COMMUNICATIONS.

To the Editor of the Chignecto Post.

Sir—Bay Verte is an enterprising place at the head of the Bay of St. John. It is the largest mercantile town in the County of Westmorland, lying on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and is a port of call for a large number of ships. There are a dozen or more retail stores, and several of them largely engaged in the lumber trade. One vessel of 900 tons, and several other large ships were loaded there this season with deals for the home market. There is also a large country trade, besides considerable mercantile transactions with Prince Edward's Island, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. One is struck with the industry and enterprise of Bay Verte. Its hospitality to strangers, and its loyalty to British institutions are proverbial. The people are generally in sympathy with Sir John A. Macdonald, and they expect to see him in the near future. The centre of the fishing business in New Brunswick, their merchants are leading men in the Temperance movement, and nothing seems to rattle the tempers of these gentlemen, but a reference to their postal accommodations. On this subject they are universally wise, and upon enquiry it would appear they have much cause for complaint.

Bay Verte is only thirteen miles from Acadia Post-office on the line of railroad. Here mails from Halifax and St. John arrive and depart daily. Yet Bay Verte has only a weekly mail, and then mails instead of being forwarded with ordinary despatch, are sent twenty hours, calling the distance of thirteen miles. Letters are not sent to St. John, but are sent to the nearest post-office, and then forwarded to St. John. The Chignecto Post, published in St. John, on Friday, with Friday's and Saturday's letters, arrive on the Monday morn. This is only sixteen miles. Letters and papers from St. John and Halifax, and a daily mail, take from three to four days to reach their destination. One mailman remarked that if the Chignecto Post were to be sent from St. John to Acadia Post-office, it would be a great improvement. He also remarked that he could leave St. John in the morning, and be at Acadia in the afternoon, while letters he mailed in St. John the day before he left would not reach Bay Verte till the day after his arrival. This is not as it should be. There is no apology for the department, for neither such a delay in the mail-passage between Acadia and Bay Verte. Even if the wants of the community for a daily mail cannot be satisfied, there could be no reason why the Bay Verte mail should not have an Acadia mail immediately after the arrival of the train from St. John, returning in time for the return train next morning. If no consideration be given to the troubles of a British Commissioner's Office, and no change can be made in a post-rail which is so absurdly arranged as to destroy its usefulness, its friends will regret the change in our political relations.

For patient resignation under severe affliction cannot be said to the Bay Verte. It is not on the whole, remarkable that the usually placid composure of the business men of Bay Verte should become distorted at the mention of their postal accommodation.

LATE RAILWAY CELEBRATION.

Our Exchanges have been filled during the past week with details of the festivities in celebration of the opening of the Railway in Maine, connecting Western Extension and New Brunswick with the Railway system of the United States. It is certainly a matter of congratulation that this section of railway has been finished, and it should incite our I. R. Commissioners to press forward to immediate completion the portion between Amherst and Truro, for until that connection is made, no proper development of the railway traffic through these Provinces will take place.

For a short line of railway, it certainly has been opened with a flourish which is remarkable even among railway celebrations. The President of the United States—who one speaker informed us was second to no man in the world—the Governor General and leading men from both the United States and the Dominion met and participated in prolonged festivities. The marriage ceremony was solemnly pronounced between Mr. Jonathan and Miss Canada, and both protested that they would behave like civilized persons. Speeches were made in honor of the occasion, and from the general style each orator seemed apprehensive that before the wedding party separated there would be a general fraternization between the bride and the groom. We were delighted when we saw General Grant had returned to Washington without hostilities having been initiated, for we were in terror lest the Commis-

captured and sent prisoners to Fort Warren, for upon no other hypothesis could we account for the fervent protestations of eternal friendship and love for the United States which formed the topic of almost every Dominion speaker. President Grant was eulogized that he did not pander to the mob and roughs by hostility to the Dominion; forgetting that he winked at the Fenian invasion of our country, had released the miscreant O'Neil from imprisonment, who had just prior to the time of speaking, organized in the United States a pirate band with which he had invaded Manitoba.

