Montreal. Sept. 12.—The Methodist General Conference spent yesterday in filling the business larder. It received memorials in abundance and sheaves of reports of officers and boards, which were sent promptly to the appropriate committees.

The report of the Committee on the Union Church Fund showed that \$37,467 was raised, including \$17,050 borrowed on the treasurer's note. Four hundred dollars was expended on necessary expenses, \$4,976 on interest, \$4,236 on interest on appropriations, \$12,000 on original note, \$9,270 paid on appropriations, \$6,100 borrowed money repaid, \$433 balance on hand. The total amount appropriated was \$45,585, of which \$24,325 is still unpaid. To this liability must be added \$13,650 of borrowed money. A Visit to the St. Clair Tunnel

The Great Engineering Feat Complete Success.

Immense Advantages to the G. T. R. and the West.

Workmen know how to steer clear of the ponderous apparatus, but a visitor unaccustomed to the work finds great watchfulness necessary in dodging them. plan of making horizontal cuttings was adopted, and in 1889 the work was begun and carried on night and day—the men working eight hours a shift—down to the present time. The tunnel is 11,600 feet long from the beginning of one approach to the end of the approach on the opposite side. Of this distance only 6,000 feet, a little more than a mile, are wholly underground, and of this only 2,310 feet, less than half a mile, are under the river. There are 2,390 feet of tunnel under Michigan soil and 2,160 feet under ground on the opposite side of the river. No brick or stone was used in its construction, and when fully ready for use it will be simply an iron tube made of plates, 6,000 feet long and 20 feet in diameter, perfectly round and watertight, as dry as a street in summer time, lighted by electric light, ventilated by air engines, and kept at the right temperature with steam pipes. The cost of the tunnel will be between \$2,000,000.

THE TUNNELING
was accomplished by means of hydraulic shields, each \$0 tons in weight, one being placed in each headway. With 24 hydraulic rams the shield was placed forward far enough to admit of another section of castings. Each ram was worked separately, and thus the shield was directed at the will of the workmen, guided by the engineers. On the line of the river being reached on both sides, two air-tight bulkheads of brick and cement were erected across the tunnel. Each side of these bulkheads contained two large air chambers seventeen feet long and seven feet in diameter, with air-tight doors at each end and over each track. The work in the section next the shield was commenced under an air pressure of ten pounds, to the square inch, which was increased as the work progressed. Mr. J. T. Eames, the mechanical superintendent, explained the working of the system in an interesting way. He pointed out that when a gang of men or an empty car is to be admitted into the compressed air chamber the outside door of the air lock is opened, and they are admitted. The iron door is then closed, and the air valve is opened into the chamber until the pressure in the lock is equal to that in the tunnel under the river. The door leading in can then be opened without any trouble. The men worked under an artificial pressure in the latter stages of 22 pounds per square inch, or about 2½ atmospheres. The benefit of this compressed air is that its pressure is such that water and quicksand will rot flow into the tunnel— leak will not show itself at all. The air pressure equalizes the pressure of 37 pounds of the workmen. Only mules can be used in the compressed air sections. Horses upon being taken out of the compressed air isos the power of their limbs, and bleed at the mouth, eyes and nose. The men before being admitted must all be examined by the company's physician, Dr. Johnston. In t

If the air is let off too fast, when a man emerges into the outer atmosphere he finds that he has what is called the "benders," that is, his knees wabble under him, and he bleeds at the nose, mouth and ears.

INTERVIEW WITH SIR HENRY TYLER.

SIR Henry Tyler, president of the Grand Trunk Railway, who, with Sir Joseph Hickson, general manager of the company, has been tarrying at Point Edward for some time, accompanied by Mr. J. H. Beatty, the well-known lake vessel manager, entered the tunnel while the ADVERTISER representative was getting his bearrings. Invited to a seat on the wagon that was about to make its gradual descent to the central workings, the representative was enabled to engage in chat with the great railway authority, and at the same time to get a good mental portrait of him. Sir Henry is a man of about 65 years of age, comparatively short in stature, but athletic in figure, with piercirg blue eyes, and a fine white beard. He is animated in conversation so long as it takes a general turn, but when it comes to projects supposed to be under contemplation by his company, or

