Concessions Fight New Trouble For The Near East Conference

CRITICS SAY DEMPSEY WILL DEFEAT FIRPO

Compare Champion and New Vanquisher of Willard

Lausanne, July 12.—The Near East peace conference is temporarily suspended over the fight on concessions, in which the U. S. is playing an important role through her desire to protect the principles of the open door and her protest against concession rights which are alleged to be monopolistic.

After the heavy fight in which Firpo knocked out Jess Willard last night, the fighters were interviewed by Firpo, who triumphed with the same seven and a fraction rounds. Willard is a fine man. I am proud to have defeated him," he said. "I told Willard that I am anxious to get in the ring with him. I believe I can beat him and that I will be a good fighter. He certainly gave me a good fight. Willard said, 'I don't want an all-out, as I was fairly beaten, but my left arm was so sprained in the training that I could scarcely use it at all. I had many openings for the face, but I could not jab hard enough to down him.' Willard said the blow that put him down for the final count was a hard right cross to the jaw, which had him groggy for several minutes after the fight was counted. Indeed, he appeared a little groggy thirty minutes after the fight as his trainers were patching him up at his dressing room.

Reparations Matter To Tribunal Said To Be Britain's Suggestion

Government's Draft in the Hands of Allies Early Next Week

Lloyd George Party Criticizes Baldwin Statement as Inadequate — French Editorial Opinion Moderate — See Door Still Open.

London, July 13.—The Government's draft of its reply to Germany on reparations, it was said last night, will be submitted to the Allies early next week, probably on Monday, and it is likely to give the British view favoring submission of the question of Germany's capacity to pay to an impartial tribunal, providing such tribunal can be formed of a sufficiently high standing to command confidence.

MEMORIAL AT MILLION COST

San Francisco Will Dedicate It When the U. S. Legion Meets.

San Francisco, July 13.—(Associated Press)—The California Palace of the Legion of Honor, now being constructed at a cost of \$1,000,000 on the crest of Lincoln Park overlooking the Golden Gate, will be formally dedicated in memory of the 3,269 California boys who made the supreme sacrifice on the battlefields of France in the World War during the national convention of the American Legion here October 15-19, according to an announcement by Adolph Spreckels, donor of the memorial.

The exhibition of the works of art donated by the French, Roumanian, Serbian and Polish Governments and other individuals, which will form a part of the permanent collection to be housed in the memorial building here, are being exhibited in the historic Legion of Honor building on the banks of the Seine, Paris, June 5-July 5, before their removal to San Francisco.

The memorial, donated under the patronage of President Harding, President Millerand of France, and other leading French and American citizens, is being given to the citizens of California, together with all its art treasures, by Mr. and Mrs. Spreckels.

In addition to being a memorial to the spirit of international friendship and good will, it is his aim, Mr. Spreckels said, to create a center of art, music, literature, politics, and an international forum for the dissemination of knowledge and the spreading of information on exact conditions among the nations bordering the Pacific Ocean.

STOCKING VARIOUS LAKES AND RIVERS

Ottawa, Ont., July 13.—(Canadian Press)—The department of marine and fisheries announces the distribution of 27,881,000 salmon-trout fry from its hatcheries in Ontario in the waters of the Great Lakes; also the distribution of 910,000 Atlantic salmon eggs into the eyed stage, and 132,882,000 Atlantic salmon fry in the more important salmon streams of the Maritime Provinces.

The total value of American exports to this country in 1922 was almost equal to that of the year before hostilities began in Europe, but less than one quarter of the total reached in the high tide year of 1920.

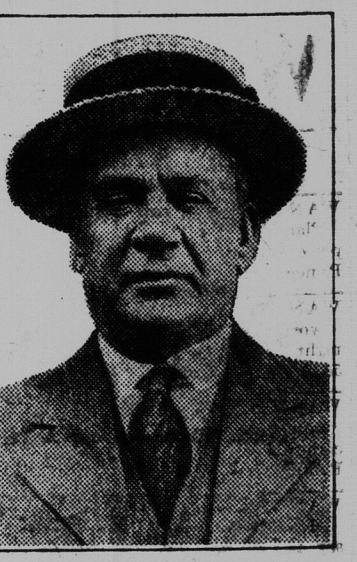

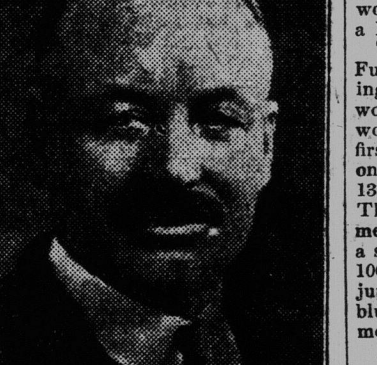

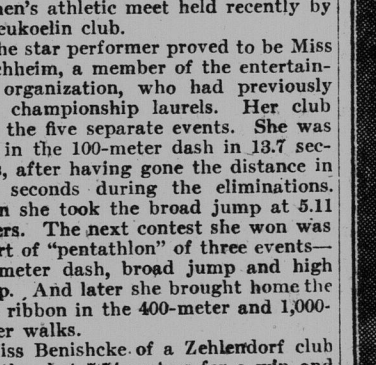

LOVE-SICK GYPSY YOUTH ADMITS ELOPEMENT

Tells How He and Leslie Tolman Left Home.

