#### PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN CANADA, WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE ONTARIO

ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Grace be unto you and peace from God, our Futher, and from the Lord

DEAR BRETHREN, -After another year of labor and conflict we have been permitted to assemble once more in our Annual Conference, in order to confer on those matters connected with the interests of our beloved Zion; and having accomplished the objects of our meeting, and being about to separate, in order to resume our labors in those portions of the field assigned us, we send you this, our Annual Pastoral Address.

The present session has been one of great harmony and love. It has been both pleasant and profitable to us thus to meet, exchange our cordial christian salutations, and renew our pledges of constancy and faithfulness in that holy work to which God in

his providence, and by his grace, has called us.

It is with unfeigned gratitude to God that we record his great mercy in preserving our lives through another year, and in crowning our unworthy labors with his blessing. In reviewing the labors and events of the year we find abundant cause for thanksgiving and praise to Him whose we are and whom we serve. "Our labor has not been in vain in the Lord." On many, perhaps most of the Circuits souls have been converted and added to the Church, while on some there have been gracious outpourings of the Holy

Spirit, and extensive revivals of religion.

The evidences of growth and improvement, which meet the eye in almost every direction, are of a truly encouraging nature. Our ministry is improving, both in numbers and efficiency; our borders are being enlarged, our membership increased, and our means and facilities for promoting the cause of Christ are becoming more adequate from year to year. Parsonages are being built on many of the Circuits, lessening the yearly expenses, and greatly administering to the convenience and comfort of the preachers and their families places of public worship-substantial edifices-are being erected all over the land, giving stability to the Church, and promise of extensive usefulness in the future. These evidences of your zeal and liberality are as grateful to us as their results will be conducive to the future presperity of our Zion.

But while we have these evidences of external prosperity let us not forget that our real strength consists in the depth of our piety, and in the holiness, both of heart and life, which we possess. To be a strong church we must be a holy church. Therefore we would enjoin it upon you, above all things else, to cultivate the

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"fruits of the Spirit, love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, &c," for after all, these constitute the true foundation of all that is really good and useful in the world.

There are several matters of importance to which we desiré more particularly to call your attention, among which we mention,—

1st. That of providing an adequate support for your ministers. Your interests, as well as theirs, are closely identified with this matter. Would you have an efficient, devoted ministry, the best way to secure it will be to place them above temporal want. If pressed with temporal embarrassment, if they are harrassed and borne down by worldly anxieties and cares, they will be greatly unfitted for their work, whereas if free, so as to give themselves wholly to the work, their "profiting" will more fully "appear to all." Your liberality, already displayed in this department of christian duty, is not forgotten or overlooked by us, and the manifest improvement which every year developes is a guarantee that, so far from becoming weary in this department of "well doing" you "will abound more and more therein." There is room for improvement; many of your ministers are but scantily supplied with the means of subsistence. Christ says "The laborer is worthy of his hire," and the apostle tells us that "the Lord has ordained that they that preach the gospel shall live of the gospel." We trust it will be an object of earnest solicitude with you to make your ministers and their families as comfortable as possible while they are laboring to promote your spiritual well being.

2nd. Our Mission Work .- We, as a church, are fully committed to this work, and cannot go back therefrom, even if we would; but we trust there is no disposition to relax our labors, or curtail our offerings in behalf of this cause. The Missionary department has grown into a magnitude little anticipated a few years ago. The field stretches from Lower Canada to Sandwich and thence to Georgian Bay, embracing all the newly settled country between. Our church membership, within these limits, is now numbered by thousands, while three or four times that number look to us to supply them with the means of grace, while new fields are constantly opening out before us. But our Treasury is in debt, while the self-sacrificing men who have devoted themselves to this work, are but in part paid for past services, so that we are not able to respond to all the calls that are made upon us. We therefore appeal to you for help. If possible let your liberality be increased. Must we recal our missionaries, or turn a deaf ear to the Macedonian cry, "Come over and help us;" or will you put forth a more earnest effort to replenish our exhausted treasury, and enable us to carry the brend of life to the precious souls fammishing in the wilderness. You may be assured, that whatever you be tow upon this cause is so much given to God, to be returned to you again with abundant increase.