Though he holds the St. Clair tunnel to be a great engineering feat, reflecting much credit on Chief Engineer Hobson and his staff, Sir Henry does not believe that the age of engineering progress and wonders has come to an end. He has already reported on the feasibility of building a tunnel between England and France, under the Straits of Dover, and despite the gloomy predictions of the Francophobos, he still adheres to his belief. In his opinion it would not be half so difficult to cut through the chalk strata under the straits as it has been to cut a tunnel in the stiff blue clay of the St. Clair. He ridicules the idea of invasion from France, and says that with a few pennyworths of chemicals he could easily kill an entire French army long before they were half way through the tunnel. Sir Henry seemed perfectly familiar with every little detail of the great work, and proved a most entertaining guide. The present intention is to build a link from the neighborhood of Blackwell, a few miles west of Point Edward, and earry it past the west side of Clake Wawanosh, touching the corner of Peter Taylor's tarm, across Neil Leckie's place, just east of the crossing at the plank road, to the Sarnia branch and then to the tunnel. This will save the long detour to Point Edward round Sarnia Bay and through the town. The Sarnia branch being the straight line, it is likely that the greater portion of the through traffic will be diverted to it in the future. It is evident from the fact that huge yards are being laid out around the mouth of the tunnel, many acres in extent, that an enormous traffic is expected. Point Edward will not be used for much except for traffic from and to lake steamers. The construction of the tunnel will save nearly an hour in time in a railway journey to and from the West.

THE TORONTO INDUSTRIAL.

An "Off Day" at the Pair—Sports and Fireworks Postponed—The English Delegate.

Toronto, Sept. 12:—It was an off day at the exhibition yesterday. From morning till night the rain fell unintermittingly and heavily. The sky was dark and gloomy, and the streets were muddy and sloppy. It was breeders' day, and the attractions were far above the average of former years, but they had nearly all to be hold over. The programme in the horse ring was abandoned, and the display of fireworks announced for the evening had with many other things to be postponed.

At the official luncheon the chief guest was Col. Fane, one of the delegates from Great Britain who are inquiring into the agricultural resources and capabilities of the Dominion. The Colonel knows a good deal about Ontario, and he thinks the Province a fine field for practical farmers—men with some amount of capital who will assis in the development of the country. He has given a good deal of attention to the agricultural industry in Quebec, but he in not greatly impressed with the conditions under which the industry has to be followed there. He said he was ne stranger here, for he took part in the defense of the country against the Fenians in 1866. Among other things the Colonel said: "There is no use of men complete who have failed in two or three things here who have failed in two or three things. and tortunes without hard work, I shall not recommend young gentlemen to come here who have failed in two or three things before they go into farming. I shall try to induce young men of experience from my own country to come here." The Colonel's remarks were heartily applauded.

### BOOKS AND AUTHORS.

THE SHADOW OF A DREAM. By W. D. HOW ELLS. (New York: Harper & Brothers.) If there is such a term as "far fetchedness," and doubtless there is in the American language, it might fitly be applied to

The chief personages are Douglas Faulkner, a young lawyer, whose life had an "editorial phase," his wife Hermia, a model of wifely devotion, and his most intimate friend, the Rev. Mr. Nevil, an Episcopal clergyman. Faulkner, who has a smoky, pale complexion, with straight, black hair strong down in points over his forchead, is troubled with mental tendencies, corre-spondingly uncanny. Mr. Nevil on the con-trary has a bloom on his cheek, quite girlishly peachy, with very pure, still, carnest, blue eyes. Faulkner falls des-perately ill, with an effect of becoming earnest, blue eyes. Faulkner falls desperately ill, with an effect of becoming darker, smokier and more morbid than ever. His wife and Nevil are his constant and devoted caretakers. He is afflicted with a horrible dream, which, very vivid and recurring at frequent intervals, leads him to look upon his wife with abhorrence and treat Nevil with distrust. Neither of them suspect the nature of his dream, and after his death Hormia romantically refuses to be enlightened on the subject by the family physician, on the ground that if her husband had wished her to know, he himself would have told her. A year or two afterwards Nevil, having been dreadfully jilted by the girl of his choice, goes back to his old friends, Hermia and her mother-in-law, to have his wounds healed, and in process of time falls in love with Hermia. She is now stricken with a fatal curiosity regarding Faulkner's dream. On learning that it is a vision of herself and Nevil attending his funeral as a newly-wedded pair, her heart turns sick, Nevil shares her feeling, and these two conscientious and overscrupulous souls, loving each other deeply, and fearing that their love might have had its first faint unconscious beginning during the life-time of Faulkner, tear themselves from each other, and from the baleful shadow of a dream. The reader is relieved to know that both Hermia and Nevil die shortly after this decision.

