Clifford who for more than forty years had filled the office of turnkey, lies dead at his home, 142 St. James street, and his associate, William J. Cunningham, on night duty at the jail, is in a critical condition at the home of his sister-in-law. with whom he resided, at 271 Charlotte street. Both men were pepular officials and the fact that both were stricken within a few nours of each other has brought depression and sorrow to their many friends and their fellow officials.

Both were apparently in their usual good health last evening. Mr. Clifford, who was on day duty with Frank Bowes, the third turnkey, left the jail about 5.30 for his home and Mr. Cunningham came on duty soon arter-wards, taking over from Mr. Bowes





FOOD COST.

There is no more important relation among the many conditions and items which make for a health, strong body than proper food and proper eating habits. When the right kinds of food are supplied to the body and digestive processes are normal in their functioning, all the various elements and chemical combinations which make up the body perform their activities naturally and the energy and strength necessary for robust health are produced.

But there is such a vast difference in the quality and quantity of food, according to the state of poverty or riches in which a family or individual is situated, that health is often a mere matter of money.

The average individual must take the proper amount of proteids, fats and carbohydrates as daily food in order to have a healthy growth and renewal. If excessive amounts of any of the three classes are taken, or if the amount of one is deficient, it will not be long before the health will be injured and bodily resistance lowered. But only a certain part of our vast population choose their food wisely or well. I am not so sure but that the poorer classes might be far healthier than their more fortunate brothers if the knowledge of how to purchase the right kind of food could be given them.





The non-metal group contributes 27 per cent. of the total value of minerals. Two-thirds of this is due to cement and other structural materials such as brick, lime, sand and gravel. After these, asbestos is the most important mineral, with a value of \$7,400,000. It is noteworthy that a record output of asbestos was attained in point of tonnage, though the value per ton was low. The competition of South Africa is felt most keenly in the longer and more expensive grades of fibre; and, besides this, the uses of the shorter grades are developing very rapidly. very rapidly.

Nickel Reaches Pre-war Output.

Gold leads the metals group, with \$24,882,000. This is slightly less than last year, due to power shortage in Northern Ontario last winter. The coming year will see this total increased substantially, due to the enlargement of old mills and the construction of new ones. Silver also has fallen off by one and one-half millions, being \$10,944,000 this year. The output in ounces is, however, slightly greater, due principally to the two important mines in South Lorrain.





The Quebec Government, it is announced, will propose a new plan for the taxation of motor vehicles at the present session of the Provincial Legislature. Hitherto, says the Toronto Mail and Empire, Quebec has imposed taxes upon automobiles in much the same manner as has Ontario. That is to say, the amount of the annual license fee payable by the owners of such machines has been in proportion to the horsepower of their engines. By that means a graded tax has been evolved.

The Quebec Government, however, contemplates the introduction of a graded tax based not on the power of the motor vehicle but upon its weight. In addition, the Government plans to levy a tax of two cents a gallon on greening.

In addition, the Government plans to levy a tax of two cents a gallon on gasoline.

More Equitable.

The idea of the ministry, its members state, is not to increase the motorists' burden of taxes, but to distribute it more equitably. It is pointed out that at the present time a light gas-driven motor car pays a larger tax, based on horsepower, than some heavy electric automobiles. Moreover, there is a difference due to the difference in power, in the fees paid upon gas-driven cars of different makes, but of practically equal weight. Finally, it is stated that the motorist who uses his car for only a portion of the year contributes as much to the provincial treasury as the man who drives it daily and nightly the year around.


The Quebec Government seeks to alter this condition of affairs and to establish a relationship betwen the taxes the motorist will pay and the wear and tear his machine will occasion on the roads of the province. It argues that a motor car will affect the roads in proportion to its weight, the speed at which it is driven and the distance it travels. The administration eliminates the speed factor from consideration because the law establishes speed limits. It proposes to deal with the weight factor in assessing annual license fees and the distance factor by the gasoline tax.

It asserts that by taxing cars at the rate of 70 or 80 cents per hundred pounds and gasoline at two cents a gallon, it will take from the automobile owners of the province approximately the same amount annually as at present. It may be observed also that under the scheme tourists from other provinces and frem the United States would also contribute through the gasoline tax to the provincial revenue. Their contribution, is is estimated, would amount to about \$100,000 a year.

The scheme would have a tendency to increase the use of light cars by the people of Quebec, just as heavy taxation based on the number and bore of engine cylinders has tended to popularize low powered cars in a number of countries. It also requires those who travel most on the highways to contribute most for their upkeep. Representatives of the Quebec Provincial Motor League and the Royal Automobile Club of Canada seem to have found no serious fault with the plan, provided it did not mean a general increase in automobile taxation and that satisfactory arrangements could be made for collection and administration of the gasouline tax. The idea will doubtless commend taself to owners of small cars and its operation will be watched with interest in Ontario.

WORDS A MINUTE

Magnetic Telegraphic Drum Recorder Invention Exhibited in London.

London, Feb. 14—Striking evidence of the advancement made in invention during 1928 is found in an exhibit of

of the advancement made in invention during 1928 is found in an exhibit of telegraphic and other instruments at the British Imperial College of Science and Technology. The most notable development is in telegraphy; delay in submarine cabling has been largely eliminated by utilizing the action of light on selenium, which responds so rapidly that the signal sent out is recorded even before the full current has passed over the wire.

A magnetic telegraphic drum recorded is shown, capable of speeding up messages to 1,000 words a minute. This is effected by the current of the incoming signal passing through collscontained in a rapidly revolving iron drum and turning it into a magnet for a brief space, thus attracting a slight piece of iron, shaped like a brake shoe. This operates a fine syphon tube charged with ink, causing it to record the signal on the paper tape as it flies past it.

Another exhibit is an "undulator," or an instrument used in high speed wireless telegraphy, capable of printing on an endless slip of paper up to 300 words a minute.

Another device which appealed both to laymen and professional is the complicated photographic apparatus for taking motion pictures at the rate of 5,000 a second.

These people are proud, and many of them would die rather than reveal their bad luck. They were celebrated by Scott in his great poem, "The Lord of the Isles," and by William Black in many of his charming novels. In short, the Islesmen are a gallant and romantic people, linked by blood with Norway on the eastern side of the North Sea, and with the Gaels of Scotland on the western side.

Roosevelt once made a remark that if he had his way he would import all of them to the United States in order to improve the American stock, and leave over there only enough to keep up the race.