We despise the toadyism and insincerity apparent in most of the speeches. No body was allowed, and the speakers only made themselves contemptible, and instead of effecting any good, weakened and injured the character of the Dominion. War is one of the greatest evils that can afflict humanity, and we should take every possible means to preserve peace by frankly recognizing the rights of our neighbors and not by exhibitions of imbecility and cowardice, showing we are afraid of insisting upon our own rights. It is no glorious policy of the American Government has been of a grasping, overreaching and unscrupulous character, never hesitating to resort to any means to secure their ends. They grabbed the first portion of New Brunswick and secured it under the Ashburton Treaty by suppressing facts which would have shown they had not a shadow of a claim to it; and this trick, which would have disgraced a pettifogging lawyer, was perpetrated by one of their ablest statesmen. The Island of San Juan is under the joint protection of Great Britain and the United States pending the settlement of the boundary line; and notwithstanding recently discovered maps show the claim of the United States is clearly unfounded, they retain their footing and will keep their hold upon it, and the Dominion, to prevent the disruption of the marriage, so happily consummated at Vancouver, will have to yield that up too. We were bullied into the Washington Treaty, the demand, "your money or your life," being in this case, "the treaty or war," we are told, being plainly put to the British Commissioners. What a picture was presented when a member of the Dominion Government assured the assembled guests that a vessel seized for a violation of Dominion Law had been stolen away, and that the Government had not only not authorized any pursuit, but had not made a demand upon the American Government for her restitution. Could a more complete abdication of the duties of the Dominion Government be imagined, or a stronger invitation to violate the rights of the Dominion be conceived? And even when this mortifying and degrading announcement is uttered, the exulting and insulting cheers from our patronizing neighbors from the shores of Massachusetts are heard as the stolen vessel reaches Gloucester.

We, with Great Britain at our back, are able to maintain an independence against the United States, or we are not. If our present position is one of subsequence merely, liable to be destroyed at any instant if President Grant or his Government think it to their interest to pander to the rabble element so largely influencing their policy, the people should understand it; and the Dominion, instead of attempting to disguise its weakness by unbecoming speeches, should now, when no political trouble disturbs the atmosphere, have its position defined, and it needs be rather than the history of the Dominion should be a record of base truckling and unworthy yielding up of national rights to the United States, let the alternative be accepted with all its consequences.

The Dominion can only preserve its independence by respecting the rights of its neighbors, by frankly atoning for any inadvertent violation of them, and by a jealous guard to prevent, and prompt and firm action to redress, any violation of its own rights. It is too weak to wink at and disregard violations of our rights, and now that there is proclaimed eternal peace between the United States and the Dominion, let it be understood that while the Dominion will cultivate the arts of peace and faithfully discharge her duties as a friendly neighbor because it is her duty and she believes the interests of both countries require it, yet, that the Dominion possesses national rights which she will not yield up.

The Agricultural Exhibition.

The Agricultural Exhibition of the Sackville and Westmorland Agricultural Society took place on Friday last the 19th inst. The day was exceedingly disagreeable. The rain and hail fell steadily all day. Cold and wet as the weather was it did not dampen the ardor with which the whole proceedings were carried out. The attendance and entries (307) were as large as usual. In the building there were 226 entries. Vegetables were not in as great quantity as last year. The prize grains weighed as follows per bushel:—Wheat, 68 lbs.; Norway Oats, 42 lbs.; Buckwheat, 60 lbs.; Barley, 59 lbs., and Timothy Seed, 49 lbs.

Home-spun and fancy work, though good, were not as numerous as some years. The butter department was as full and creditable as usual. In the field, 59 roadsters, 25 draught horses, 10 short horn Durham stock, elicited much admiration as well for their fine proportions as their size. Eight bulls and eight heifers were entered. In grade stock, 18 bulls, 50 cows and heifers, and 90 head of oxen and steers were entered, and the show in these was better than last year. The sheep, 38 entries, did not show to advantage. In swine, 14 entries, there were some fine specimens. There were also some fine collections of poultry and a quantity of agricultural implements.

At the close of the proceedings the members of the Society adjourned at the Brunswick House, where we understand interesting speeches were made by Mr. McMonagle, Esq., of Sussex; Charles S. Legrain of the *Frederic*; and other gentlemen. We regret we have been compelled to make this notice so brief, and shall take occasion again to refer to the exhibition.

