MEETING OF SHIPPING INTERESTS

MEETING OF SHIPPING INTERESTS

London, May 1.—As a result of the suggestion of the German Emperor some months ago, an important international conference is to be held in London, probably in September, to which all the shipping interests on both sides of the Atlantic will be invited. The conference will deliberate upon questions pertaining to the greater safety of life and property at sea with a view to the adoption of a uniform code of regulations.

The life saving rules which were framed by the board of trade directly after the Titanic disaster, and which came into force on March 1, will, it is expected, be amended to some extent when the boats and davits committee presents its, final report. An interchange of opinion on the subject is now taking place between the different governments concerned.

Other measures, notably the equipment of ice observation vessels and the diversion of North Atlantic liners farther south, have already been adopted with a view to safer navigation. On July 1 next a new radiotelegraphic agreement will take effect throughout the world. Among other things it provides for a constant wireless watch on ocean going passenger steamers and the interruption of long distance messages for 30 minutes at times when it is likely distrass calls might otherwise not be heard.




