Right Men in the Right Place.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISEN:
Several of my shopmates and myself had an argument the other day. There were different opinions among us, so we decided to have your opinion through your paper, if you would be kind enough to give it. The question is this: "Is a practical pipe-layer, either water, gas or steam mains, classed among the different trades or not?" When the water commissioners let the contract for laying their mains this year, one of the party said he ought to have the contract on the ground that he was a mechanic, and that the man that got the contract was only a laborer; but I place him as a practical pipe-layer, and my reasons for doing so are this: When Stevens & Burns got the contract to lay all the mains in the city and to Springbank in 1878, according to this man's statement they could have got all the help they wanted in London. There were plently of blacksmiths and mechanics of all kinds idle in the city at the time, as trade was very dull. But they knew it was no use, and had to advertise for practical pipe-layers, and paid them from \$1.75 to \$2.50 per day. What I hold to is this, that waterpipe-laying is a branch entirely by itself, and it takes years to make a man perfect at the business. Now Irwin, the present contractor, has had very

branch entirely by itself, and it takes years it to make a man perfect at the business. Now it rwin, the present contractor, has had very good experience. When Peter Rimmer and our present foreman of waterworks was running the contracts for Stevens & Burns, two men that had spent the most of their lives at the business, he went with them to Hamilton, where they laid seven miles of pipe, five miles at Brampton and five miles at Dundas. Now, all of this ought to give a man pretty good experience, and more than that mostly every waterworks system on the continent of America is run by practical pipe-layers, and still this mechanic or blacksmith put them down as as laborers. ONLY A PARTIAL CURE. the House of Commons to amend the Fran chise Act. It provides that in case the electoral lists were not revised within twelve months of a general or a bye-election the Provincial lists shall be used, providing the Provincial lists are more recent.

The purpose of the motion is to preven scandalously incomplete lists, like those voted on in the elections last March, from being used in future. If the bill were permitted to become law it would in part neutralize the evil effects of the now thoroughly discredited Dominion Franchise Act, but only in part, The enormous expense of managing the Dominion lists would remain, and in Provinces like Ontario many men who have votes in the Provincial elections would be deprived in all ordinary contests of their right to go to the polls. Better far to adopt Mr. Cameron's bill to sweep away the entire iniquity, and save enormous trouble and expense to both political parties by using the one man, one vote, municipally-prepared lists.

A NOTABLE WORK .

How few people seem to comprehend that we are on the eve of the 100th anniversary of the establishment of a regular system of government in this portion of Canada? On Aug. 24, 1791, two "Orders" were passed by King George III. in council, one making the division of Quebec into Upper and Lower Canada by a boundary defined in the "Order," the other citing this "Order," and enjoining the issue of a warrant authorizing the Governor of Quebec to fix a day for the act to go into operation. Lietenant-Governor Clarke, in the absence of Governor Dorchester, proclaimed Dec. 26, 1791, as the day when the division of the Province should take effect. On July 16, 1792, Lieutenant-Governor Simcoe issued a proclamation from Kingston, then the seat of Government, dividing Upper Canada nto electoral districts. The first Parliament met at Newark (now Niagara) in October, 1792, and the second act which it passed was one to establish trial by jury in Upper Canada. Fifty years later, in 1841, as a result of Lord Durham's report, the excellent municipal system which we now enjoy, enlarged and improved was created in Upper Canada.

At this stage of the history of the coun try, and particularly of the Province of Ontario, which embraces the whole of what was known in those early days as Upper Canada, the student of a history so full of interest must gladly welcome volume of "Constitutional Documents of Canada." In it are placed the principa ocuments which embody the constitution and illustrate its development from the early days until the present The text of such important documents as the Quebec Act, 1774, the Constitutional Act, 1791, the Union Act, 1840, with amendments, the Act of Confederation with the addition made in 1871, 1875 and 1886, the Governor-General's commissions and royal instructions, treaties relating to Canada, stipulation with France, the United States and Russia regarding the fisheries, Lord Durham's report of 1839 upon responsible government, the Quebec conference resolutions

1864 is given, together with explanatory notes. These aids to the student are most valuable. He points out that this study is not only a desirable task for Canadian students to undertake, because it is the record of their own country, but because the distinctive merits of our con-

MANUFACTURED PROTESTS. There is much comment in Ottawa over the fact that the election petition deposits of \$1,000 a constituency are being paid out of a huge Government-accumulated fund, with a portion of which emissaries of the Administration have been sent into the ridings affected as soon as deemed practicable. These developments explain how

protests have been laid against the return of Liberals in constituencies where the local Conservatives are strongly opposed to continue the expense and turmoil of a political fight which, while not likely to change the representation, would demoral ize business at a time when it is highly impolitic to run any risks on that score.

PROHIBITION. The question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic will come before Parliamen

at an early day. There has been a disposition on the par of some politicians to shirk the subject, but it should be manfully faced.

Some profess to believe that the country is not ripe for the change, and will not vote for the principle till they are so convinced. This view may be honestly held, but it does not bring the question any

earer practical settlement. While we favor prohibition, as calculated to benefit the Dominion to an enormous extent, there should be no objection to first take a plebiscite on the subject. Nothing would be fairer, nothing more educative than a straight vote of the entire people on this question, apart from the entanglement of other matters of public policy. Surely no member of Parliament would oppose the taking of such a vote.

PERSONAL AND GENERAL.



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

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