The Amherst Agricultural Fair.

The Exhibition took place on Tuesday. The weather was fine and the attendance though not very large was fair. The entries numbered 197; last year's being about 210. Manufactured articles made a poor show and not equal to last year. The show of roots was good, and that of butter, as might be expected, very good.

Horses.—There were four entries for the best mare and colt; John Embree, Jr., took the first prize. Best carriage horses, six entries; F. W. Bent took first prize. Best draft horse, nine entries; Thompson Keilor, first prize. Best three year old colt, five entries, was owned by Jos. Coates; best two years old colt, owned by Daniel Trauman; best one year old colt, four entries, owned by Joseph Coates.

NEAT CATTLE.—Best pair of oxen, girthed 7 feet 6 inches and 7 feet 8 inches, seven entries, owned by Jos. Coates; best three year old steers, three entries, D. McElmoun; best steers, two year old, girth 6 feet 5 inches and 6 feet 8 inches four entries, and weighed 2,600 pounds, William L. Ripley, best one year old steers, four entries, D. McElmoun; best pair steer calves, four entries, Thompson Keilor; best cow, seven entries, Torrey Bent; best heifer, two years of 1, seven entries, Jos. Coates; best one year old heifer, five entries, Wm. Fichet; best heifer calf, two entries, Torrey Bent; best bull, four entries, Wm. L. Pipes; best yearling bull, two entries, D. McElmoun.

SHEEP.—In sheep there were eleven entries; eight took prizes.

IS BUTTER there were fourteen entries. Torrey Bent took first prize for firkin butter, and first for tub butter. In these, four entries, Maynard Freeman had the best.

CHEESES.—Best wheaten, John Glen-dinning; best barley, John Logan; best buckwheat, five entries, Maynard Freeman; best white oats, James M. Layton; best black oats, five entries, J. M. Layton; best timothy seed, J. M. Layton.

POST OFFICE ROBBERY DISCOVERED.—Mr. John C. Campbell, son of Hon. Stewart Campbell, M. P. for Guysboro, a clerk in the Halifax Post Office, has confessed to the robbery of \$1800 belonging to the Bank of Montreal, and other robberies. General Inspector Dawe was sent from Ottawa to Halifax on Post Office business, and by close observation satisfied himself that Mr. Campbell was the culprit. On being charged by Dawe with robbery, he finally confessed. A few days ago he burned the money, fearing it might lead to his detection. He has been some ten years in the Post Office, living extravagantly on \$800 per annum. On Tuesday he bought his ticket and tried to leave in the Boston steamer, but was arrested and taken ashore. He is married to a highly respectable family, but has no children.

THE BARBAR at the Ladies' Academy on Tuesday was a decided success. The weather was extremely fine. The trains brought visitors from St. John, Amherst, and intermediate places, and the attendance was large. In the evening the grounds were lit up with Chinese lanterns and fireworks were let off, creating a fairly fine scene never before witnessed here. A picture gallery, fitted up by J. W. Gray, Esq., had hosts of visitors. The fancy, refreshment and supper tables were crowded. The remnants were sold at auction last evening. The net receipts are \$600.

Mrs. Cady.—The "Wednesday" contains an extract of a letter from Mrs. Cady formerly of this place, and now of Chicago. She speaks of the most distressing privations there, because of the want of food and water, although ear loads of provisions are continually going in. Attempts are continually made to set fire to the remaining portion of the city. Two daughters of Mrs. Cady were burned out and lost all but their lives.

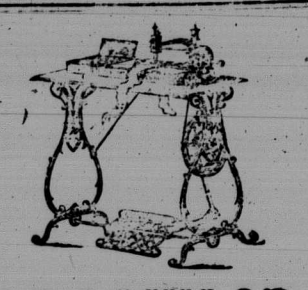

The Mayor of London issued an appeal for subscriptions, and public meetings have been called in London, Birmingham, and other places.

The "Temperance Banner" of Arthur N. Y. has for its motto: "Fight for the right and never get tired."

All roots, crops, and provisions were destroyed in seven counties of Wisconsin and the western portion of Michigan.