Frightened by Stories, He Decided to Send Girl Back —Says She Wanted to Stay With Him—Registered as Mrs. Stanley First Night at Hotel.

East Rindge, N. H., July 12.—In a little tent, pitched beside a rough mountain road, Boston reporters tonight found Valentine Stanley, a love-sick gypsy boy, and from him they wrung a confession of his attempted elopement with Leslie Tolman, 19-year-old daughter of Dr. Henry Tolman, Salem, Mass., physician.

For two years, the romance-craving girl and the gypsy lad have been lovers. Meeting surreptitiously whenever they could during the last two summers, they planned for themselves a life of roving. He taught her the gypsy language and it was he who showed her how to weave the little baskets she was selling at Duxbury, Friday, when she ran away.

Frightened, Send Girl Home.

Friday night, while state police were scouring the main roads of the commonwealth, Leslie was registered at the Black Rock House in Cohasset as Mrs. Stanley. Valentine stayed that night at the nearby camp. Saturday night they slept in a tent on the schoolhouse lawn at Komeverlie. Last night they camped here.

This morning the wanderers picked up a Boston newspaper, frightened by the seriousness of the situation as it was revealed to them, they decided to send the girl to her home. She wanted

to stay, but Stanley drove her to Fitchburg, where he left her, with instructions to find a rooming house and telephone for her father.

She was inquiring for a rooming house when she was recognized by Mrs. Katherine Lowe York of 1365 Main street, Fitchburg, whose efforts hastened the reunion of the girl and her parents.

Leslie told a tale of attempted elopement with a Jacob Bull when discovered. Little credence was placed in her story and there was to be no let-up in the search for the gypsies. They might still be in parts unknown had not reporters learned that there was a small camp 21 miles north of Fitchburg, just over the Massachusetts line.

At 10 o'clock they drove their automobile past the tent. It was guarded by a lone figure. For two hours the reporters lay in the brush, taking careful note of what happened at the camp. At midnight one of them stopped the automobile before it and asked for water for his radiator. The man inside replied that he had none, but that he would get some, and then the reporter asked if he were not Val Stanley.

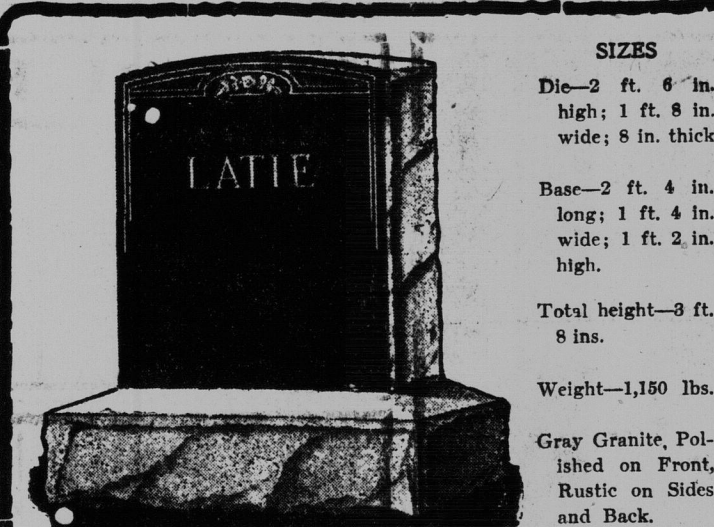
He replied that he was. His companion, he said, was Leon Leighton, a local farmhand, whom he had asked to stay all night, with him, as he was alone and afraid.

