Malta, Feb. 3. - The British battleship Duncan, flagship of Rear Admiral Sir George Astley Callaghan, second in command of the British Mediterranean fleet, with the cruisers Lancaster, Minerva and Barham, and four torpedo boat destroyers, has left here for Piraeus, the port of Athens.





SHORT SESSION WILL **CUT INTO ALLOWANCE**

\$300 From Present Sitting.

Toronto, Feb. 3.-A terrible suspicion is creeping over the minds of the members of the Ontario Legislature. It is beginning to look as though Sir James Whitney and the members of his Government intend to get through all the business of the session in one calendar month. Just how this will affect individual

members will be seen when it is realized that under the Legislature act the indemnity of the members will be paid only at the rate of \$10 per day, or a total of \$300 for the session, instead of the \$1,000 they have been accustomed to receive. Added to this there is a deduction of \$4 per day to be made for every day on which a member is absent. It does not take an advanced mathematician to work out the problem of just how much the members stand to lose under this scheme, and to many of them the \$1,000 they have been accustomed to receive has been a very acceptable

sum. A 30-day session would be some-thing in the nature of a precedent, but it looks at present as though that precedent would be established. The sessional business is already well under way, and if the present rate of progress is kept up, the end of the session cannot well pass the 30-day mark. The crop of private bills has never been so light; very few of the members have yet given signs of having any, and Sir James has already spurred his followers up

steady effort. If the session should really come to close in 30 days, it will cost each of the members the sum of \$700, but on the other hand the saving to the province will reach the respectable to-

tal of \$74,200. THE 3-5 CLAUSE