Mr. Howells is a realist, a delicate and accurate painter of actual life. He is the George Washington of novelists; even in the minutest details he cannot tell a lie; but his latest story presses close to the verge of improbability. Does the man exist whos would release his hold upon the woman he loved from the fear that he might have coveted her when she was a wife? Where are the lovers whose spiritual sensibilities are cultivated up to such a pitch that they can be permanently forced apart by nothing more substantial than the shadow of a dream?

THE COURTING OF DINAH SHADD AND OTHER STORIES. By RUDYARD KIPLING, With a Biographical and Critical Sketch. By Andrew Lang. (New York: Harper & Brothers.)

No writer of recent note is more alked of than Mr. Rudyard Kipling, and talked of in more various fashions. So much praise has been lavished upon him that one might almost say his career had been "boomed," yet there have not been found wanting those who accuse him of inequality, flippancy and execrable taste. Genius may touch pitch and not be defiled, but it has been suggested with regard to Mr. Kipling why should it decide in conse-quence that it will never touch anything quence that it will never touch anything else? But were ever such striking results achieved from common, coarse materials? These half-dozen stories, like all the others that have flowed from Mr. Kipling's pen, are full of real fighting soldiers, primitive men, "gun-firing and bayonet-plunging creatures," whose siang is flavored with onion and tobacco. They are as warm hearted and as addicted to the practice of the warmer vices as are the favorite characters of Mr. Bret Harte's short stories. Indeed this extraordinary young literary celebrity from Bombay may be called the Bret Harte of the East. His "genial blackguards" are matched by Mr. Harte's great-hearted rascals. If the company to which Mr. Kipling introduces his reader is not to the latter's taste he can find his account in the match-loss vigor and brilliance with which the subject is treated. Brightness, audacity and spirit are shown on every page, but brevity in the power of condensation is the most marked quality of these tales of Indian native life. Not a superfluous word, not a feather's weight of padding is permitted. "Plain Tales from the Hills," the largest collection of Rudyard Kipling's stories, has been called "the best book ever written on India," by an authority of great experience in life and literature. He is really a close student of the military, social and native sides of Indian life. If some of his stories impress one as cearse and commonplace others are exquisite and artistic. Inequality else? Frankness is another good sign. In every language of civilized people a frank face is synonymous with a good face, and a false face with a wicked face. The most certain revelation of a wicked character is an oblique or furtive look. The muscles of the eye are always those which best resist hypocryix, and though one may weep when joylul or laugh with a lacerated heart, it is nearly impossible to openly front the look of others when the need is felt of hiding an emotion. Beware of the gaze that turns aside or has an uncertain character.

In a person of marked intelligence the head, forchead, eyes and chin are unusually large, or tending to be large, the ears and jaws small. The eyes express the degree of intelligence, the mouth the force or feebleness of will. The muscles of the intelligent face are mobile and vivacious; those of the stupid face are relaxed and slow to act. The maximum of will is expressed by a large chin thrown forward, and mouth closed; the weak-willed have a small, retreating chin, and half-open mouth. The eye and mouth are the two great expressive centers of the face. An absolutely negative expression is rare except in sleep. Of all the muscles those of the trunk are most amenable to the will, those of the face less obedient, those of the eyes the most independent of all. It is in the eyes that expression concentrates all its forces, A woman in the presence of witnesses may note the unexpected appearance of her lover without change of color, but she almost invariably lowers her eyelids. Even the eyes of a hypocrite tell us frankly that he is a hypocrite. Next to the eyes the gestures are the least deceitful means of expression. Another peculiarity of gesticulation is that two people alike in face express their emotion in analogous ways. 