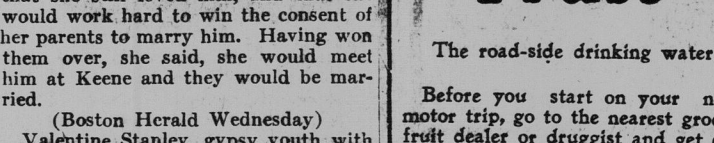

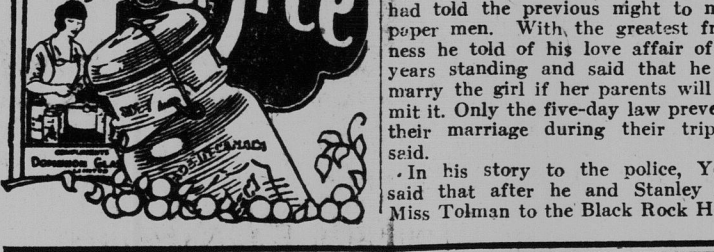

Meanwhile Tom Young telephoned from East Rindge to Cohasset. He asked Stanley's father, Jim Stanley, what he had better do. Jim told him that Tom Bates, the Cohasset police chief, wanted to see him. Tom, with his wife and babies started at once for Cohasset, where she stayed Friday night. "We went to our tribe" meaning that he and Stanley stayed in the gypsy camp that night. He said that they started out again about 11:30 am. Saturday, went to the Black Rock House and got the girl, and started on the trip that ended in Miss Tolman's being found in Fitchburg, and Stanley in Rindge.

Young said that he advised the girl to return home, and his urging became more emphatic when, on arriving in the summer camp at Rindge, he found that a hue and cry had been raised. "I told her," said Young, "that my family and I were going back to Cohasset, and that we would take her to Fitchburg if she would go. She went and I waited long enough to learn that she understood where and when the train went. Then I went on, reaching Cohasset late Monday night."

According to Stanley's story in the possession of Chief Pierce, the girl was registered at the Black Rock House as Mrs. Stanley. She left her grandmother's house about 9 p.m. and at 10 he went called on the chief, who, before 10:30 p.m. had telephoned to Plymouth, Providence, Taunton, Brockton, Rockland, Hingham, Setauate and Marshfield, spreading the alarm for the party through a circuit of towns about Duxbury. Had the gypsies attempted to leave the vicinity that night he thinks it likely that they would have been taken. Then Chief Pierce called on all the agencies available to assist in the search, including the Pinkerton Detective Agency, the state detectives and state police.

Dr. Tolman stated yesterday that his daughter had gone to stay with relatives at some distance from their home in Salem and that she would stay there until the excitement had died down. He expressed belief that she was not ill-treated in any way while with the gypsy party and that she went of her own accord. He felt that there were no grounds for prosecution.





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NEW MAGISTRATE ON BENCH TODAY

G. A. Henderson Sworn in by Chief Justice

S. E. Morrell Speaks for Bar—Reminiscences of Days of Former Magistrates in Pleasing Address of New Judge.

In the presence of a representative gathering of members of the bar and citizens generally, George A. Henderson, for many years clerk of the police court, was this morning sworn in by Chief Justice H. A. McKeown as Magistrate of the St. John Police Court and Judge of the St. John City Court. The congratulations of the St. John Law Society were presented by Scott E. Morrell, senior member present.

Promptly at ten o'clock Chief Justice McKeown produced a copy of the royal Gazette dated July 10 and read the notice of the appointment of Mr. Henderson in place of Hon. R. J. Ritchie, resigned. He then administered the oath of office in each case. The Bible upon which the new magistrate took the oath of office was presented to him by the New Brunswick Bible Society, Chief of Police J. J. Smith held the book during the administration of the oath.

At its conclusion Chief Justice McKeown shook hands with Mr. Henderson. He said the latter was following in the steps of a man who had been there a long time but the connection of the new incumbent with the court was even longer. He was certain that one with more knowledge of his work and more aptitude could have been found for the position. The city was to be congratulated upon obtaining a man of his experience, his justice and his knowledge. He expressed the wish that the new magistrate would long be spared to perform the duties of his important office.

S. E. Morrell said that as senior member of the St. John Law Society present it was his pleasant duty to extend congratulations to the new magistrate. With the knowledge of his work obtained through years of association with it he was certain that the administration of justice could not be in better hands.

His Reply.

Magistrate Henderson said that, being naturally a quiet and retiring disposition, he had tried to have the ceremony of being sworn in carried out down town in the judge's chambers but the Chief Justice had insisted that the ceremony take place in the police court and he had acceded to his request. He appreciated the interest and the kindness of the Chief Justice in coming to the police court to swear him in. He felt more than at any time he had been setting magistrate. In the latter cases he had merely been acting as clerk of the court. He had gained through years of intimacy with them. Magistrate Ritchie had then taken office and he appreciated the kind acts he had done for him.

TRACK INDIAN INTO WOODS AND ARREST HIM

Rothsey Constables Come Upon Louis Morris' Trail, Get Him Near Crystal Beach.

