





NEW RECORD FOR LIQUOR SALE MADE

B. C. Profits, Steadily Growing, Reach \$1,634,601 in Six Months.

Victoria, B. C., June 19-Liquor profits carned through the sale of all kinds of liquor in government stores for the six months, from October 1, 1923, to March 31, 1924, amounted to \$1,634,601.70, constituting a record for any such period since the Liquor Control Act came into force in British Columbia.

According to the system of distributing the profits, one-half goes to the credit of the consolidated revenue fund, after \$81,730 has been deducted for the reserve fund. The Government, therefore, retains \$776,435, in addition to the reserve fund allowance, while the municipalities receive a like sum.

Of this amount \$543,505 goes directly to the municipalities on a per capita basis, while the remainder of half the profits, \$232,930, is paid to hospitals and

A noticeable feature of the minister's report is the steady increase in liquor profits during the last two years. From April 1, 1922, to September 30, 1922, the profits amounted to \$1,075,258. For the next six months' period the profits increased to \$1,250,195, the following six months showed a figure of \$1,402,499, and the last period \$1,634,601.

Animals, Birds and Fishes are Outdone by Modern Travelers.

Philadelphia, June 19—(United Press)
—Man is now the fastest thing on

within the last few years, after being hopelessly inferior in speed, since the beginning of time, to the birds, beasts and fish, man has, with the aid of his mechanical inventions, outstrip-

beasts and fish, man has, with the aid of his mechanical inventions, outstripped them all.

Wild ducks and geese are not able to exceed a mile a minute, and to snipe and golden plover are able to beat this speed only by about ten miles an hour. The fastest British aird, the peregrine, can attain a speed of 100 miles an hour. The spine-tailed swift, which breeds on the mountains of northern Asia, is the fastest bird in the world, being capable of a speed of about 200 miles an hour.

But even this terrific speed is a good deal less than that which is possible with the modern airplane. The present record is 266 miles an hour.

On land, man, with the aid of the motor car, is vastly superior of the four-legged beast. Tommy Milton, racing driver, is down on the records as having exceeded 180 miles an hour with a flying start. Compared with this, the cheetah, or hunting leopard of India. the fastest thing on legs, which has been timed for short distances to have reached 30 miles an hour, is a sluggard.



METZ HAS MODERN The CO JEAN VAL JEAN

Escaped Convict, After Years of Respectability, Returned to Prison.

Paris, June 19—Few of the many sad stories of the exploits of escaping French convicts are so pathetic as that of Jean Hateau, who got away from the penal settlement at Cayenne (Devil's Isle) in 1904, and who was recently rearrested at Metz. Hateau was abandoned by his mother a few days after his birth, and the Assistant Publique took charge of him. At eighteen he fell in love with a woman of questionable repute, and under her influence he became a thief. He was sent to prison. On his release Jean married this "femme fatale."

Later, for his sins, he was sent to join the Convict Legion in Africa; but he survived even that, and returned to France. His "femme fatale" planned further criminal coups and Hateau executed them. New convictions followed. In 1903, Hateau was sent to Cayenne as incorrigible. But soon Hateau and three other convicts escaped on a raft, which they built themselves.

Never Too Late to Mend.

Two died. Hateau and the fourth reached Dutch Guiana and Panama. There they made money. Hateau married a girl from Martinique in 1913. He pined for home, and was in Europe when the war broke out. He worked in a French shell factory till the war ended, and then went to Metz under an assumed name, opened a toy bazaar, and became rich and respected. At evenings he played cards in the cafes with the chief of police and other notables. Then a trivial charge against him led to his revealing to a magistrate the story of his life—and he was arrested as an escaped convict—and sent back to Devil's Isle.



GAELIC CENTRE IN **NEW YORK PLANNED**

Building Proposed For Artistic, Athletic and Social Activities in Metropolitan Area.

New York, June 19—A building which will be used as a centre for the artistic, athletic and social life of the Irish, Scotch and Welsh residents of the metropolitan area is to be erected here, and its chief features have already been agreed upon, according to an announcement by Frank Nally, secretary of the Celtic Fellowship, at ready been agreed upon, according to an announcement by Frank Nally, secretary of the Celtic Fellowship, at 44 Seventh avenue. Invitations have been issued to all of the Gaelic organizations in the city and suburbs to send representatives to a meeting on Sunday evening, June 29, at which plans for the centre will be discussed. The exact cost of the building has not yet been decided upon, but it will amount to several hundred thousand dollars. The physical department will include a gymnasium, handball courts, a natatorium with all modern accessories, a restaurant, reception, lounge and game rooms. The artistic division will have an art museum, studios, a large auditorium convertible into a ball-room, and a theatre. There also will be a library, a scientific museum and classrooms.

classrooms.

In addition, the building will have a large number of small clubrooms, which it is expected will be leased to many of the small and scattered clubs and Celtic societies at present occupants of unsatisfactory quarters in various sections of the city.

"The absence in New York City of a centre for Celtic art, athletics and social intercourse has been keenly felt by the Irish and other residents of Gaelic extraction," said Mr. Nally yesterday. "Dancing, music and sports, which form so large a part of the leisure life of the Celt, have hitherto been without a home built and adapted for their proper setting and enjoyment and for their best organization and growth.

Colonel Alexander Fraser's reference to the revival of Scottish sports in Toronto and the prominence which he gives to the ancient sport of archery recalls the fact that not only in Scotland, but also in England, extreme measures were for many centuries taken in order to ensure knowledge of this art so valuable in time of war, until the bow was finally replaced by more effective weapons.

Children, as well as adults, were forced to devote their time to archery. The articles of Harrow school, drawn up in 1592, tell parents that "You shall allow your child at all times bow shafts, bow strings and a bracer"—not, to be sure, in the modern sense. In the ancient city of Chester it was decreed that "all children of six years old and upwards on Sundays and holy days shall resort to their parish churches and there abide during the time of service, and in the afternoon all the said male children shall be exercised in shooting with bows and arrows for pins and points only." Archery was even commended from the pulpit. Latimer said: "It is a goodly art, a wholesome kind of exercise, and much commended as a physic."

It was early found that other sports were interfering with archery. This led, at various times, to the enactment of laws which put innocent games under the ban because they were held to detract from an art which was necessary to success in war. Edward III. directed in 1349:
