FIRST EDITION. BIRCHALL IS DEAD.

He was Hanged at 8.27 O'Clock this Morning.

HIS IRON NERVE SUSTAINS HIM THROUGHOUT.

HE IS COOL AND COLLECTED AND WALKS UP TO THE SCAFFOLD.

THE EXECUTION AND DETAILS.—There was no hanging and the Victim Suffered Pain.—The Body was Cut Down in Sixteen Minutes.

WOODS, Oct. 14.—John Reginald Birchall was hanged this morning.

He retained his jaunty calm air to the end, unshaken by the advice of the Rev. Mr. Wade, the clergyman who had been in his cell day after day.

The past night has been a terrible one for all who through family ties held the condemned man dear.

Various reports have been sent broadcast through the press concerning the final interview between the murderer and his unhappy wife.

There is no way to represent what really occurred in the condemned cell. This morning, however, officials and friends talk freely about it.

Mrs. Birchall went to the jail at 10 o'clock accompanied by her sister and her young daughter.

She had just parted company with Deputy Sheriff Perry who was there to see that things were all right and that no hitch would occur in the execution.

The Deputy Sheriff had not talked to the prisoners many moments when he found that Birchall was a most romantic possibility.

Instead of being dejected Birchall was resorting to every device which his vivid fancy might suggest to sustain his spirits as the gallows rose.

He made jokes about the gallows and talked at the cook who had sent him a venison steak for supper.

He had been long enough after killing but he had his calm moments also, and in one of these he presented the Deputy Sheriff with a signed and dated photograph of himself.

JOHN REGINALD BIRCHALL.

Soon after Mr. Perry had left, Mrs. Birchall and Mrs. Woodcock went into the cell; the latter remained only some fifteen minutes.

Her farewell was a sad one, but she kept perfect control of herself. The wife was then practically alone with her doomed husband.

For the guards stood at the other side of the cell with averted faces.

The woman wept bitterly though she tried to confine her tears for a while, but she wept aloud in her abandonment of misery.

The man kept cool for a time, then he adopted a more despondent tone. Mrs. Birchall did not faint and helped him not to be called in at any time.

After an hour had passed by the prisoner had somewhat recovered from the effect of the prolonged interview with his wife.

For a time after she had gone he was as calm as a child in the hands of the clergyman.

Then he lay down and in his exhausted condition tried to sleep, but sleep was impossible.

Then he got up and declared he would sit it out. He laughed and joked at the guards again, but after a while began to pay attention to the ministrations of Mr. Wade.

At six o'clock the prisoner who had again lain down for a few minutes rose and robed himself in a dark suit of clothes, a white shirt with cuffs, and collar, black corded tie, white gloves and silk shoes.

Mr. Wade prayed earnestly and was thus engaged when the hangman entered the cell. He was the executioner, "Ratley," of Toronto, who has hanged Kane, Smith, and Davis—Bardclive is the man's real name.

Birchall who had seen him previously during the day, nodded to him as he entered. The hangman seemed to open a conversation but it was a failure.

At this time half a hundred newspaper men had been admitted to the jail yard for it was then half past seven and hundreds of people lined all the streets around.

The morning was clear and sunshiny, a clear frost on the ground.

The crowd of people who got admission to the jail yard numbered about 200. No one was allowed to stand in the corridors.

The hangman himself dressed in a ordinary coat, gray trousers and a soft wide rimmed hat, came into the yard shortly before eight o'clock.

He was smoking a long pipe and carried a bundle of rope in his hand. The scaffold, consisting of two uprights and a cross beam which leaned against the wall for support, had been erected in the north east corner of the west yard.

Five of the jail windows overlooked it; Birchall's was nearest of these to the gibbet. Many curious looks were cast up at his window but no face was seen there.

It took the hangman some ten minutes to adjust the ropes and run them through the pulleys. He was then assisted by half a dozen constables to hoist the 300 pound weight into position.

STANLEY'S REAR GUARD.

THE FULL TEXT OF ANAS FARRAN'S AFFIDAVIT PUBLISHED.

He Describes Bartlett's Conduct after Stanley Left Yarmouth, the Arrival of Tippeco and Jameson's Purporting to be a Slave Girl for Cannibalism.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE.

