DON'T TAKE KINDLY TO BISHOPS' SUGGESTIONS

Pastoral Letter Was Read in the Churches and Comments Made on It.

The pastoral letter from the bishops of the Church of England which was read last Sunday in all the churches has created considerable comment in St. John at least. There is a disposition among the city clergymen to resent any interference with their forms of service by bishops throughout the country, and they do not seem inclined to take suggestions from anyone but Bishop Kingdon.

As one clergyman put it, "The Archbishop of Canterbury himself has no right to dictate as to our individual forms of service, but whatever our own bishop we will do."

In several of the English churches on Sunday the clergymen commented particularly on the paragraph of the letter relating to services. This set forth that there is a tendency to introduce into the services unauthorized and untidy musical selections, such as anthems, solos, in place of the offertory sentences, and the employment of elaborate services instead of plain chants and responses.

In Trinity church Canon Richardson made his position clear to his congregation. He said no changes would be made in the form of service in Trinity. In his church the organist and choir-master were not exerting undue pressure on anyone, but the musical portion of the service was arranged with his approval.

Rev. Mr. Kubring in St. John's (Stone), and other clergymen also commented on various portions of the letter, though some of them omitted the clause relating to the musical service.

RECENT DEATHS.

MRS. JOSEPHINE GIBSON, widow of John T. Gibson and daughter of the late Ronald Campbell, of St. George, died Tuesday at Maryville at noon. Her daughter, Mrs. Charles L. Chisholm of Sydney, C. B., had just arrived, and it was during a conversation with her visitor that Mrs. Gibson suddenly collapsed and died within a very few minutes.
