FIRST FRUITS OF PARLIAMENT ACT

Disestablishment of the Church

FIFTY YEARS OF EFFORT

Twenty Since First Bill Was Introduced in British Commons-Effects of the Bill, Now Law, Upon Church of England

London, June 8—By the passage of the bill to disestablish the Church of Engand in Wales the Liberals reaped the first fruits of the parliament act which they passed to limit the veto power of of the House of Lords.

It is forty years since the non-conformists of Wales commenced the movement to have the church disestablished so far as their principality is concerned and just under twenty years since a Liberal government introduced in the House of Commons the first bill to carry out the wishes of these non-conformists.

Like many Liberal measures since, this first disestablishment bill, passed by the House of Commons by a majority of forty-four in a House of 564, was thrown out by the House of Lords. Not until H. H. Asquith, who, as home secretary, introduced that first bill, became minister and undertook the huge task of curbing the power of the upper chamber, was there any hope of a bill to disestablish the church becoming a law, so strongly are the Lords on the side of the established church in all matters of the kind. Now, however, they have to bow to the inevitable. Under the parliament act, the bill having passed the House of Commons three times, becomes law no matter what the attitude the House of Lords takes.

Glasgow, June 6—The birthplace of Rob Roy, the celebrated Highland free-booter, the place where he died, and his grave have been saved by a decision of oly from Loch Voil and Loch Doine. CAMPAIGN TO SAVE HOUR OF DAYLIGHT

ed in reports to the International Congress of Chambers of Commerce here today.

William Willett of London reported a long list of organizations in England which have passed resolutions in favor of the bill for daylight saving. "That so many as 154 hours of daylight are, to all intents and purposes, wasted every year is a defect in our civilization," he asserted. "Standard time is so fixed that for nearly half the year the sun shines for several hours each day while we are asleep and it is rapidly nearing the horizon when we reach home after our work is over.

"By a simple expedient this may be overcome. If we will reduce the length of one Sunday in the spring by sixty minutes, of which no one would be conscious, we shall have sixty minutes more daylight after six o'clock on each succeeding day until autumn."

Dr. Von Bottinger, a member of the Prussian House of Lords, added a report on the subject, declaring that the daylight saving idea was regarded with great favor throughout Europe. Many German chambers of commerce were working in behalf of the reform.


