How the "Times" was sent to Paris.

The long columns of announcements in the London "Times," intended for friends in Paris have for some time been a frequent subject of remark, and people have wondered what chance there was of their ever reaching the eyes for which they were meant. The means adopted for this purpose are as follows:—Three pages of the paper which contained communications to relatives in Paris were placed in great care by the London Stereoscopic and Photographic Company on pieces of thin and almost transparent paper, about an inch and a half in length by an inch in width. On these impressions there could be seen by the naked eye two legible words, "The Times," and six narrow brown bands representing the six columns of printed matter forming a page of the newspaper. Under the microscope, however, the brown space becomes legible, and every line of the newspaper was found to have been distinctly copied and with the greatest clearness. The photographs were sent to Bordeaux for transmission, thence by carrier pigeons to Paris. When received there they were magnified by the aid of the magic lantern, to a large size and thrown upon a screen. A staff of clerks immediately transcribed the messages and sent them off to the places indicated by the advertisements.

A French physician has investigated the effect of smoking on thirty-eight boys, between the ages of nine and fifteen, who were addicted to the habit. Twenty-seven presented distinct symptoms of nicotine poisoning. In twenty-two there were serious disorders of the circulation, indigestion, dullness of intellect and a marked appetite for strong drinks. In three there was heart affection; in eight decided dyspepsia; of blood; in twelve there was frequent epistaxis; ten had disturbed sleep, and four had ulceration of the mucous membrane of the mouth.

Ravages by Wild Beasts in India.

The Government of Bengal has sent to the Government of India a report of the war in the province against wild animals and snakes, and the Malabar Government has a like report on alligators—a menacing one it now at large, to the great terror of the people, in one district, which has lost by alligators a man, thirteen head of cattle, and fourteen buffaloes during the year. The government pays ten rupees, nearly £1 English, for every alligator above eight feet and a half long killed on the coast of Malabar. The Bengal Government has much greater trouble. In the Burdwan district about thirty thousand rupees were paid in a short time for the destruction of poisonous snakes, though only two annas (3d) were paid for each. In Behar the wolves are the principal pest, and the Government has to fight against a popular belief that any village where a wolf's blood is spilt will have ill-luck. Not only, there, do the people not enroll themselves on the side of the Government against the wolves, but they actually take the side of the wolves against the Government, and this in spite of a fearful loss of human life from wolfish depredations. At Chung Bhakar several herds of wild elephants have been devastating the country for two years, while the authorities have been differing as to whose business it is to attack them. Some action, however, is at last to be taken. And so with tigers, which have been allowed to multiply upon the people, till it is now very difficult to check them.

OUTPLANKED.—A gentleman of Halifax, being at a ladies fair, not long since, and being known to buy something, by a fair creature who kept one of the tables, said he wanted to buy what he feared was not for sale—a lock of her hair. To his surprise and delight she promptly cut off the coveted curl and received the price offered—ten dollars. The happy purchaser was exhibiting his trophy to one of his friends, who very shrewdly blessed his joy by saying, "She rather outplanked you, for to my certain knowledge, she only paid three dollars for the whole wig."

THE QUEBEC & NEW BRUNSWICK RAILWAY COMPANY.

AND THE NEW BRUNSWICK RAILWAY COMPANY, (From Fredericton and Woodstock to Riviere du Loup.)

TOTAL AUTHORIZED SHARE CAPITAL, \$3,500,000. Divided into 35,000 Shares of \$100 each. In addition to the Share Capital, power is reserved to borrow to the extent of \$15,000 per mile in Mortgage Debentures bearing six per cent. interest.

PROSPECTUS.

THESE COMPANIES are formed for the purpose of constructing, under charters granted by the Dominion of Canada and the Province of New Brunswick, an important commercial line of Railway from Fredericton and Woodstock to Riviere du Loup, so as to form a continuous line from Western Canada and the St. Lawrence to the City of St. John, New Brunswick.

It will be a continuation of the present system of Railways in New Brunswick, connecting with the European and North American, and Fredericton Railway, and the New Brunswick and Canada, and Woodstock Railways, the Grand Trunk and Intercolonial Railways at Riviere du Loup. (See Map.)

The distance to effect the connection between Woodstock and Riviere du Loup is about 189 miles, the total distance to Fredericton being about 232 miles; or, together with a branch to Woodstock, 240 miles.

Surveys have been made of the route, and estimates prepared, from which it has been ascertained that the cost of construction will not exceed \$23,000 per mile.

The Legislature of New Brunswick and Quebec have granted in aid of the undertaking the municipal donation of 2,400,000 acres of Crown Lands, to be given to the Company as the Railway is proceeded with, from the Counties through which it runs.

This aid is expected to be supplemented by subscriptions of stock from the Counties along the route, as well as from the City of St. John.

The commercial advantages of this undertaking are as follows:—

I. It is (as declared by the Montreal Board of Trade) the shortest and cheapest route for freight from Western Canada to the Atlantic at Saint John where there is an open harbor all the year round.

II. It is the most direct route to Quebec for passengers, and from Europe, either by way of St. John, or by Annapolis and Halifax.

III. The distance from Quebec to St. John via this route is shorter than by any other route, being per intercolonial Railway, 673; per Western Extension, 606; per Sherbrooke line, 445; and by this Railway, 420 miles.

IV. It will connect with Quebec the terminus of the North Shore Railway, the Canada Central, and ultimately the Pacific Railway, making Saint John the winter port of the shortest Pacific line on the continent.

V. The maritime provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia depend principally for flour and other articles of consumption upon Western Canada, and nearly all this traffic will come over this railway, because in addition to the shortness of the route, it will avoid the necessity of forwarding in bond through the United States, and also extra handling, transhipment and insurance. There will be a return traffic in West India produce, European and other imported goods.

VI. The local traffic will be rendered live, the proposed line passing through a comparatively well settled and prosperous district, especially gifted with abundant water power, with plentiful timber and other raw materials for manufactures, and with undeveloped agricultural resources capable of sustaining a very large population.

VII. The lands granted by New Brunswick will immediately produce by sales, leases, and timber licenses a revenue to the Companies apart from the traffic of the Railway.

VIII. It is estimated that the increased value of these lands will redeem the debentures, leave the Railway unencumbered in the hands of the shareholders, and at \$2.50 per acre pay for the cost of the Railway.

IX. It is intended to import laborers to work upon the Railway, to whom will be given free grants of land upon condition of settlement.

X. It is also the intention of the Company to import and induce settlers in lands now vacant, by sales of lands at low rates and long credits, thus realizing profits from the lands as well as Railway.

XI. The Traffic, estimated from existing data and returns from other Railways, under similar circumstances, is as follows:—

An addition of only \$44,000 to this amount, to be derived from Land and Timber Revenues, would give the shareholders a dividend of 6 per cent. The average net earnings on all the Canadian Railways being about \$2,000 per mile, there is no exaggeration in the above account.
