

BETTER BICYCLES. Important Invention for the Benefit of Wheelmen.

Pugliist Bezenah, Who Killed Tom James, Gets Off-The Winnipeg Bonspiel-General Sport-ing News.

THE WHEEL.

Stirlingshire boasts a grand old 'cyclist in the person of Mr. James Robertson, a merchant at Laurieston, near Falkirk, now in his 73rd year, who last year rode 2,000 miles on his bicycle. He rides out summer and winter, being often on the road as early as 4 and 5 in the morning.

A pneumatic tire for bicycles has been invented in Belfast, Ireland, which, if all that is claimed for it be true, must make a new era in this method of recreation. The tire for a full roadster is about 2½ inches in diameter and is composed of an outer covering of rubber, graduated in thickness from about one-quarter of an inch, where it

diameter and is composed of an outer covering of rubber, graduated in thickness from about one-quarter of an inch, where it touches the ground, and protected by canvas where it is attached to the rim, which is very broad and nearly flat. Inside this outer covering is an inner tube, which contains the air. The air is pumped in with a foot-ball blower and a patent air valve prevents its return. Vibration is practically annihilated. It is intercepted between the rim and the ground, and consequently the frame receives no jar except when an unusually large hole is encountered. A frame so protected should wear out two frames with solid tired wheels, and not only so, but riders will be able to use very much lighter frames without any danger to their collapsing. In a 50-mile road championship in the Phenix Park, Dublin, one of the competitors rode a racing safety, fitted with "pneumatic" tires, and scaling only 25 pounds, and yet it passed through the ordeal—an ordeal trying even to the heaviest makes—without the slightest damage.

They might avail themselves of the endowment fund, but this would be done at the expense of cutting

down salaries or reducing the staff. The Messrs. Patterson & Jolly, of this city, consigned their second shipment of 50 wagons to the Northwest on Saturday per C. P. R. the generosity of graduates who otherwise would come to the rescue. It is a visionary presumption to expect the Legislature to assume the responsibility of the loss and replace the building. 
