MARINE DISASTERS.

London, May 21.-A quantity of wreckage of a three-masted schooner was washed ashore at Castle Bay, Hebrides, yesterday afternoon, and later the body of a young seaman was washed ashore at Port Patrick, on the southwest coast of Scotland. Of a Four-Story Brick Building in Buffalo.

Between 15 and 20 People Buried in the Ruins.

Some Fatally Injured Persons Recovered -The Work of Rescue-Sad Sight.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 21 .- A loud crash. the breaking of timbers, sound of falling bricks, shricks of men. united in startling people in the vicinity of Main and Seneca streets about 9:20 o'clock this morning. What seemed at first to be an awful calamity, involving great loss of human life moment's warning while a large number of men were at work in the building remodeling it. The building went down upon a cou-ple of smaller brick buildings adjoining on the east side and practically demolished them. Schnert's barber shop, next door to the falling building, was crushed like an egg shell. It was full of barbers and customers, and it was certain that all of them did not get out alive.

Quickly responding to an alarm, a force of bremen were put at work clearing away the ruins. Memorial to O'Reillu. Patriotism and Poesy Linked in Portraiture and Allegory.

Unique Tribute in Stone and Brenze to of the Celtic warrior as Patriotism, the Patriot and Poet.

Blending, as it will, the elements of portraiture and of allegory, which so rarely consort in art, and fitly combining the inspiration of poesy and patriotism, the memorial to John Boyle O'Reilly, the Irish author and patriot, will be unique among artistic conceptions in Boston, and appropriately so, as it is designed to embody the real COUNTRY. as it is designed to embody the real and the ideal in one of the most diversely gifted personalities that our land has greeted. It is the outcome of the concensus of tributes from various classes and races which clamored for expression on that sad summer morning, five years ago, when the tidings came that he who was beloved by his adopted, not less than his native country-for his endowments of nature, not more than his endearing qualities of heart-had been summoned away

forever. Mr. A. Shuman, who contributed very largely, both by funds and personal effort, to the raising of the fund of \$20,000 necessary for the contract, acted as treasurer during the major portion of the time, and, in conjunc tion with Hon. P. A. Collins and Mr. Thomas B. Fitzpatrick, served in permanent trusteeship of the sum for the monument.

The contract was given to Mr. Daniel Chester French, of New York, formerly of Boston, who has been characterized by O'Reilly's biographer and successor, Mr. James Jeffrey Roche, as "a poet who writes in marble and bronze;" and who has achieved fame by his works representing the story of ville. Music was furnished by the home lodge choir, assisted by Miss also the Minute Man and of the Angel of Death arresting the hand of the young sculptor, Martin Milmore. Mr. Roche says of him, "He moulds in clay as the great painter mixes his colors, with brains and poetry. All the faces and outlines are of marked grace and fidelity of expression, in keeping with the sentiment they set forth, the tender sympathy of Mother Erin, the lofty inspiration of Peesy and the resolute devotedness presenting a group which is rarely rivaled for individual excellence as well as consummate unity in the purpose to which they are tributary. The unveiling of this memorial, which is now expected to take place on the 13th of June, will be one of the most interesting events of its character that has taken place in Boston. 

NEW NIAGARA BRIDGE

To Be Substituted for an Old Without Disturbing Traffic.

Harrisburg, May 21.—The Pennsylvania Steel Company has closed a contract with the Niagara Falls Suspension and the Niagara Falls Inter-national Bridge Companies for the erection of a steel arched bridge to take the place of the present suspension bridge, built by Roebling in 1855. The arch measures 550 feet, and the center will be 260 feet above water level. This is the longest single steel arch ever designed. length of the bridge will be more than 1,100 feet. The bridge will double decked open structure. On the upper deck two tracks will be laid, and on the lower one will be two electric car tracks, a roadway and two footwalks. There will be two ribs or main arches, 550 feet long by 4 feet deep and 3 feet wide, which will be shipped in 25-ton sections from the steel plant. Every particle of the structure will be made at Steelton from the raw material, and shipped

to the Falls.

The structural work will be done by the cantilever process, and no superstructure will be necessary. The traffic of the steam and electric lines will not be interfered with, yet the new bridge will occupy exactly the

same position as the old one. The structure will cost about \$500,-It is to be completed in one