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y let us r piety, possess. fore we ate the 3rd. Our Connectional Paper.—This subject has strong claims upon your attention, and is worthy of your support. We commend it to your favorable consideration, as one of the most efficient means in connection with our itinerancy, for building up the church and spreading holiness over the land. But the paper is in an embarrassed condition, owing, principally, to the neglect of those who have enjoyed all the advantages which it confers, to pay for it. These just dues, thus withheld, amount to over four thousand dollars. Had these subscriptions been promptly paid the Advocate would not now be in its present embarrassed state. We appeal to you, dear brethren, and ask if this is right. Your ministers have of their scanty means, contributed, at different times, several thousand dollars, in order to sustain the paper, that the Church might not be deprived of its valuable services; and they must continue to do so, unless you relieve them by promptly paying these just demands. You cannot fail to see the reasonableness of this, and we affectionately entreat you to apply the remedy.

4th. Sabbath Reform, Bible, Tract, Sunday School, and Temperance Societies, have strong claims on your sympathy and support. We have not time to dwell upon them, only to commend them to you as among the best means employed for the suppression of vice and crime, promoting the knowledge of God, and advancing the moral and religious interests of society. What means so efficient for the religious instruction of your children and the rising generation, as the Sunday School? What can be more in accordance with the spirit and precepts of the gospel than to supply the poor and destitute with the word of life? And what is more important to the temporal and eternal well being of mankind than the suppression of the odious vice of intemperance? We exhort you, therefore, to give your hearty co-operation with these christian efforts to bless and save mankind.

5th. The Belleville Seminary.—The liberal manner in which you have contributed towards this Institution, both tor its erection, and for relieving it of debt and embarrassment, is a clear proof that you feel a deep interest in its behalf. This liberality, we sincerely believe, has not been misdirected; the Institution is worthy of your warmest sympathy and support, and it will ultimately more than repay all the labor and expense bestowed upon it. There are several important considerations connected with this subject which we would not have you overlook. The Institution is your own; it is under the direct control of your own Church; it has a competent staff of Professors and teachers, deeply devoted to its interests; is doing a good work for the church and the country; is pervaded by a healthy moral and religious influence, affording the best guarrantee in the world of the safety of those attending it; and is increasing in efficiency and

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public favor continually. Its affiliation to the Toronto University, thereby identifying it with our Provincial System of Education, and securing to its students the advantages of a University Degree, places it in a position superior to that of any similar Institution in the land. But its best recommendation is the opportunity it affords of securing a liberal education for your sons and daughters, under the supervision of your own church, free from the dangers attendant upon schools not so circumstanced.

The Seminary has from the beginning labored under serious embarrassments, from which it is not yet free. But during the past two years great progress has been made in raising means for paying off its indebtedness. A subscription of over twenty-five thousand dollars has been secured for the purpose; but in order to provide for all contingences, and make sure of the object had in view, we deem it advisable to continue the canvass for subscriptions in those places where it has not been thoroughly attended to. We ask your co-operation in this. It is also of great importance that the subscription in hand be paid with as little delay as possible, both to satisfy demands of creditors and to save interest. We hope you will make every exertion in your power to do this. You can also aid the Seminary by sending your sons and daughters to it to be educated. To prevent debt is just as important as to pay debt. An average of one student from each of the Circuits and Stations would not only prevent any accumulation of debt, by the running of the School, but furnish a revenue from this source. And what is to hinder this number being obtained?

And now, dear brethren, in conclusion, permit us to urge upon you the importance of personal religion. You are called unto holiness and are commanded to perfect holiness in the fear of God. Your influence for God in the world does not depend upon the profession you make, or the position you occupy, but upon your holiness, both of heart and life. "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven." Your duty is to "grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." This implies a constant progress, a going on from strength to strength, a daily advancement in faith, in purity, and in love. Let this be your constant endeavor; "leaving the things that are behind, and reaching forth unto those things that are before, press towards the mark. Be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as you know that your labor shall not be in vain in the Lord."

Do not neglect the appointed means of grace, such as the public worship of God, prayer and class meetings, private and family prayer, the sacrament of the Lord's Supper and fasting. These means have been ordained by God, and they are essential to your prosperity as christians. You cannot neglect them without suffering spiritual loss, and jeoparding your eternal interests. Here backsliding begins, but where it will end who can tell. You can-

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not be too earnest and constant in the use of every means within your reach. Let your daily effort be to secure more holiness, more heavenly mindedness, more of the spirit of your Divine Master. Finally, brethren, "be strong in the Lord and in the power of his might. Put on the whole armour of God that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil."

Brethren, pray for us, that we may come to you in the fullness of the blessing of the gospel of Christ, and that utterance may be given unto us—that we may open our mouth boldly to make know the mystery of the gospel of which we are ambassadors for Christ.

"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Ghost, be with you all. Amen. Signed in behalf of the Conference.

## REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

WE, your Committee, to whom was referred the subject of Sabbath Observance, would respectfully report:

That we regard the proper observance of the Christian Sabbath, as a day of rest and devotion, a law of the Eternal, guarded by the most solemn sanctions, and an invaluable blessing to our race. Hence we hail with pleasure and gratitude the success which has attended the efforts put forth for the suppression of Sabbath desceration throughout our land. As a rule, labor is suspended on our railways, canals, and other public works. Saloons, theatres and other places of amusement and crime are closed. Yet we have need of constant and persevering effort in the education of the people, that in all places and under all circumstances the vice of Sabbath breaking may be uprooted—especially in its most common and unnoticed forms—such as social visiting, worldly conversation. Sabbath evening calls, &c. So that while we ask for reform in public works we, consistent with ourselves, use our influence in our own sphere for the keeping holy of the Sacred Day.

We, therefore respectfully submit the following Resolutions:

1st.—That we regard as inconsistent with the sanctity of the Sabbath, the practice commonly allowed in connection with Campmeetings, of exposing refreshments for sale.

2nd.—That we preach more frequently and pointedly upon the keeping of the Lord's Day, especially against the more common forms of descration—by precept and example enforcing the Divine command—"Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy."

Large accessions to the church are gratifying; yet in our ambition let us not lose sight of the necessity of each member possessing that purity of character and life which alone will qualify us to be what the Saviour has designated us, the "sait of the earth;" and, also, to enter upon that inheritance, where nothing unclean shall enter. Let each member hold it to be his duty—a duty from which there is no relief when it is impossible to be in attendance—to be in their place at each class-meeting and prayer-meeting. As Methodists we think it impossible to retain that vigor and power which ought to characterise us, without a faithful attendance upon these means. It will be a great relief to your minister or ministers, and add greatly to their confidence in you to know that in his absence you are punctual in these means.

For the support kindly contributed to your pastors during the last year, we feel thankful. We would suggest, however, that is some places improvement ought to be made. Your ministers are men of one work, and they are worthy of their hire.

## SUPERANNUATED PREACHERS.

We cannot too highly esteem our venerable fathers and worn-out ministers. You cannot appreciate too highly these nurseries of the church. Remember, dear brethren, that the young must have a moral training. Influences will meet them everywhere, that will lead them from God. If the church neglects this matter, rest assured the world will take it up. No better policy can be adopted in evangelizing the world than to make a part of the programme to consist in Sabbath School instruction, and send them to the world with character and principle. Let Denominational Schools be established wherever it is practicable—amply supply them with teachers and with funds, and many shall rise up to call you blessed.

## OUR CONNEXIONAL PAPER.

Our excellent Christian Advocate claims your increased support. We are glad to possess a connexional paper that will compare favorably with any other religious journal in the country. It wings its way weekly into thousands of homes—going like a flame of fire

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throughout the land, and by its spiritual, pithy, and wisely selected articles, arrests the wandering footsteps of the sinner, and leads him back to God; while at the same time it encourages and builds up believers in the divine life. Can we allow such an all-powerful auxiliary of the gospel—such an advocate of the principles of the denomination—such a defendent of the honor and integrity of the church when assailed—can we allow it to fail and be discontinued, and live without a religious journal in the connexion, while our membership numbers over 20,000, and adherents over 70,000? With anxious solicitude do we bring to your attention the Belleville College. For the unprecedented manner in which thus far you have stood to the rescue of our noble institution, receive our heartfelt thanks; and this but feebly expresses our appreciation of your liberality. But, brethren, financial embarrassment still rolls its accumulated waves against it, and threatens to engulph it. Are we willing to abandon our undertaking—sound a retreat—and leap from the jaws of Scylla into the mouth of Charybdis? We are committed to the work; there is no alternative; we must go on. Some of their institutions in the church in the United States point to twenty years of financial embarrassment, and yet they succeeded. And why may not we succeed. Are we willing to set a precedent of failure to clog the wheels of progress in the future history of the church? This difficulty overcome and success will infuse strength into our denominational heart, and we shall emerge from this wilderness of difficulties-leaning upon the arm of our beloved-"Fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners."

Forget not, dear brethren, the importance and claims of the Bible and Tract Societies. They wast holy influences into neighborhoods and families, where the voice of the preacher is seldom or never heard, and bear the seeds of devotedness to God into hearts unaccustomed to think or feel.

The cause of Sabbath Observance received our serious consideration. We mention as prominent among the agencies to promote Sabbath Observance, the Kingston Sabbath Reformation Society. And we rejoice that in our own province so much improvement has been made in this direction. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."