Something unusual in the way of police work was done yesterday by Provincial Constables Evans and George Burton of Rothsey, when they followed Louis Morris, an Indian wanted on suspicion of the theft of a boat and supplies from Dr. W. B. McVey on Saturday, into the woods for a mile and a half and arrested him there. They left Rothsey yesterday morning in Mr. Burton's motorboat to follow a clue sent on Wednesday from their boat to the Indian who had been seen. They went up the St. John River from the place where the Kennebec joins it and were passing Crystal Beach when they saw part of the missing boat, which had been pulled some distance out of the water and partially concealed. They tracked Morris into the woods and had some difficulty before they finally came in touch with him. The supplies and the boat were both damaged considerably. Constable Evans and Mr. Burton towed the boat back to Rothsey and then took Morris to Hampton where he was turned over to the authorities.

Noted Concert Stars On Vacation Here

Miss Louise Loring the Anglo-American concert star who is to sing for imperial patrons next week—once on the afternoon and twice at night—comes to this part of Canada just now in a spirit of vacation. In fact she is one of a party of performers who are to appear before the Vice-Legal party at a grand entertainment scheduled in connection with the Hector anniversary at Pictou where thousands of Scotch descendants will be present from all over the continent. The leading star upon this Nova Scotia occasion will be Marion Armstrong, neo-Scandinavian prima donna who has such an attraction in the United States and who resides in New York. Madame Nicholas, pianist, is also on the programme. Miss Loring, an English-born girl, comes east for the cooling trip. She passed through the city yesterday with her manager, Miss Betty Tilton, enroute to Pictou with Miss Armstrong and Madame Nicholas, just to greet Miss Armstrong's aged parents and offer her congratulations. She will return Saturday for rehearsals with the imperial orchestra. After the Pictou rendezvous the concert stars will enroute in the Maritimes until the hot season is over in the States. In the meantime St. John is fortunate in having the opportunity of hearing Miss Loring.

RELATIVE OF MONCTON MAN DEAD IN WEST

Moncton, N. B., July 13—Lloyd Cove of this city today received word of the sudden death of his brother-in-law, Captain Leroy Cummings, in Sacramento, Cal. He was in the Great War with the American Expeditionary Force. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Isabelle Cove of Amherst, N. B., and by one son, Stanley.

JUDGMENT IN STOCK ACTION

Chief Justice Rules Against Dr. F. H. Neve

Large Sum Involved—Judgment Carries Interest and Costs—Counsel Intimates Appeal—Ruling in Bankruptcy Procedure.

Judgment in favor of the plaintiff was given this morning by Chief Justice McKeown in the matter of F. B. Neve v. Dr. F. H. Neve, an action for recovery of more than \$30,000 alleged to be due in stock transactions. The judgment was verbal, but it is likely that a written judgment will be given later. The court found on all facts in the plaintiff's favor.

It decided that the manager of the company had acted upon instructions from the defendant in the matter and that the stock transactions were of such a nature as to make the defendant responsible. The Chief Justice did not have the exact amount involved in his finding before him this morning, but his verdict as for the full amount of the suit with interest and costs. The defendant is reported to be in the United States.

Hearing in connection with the matter of the injunction restraining the defendant's wife from disposing of property in her name alleged to have been purchased with his money will be heard later. F. H. Neve, of Toronto & Teed, appeared for the plaintiff, and for the defendant B. L. Gerow, who said he intended to appeal.

Bankruptcy Ruling

In bankruptcy this morning Chief Justice McKeown laid down the rule as to review of registrar's taxation of costs, deciding that the practice should be similar to that in vogue in the Supreme Court. The question arose through an appeal by B. L. Gerow against the costs in the estate of Morris Lambert, as taxed by the registrar, Francis Kerr. J. F. H. Teed appeared contra for the trustee. The court decided to grant the appeal or application, but decided that in future the review should first be taken before the registrar, and then if the parties were not satisfied they could come before the court. Ten days were given to either party from the date of the service of the order to apply for review. The question of particular interest to barristers in bankruptcy practice.

S. P. C. Case First To Be Held by The New Magistrate

The first case Police Magistrate Henderson was called upon to hear was one in which Edward Jarvis was charged today with beating a horse in a yard off City road and also with working a horse with a sore back. Police Constable Lindsay, who made the report, said that on Wednesday morning while sitting in the kitchen of his house he heard the noise of a whip and a boy shouting. He had gone to a window and had seen the accused through the window and try to put a saddle on the horse. The horse did not take to the animal again. The accused had told him that he could not harness the horse without beating it. There had been a large sore on the horse's back.

The boy pleaded guilty to beating the horse but said the horse had been given to him to work and he had nothing to do with the sore on his back. The horse belonged to a man named Healey. The case was postponed until tomorrow morning when the evidence of the horse will be in court with the boy. The horse will be examined by a veterinary in the meantime. J. King Kelley, K. C., appeared in the interests of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. S. M. Wetmore, secretary and Frank D. Thorne, assistant secretary, also were present.
