

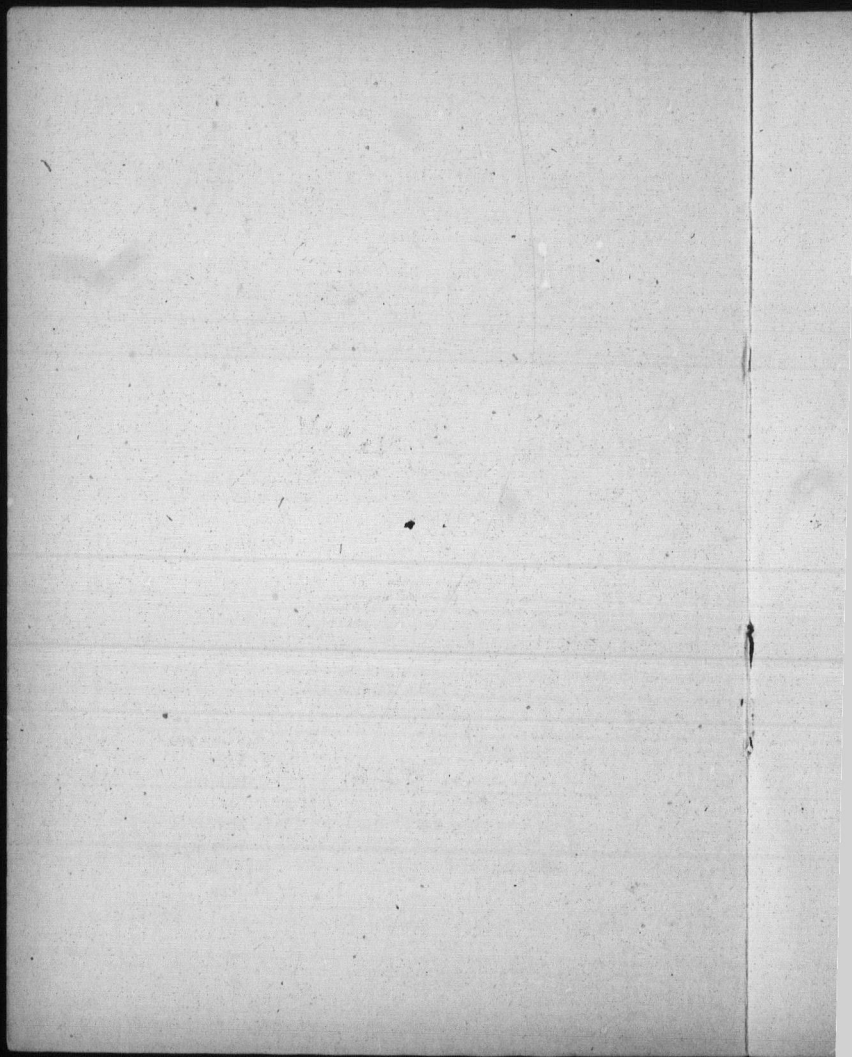

- Nov. 8th—Artists' Recital—Mrs. Clara Barnes-Holmes and Miss Lillian Littlehales.
- “ 15th—Miscellaneous.
- “ 29th—“Tone Pictures”—by Mr. T. G. Mitcheltree—Spring Songs.
- Dec. 13th—Mendelssohn, Raff, Oratorio—Paper on Mendelssohn and Raff.
- Jan. 10th—The Suite—Paper by Miss Regan, with description of the “Pier Gynt” Suite (No. 1)—Flower Songs.
- “ 24th—Modern Composers—Paper on Woman's Creative Power, as shown in Liza Lehmann's Song Cycle, “In a Persian Garden.”
- Feb. 7th—Slavic and French Music—Paper.
- “ 21st—Wagner, Weber—Paper by Mr. Hewlett on “German Opera, contrasted with Italian Opera.”
- Mar. 7th—Beethoven, Chopin—Paper on the “Chopin Ballades,” with analytical and literary treatment.
- “ 21st—Schumann, Schubert—Paper on Schumann, with the “Faschingsschwank,” illustrated.
- April 4th—Bach, Mozart—Miscellaneous Songs—Paper, “The Voice as a Musical Instrument.”
- “ 18th—Request Day—Question Drawer.

BY-LAWS.



1. An Annual Fee of One Dollar must be paid by all members.

2. Three persons of one family may become members on payment of two dollars, but such membership tickets will admit only two of the three to any one regular concert.

3. Any member failing to render the part assigned to her on any programme, except when due to illness, must either furnish a fitting substitute, or pay a fine of 25 cents.

4. Concerts must begin promptly on time, and no person shall enter during the performance of a number.

5. Visitors to the city introduced by members are welcome at the Club Concerts.

6. Twelve members of the Executive Committee shall form a quorum. Members of the Committee absenting themselves from business meetings, except from unavoidable causes, shall pay a fine of 10 cents.

7. Gentlemen can become associate members upon payment of the annual fee of one dollar.