#### TEMPERANCE.

We deplore the ravages of this monster evil, Intemperance. Receiving its commission from the burning throne is pandemonium—sanctioned we are sorry to say by the authority of the land it continues to sweep its pathway of destruction through the earth; leaving in its wake, withered hopes, blighted destinies, poverty, ignorance, crime and death. "Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly, above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us. #### OBITUARY.

REV. CHARLES PETTYS was born in New Ashford, State of Mass., May 3rd, 1777. He removed to Canada in the 11th year of his age, and settled with his parents near Prescot. He made a profession of religion under the labors of Rev. James Colman, in January, 1795, and commenced to exhort under the administration of Rev. Sylvanus Keeler, the next conference year. He removed to East Flamboro' in 1809, and continued his labors as an exhorter.

In 1812 he was called out in defence of the Province, but was soon placed in some position in the commissariat department, by means of which he was not exposed to the hardships or dangers of other soldiers. He, however, continued to hold meetings in and about Niagara—being a soldier of the cross as well as a soldier of the King of England. Here Bro. P. was useful. He was a good

exhorter, sympathetic and acceptable to the people.

After the war he removed to the North St., in Westminister.

This was about the year 1815 or 1816. Here, too, he collected the few scattered settlers together for prayer and exhortation, when there were only six grown up persons in the vicinity, including the subject of this notice and his wife. The people, however, soon commenced to settle in very rapidly, so that in less than two years he had formed two societies containing a total of about seventy members, extending the work along the North St. Some of this number had been Methodists before their arrival in Westminister. Many were, however, new converts,-the fruits of an awakening which commenced in the following manner: On Christmas Eve a dance was to be attended at or near Dingman's Creek, and Mr. P. hearing of the matter went to the place, and succeeded in turning the minds of the people in a religious direction, and stopping the dance.

He is supposed to have been the first Methodist who held religious services where St. Thomas is now situated. He visited the Jacobs settlement, in London, some time in the Summer or Fall of 1818, and held meetings among the people, soon forming a class of twentythree persons. He also held the first public religious services in

the Township of Lobo. Bro. P. commenced to travel as an itenerant preacher in 1828, under the P.E., and labored on the London Circuit with Mr. Whiting—Oxford with J. Bailey, and they extended their work to Stratford, Goderich and the adjacent places. He next traveled Dumfries, then the Thames, and again he was sent to the Dumfries Circuit. In 1833 the division in the M. E. Church (inaptly termed the Union) was effected. Bro. P. strongly opposed the measure, believing it to be unconstitutional; and he did much toward supplying the word to the societies which refused to submit to the aggressions of the Canada Conference, though he felt keenly the reproaches heaped upon him by his former brothren, lay and clerical,

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who took a different view of the case. His attachment to the M. E. Church was as strong in the days of its adversity, under weakness, as in the days of its glory and strength. From 1833, until he became superannuated, he devoted his time to, and was not sparing of his means in endeavouring-in connection with his brethren-to build up the waste places of Zion. He outlived those days of depression and darkness; and by the blessing of God upon the efforts of His ministers our venerable brother lived to see the church which had been the means of his conversion, and to which he had unflinchingly adhered throughout her day of sore conflict, with the breaches in her wall repaired, her courts crowded with earnest worshipers, and by the power of the most High going on from strength to strength.

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His house was alway a hospitable home for the ministers of Christ; and his pious and benevolent companion-now his aged widow—ably aided his efforts, encouraging him to persevere in his

work of faith and labor of love.

Bro. Pettys departed this life on the 29th of August, 1863, in great peace, being in the 87th year of his age.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SLAVERY.