MONROE, Nov. 14.—The Times publishes the full text of Anas Farran's affidavit with regard to Stanley's rear guard.

The original is in Anas's handwriting. Anas explains he was obliged in London to contradict his account because the conditions did not do him to reveal anything.

Tippeco describes how Bartlett after Stanley left Yarmouth, finding food scarce employed some Eskimos to attack the neighboring villages, but found them empty.

Tippeco had recourse to capturing native women, and demanding their ransom for their ransom. He had daily ordered men to be given from 25 to 50 lashes for various offences.

He describes the arrival of and negotiations with Tippeco. He speaks of numerous cases of stealing of food, the Eskimos did not desire to see him, or more lashes each. The affidavit tells of the hanging of the prisoner, Jameson expressed to Tippeco's interpreter the desire to see the cannibal.

Tippeco consulted with the chief and Jameson had better purchase a slave. Jameson said he would like to see the hands. The man returned a few minutes after with a ten year old girl.

Tippeco and his chief ordered the girl to be taken to the native hut. Jameson himself, Selim Macaulay and Farhad, Jameson's servant, presented to him by Tippeco, and many other followed. The man who brought the girl said he was a cannibal. This is a present from the white man who desire to see her eaten.

The girl was tied to a tree, the natives and Jameson's men were ordered to stab her until she was dead.

The natives cut pieces from her body and carried them to the hut, and the other portions straight to the hut, and washed them in the floor of the hut, making rough sketches of the horrible scenes.

Jameson afterward finished his sketches in water color. There were six of them nearly done. He made a further statement to the effect that the cannibal incident was the cause of the death of Jameson and Bartlett.

He says Anas told the natives that they were to be put to death, and that they were to be put to death, and that they were to be put to death.

Bartlett heard of this, and feared he would lose his commission. He became more violent than ever and probably very crazy. Jameson worried himself into the fever that killed him.

SPENCER, Nov. 14.—At the close of Mr. Vanwar's address yesterday afternoon the Chief Justice proceeded to deliver his charge to the jury.

His Honor submitted to the jury the following questions:—1. Whether the articles published in the Sun or any of them are only a fair criticism on plaintiff's proceedings in the division of the electoral lists in the year 1888.

2. If the articles published exceed the limits of fair criticism, do they bear the meaning which plaintiff puts upon them in the declaration; that is to say, do they contain any charge of fraud, or of corruptly and dishonestly making up the electoral lists, and deciding in favor of the plaintiff's party?

3. Whether the plaintiff, referring to persons supporting one political party, and excluding the names of persons supporting the other political party in this country?

Did plaintiff, in referring to the names of certain persons in the party of the defendant and Peterborough or other parties, do so with the intent of favoring the defendant's party in the country, or to do so in the honest belief that he was acting according to the law in the decisions which he made?

Proceeding to the second question, Judge Allen thoroughly reviewed the evidence in the case, and after a short time the applications of parties which had been produced in court, already explained, and explaining each case the grounds on which a verdict or acquittal should be made. His address was clear and forcible. He elicited Judge Stewart's ruling in the case, and in every private character, basing his statements upon the plaintiff's past record in every relation of life.

At 12.30 the jury retired, and after deliberating two hours brought in a verdict for the plaintiff, and assessed the damages at \$2500.

Mr. Curry applied for a stay of pendent, which was granted.

TO ENGLAND IN THREE MINUTES.

The Canadian Pacific Telegraph Company has in connection with the British Exhibition.

WOODS, Oct. 14.—The struggle between the two telegraph companies as to which should announce first throughout the world that Birchall was no more, was an exciting one.

The Canadian Pacific company made a special effort to get the news to England. This company did not get permission to put their wires inside the jail yard until midnight last night, but notwithstanding this at daylight this morning two wires were working direct from the jail.

The French cable for the use of the Dunlop and Dalziel cable news associations, and the other with the Commercial Company's cable to be used exclusively by Reuters' cable agency. The instruments were placed on a bench within twenty yards of the scaffold.

When the drop fell at 8.27 the news was sent forth within a fraction of three minutes later it was on a bulletin board in London, England, besides having during that time been carried to every part of Canada and the United States.
