ITALIAN TENOR NOW BLIND.

Operation Fails to Restore Sight of Borgatti, Singer of Wagner Roles.

Milan, July 13.—Gluseppe Borgatti, the tenor, regarded as one of the best in Italy in Wagnerian roles, has become totally blind despite an operation which it had hoped would avert such a misfortune. The singer has accepted the inevitable bravely, even cheerfully, remarking:

"Fortunately I can still hear music and teach it."







The total area sown to wheat in Canada this year shows a decrease of 253, 393 acres as compared with 1922, the figures being 22,169,300 acres as against 22,422,693, as shown by the revised estimate of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The report is compiled on returns from crop correspondents as at the end of June.

The area sown to spring wheat is 21,283,800 acres, and to fall wheat 885,500 acres; oats 15,518,700 acres; barley 2,515,900 acres.

THE RHODESIAN **QUESTION SETTLED**

Terms Arranged by Colonial Office and the British South Africa Company. Am Beet Sugar

London, July 13.—(Canadian Press).

—It was announced yesterday that the long outstanding Rhodesian question has been settled as a result of negotiations by the colonial office with British South Africa Company. The agreement is subject to the endorsation of the shareholders, which provides that the Imperial Government/take over the administration of North Rhodesia from April 1, 1924. It will have entire control of the lands and will pay the company £750,000 on October 1, the date on which responsible Government is being established in South Rhodesia. The company also foregoes all right being established in South Rhodesia.

Says Drug Trade Passing in Prisons

Many Ingenious Methods of Smuggling Have- Been Discovered, Mainly by Women

Washington, July 12.—Ingenious plans by inmates of Federal penitentiaries to obtain cocaine, morphine and other drugs were revealed by Heber H. Votaw, Superintendent of Prisons, who said, however, that drug smuggling into the institutions had been cut to a minimum since his investigators began an intensive campaign more than gan an intensive campaign more than

a year ago. Even in a last kiss women some times passed narcotics to prisoners, he said. Handkerchiefs were soaked in "the stuff" and ironed and folded, to be sent to inmates who later chewed up the cloth. Babies in arms were at times made the innocent bearers of drugs hidden in their little dresses. To cope with the smuggling evil a strict guard is now being maintained in all Federal penal institutions, especially in the Atlanta penitentiary, where the traffic was found to be in a support of the s flourishing stage when the investiga-

"No prisoner is now permitted to enter a Federal penitentiary until he purchases a new pair of shoes from the officials," said Mr. Votaw, who added:

"It was discovered that many of the convicts when they arrived had secreted in the heels and soles of their shoes large quantities of drugs. Also narcotics were found in their clothing and occasionally secreted in their mouths. All letters are received by the prisoners subject to close examination, as it was found that under the fold of the envelopes frequently was a quan-

tity of cocaine.

"In a few institutions guards and 'trusties' were found to be in league with the prisoners regarding the drugs and in some instances these guilty individuals were discharged or arrested and indicted.