Your Committee on Slavery beg leave to enter their unqualified protest against this unholy traffic in human beings, from many weighty and serious considerations. It is revolting to every principle of humanity, dishonoring to God, and invasive of the rights and liberties of citizenship; a liberty which is the exclusive prerogative of every human being, and the charter-right of every moral agent. We hereby cordially express our sympathies with the efforts now being made in the neighboring Republic to abolish that foul blot which has so long disgraced that otherwise prosperous and noble country, and though sorry that it has required a grevious and afflictive war for its extinction, we trust we shall yet have occasion to rejoice in its complete final overthrow. We believe that God has had a controversy with that very nation, pending for years previously on that very question, and as they have been slow to learn God's implied will, and consequently have not shaken off the cruel yoke of bondage from the neek of the oppressed and captive slave, God has seen fit to make his anger more apparent by signal manifestations of displeasure, and has at length come forth as a mighty man of war to shake the nation and rouse the slumbering energies of every friend of humanity, to take more decisive measures for its complete overthrow. If the rights of man's liberty and freedom are ruthlessly invaded, and oppresment to the M. The modern Pharaohs of oppression shall be plagued with God's judgments till the notes of the trumpet shall proclaim throughout the length and breadth of the land the jubilee of freedom arrived. Thank God, we live in a land where freedom reigns triumphant, though once her dark foot-prints marked the soil of our beloved Canada. This may appear to many a startling statement, but it is nevertheless true, that in the second session of Parliament in Upper Canada, whiche emmenced on the 31st day of May, 1793, in Newark, now the town of Niagara, thirteen useful bills were passed, the fourth of which was an Act to prevent the further introduction of slaves into Upper Canada. The preamble had the following very significant words: "Whereas it is unjust that a people who enjoy freedom by law should encourage the introduction of slavery," &c. It was then enacted, that "No negro shall hereafter be imported as a slave," and that all colored persons should be free at the age of 25 years. Slavery was abolished in Lower Canada ten years afterward, that is in 1803. We rejoice to know that the M. E. Church in Canada has always been firm in discountenancing this climax of human evils, and in corroboration of this fact we have only to call attention to the general rules of our society contained in our excellent book of Discipline, wherein "the buying and selling of men, women, and children with an intention to enslave them" is prohibited. This report is not uncalled for by us as a religious body at the present time, as there are many in Canada whose sympathies are with the Southern Confederacy in the struggle now going on in the neighboring Republic. We most unhesitatingly declare our dissent from such views, and are free to confess that our sympathies are with those who are nobly struggling for freedom, and regret to think that there are any advocates for slavery on British soil. May our fair land ever enjoy the right of freedom, and the flag of liberty still wave o'er us and our children to the latest posterity. Our earnest prayer is that peace and liberty may be speedily restored to the United States, and that moral, political and uni-versal emancipation may soon gain its final and complete ascendancy.

## CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER.

1. The Conference shall meet at 9 o'clock, A. M., and adjourn at 12, M.; meet at 2, rise at 5; but may alter the time of meeting and adjourning at its discretion.

2. The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned, and cause the same to be opened by singing and prayer, and shall have the journals of the preceding day singing and appropriate.

3. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but, in case of an appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

4. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at the same time.

5. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing if the President, Secretary, or any member of the Conference requests it.

6. When a motion, resolution or report presented, is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before the action or amendment.

7. No new metion or resolution shall be made until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz: Indefinite postponement; laying on the table; reference to a committee; postponement to any given time, or amendment.

8. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalties, or disrespectful language, but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

9. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President.

10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, or more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to meak shall have subtant.

11. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the affirmative to move a reconsideration.

12. No member shall absent himself from the service of Cenference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time such question is put by the President, except by leave of Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

He shall take charge of the journal and other papers of the Conference, and preserve them with care; suffer no person to take a copy of any paper during the interval of Conference, except with the consent of the Conference, and shall forward the journal and papers to the next Annual Conference.

17. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be

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decided without debate.

18. No preacher shall bring any charge against any member of this Conference until he has first given him information of the same, either by letter or otherwise, so that the accused may have an opportunity for

19. When any brother intends to object to the passage of another's character, it shall be his duty to hand the name of the person against whom objections are to be made, to the President of the Conference.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS AND FRIENDS OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN CANADA, WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE BAY QUINTE

DEAR BRETHREN AND FRIENDS,—Another Conference year has rolled into eternity, and we greet you once more with our annual epistle. The destroying angel has entered some of our families the past year and taken cherished ones from our embrace; yet through the kind providence of God, death has not invaded our itenerant ranks. Sickness has prostrated, but though cast down we have not been forsaken. To His great name, for our preservation, be all the glory.

The Conference just closing has not been characterized by any extraordinary features, differing from previous ones, yet we are happy to inform you of the fraternal and christian feelings which have manifested themselves in all our deliberations. An earnest desire for the glory of God, we trust, has been the impelling motive, during the various sittings of the Session. Our motives having been pure; we sincerely hope our conclusions may have the approval of

Allow us then, dear brethren, to call your attention in this our accustomed letter, to some, at least, of the more prominent duties devolving upon you as professed followers of Christ, and thus stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance. We consider that those duties are clearly and distinctly set before you in a succinct form in the general rules embodied in our book of Discipline.

We earnestly direct you, as embodying our peculiar polity, to the general rules, as embracing all the fundamental precepts and practices of our holy religion. In the language of the great father and founder of Methodism, we would endeavor to enforce them.

