HOT WEATHER IN CHICAGO.

PRAIRIE FIRES CAUSING MUCH DISCOM-

FORT AND LOSS OF PROPERTY.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—Extremely hot

weather for the month of October is

prevailing in this section. During the

past twenty-four hours the thermometer

in this city went up to 86 degrees, and

according to the signal service records

this is the highest point that has been

registered for the month of October in

twenty-seven years. Smoke greatly

aggravated the conditions. On account

of the drought the last two months

everything is as dry as tinder and forest

and prairie fires are numerous. Lake

Michigan has been almost unnavi-

gated on account of the smoke and fog. Cap-

itains on incoming vessels have reported

a most alarming state of affairs. Many

have not slept for forty-eight hours on

account of the watchfulness that was

necessary. Bosta picking their way

through the straits of Mackinac were

particularly hampered. Landmarks

were obliterated and light rendered

indistinct at a distance of the length of

the steamer. Chicago southwards and

suburbs are surrounded by prairie fire

and dense smoke overhangs a large part

of the city lying south of Seventy-fifth

Street. Hundreds of acres of prairie

have been burned over and thousands

of livestock and fencing have been

consumed. Firemen in this division of

the city are completely exhausted fight-

ing prairie fires by day and night.

Most of the fires are started by sparks

from locomotives and not infrequently

by mischievous boys, who have set the

grass on fire for the excitement.

THE DISEASED CATTLE.
WHAT THE BREEDER SAYS ABOUT THEM—
—HIS PROPOSITION.

Mr. Reburn, the gentleman from whom the Jersey cattle afflicted with tuberculosis was bought, is yet in the city, awaiting the reply of the Local Government to his newest proposition, and a decision as to the final disposition of the animals. Mr. Reburn says that since 1870, and has a reputation to maintain as to quality of his herd. He contends that if the seven cattle bought from him by the New Brunswick Government, and pronounced tuberculous by the veterinary

surgeon, are really diseased that his whole herd are doubtless similarly affected. Mr. Reburn states that if the Jerseys are diseased he will take them off the Government's hands. If he has to do this, Mr. Reburn says further that it will be necessary for him to slaughter his whole herd.

Mr. Reburn's proposition, now under the consideration of the department, is that one of the cattle adversely reported upon by the veterinarian be killed and subjected to examination. If proven to be diseased he will take back all the cattle bought from him. If, on the other hand, the slaughtered animal is pronounced healthy, the Government are to keep, and pay for all.

When asked what price he received for the cattle, Mr. Reburn stated that the Government bought them on the sliding scale plan. A minimum price that he would receive was agreed upon, but if the Jerseys should prove to be diseased, the price would be increased to the profit, he was expecting to receive from the sale of the animals, and was informed instead, that his Jerseys would not stand the veterinary surgeon's test for tuberculosis, and that he had better come on and see about them.—*Gleaner.*