We have in the past, been accustomed to call your attention to especial duties. Let us again cnumerate some of the more prominent. It is an invariable evidence of declension in religion to see the class room neglected. A strict and punctual attendance upon this means of grace we deem indispensable in our Zion to a full development of all those graces which adorn the christian character. Sanctioned by the word of God, and confirmed by experience, we have no lesitancy in saying, that the class-meeting is indispensable to our vitality and spirituality. Frequent them, therefore, and catch their heavenly inspiration.

Private devotion we esteem as the very groundwork of religious experience. Declension in religion almost invariably commences here. Could we trace to their source those painful instances of apostacy, which end in dishonor and infamy, we should find it in the neglect of private devotion, and the reading of the Scriptures, which are able to make wise unto salvation, through faith in Christ Jesus.

We may be fermal, if not hypocritical in the class-meeting, the prayer-meeting, or around the domestic altar, but we cannot conceive of a hypocrite frequenting his closet, and there pouring out his heart to his "Father who seeth in secret." Our blessed Saviour has given us instruction upon this point, and we will not vary far from the path of rectitude in other matters, if we follow His directions in this. "When thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut to thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret;" and the gracious promise is "He shall reward thee openly." There is another private duty enjoined in the word of God which we fear is greatly neglected, that is fasting or abstinence, and we have the example of Discipline requires the Friday previous to the Quarterly Meeting to be observed as a day of fasting and prayer, and we shall never arise to our true position of spirituality while this duty is so frequently neglected.

There is another matter which demands more than a passing notice. We allude to Sabbath Schools. We hope you are doing all you can for these nurseries of the church. Remember, dear brethren, that you must soon make way for others. The important question arises, who will take your places in the church and in the world, if the young are not trained to fall them. Do not let the burden of sustaining the Sabbath School fall upon a few, but let all engage heartily in doing their appropriate work. You can by your attendance and influence accomplish something for God

and humanity. If you cannot impart instruction, you can receive it.

The Conference has listened with a good degree of pleasure to the statements made by the representatives of our General Conference, to the General Conference of the M. E. Church in the U. S., in regard to their reception, and the action of that body as expressed in the following resolution:

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"Resolved—That we have been highly gratified with the presence and fraternal greeting of the delegates of the M. E. Church of Canada. We recognize in the church they represent a legitimate branch of the Methodistic family, and we pray that God may bless and prosper it in the fulfilment of that mission upon which it has

so successfully entered."

The Temperance cause demands your heartiest support. By our general rules, our church is one vast temperance organization. Not only is drunkenness forbidden, but we are prohibited from "buying or selling spirituous liquors, or drinking them, unless in case of extreme necessity." Should the bill now pending legislative action happily become law, it will devolve upon you as members of the community, to do what you can to give effect to that law, so far as its provisions are calculated to prohibit the soul destroying traffic in alcohol. Our earnest exhortation is, "Touch not, taste not the accursed thing."

The elective franchise is dear to every man worthy the name. Freedom, however, imposes its duties and obligations, as certainly as it confers its privileges. The free institutions of this young country should be sacredly guarded. We are led to these thoughts by the spirit of speculation which has been growing with such fearful rapidity of late. Even the franchise has not escaped this fearful contagion. We have the painful truth thrust upon us, that men are making merchandize of this cherished privilege. We raise our warning voice, dear brethren, against the fearful pall of corruption which is settling upon this land. Popular institutions are becoming fearfully corrupt. From the election of the village or school section trustee, to the highest elective officer in the county, men are found enquiring how much is to be had for their votes. What renders the fact more melancholy is, that professed christians are not entirely innocent in many instances. We hold the man who offers a bribe as equally guilty with the man who accepts it. We regret to think that there are men of high religious pretensions who would not scruple to purchase political support, thereby sapping the foundations of our free institutions. So long as men are found base enough to sell their birthright, purchasers may be found. Here, supply causes demand, and vice versa.

We regret to see the direction which the support of the ministry is taking. Every effort must be accompanied with social entertainment. Our church organ must contain a long and glowing account of this presentation or surprise, that donation or 'social,' while, perhaps, the ordinary and proper methods are entirely ignored. This is a growing evil, and the usefulness of our excellent paper is materially injured by it. What do the majority of the readers or the Advocate care for these entertainments, which can at most be but local items? Items which should at most occupy only a few lines, are lengthened into columns. They are also exceedingly deceptive. It is presumed that the finances of this or that circuit are in an excellent condition, when perhaps a reference to the Recording Steward's book would reveal the very opposite. The result of all is that people who would otherwise keep in the old paths, are attracted by the glitter, and are led to despise the ordinary means. All their power is reserved for an extraordinary effort. Another and greater evil is, that our people are educated into the belief that giving for the support of the minister is a matter of mere impulse, not a sacred binding obligation. This is a matter, brethren, that demands your serious attention; not that we would entirely condemn the, perhaps in some instances, laudable means. may be instances where they are commendable, but not as ordinary appliances. Let us keep to our proper disciplinary regulations in this matter; we are persuaded it will be found better in the end.

There seems to be a growing desire for popular amusements. We are social beings, and a kind and beneficent Creator has bestowed these faculties upon us for a high and holy purpose, but let us endeavor to conduct this feeling of our nature into a proper channel. Plays, circuses, balls and such like amusements, not to speak of gaming in its various forms, we consider to be ruinous to religion. Here again our general rules properly apply. We are prohibited by these rules from "taking such diversions as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus." In all our social entertainments, whether in connection with the church or otherwise, this should be our guiding principle.

Church accommodations are rapidly increasing in the different sections of the work, which is cause for unfeigned thankfulness. The substantial character of the buildings give evidence of increasing liberality, and the permanency of the church of our choice. sincerely trust utility and stability may be the object aimed at in the erection of our churches, rather than glitter and show.

With devout feeling to the Great Dispenser of all good we desire to acknowledge the blessings which have accompanized our Missionary labors. It has pleased God to grant success in the conversion of sinners more extensively than in any other portion of our work. New fields are opening every year, and circumstances are prompting us to fill them. "The fields are white unto the harvest." Come over and help us" is still heard from various sections of the land. But how can we respond to all these calls without the means? The people are unable to sustain the cause of Christ among themselves. We are more than ever persuaded that those

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enjoying the blessing of salvation are ready to lend a helping hand to the needy, if their claims are properly placed before them. Failure here is almost invariably the result of carelessness, or want of interest in the work. With the most rigid economy in the expenditure, our Missionary Society is considerably in debt. We confidently appeal to you to support by your prayers, sympathies, and

contributions, this vital part of our economy.

The C. C. Advocate has claims upon you, as christians, and as Methodists, which no other paper can have. It is indispensable to us as a church, and in pressing you to patronize it, we are urging upon you that which we are fully assured will be a blessing. This is a reading age, and it is a hopeful indication of progress when the love of literature increases. Seize upon the Advocate as one of the great educators of your children. Poor indeed is that family who cannot afford the means to pay for it. Better deprive your children of almost any earthly comfort than rear them up without supplying them with that intellectual food and moral culture which its weekly visits are so well calculated to afford. We need not remind you that those families where the religious weekly never comes, will, as a general rule, be far below, in point of intelligence and moral worth, those households regularly supplied with sound religious literature. Can you feel justified, either before God or man, in suffering your children-to say nothing of yourselves-to fall below others in intelligent moral worth, merely to save the paltry sum the Advocate will cost? Possibly you may say "Our families don't like to read the Advocate, or papers of a similar kind." If this really be so, it must be mostly your own fault in having suffered them either to grow up without fostering a love of reading, or otherwise permitting them to read works of fiction, or those frothy and exciting publications which are so destructive of all relish for reading of a higher order. In either case you have done a terrible wrong to your families, the effects of which will be felt forever. Let us urge upon you the importance of educating your children to bless the world.

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Your S. S. Committee is highly gratified in receiving returns from all our charges, save three, and upon two of the latter no schools exist, The number of Union Schools is the same, but the increase of expenditure over last year amounts to \$55.85. Yet, notwithstanding these encouragements, on the whole, we find a decrease of sixteen schools; and consequently a corresponding decrease of officers, scholars, books, &c.

As a Committee, we consider that violence would be done to our feelings, and an injustice to this Conference and our work should these painful truths pass unnoted. It is an undeniable fact, that Sabbath-Schools are nurseries for the church; and can we close our eyes against our actual knowledge and firm belief? Surely not. Sister churches are increasing in effort and utility in this department, and while, seemingly, we have beheld this with complacency, our efforts have not been sufficiently strong; hence the large decrease.

Do we expect to increase, as a church, in the future, as in the past, while we calmly surrender our children and youth to the care of other churches? Preposterous! Yet, providing this could be done, have we not discovered as yet, that those trained in Sabbath-Schools make the real pillars in the church? We fear that our inattention to the children and youth of our land, will ultimately bring us in the succession of other churches, whereas, we should be a leader.

Your Committee would therefore respectfully and sincerely request our chief Superintendents to urge upon this Conference collectively, and its members respectively, the imperative necessity of diligent, earnest, and prayerful endeavors in this praiseworthy enterprise. Let sermons be preached whenever, and wherever practicable. And may the Great Head of the church help us in our work of faith and labor of love.

#### REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of Sabbath Observance, beg to present the following thoughts:

First—The sanctity and claims of God's holy day are fully and unequivocally set forth and enforced by the following expressive and encouraging portions of divine truth: "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." "Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work: But the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God, in

it thou shalt not do any work." Ex. xx. 8, 9, 10. "Six days may work be done; but in the seventh is the Sabbath of rest, holy to the Lord." Ex. xxxi. 15. "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable, and shalt honor him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord, and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with a high heritge of Jacob thy father, for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it." Isaiah lviii. 13, 14.

Your Committee take unfeigned pleasure in expressing its admiration of the zeal and unwearied fidelity of the Kingston Sabbath Reformation Society, and would invite your co-operation with, and prayers for them in their elevating and honorable work. We regard the moral portions of society under many obligations to the conductors of the religious presses in these Provinces, for the independent and outspoken manner in which they defend the claims of the Sabbath, and advocate enactments to more fully guard its

It is with feelings of sincere regret that we confess that after all that has been thought, said, and done by synods, assemblies, conferences, newspaper conductors, and christians, to secure to society the full enjoyment and advantages of God's day, there remains much to be done, and an awful amount of desecration still goes on.

In consideration of the above sentiments, and feeling that there is force in the maxim "Line upon line," your Committee would recommend this Conference to again memorialize the three branches of our Legislature, asking them for a statute prohibiting Sabbath labor on all our rivers, canals, and railroads. We also recommend that the Presiding Elders of this Conference make the observance of the Sabbath a subject of pulpit ministration all around their districts, at least once this year; and we pray that the day may hasten when the christian Sabbath will be all over our land, what it is designed to be,—an honored type of the glorious Sabbath of eternal rest.

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#### EXTRACTED FROM THE REPORT ON EDUCATION.

That the Belleville Seminary and Female College is in a prosperous condition. The average number of students for the past two years has not varied much, being about eighty, and producing a revenue nearly sufficient to meet current expenses. Twenty additional students would fully meet the case.

The course of instruction, and the efforts of the faculty to advance the students in their studies are thorough; the system of government judicious and efficient, securing good order and propriety on the part of the students; the moral condition is all that could be desired; and the general character and management such as to meet and secure the respect and confidence of the public.

The school is at present conducted at an expense far below that of any other school of the same grade in this or any other country, owing, chiefly, to the relinquishment by the teachers of a portion of their salaries. The good effects of this Institute are beginning to be seen, and they will continue to be more and more developed.

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### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committe on Church Property beg leave, to report as follows:

That after careful examination, we find that increased attention is being given to the important subject of church building. The enterprize leading to the extension of chapel accomodation, appears at least, to keep pace with all other important, commendable, Canadian enterprizes of this present progressive age. The exceeding importance of this subject seems to be resting with increased weight upon the minds of the lovers of our Zion. Ministers and members appear to be waking up more fully, to the fact, that the real progress of our church greatly depends upon the vigorous endeavors put forth in this direction. The reports furnished by the preachers representing our various circuits, missions, and stations, respecting chapel-building, enlargements and improvements are quite satisfactory. The real value of church property, as it will stand upon the minutes of this present Conference, however, will not be so high, as in all probability, it has been anticipated. This circumstance is owing to errors or mistakes of about \$7,000 reported in the minutes of last year. These errors standing corrected, a respectable increase, which reflects much credit on various ministers and their charges, is reported this year. Still your Committee being deeply impressed with the vast importance of extending our chapel accomodations in order to a successful prosecution of our religious enterprises, would urge the ministers of this Conference, as well as the members of our church, to increased, continued, and unremitting exertions in this department of our work. Your Committee is much gratified with the exertions which have been put forth during the past year, to secure the erection of parsonages for the convenience and comfort of the preachers and their families. Nevertheless, we regret to find that quite a large number of our circuits, missions, and stations are destitute in this respect, which destitution we regard as detrimental to the interests of our work. We would therefore urge that every reasonable exertion be put forth to make advancement in this important particular.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPORAL ECONOM Y.

There is by subscribers due to the Advocate the very large amount of \$4,257.00, notwithstanding the collections made by the special agents last year. We learn too, that less has been paid on the current volume, since its commencement, thanin former years, thus showing that the evil, viz, "neglect to pay for the paper," is growing worse instead of better. We therefore recommend, that the preachers and members of the Conference he required to give their earliest and most earnest attention to the collection of these debts.
